THE OATH OF OFFICE

ADMINISTERED LAST NIGHT TO
NEW COUNCILMEN AND TO
THE MAYOR.

THE SEWER PROPOSITION

Suggestion That City Undertake Work
Meets With Favor, But Definite De-
cision is Not Reached.

At the meeting of the city council last night, the newly elected aldermen, A. Richolt and John Young, were sworn into office and Mayor T. B. Noble was re-sworn. The administration of the oath of office to Tax Assessor and Collector Harry Robertson was deferred until such time as he made his bond.

The new councilmen took to their work like ducks to water and showed that they will become valuable workers for the city's good. Mr. Richolt was appointed to the committees vacated by Dr. Reed and thus will become chairman of the streets and alleys committee. Mr. Young was appointed to the committees vacated by Mr. Egan.

At the opening of the meeting J. J. Lory appeared to remonstrate against the excavation made by Wiley Wyatt in the alley between Mr. Lory's building and the new building to be erected by Mr. Wyatt, and also wanted to know what authority Mr. Wyatt had for making the excavation.

Mayor Noble explained that Mr. Wyatt had told him that he wanted to make an excavation in the alley, and widen the sidewalk adjoining his building and that he had told him to go ahead.

Mr. Lory contended that the widening of the sidewalk narrowed the alley so that an injury was done to his building and asked the council to remedy the injury. The new councilmen were not ready to take action in the matter and action was deferred until May, while the council had an opportunity to investigate the situation.

Chief McHam called attention to what he considered dangerous conditions in case of fire at the Majestic theatre and the new skating rink. Upon a motion the mayor and Councilmen Richolt and Anderson were appointed to investigate these buildings and also the old wooden structure on Indiana avenue adjoining the Fashion building. The committee was authorized to order the owners to make such remedies as were necessary for the protection of the patrons of these places and to comply with the city ordinances.

A resolution was passed giving Geo. Dobson full control of the work on the streets. This resolution was as follows:

It is ordered by the city council that George Dobson be and is hereby given charge of all the city teams and tools and full charge of all work on the streets and alleys, subject only to the control and direction of the street committee of the city council.

A communication from K. E. Bauch was read requesting the council to take some action that would give him authority to prevent skating on his sidewalks. The matter was discussed at some length, but no action was taken and the communication was finally passed over.

The report of City Tax Collector Harry Robertson was received and audited. The usual number of bills were allowed.

Mayor Noble announced that he had received the plans and specifications for the proposed sewerage system from the engineer, John W. Maxey, and the profiles and specifications were introduced into council, also several communications from the engineer.

An informal discussion of the sewer proposition followed and a suggestion from Mr. Richolt that the city undertake the construction of the sewer, employing a competent local man as superintendent, using the city teams and local labor, met with much favor.

No definite action was taken on the proposition last night and it was decided to hold a meeting within the next few days to further discuss the question.

WARMLY WELCOMED AT SAN ANGELO

A resolution authorizing the purchase of \$2,500 of the city hall bonds from the interest and sinking funds was adopted, it being understood that the proceeds were to be used as payment on the lot purchased some time ago on Ohio avenue as a site for the proposed city hall at a consideration of \$2,700.

Mayor Noble announced that the appointment of the city officers would be deferred until a subsequent meeting of council.

A communication was read from Mrs. Brown, asking the council to reduce the amount of the back taxes on her property on Ohio avenue, which she considered excessive and exorbitant.

After a discussion it was decided to authorize the tax collector to release Mrs. Brown from further payment when she paid the amount assessed against her minus the interest that had accrued.

WILL SPEAK AT PEORIA.

Central Illinois Democrats Will Hold Rally There Next Tuesday.

Peoria, Ill., April 9.—William J. Bryan has notified the Mandan Club of this city that he would reach Peoria next Tuesday, when he will deliver a political speech at a rally which will take place at the Coliseum. Invitations were hurriedly issued to all the prominent democrats in Central Illinois to attend and several have already accepted.

A MOST REMARKABLE CASE.

Man With Three Stitches in Heart is Reported Greatly Improved.

New York, April 9.—Robert English, who has been in St. Joseph's hospital at Yonkers since Sunday with three stitches in his heart, is reported greatly improved, apparently. His case is now looked upon by the medical men as one of the most remarkable in the history of their profession.

ANARCHISTS, THEME OF SPECIAL MESSAGE

Washington, D. C., April 9.—In one of the shortest messages which he has yet transmitted to congress, President Roosevelt today called the attention of that body to the necessity for further legislation on the subject of anarchy. With the message, he transmitted a report, reviewing the legal phase of the question by the attorney general to exclude from the mails such publications as the "La Question Sociale."

The president, in a letter to the attorney general, asks for an opinion on the legal phases of the subject and says he had in a particular case called the attention of the governor of New Jersey by Secretary Root to the fact that the governor may proceed under State laws.

OUT THREE JAYS.

Jury in Skinner Liquor Case Unable to Reach an Agreement.

The jury in the case of the State vs. M. S. Skinner, charged with selling liquor to a minor bids fair to complete its three days deliberation without the jurors arriving at any agreement as to a verdict.

The case was given to the jury late Monday afternoon and it is said that the first ballot showed five for acquittal and one for conviction, and that the subsequent ballots have failed to bring about any change.

The case of Billy Keys, also charged with selling liquor to a minor was tried before another jury, and after being out only about ten minutes returned a verdict of not guilty.

About fifteen other indictments against saloon men were dismissed this morning upon the motion of the county attorney, for the reason that there was not sufficient evidence to secure a conviction.

This afternoon the trial of Jim Campbell, charged with failure to support his wife, was taken up in the county court and testimony in the case is now being given. This is the first case of this nature under the new law to be tried in the Wichita county court and for this reason is attracting considerable attention.

BIBLE MAY BE READ

SUPREME COURT HOLDS THAT
BIBLE CAN BE READ IN
PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

OPPOSITION IS ABSURD

Court Holds That Prohibition of Religious Reading and Singing Would Result in Moral Anarchy.

Austin, Tex., April 9.—In an opinion handed down today by the supreme court, through Associate Justice Brown it is held that there is nothing in the constitution of Texas to prohibit the reading of the Bible or singing religious songs or conducting religious exercises in a public school in Texas. This question came up in the case of E. H. Church et al. vs. W. L. Bullock et al., from Navarro county, which was affirmed by the supreme court. This is an action for mandamus brought in the district court by appellees against the board of trustees of the public schools of the city of Corsicana, appellees commanding said trustees to desist from conducting certain exercises in said schools which are alleged to be religious and sectarian. The defendants answered by general denial, in substance, that the exercises were neither religious nor sectarian in the sense prohibited by the constitution of the State of Texas. A trial before the court without a jury resulted in favor of defendants. The evidence shows that E. H. Church does not believe in the inspiration of the Bible and he protested to the trustees and teachers against conducting the exercises. The plaintiffs in the case depended upon that part of the constitution which provides that money shall not be drawn from the treasury for the benefit of any religious service, nor shall property belonging to the State be appropriated for any such purpose.

"To hold that the offering of prayers," said the court, "either by the repetition of the Lord's Prayer or otherwise, the singing of songs, whether devotional or not, and the reading of the Bible, makes the place where such is done a place of worship, would produce intolerable results."

The court continues, in effect, that the house of representatives and the senate of the State legislature elect a chaplain, who, during the daily session, offers prayers to Almighty God in behalf of the State and in the most express manner invokes the supervision and oversight of God for the lawmakers. Associate Justice Brown further declares that, "in fact, Christianity is so interwoven with the web and woof of the State government that to sustain the contention prohibiting the reading of the Bible, offering prayers or singing songs of a religious character in any public building of the government would produce a condition bordering on moral anarchy. The absurd and hurtful consequences furnish a strong argument against the soundness of the proposition. The right to instruct the young in the morality of the Bible might be carried to such an extent in the public schools as would make it obnoxious to the constitution, not because God is worshipped, but because of the character of the services the place would be made a place of worship."

SPECIAL RATE UNLAWFUL.

Public Must be Included in Any Special Rates Made.

Austin, Tex., April 9.—Assistant Attorney General Claude Pollard today held that the railroad commission cannot grant a special rate to firemen exclusively for their state convention at Waco, declaring that the public must be allowed to participate in the rate.

Chicago Broker Commits Suicide.

Chicago, Ill., April 9.—Lorenzo Kneeland, 55 years of age, a former senior member of the firm of Kneeland, Clement & Curtis, brokers, committed suicide at his home here today by shooting himself in the head with a revolver. Kneeland was a member of the Chicago board of trade and the Chicago stock exchange, and had been in ill health for a long time.

Philadelphia, Pa., April 9.—Warrick Brooks, a negro, was hanged here today for the murder of William Jones, also a negro, whom he shot during a quarrel. Brooks is the seventh negro hanged here within the last eight weeks.

Mr. Cook took charge today. The sign attracted hundreds of persons, but the police kept the crowd scattered and there was no undue excitement.

Oil and Gas in Young County.
 Graham, Tex., April 8.—Graham, the county seat of Young county, is coming to the front with an oil and gas boom. A well was drilled a few years ago at Belknap, which is about six miles from Graham, and after reaching 726 feet the well was abandoned. This well shows gas at a depth of 264 feet and again at 385 feet, and at 694 feet. Up to a few months ago the prospects of its development in Young county were anything but flattering, when prospectors quietly sent leases into the county and during the past few weeks many thousands of acres have been leased.

Last Friday a joint stock company was organized at Graham by L. Solensky of Beaumont. A capital stock of \$10,000 was subscribed and a well is to be drilled on the property of Judge R. F. Arnold.

Nearly all of the land near Graham has been leased by different companies. R. L. Zinn of West Virginia, who is connected with some Pennsylvania operators, has 5,000 acres near Graham and along the Brazos river, and while he cannot say how soon developments will be begun, he said that he believed Young county oil resources would equal the Caddo, Oklahoma, field.

Early Planting.

The Department of Agriculture sends out the following from its special agent:

The cotton planter is generally over anxious to get his seed into the ground. He should not be blamed; he has waited all winter and the first warm days of spring he accepts as a notice that something ought to be done immediately. Frequently he does not wait for the soil to dry sufficiently, but throws it up in clods, and plants without waiting to pulverize thoroughly. He used inferior seed because it was convenient and cheap. Of course he does not get a good stand and he blames the weather. The loss from inferior preparation, poor seed and imperfect stand annually equals more than a hundred millions in cotton alone. If the other crops be added, the total expresses the difference between poverty and wealth. A good stand is a clear gain. It costs just as much to work half a stand as a full stand.

There is nothing quite equals fall preparations of the soil if properly plowed, but if this has not been done, then the spring preparation should be all the more thorough.

1. Get the surplus water out by opening the ditches or making them if there are none.

2. When dry enough plow; then disc, harrow and roll till the soil is as fine as a garden. When the soil and weather are warm enough, plant shallow, using good seed and follow with a roller, attached to the planter, or separate.

As a rule, the seed bed should be very slightly elevated as a precaution against heavy rains. If the farmer has made such preparation and has good drainage for the planted rows, he may retire early and sleep soundly; he will get a good stand and with proper working, the plants will grow rapidly.

One of the great mistakes in cotton planting is the use of too much seed. The average amount for planting an acre appears to be a bushel and in some sections two bushels. Possibly the object is to secure a stand, even if poor seed is used, or to save a stand if many plants die.

Poor seed means weak plants and crowded weak plants is a condition inviting an attack. The plants have a better chance for success if they come up singly. It will tend a bushy form to the plant and cause the fruiting to be nearer the ground. A peck of good seed for planting an acre is better than more.

Cross-harrowing when the plants are small serves for a good purpose. It prevents crust, destroys weeds, slightly thins the stand and does a little root pruning.

The use of much commercial fertilizer at the time of planting is unsafe. The fertilizer is liable to come in contact with the seed and do damage or if a dry spell follows planting, it reduces the probability of germination and in any event is not of immediate utility. Generally the best results are secured by placing the fertilizer in the rows ten days before planting or on both sides of the plant rows after the plants are up.

Properly understood and applied, the use of commercial fertilizers are valuable and economical.

Equal Train Service for Negroes.

The following is the letter of President Roosevelt addressed to the Department of Justice, instructing that certain railway companies in the South provide equal accommodations to the whites and blacks, mention of which was made in yesterday's Washington dispatches:

"To the Department of Justice: I forward herewith report on interstate commerce commission containing its order June 27, 1907, and report failure of railroad companies to obey this order, under date of March 26, 1908, together with letter of commission April 1, 1908. It appears the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railway Company has not complied with the order of the commission to furnish same facilities to colored passengers paying first-class fares to those furnished white passengers paying first class fares.

"From time to time various complaints have been made me by reputable colored people to the effect that the accommodations furnished colored persons on certain railways are filthy and inadequate compared to the same accommodations furnished the white passengers paying the same fare. The commission has taken what is unquestionably the right ground, where separate accommodations are provided for white and colored passengers the accommodations for the colored passengers must be as good as those furnished the white passengers for the same money.

"In other words, while there is nothing in the law which forbids separate accommodations, these accommoda-

tions must be equal. The principle of equality of accommodation is set out explicitly in various state laws. For instance, the code of the State of Alabama provides there must be equal, but separate accommodations for the white and colored races by providing two or more passenger cars for each passenger train or by dividing the passenger cars by partitions.

"The action of the commission has simply been to insist that the accommodations be equal in convenience and comforts for the same money, wherever the separation is made. In this particular case where a railroad has neglected to comply with the order of the commission, it is important compliance with this order be immediately obtained. I suggest you proceed to enforce the order by injunction proceedings unless in your judgment some other course is preferable.

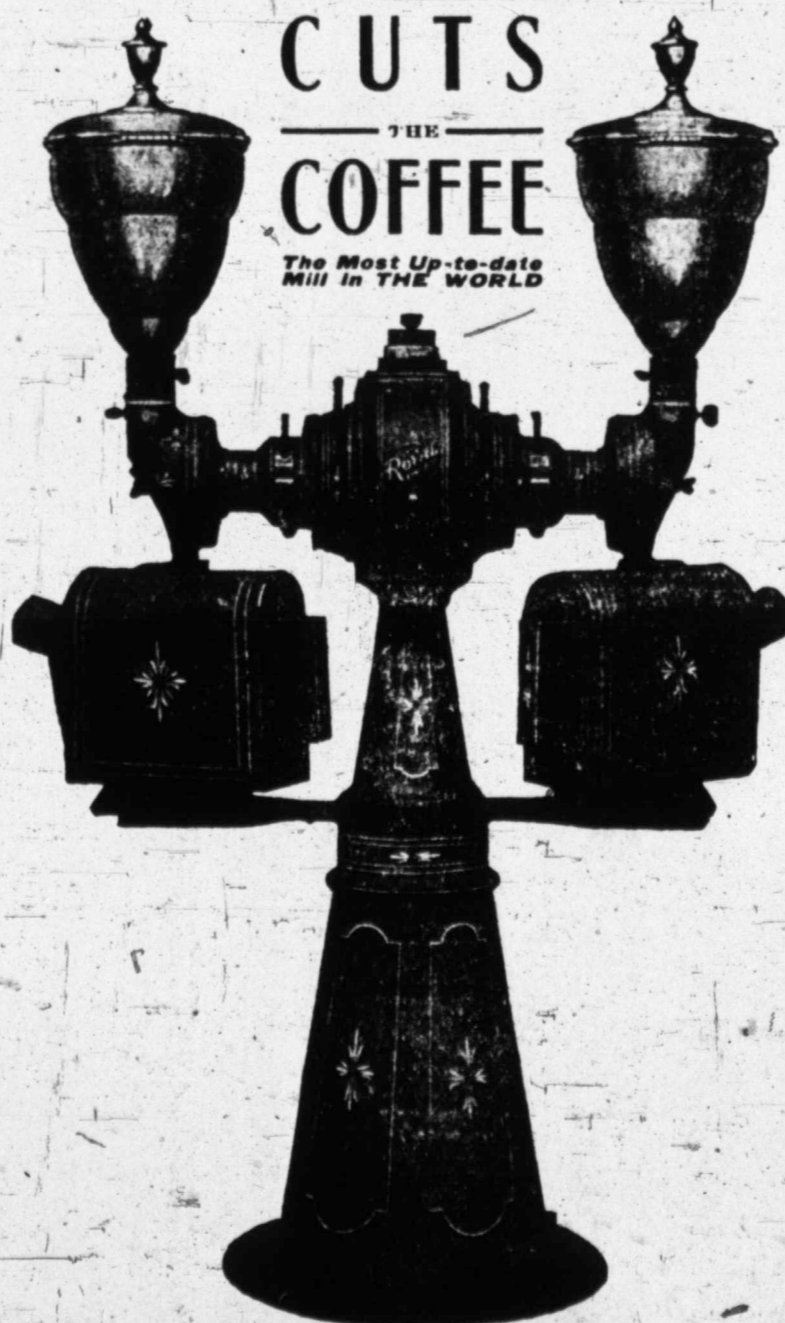
