### LIFE IN GREENLAND.

Summers Pleasant and Winters Not So Bad, a White Woman Writes.

Certain white men in the Danish government service live along the southwest coast of Greenland. How do the European women and children thrive in that Arctic land? It is interesting to hear from one of these women, who has written to the German paper Ausland that on the whole they like Greenland, have many simple pleasures there, their children are happy and robust, and the natives are simple, jolly and industrious.

The writer says that life is not irksome, though the coast is bleak and the winter snows are deep. She lives in Godthaab, the capital of the colony of south Greenland. The white women spend many of the summer hours on the hills or in the gardens.

"My garden," she writes, "from the Greenland point of view, is a great success. A broad walk divides it into two parts. On one side beets, radishes, cabbages and some other vegetables grow lustily and mature even in the short summer.

"On the other is a beautiful grass plot, sprinkled with dandelions and daisies, and in a corner is a little hot-house in which we bring a few European flowers and strawberries to perfection. Near the entrance are garden chairs and a little table, and often, in the afternoon, all the white women in the colony sit here with their needles, enjoying their tea and the bouquets of roses and gilly flowers which the hot-houses provides."

The Danish mothers and their children are often seen on fine summer days climbing the hills behind the settlement, some with their sewing, others with books, while a tea kettle and a basket of fresh baked cake are carried by the young Eskimos. In sunny places, protected from the wind, the picnic-party enjoys the glorious view of the blue sea, and the entertainment is varied by visits from the village goats, imported from Europe generations ago and thriving in their new home.

The single street of Godthaab, says the New York Sun, is lined with houses and bears the name of Lange-Linie, in memory of the famous promenade of that name in Copenhagen. It is a noisy street in summer, for it is the center of the happy-out-of-door life of the people and the playground of the children, both Greenlanders and European.

The little folks recognize no racial distinction. They are all playmates together; and in fact, there is a large European admixture in all the Eskimos, old and young.

"Sometimes," the narrative continues, "we hear a furious shout, 'The post, the post!' and in an instant the whole colony is out doors.

"We see a boat coming up the bay propelled by the paddle of one of the Eskimos whose business is to travel

from one settlement to another with the mail. The Eskimos are just as interesting as we are, for all can read and write and are eager for the news from their friends in the northern colonies. Only a few old women standing in their doors or sitting on the flat roofs have no part in the general excitement.

"But the stir and bustle are greatest if an oar is fixed upright like a mast in the boat. This means that the boat is from one of the southern settlements, where a vessel from Denmark has arrived, and the Eskimo postmen are trusted with letters from our dear ones in the home land, as the ship is unloading a part of her cargo and will not arrive for several days. The governor of the colony opens the post bag and its contents are for days the chief topic of conversation."

A different aspect Godthaab wears in the winter months. Even in South Greenland there is a long period when the moon and stars are the only illumination and there is just enough light to make the settlement look dimly ghost like, nearly buried, as it is, in the deep snow.

Some of the Eskimos give all their time to shoveling the snow out of Lange Linle, so that there may be one place to promenade between the dwellings, the school house, the kirk, the store and the meathouses, where supplies of frozen flesh and birds are kept.

The path is wide and walled in on either side by snow piles. But even in this gloomy season the white women wrapped in furs, have their walks and picnics.

There is zest in the air and in fine weather the women enjoy a scramble among the frozen hills and valleys; and if fresh snow lies deep and soft they wear snowshoes. It is a busy time for the Eskimos, for their main business is to look out for the comfort of Denmark's agents in Greenland. They bake, brew, forge, sweep and clean.

### THE PEOPLE? PSHAW!

The "Financial Age," published at New York, printed in its issue of March 23rd, this editorial:

#### Hopes for Aldrich Bill.

The removal of the railroad bond feature from the Aldrich bill provokes the question: Is currency legislation something to please a voting constituency, or is it something for the financial betterment of a people? This action is considered a direct play to the west and southwest, and it may save a congressman or two. There is another question, of course—even with this feature eliminated, does the bill answer the purpose? That question is of considerable importance.

In other words, is currency legislation or any other legislation for that matter to be for the benefit of the people or for the advantage of a coterie of individuals?

The editor of the "Financial Age" evidently thinks that currency legislation should be passed in accordance with the pleasure of the financier. Then railroad legislation should be arranged by the railroad magnates; trust legislation by the trust magnates; tariff legislation by the tariff beneficiaries and so on down the line. But the people—who are the people, anyhow, if they are not the men who provide the republican party with its campaign funds?—Bryan's Commoner.

Tons and tons of paper; barrels and barrels of printers' ink—all consumed daily in Texas—in the interest of what? Politics purely. And not an inch of the white or a drop of the black for the State's needed commercial and industrial advancement. Turn Texas loose!—Temple Telegram.

Not so fast. All the papers of Texas are not ignoring development of Texas in order to print politics. Not a single one of either West Texas or the Panhandle is doing it, and they have some good papers in those sections. The Abilene Reporter isn't doing it, nor either are the Amarillo Panhandle, the Wichita Times, the Hereford Brand, the Childress Post and a dozen others. Why not get a different kind of exchange list?—Fort Worth Telegram.

It is far better to boost for your town, county and State than to be everlastingly fighting the battles of this or that candidate for political honors. If one is to believe half the leading candidates of the opposing factions are saying of each other, there would not be much honor to the democratic party of Texas in delegating either to represent it in the national convention.

In a letter under date of St. Paul, Minn. March 27th, and addressed to the publisher of the Swedish American Post of Minneapolis, Governor Johnson announces his candidacy for the democratic nomination for the presidency. In this letter Mr. Johnson said: "Matters have progressed so far, however, that it seems to me that I should at least say, in answer to your interrogation, that if the democratic party of the nation believe me to be more available than any other man, and felt that by my nomination I could contribute any service to the party and to the nation, I should be happy to be the recipient of the honor which has been paid me by the people of Minnesota, and if the democratic party of the State desires to present my name to the next national convention, I am sure I would have no objection; but even if Minnesota were the only State to declare for me at that time, I should still feel that the distinction was one of the greatest which could come to me."

The fellow with a poll tax receipt will be given several opportunities to vote this year. On next Tuesday our municipal election is to take place, following that the democratic primaries to decide who shall go as delegates to the Denver national convention, which will be held on May 2nd. Next in order will be the primary elections for the nomination of candidates for State and county offices in July. After that will come the general election in November.

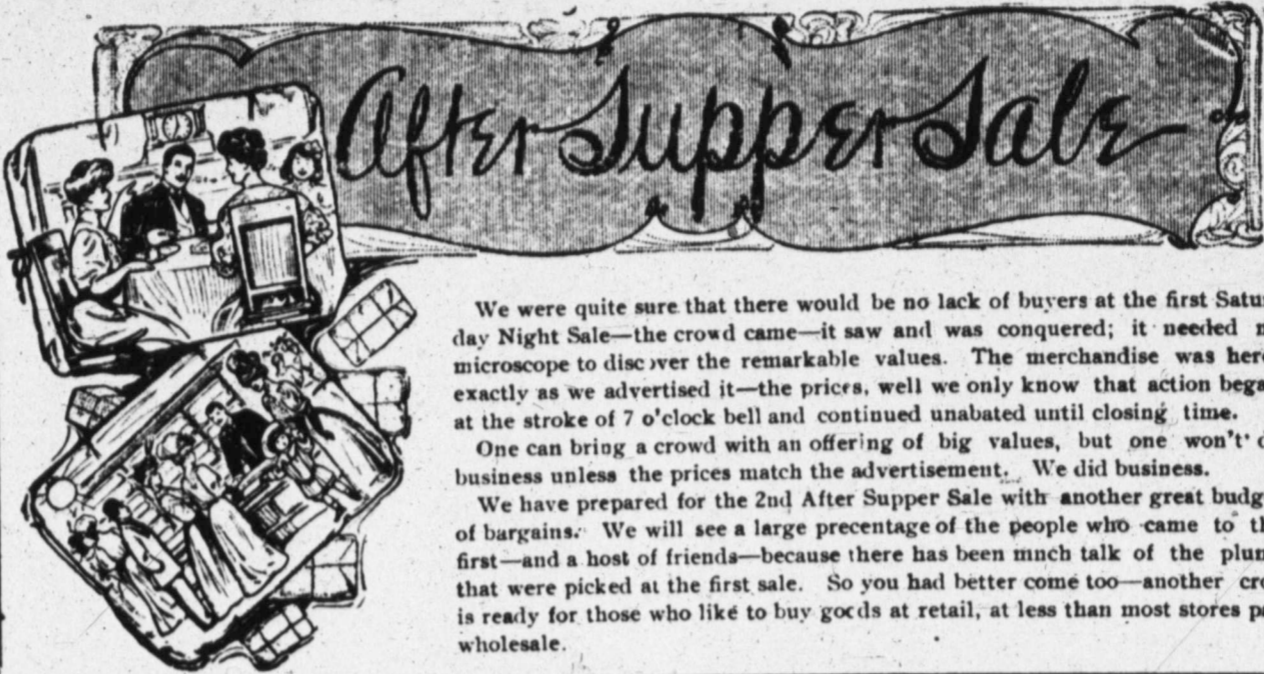

**About Judge Dillard.**  
In speaking of the selection of Judge J. E. Dillard of Kaufman, who is the father of Mrs. G. D. Anderson of this city, as an elector at large on the anti-Bailey ticket, the Dallas News says: Judge George W. Riddle, chairman of the Democratic Club of Texas, said yesterday: "Hon. Roger Q. Mills has withdrawn his name as a candidate for presidential elector at large to the Denver convention, and we have secured the consent of Judge J. E. Dillard of Kaufman to substitute his name in place of that of Col. Mills on the ticket. Judge Dillard has always been a democrat, and he has never scratched a ticket. He is a strong man mentally and physically. With a record clean from top to bottom, he stands without a blemish."  
Born in Georgia in 1833, Judge Dillard came to Texas at the age of 13 years, locating first in Liberty county, but later going to Cherokee, where he studied law and was admitted to the bar. After the war, in which he served as a volunteer on the Confederate side, he was elected county judge of Cherokee county, but was removed by order of the military government. In 1869 during reconstruction days he was elected to the State senate from the Third district, but although he received a clear majority of the votes, his competitor was counted in. Shortly afterward there was again a vacancy in the Senate from the Third district, and Judge Dillard again became a candidate. He was again elected, but was, after a contest of three months duration in the senate, expelled from that body on the ground that the negroes of his district were not permitted to vote, a charge which Judge Dillard and his friends contended was false. This was under the E. J. Davis administration.  
In years after when democracy gained control Judge Dillard served several terms both in the senate and in the house. He was present when the military government was expelled from the capitol, and Gov. Coke was seated. He later temporarily retired from politics, and transferred his residence from Cherokee county to Kaufman. Beginning in 1882 he served six years as county judge of Kaufman county, and in 1888 he was elected to the legislature. He was chairman of the committee on constitutional amendments, and made a report in favor of a permanent railroad commission. In 1893 he was appointed by Gov. Hogg to be district judge of the Fourth district, and he was continued in that office by the people for thirteen years. In 1907 he voluntarily retired to private life.

### ARE NOT DISHEARTENED.

Taft's Opponents Making Hard Fight and Secretary Hasn't a Cinch On the Nomination.

Washington, April 2.—While Secretary Taft continues to enjoy a long lead in the race for delegates to the Republican national convention, those opposed to him have by no means abandoned hope of preventing his nomination. Frank Hitchcock, the Taft manager, claims 552 delegates pledged and in prospect for his delegate. This would land the secretary on the first ballot, as 491 votes will nominate.

The opposition discredit Hitchcock's calculations and charge the Taft manager with trying to capture the nomination by bluster and bogus claims. To this end the Taft people planned the early assembling of conventions in states favorable to the war secretary. From now on, say the representatives of the opposition, the Taft forces must fight for what they get, and they predict that within the next thirty days the band wagon will drop back.

So far 254 delegates have been elected. Of these, 146 that are uncontested have been instructed for Taft and sixteen that are for him have been contested. There are twenty-two other contested delegates claimed by the anti-Taft men. There are twenty-four uninstructed delegates and some of these are Taft men, as in Virginia, where Taft men were selected but not instructed.

In opposition the ranks Indiana has instructed twenty-six delegates for Fairbanks and Illinois twenty for Cannon. The big vote of New York for Hughes and Pennsylvania for Knox are soon to be added. Most of the New England states are expected to resist Taft instructions. It is claimed that in addition with the votes now aligned the field and the favorite son states it will be necessary to secure but 140 votes more to control the convention. In response to the statement that there are many second choice Taft votes in the favorite son States, it is claimed that there are corresponding soft spots in the Taft column.

### Mr. Blaine's Request.

Years ago, just two weeks after Grover Cleveland had been inaugurated president for the first time, Jas. G. Blaine, his defeated opponent, went to the White House and into the Cleveland presence. It became known afterward that Mr. Blaine told Mr. Cleveland that he came to ask a favor, only one favor of the administration. Then the defeated one told the president that he hoped sincerely that a certain man in Maine, a democrat, would not be given the office that it was known he craved.

Mr. Blaine told Mr. Cleveland that the campaign of the summer and fall previous had been a campaign of personal abuse and mud-slinging in which neither party chief had a part and which both discountenanced. The Maine man who Mr. Blaine wished to have denied the office that he sought was the man who in a large part was responsible for certain stories concerning the early personal life of Blaine, which, even had they been true, should never have seen print.

Mr. Cleveland's answer to Mr. Blaine on that occasion was never known in its exact form, but this much is known, the Maine mud-slinger asked for his office only to have his request met with pointblank refusal.—Washington correspondence Chicago Post.

The impostor claiming to be Jonathan G. Thaw, who was arrested as the result of confidence games worked here and in Vernon, has been given a preliminary hearing at Vernon and has been bound over to the grand jury. He was unable to furnish bond, which was set at \$750.

## SHIPPING CATTLE

MOVEMENT OF NEARLY THREE HUNDRED CAR LOADS HAS BEGUN.

### LOADED AT ARCHER CITY

Two Train Loads a Day Being Moved Over the Wichita Falls and Southern Railway.

One of the largest movements of cattle ever known in this section of the country is now under way and during the next week the Wichita Falls and Southern will haul nearly three hundred carloads of steers from Archer City. Of these 60 cars will be loaded with cattle from the "66" ranch, owned by L. F. Wilson and the remainder will come from the Club ranch and are owned by Mr. Courtney and E. B. Carver.

The cattle are being gauled out of Archer City at the rate of two train loads a day and at this rate about a week will be required to complete the shipment.

At this place the loaded cars will be turned over to the Katy and will be hauled to a point on the Fort Smith and Western railroad in Oklahoma, where the cattle will be placed on pasture.
