SECRETARY STRAUSS DELIVERS
SPEECH BEFORE SAVANNAH
BOARD OF TRADE.

LABOR AND IMMIGRATION

Should Welcome Self Respecting Hon-
est-Minded Aliens, But Give No
Room to Socialism.

Savannah, Ga., April 4.—In a speech before the Savannah Board of Trade last night Secretary Thomas of the Department of Commerce and Labor in part spoke as follows:

"Our age and generation is preeminently commercial, and the people of the United States are in front, both in the rewards they reap and in the prosperity they enjoy. The spirit of commerce has contributed more than any other cause toward bringing together the various sections of this great nation, which in its growth and development, in its necessities and expansion, has wiped out socialism and made us one united people.

"Commerce thrives along the highways of peace, and it speaks the universal language of peace. No agency is working more steadily toward the peace of international commerce than the agencies of commerce. Appreciating all this as I do, and appreciating also the ideal condition for all nations which is to be reached by the millions that we are now spending on armies and navies and use them in promoting the economic welfare of the masses, yet so long as other nations, though progressing toward that ideal, are far from its realization, a great country such as ours, with such a tremendous season and with great international interests, can best serve the cause of peace and hasten the ideal condition by a navy adequate in strength and efficiency to give it the proper weight in the promotion of peace, in the council of nations.

"The commercial development of the South, as distinguished from the production of agricultural staples, is of comparatively recent growth, and for that reason all the more remarkable. Let me cite a few examples. Since 1870 the railroads of the South have grown from 1,500 to 61,500 miles; in other words, they have practically quadrupled in length, while those of the other parts of the United States have only quadrupled. Take the cotton manufacturing industry. In the same period of time it grew from eleven millions to one hundred and sixty-three millions. In the same period the value of all manufactures in the South has grown from two hundred and seventy-eight millions to one billion five hundred and twenty-six millions, nearly double as much in percentage as the rest of the country. In the period from 1900 to 1906 the number of national banks and individual deposits in national banks have increased more than one hundred per cent, while the deposits in the banking institutions of the country as a whole have increased only eighty per cent. In the State of Georgia the growth has been equally gratifying. To take a few examples, the value of cotton manufactures from 1870 to 1905 has grown from three and one-half millions to thirty-five millions; and the total value of manufactures during the same period has grown from thirty-one millions to one hundred and fifty-one millions, and the value of exports passing out of this port of Savannah has grown from thirty millions in 1870 to more than sixty-three millions in the fiscal year 1907.

"Now, I have referred to this, not to glorify your greatness, but rather to direct your attention to future possibilities. Great as this growth has been your opportunities for the future will certainly be increased by the construction and opening of the Panama Canal. The market for cotton goods in Latin America amounts to about one hundred millions a year, and with the opening of that canal the entire Pacific frontage of Latin America—the total imports of which amount to more than six hundred millions, will afford attractive markets for you.

SENTENCED TO HANG

COURT SAYS JAMES B. CARSON
MUST HANG BY THE NECK
UNTIL DEAD ON MAY 22.

JUDGE'S VOICE TREMBLED

And Condemned Man Was Also Visibly Affected and Earnestly Protested His Innocence.

James B. Carson, the convicted murderer of L. F. McLemore, is to pay the extreme penalty of the law by being hanged by the neck until he is dead, on Friday, May 22nd.

This was the awful sentence imposed upon Carson in district court this morning, and a crowd of several hundred had assembled in the courtroom to hear Judge Patterson fix the date of execution.

It became known late yesterday afternoon that Carson was to be sentenced at the opening of court this morning and in spite of the bad weather, a large crowd was present to witness the event.

Sheriff Pope and deputies left the jail with Carson promptly at 8:55, and arrived in the courtroom with him at 9 o'clock. Judge Patterson entered from the rear of the room and instructed the sheriff to open court, which was done. Asking if James B. Carson was in the room, the answer was returned that he was, and he was ordered to stand up.

Carson, who was attired in a light suit of clothes, clean shaved except for a thin, light mustache, and with his face covered almost with the pallor of death, slowly arose to his feet and faced the judge.

In a voice tremulous with suppressed emotion, Judge Patterson briefly reviewed the fact that Carson was convicted of murdering L. F. McLemore at the April, 1907, term of the district court, the crime being fixed by a jury of his own selection at murder in the first degree, with the death penalty assessed. The court referred to the fact that the defendant had been furnished the services of able attorneys who had carried his case to the court of criminal appeals, where it was affirmed, according to the mandate received in the case. He stated that under the laws of the State of Texas it was necessary for him to impose sentence and asked Carson if he had anything to say before sentence of death was pronounced upon him. In a husky voice Carson replied:

"Nothing more than that I am not guilty, and I ask the court for all the time it can give me."

That was all he said, and his face was of an ashy whiteness when he made his statement.

Judge Patterson assured the prisoner that he had been given a fair and impartial trial and his guilt established by the evidence to the satisfaction of the jury and the courts that had passed upon it. Accordingly, there was nothing for him to do but to impose the sentence and fix the date of execution.

The sentence of the court is that you, J. B. Carson, shall be taken by the sheriff of Parker county on Friday, May 22, to the place of execution and hanged by the neck until you are dead. And if you have any arrangements to make, either concerning this world or the next, my advice to you is to make them. And may the Lord have mercy on your soul. Remove the prisoner, Mr. Sheriff.

The crowd began to surge out the front door and the sheriff and his deputies carried Carson out the back door and to the jail, where he has been placed in the condemned cell, and will be under constant watch day and night until the hour arrives for his execution.

Carson is still vehemently protesting his innocence, and evidently still has some hope the governor will commute his sentence or grant him a reprieve. It is not believed he will make a confession until the last ray of hope is gone, and perhaps not then. It may suit his purpose to enter the presence of his Maker with a denial on his lips, and if that is the case, there is no method of compelling him to make a

ROAST REPUBLICANS

WILLIAMS CHALLENGES MAJORITY
TO PUT PULP AND PRINT
PAPER ON FREE LIST.

FILIBUSTER IN HOUSE

Charged That Gentleman's Agreement
is Broken By Republicans—Pays
Respects to Cannon.

New York April 3.—A special to the New York Herald from Washington says:

Washington, April 3.—Minority Leader John Sharp Williams today told the Republicans of the House that the Democrats were "enlisted for war" in the present filibuster being maintained to force legislative action upon the President's legislative program before Congress.

He said the Democrats as a party had no political advantage to lose as a result of the sealing process now going on and challenged the Republicans to bring in a rule putting wood pulp and print paper on the free list. He said the majority had the power to act if it wanted to do so.

In the course of his remarks Mr. Williams called Speaker Cannon "Old Man-Afraid-of-His-Horses," and likened Majority Leader Seno E. Payne of New York to Falstaff. Democrats who have not hitherto been overfriendly to Mr. Williams crowded around him to shake hands after the "roast" was concluded.

Mr. Williams speech followed a day of filibustering, which delayed the business of the House and made the Republicans squirm. Roll call after roll call was forced, more than three hours being utilized in agreeing to Senate amendments to the urgent deficiency bill, carrying appropriations for the armor and armament of battleships, although everybody in the House favored the bill.

Ordinarily the amendments would have been adopted in fifteen minutes. Following the delay the Republicans brought in a rule limiting the debate on the District of Columbia appropriation bill to two hours and authorizing only one roll call to get out of the committee of the whole House back into the House again.

Mr. Williams charged that this rule broke a gentleman's agreement entered into some time ago for eight hour's debate.

EVIDENCES OF POISONING.

Body of Hackman Discovered in Amarillo Rooming House This Morning.

Amarillo, April 4.—The dead body of Roy Blasergame, a hack driver, was found in his room at a rooming house here this morning with evidences of poisoning. The coroner is now investigating the case and sensational developments would not be surprising.

This afternoon, T. M. McCullough, formerly of Cache, Oklahoma was found dead in the county jail. His death is believed to have been caused by an attack of heart failure.

TAFT RESOLUTION DEFEATED.

DIDN'T NEED EXTENSION.
Big Pasture Farmers are Making Payments to Avoid Interest.
Lawton News-Republican.
That many of the thirty-five hundred farmers of the Big Pasture were not in need of the special legislation of congress granting extension of time upon land payments is evidenced by the fact that large numbers of them are still continuing to make the payments as they fall due, notwithstanding the fact that, even when payment is offered, they are notified of the extension. These who are paying state that they have the money ready and would prefer to make the payments as they are due than to pay the interest required in the extension bill.
Numerous applications are also being received from many of the pasture farmers for final proof, thus taking advantage of the right to prove up their claims after fourteen months of payment of the entire price of the land.
"There is a surprising activity along this line," said Register H. D. McKnight today, "and they, together with the final proofs from the original Kiowa and Comanche county, are rushing us closely now. These, however, are having to wait their time, until scheduled for hearing in order with the original settlers.
The homestead law pertaining to the settlement of public land provides that final proof must be made within seven years from the date of entry. Since it takes some time in which to effect final proof, those who made entry in the original opening in August are hurrying their applications.
There is an unusually large number who have yet to make final proof, since many waited with the hopes that congress might pass a free home bill later.
The fourteen months for pasture settlers begins to arrive May 18th next. In the making of any kind of payments to the local land office, claim owners are urged not to send any kind other than currency or postoffice money orders. Checks or drafts will not be accepted. If, however, payment is desired to be made through local banks any agreement may be made to the bank permitting the bankers to pay currency into the land office.

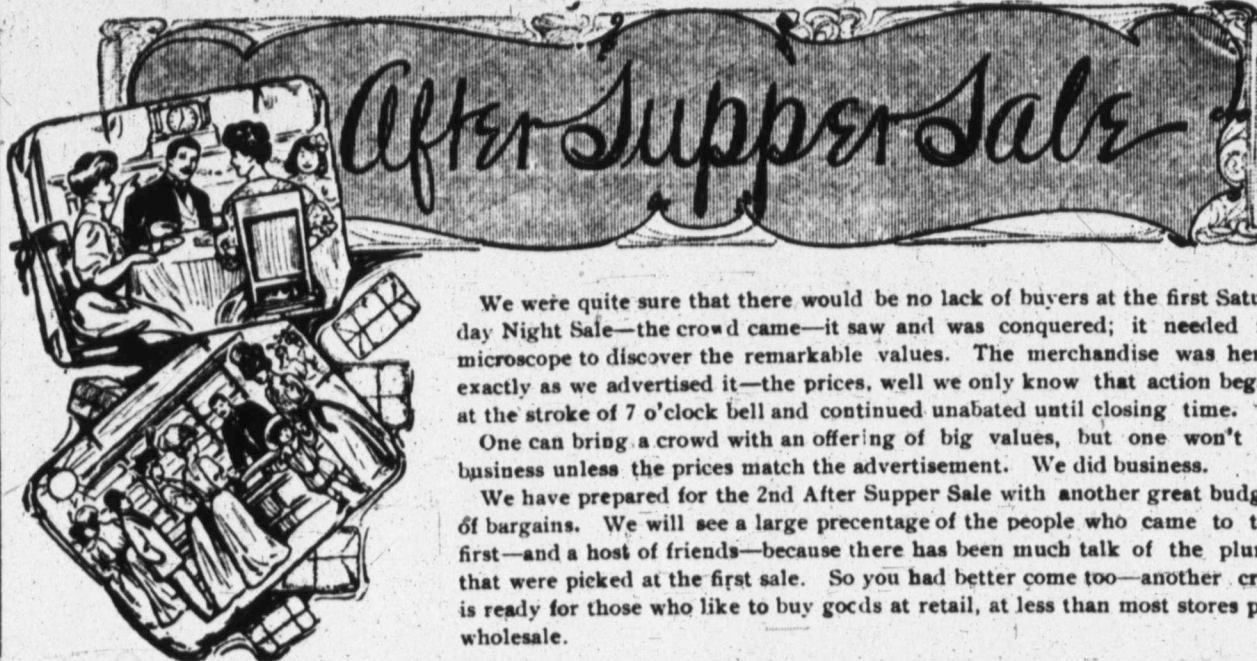

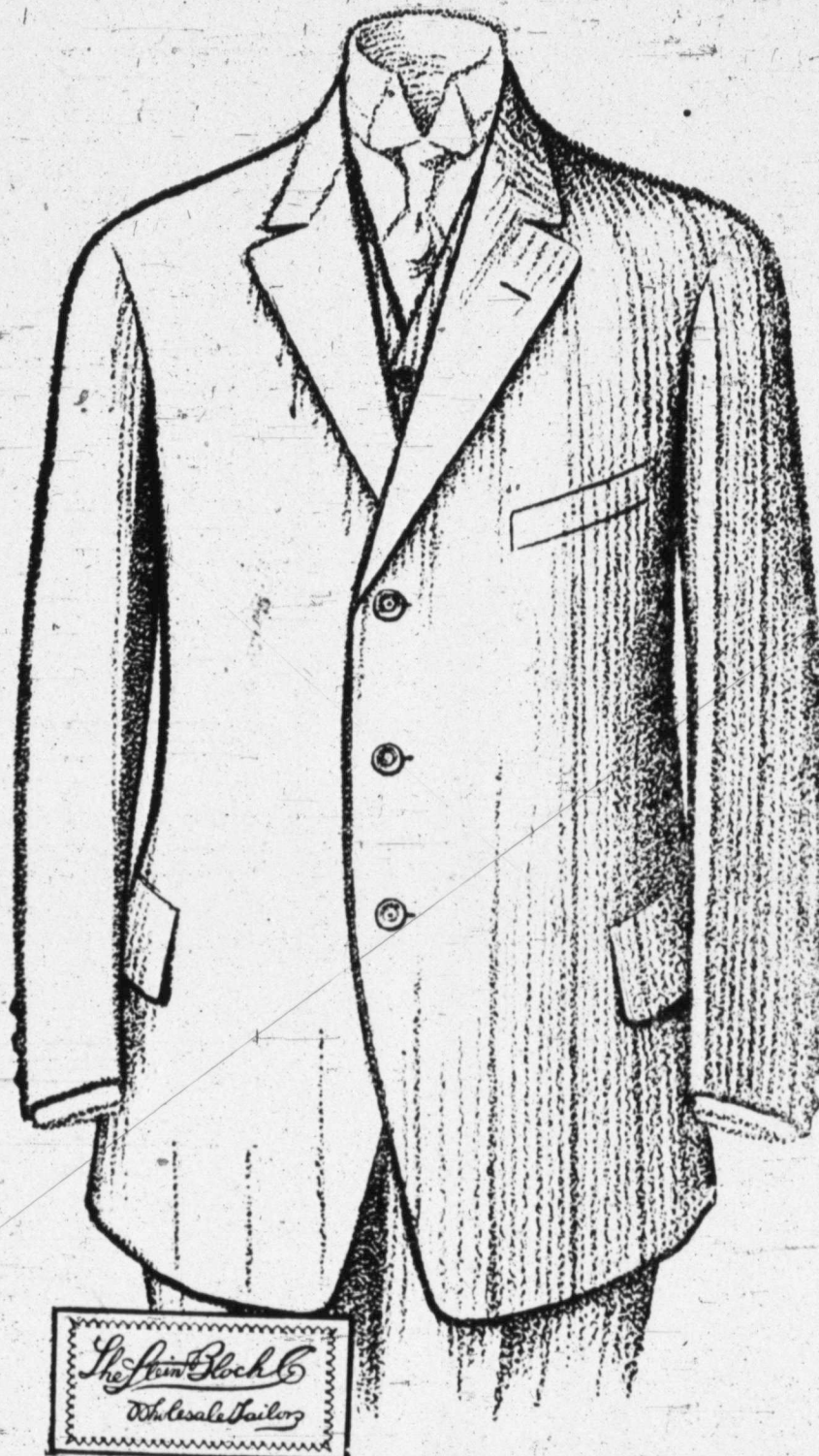
