is Not a Centralized Form of Government, But an Equal Distribution of Privileges.

Chattanooga, Tenn., April 10.—Be-fore several thousand people at the Shiloh battle ground this afternoon, Governor John M. Johnson of Minnesota delivered an address at the occasion of the unveiling of a monument erected to Minnesota's soldiers who fell during the battle of Shiloh.

The address was a brilliant one and was of unusual interest on account of its being Governor Johnson's first noteworthy public utterance since ae has been prominently mentioned in connection with the-democratic presidential nomination. Gov. Johnson spoke as follows:

Representing the people of the commonwealth of Minnesota, we are as-sembled on one of the historic battlefields of the Civil war to pay our tribute of respect and affection to the memory of the sons of Minnesota who here yielded up their lives that this might continue to be a united nation. Their sacrifice was not for personal gains, but was in response to duty, and a contribution to the civilization of the age, and for the purpose of perpetuating the institutions of human liberty.

The Spirit of Liberty. I appreciate that nothing which I can say will add or deract from the glory of their achievement, which in itself is an enduring monument to the patriotism and the heroism of the American soldier. Their sacrifice, however, was not different from that which has been made throughout all the ages by those lovers of liberty who believed in a government which might give to all the people the right to life, liberty and property. The love of lib-erty was not born in this country of ours; it was cradled along the Danube and about the shores of the Baltic; even when Rome had reached the limit of her imperial grandeur. Increasing in intensity with the passing of the centuries in the great English charter of civil rights, which forever guaranteed to the people of that land immunity from the despotism of those who claimed to rule by virtue of divine right. From the beginning of civilization man has ever struggled against the despotic power of the strong and has never hesitated to mix his blood with the soil of the land when by this offering he might leave to his posterity and those dear to him, a legacy of freedom; and while the immediate result has not always been the triumph of the right, none of the great battles of history could have been fought unless there had beenon one side or the other those who were willing to sacrifice their own lives for the common good and for the permanent establishment of those principles of liberty which men have ever cherished. The Great Contest of Humanity. One hundred and thirty-two years ago the great contest of humanity was transferred from the old world to the new, and here, because of the isolation of the country, because of the high character of the men who espoused the cause of liberty, and because of the signal victory achieved by them in that struggle, an opportunity was afforded to crystallize into written law the aspirations of the patriots of all the ages. The men who built the foundation of this government were those who had submitted to the supreme test of patriotism, for those who inspired the constitution of the United States were the same who had pledged their lives, their properties and their sacred honors to the cause of independence. The scheme of government devised by our forefathers was adopted after most mature deliberation, and after the fullest investigation; and only when they were satisfied that in the distribution of the powers of government, the rights of the people would be respected. It was founded upon the theory that the right existed in the people to make, elter and modify their form of government, and to this end the several States in constitutional convention agreed upon and adopted a constitution w...c. was the founda-tion upon which this nation rests. But, as Washington saids "The constitution which at any time exists, till changed by an explicit and authentic act of the whole people, is sacredly obligatory upon all the further heritage of the power and right of a people to establish government, presupposes the duty of every individual to obey the established government. The original Sovereign States, which, through their representatives in 1787, united to form a Federal government certain specific purposes, were care-







But with the development of the country and changes in economic conditions, and particularly with the growth of great private corporations, performing many of the functions of the govern-ment, has come the necessity for the exercise of strict governmental con-trol, and a rigid enforcement of all and the natural and legal rights of the poor and weak.

The Constitution Sufficiently Flexible. The marvelous foresight of the fathers of this country in framing the constitution of the United States is shown by the fact that in spite of, all the changes which have occurred in industrial and economic conditions, in spite of the unexpected expansion of the country, the constitution has been found sufficiently flexible to meet every emergency which has arisen. Let us remember this, for the danger of today is that the American people may be lulled into a false security, and, yielding to the demands of selfish inerests, permit the breaking down of onstitutional provisions, under which he American people have attained this wonderful degree of material prosper-ity and have yet maintained the indi-vidual liberty of the citizen.

The constitution of the ancient republic of Rome, which for 500 years had recognized the voice of the people is supreme was expanded by executive interpretation and contracted by executive administration, until Rome has so completely outgrown its democratic conditions as to become only a tragedy and a tradition. Let us implore the aid of Him on high to preserve us from the errors which ruined Rome, by the limitations upon state and federal govavoidance of which America may trayel on to that destiny and reanze that fulfillment which will be the inspira-tion of right-thinking men ol all the iges yet to come

The Majesty of the People.

Our government is divided into three eperate and distinct co-ordinat branchs; the legislative, the executive and the judicial. Danger will surely come to this republic when any of these departments of government attempt in he slightest degree to usurp the functions of the other. And while now and then it may be that a court of the land n constraing the constitution, may nulify a section of it, I have the faith to feel that the people of the country wal rise above the falibility of judicial tribunals and assert, and preserve criticise the executive, the legislative or the judiciary. Our duty is to rec ognize them Majesty of the law when enacted by the legislature, to abide by and with the honest executive administration of the laws when so enacted, and to respect, even though wrong, the opinions of the courts of the land, because when respect for these insti-tutions is gone, then the very framework of our government is bound to crumble and decay. But having thus given our acqueisence to the voice of authority, if in the opinion of the peo-ple the action taken is one which hould not be exercised by that partic ular department; it is our inarienable right to so further limit its power as to prevent the recurrence of the error



Therefore, discharging all our responsibilities as citizens of a country, refusing to surrender our rights of citizenship in any degree, let us so live that the heroism exemplified on this and other American battlefields may not be simply a tradition, and the national wisdom of our forefataers a mere legend, but that through us and those to come America will reach her full destiny in the permanent establishment of a perfect union, which shall be not for today nor for tomorrow but forever, and be so established that it will be for all of the people, and their own rights.
