WAGES OF 125,000 MILL HANDS ARE GUT

Boston, Mass., April=6.-A wage reduction averaging ten per cent became effective today in the cotton mills in New England, employing 30,000 oper atives. Last week the wages of 60,000 operatives were reduced and next Monday the pay of 30,000 additional mill hands, including those in New Bedford will be cut, bringing the totoal affect ed by the present movement to 125,000

The mills affected in the cut today are principally located in the Black stone Valley, the Berkshire region and in Maine.

WICHITA FALLS SALOON KEEPER CHARGED WITH VIOLATION OF NEW LIQUOR LAW.

Forfeiture of License Involved and the Saloon Men are Watching the Case Eagerly.

At the opening of the April term of the county court this morning, the first case to come up for trial was one wherein M. S. Skinner is charged with selling liquor to a minor, contrary to the Baskin-McGregor law.

The case is being heard by a jury with Judge Yeager presiding.

This is the first liquor case to be prosecuted under the Baskin-McGregor law and if a conviction is secured the

defendant's license will be forfeited. District Attorney P. A. Martin is representing the State and Attorneys C. Huff, L. H. Mathis, and Judge Edgar Scurry are representing the de-fendant. As there are a number of indictments under the Baskin-McGreglaw against Wichita Falls' saloon keepens, the trial of the case is attracting unusual interest.



Retrenchment Causes Helen Gould to Close Part of Estate. New York, April 3.—Miss

Gould has given out through her secretary a statement that the necessity of retrenchment in her charities has forced her to close part of her estate at Tarrytown, of which a portion is to be rented, to rent the Girls' Industrial school at Lindhurst, recently built at a cost of \$75,000, and to discontinue plans for outings for children of the poor at Woodycrest this sum-

"It is probable that the school will not be reopened," the statement read, and it continued with the explanation that the present financial conditions are responsible for this curtailment of Miss Gould's benevolence

Hundreds of poor children have been entertained at Woodycrest every summer and plans had been made to continue the entertainment there this Miss Gould was forced to the conclusion that the work could not be carried out without slighting other projects which she considered more necessary and several weeks ago she gave orders to her agents to discontinue the plans. The Lyndhurst. school, which was a pet project with her for many years, has been rented as a school for boys.

To the Voters of Wichita Falls.

I am informed that the charge is being made that the city attorney of Wichita Falls is being paid excessive amounts for the services rendered. As have been acting as city attorney for quite a long wnile, I feel like it is

my duty to state the facts.

I accepted the appointment at the request of the city council, and for all services rendered by me in civil matters including the writing of all ordinances, and attending meetings of the city council, and advising the council on all matters requested by it, I have received the sum of Ten dollars per month and no more.

As to fees in criminal cases I will That the law provides that there shall be taxed as costs in each criminal case where there is a conviction such costs as may be provided by ordinance of the city council, in no case to exceed the costs provided by law for cases in the Justice court.

The law for Jusice court provides that a fee of \$5.00 shall be taxed as costs and paid to the county attorney in all ceses where the defendant pleads guilty,, and that in contested cases a fee of \$10.00 shall be taxed and paid to the county attorney if the defendant is convicted.

In the corporation court of this city fee of \$5.00 has been taxed in all cases, but one-half of this fee, or \$2.50, has been retained by the city and the attorney has received only one-half, or \$2.50, in each case, and has received nothing where the parties convicted worked out the fine and costs on the

Thus the city has paid only one-half he costs actually taxed as attorney's fees and collected.

This is less, as I believe, than is usually paid and only one-half of the mount the council was authorized to

Prior to the time C. C. Huff resigned county attorney, he looked after the cases in the city court and received all the fees and up to that time I received the magnificent salary of ten dollars per month only.

Since Mr. Greenwood has been coun y attorney, I arranged with him to repesent the city in criminal cases, under an agreement that I was to advise and assist him in all cases where it was deemed necessary, and that he and I should divide the fees received from prosecutions in the city court. amount of these fees so received appear in the city records, and in my opinion the amounts paid by the city have been no more than fair compensaion for the services rendered.

During the last six months the city has received in cash, after deducting he recorder's and marshal's fees, the sum of \$2,516.05 and fines and costs to the amount of \$1,697.40 have been worked out on the streets. During this six months there was paid out to the ity attorney for all services, including salary of \$10.00 a month, above re ferred to, \$706.40.

I have refrained from taking any active part in the city election to be held tomorrow, and make this statement in the interest of no candidate, but simply to state the facts as they are J. T. MONTGOMERY. spectfully. April 5th, 1998.

Everything is in readiness for the dection tomorrow in which a mayor, city, tax assessor and collector and wo aldermen will be elected to serve for terms of two years,

The voting will be done at the city all. W. C. Sherrod will be the presiding judge and C. B. Montgomery and W. J. Howard will serve as assistant The polls open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

Public interest is mostly centered in the contests for the offices of mayor and tax assessor and collector.

There are two candidates or the office of mayor. T. B. Noble, the present mayor, and W. E. Skeen, who is now a member of council. Both of these candidates have conducted an active campaign and both have given their friends to understand that they want the office.

There are also two aspirants for the office of city tax assessor and clollector, J. W. Lee and Harry Robertson. These two gentlemen are also most willing to give their services to the

For the two vacancies in the city council four candidates have been drafted. They are Dr. J. F. Reed, John Young A. Richolt and J. M. Bland. All are good men and while none of them have sought the honor, it is probable that none of them would be dis-pleased at his own election.

More interest has been taken in the election which will take place tomorrow than any in recent years and it is probable that a good vote will be
