## BAILEY WINS BY ABOUT 25,000

### SHOW GREAT GAINS

LATE RETURNS INDICATE THAT BAILEY'S MAJORITY WILL BE GREATLY REDUCED.

### EAST FOR TYLER MAN

Returns From East Texas Counties Show Great Gains for the Waco Ticket.

Special to the Times. Fort Worth, Tex., May 3.—At 1:30 o'clock this morning the returns from two-thirds of the State, as received by the Fort Worth Telegram, give Bailey 20,398, against Johnson's 101,794, showing a Bailey lead of 18,604. The returns from the East Texas counties now coming in show great gains for the Waco ticket.

Fort Worth, Tex., May 3.—(Special.)—At one o'clock this morning with returns from over 500 precincts approximately 150,000 votes accounted for and prospective total vote of 200,000 it looks as if the Bailey ticket has carried the state by a majority of 25,000.

Between eleven o'clock and midnight the returns showed remarkable gains for Johnson and at one time it looked as if he would cut down Bailey's lead to 15,000, but later returns from East Texas and the statement that Red river counties are all for Bailey make this improbable.

Most returns so far received have been from west Texas, the Panhandle, the extreme south Texas and the north central portions. The returns from east Texas are meagre. Houston went for Bailey by a small majority. Fort Worth was also for Bailey by a little better than 1,200. Travis county and Austin went overwhelmingly for the Waco ticket but this was more than offset by the result in San Antonio and Bexar. Johnson has swept Dallas by 2,500 and Dallas county by 1,000 more, this probably being the greatest vote he polled anywhere in the state.

Galveston went for Bailey as did Beaumont. Aside from this vote in south Texas Bailey's principal strength has been shown in his old congressional district.

The total vote has been light everywhere, this being largely due to the ideal weather permitting the farmers to stay in the fields. A notable feature of the election has been the absence of Bailey majorities in a large number of counties where the cattle interests predominate. These were expected to be overwhelmingly for Bailey.

Fort Worth, Tex., 2:30 a. m.—(Special.)—"We expect the election of Senator Bailey by a majority of 40,000" was the statement at the Bailey headquarters at one o'clock this morning. It is reported here that Anti-Bailey Chairman Riddle has conceded Bailey's election by 26,000. The Galveston News concedes Bailey's victory.

### WICHITA FOR BAILEY

BOTH SIDES SURPRISED AT THE BAILEY STRENGTH THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY.

### HE LOSES ONLY ONE BOX

City Gives a Bailey Majority of Fifty-One Votes—His Majority in the County is About 120.

The Baileyites were generally successful in the mass conventions throughout the county in the election of precinct delegates for the county convention which meets in this city next Tuesday, May 5th to select in turn, a delegate to the state convention in Fort Worth which will vote to send either the men on the Waco or the Fort Worth tickets to the national convention in Denver. The delegates will vote in the state convention as the county primaries determine.

In both precincts in Wichita Falls the Bailey men outgeneraled the anti-Baileyites and captured both mass conventions.

### City Hall Box.

The mass convention for the city hall box was held in the chamber of commerce rooms at two o'clock, less than twenty-five voters being present.

The delegates selected are Bailey men and are as follows: A. F. Blue, Charles Bowen, Edgar Scurry and J. F. Stearns.

### Court House Box Delegates.

At 2 o'clock, the hour appointed for the mass convention at the court house, it was apparent that more anti-Bailey men than Baileyites were in the court room so that the voters were being registered and challenges made the Bailey leaders scoured the town and brought in enough Bailey votes to overbalance the anti majority.

When the vote was finally taken at three o'clock the Baileyites counted 70 votes against 66 for the anti, and the following Bailey men were selected as delegates:

Frank Kell, J. B. Walker, W. E. Lane, Paul Fowler, R. E. Huff, J. T. Young, W. J. Howard and B. C. Williams.

With only one box to hear from, Wichita county gives Bailey a majority of 119 votes.

The missing box is Beaver Creek, which casts only a small vote, which will probably be for Bailey.

Considerable money changed hands and a number of new Stetson hats will be worn as the results of yesterday's primaries. From rumors that have reached the Times office probably as much as a thousand dollars was wagered in Wichita Falls.

A large part of this money was wagered at even odds on the results in Wichita county and Wichita Falls.

Several small bets are said to have been made on the amount of Bailey's majority in the State. One bet is reported to have been made at odds of 10 to 6 that Bailey's majority in the State would not reach 50,000.

### AUTO IN RUNAWAY

MAN STARTS MACHINE ON THE STREET BUT IS UNABLE TO CONTROL OR STOP IT.

### COLLIDES WITH A BUGGY

Machine Ends Wild Dash in a Smash-Up and two Persons are Slightly Injured.

Bob Crittenden was severely bruised and sprained and otherwise injured. J. K. Faunt Le Roy was slightly bruised and cut on the back of the head and a buggy and an automobile were badly damaged as the result of a collision at the corner of Ohio avenue and Seventh street early Friday night.

The collision was the result of Crittenden's fooling with something he did not know anything about.

The machine was Mr. Fonville's, who had just come in from a ride in the country with a party of friends, and had stopped in front of the Coney Island restaurant, where the passengers went in to take a lunch.

The machine was left standing at the curb and while the party was in the restaurant, Crittenden came out of Bennett & Hardy's saloon and took a seat in the automobile. Mr. Fonville's machine is a "steamer" and while Crittenden was handling some of the levers in front, he moved the lever which started the machine at full speed.

Crittenden had never been in an automobile before and sat helpless and frightened in the seat while the automobile tore through the street.

Mr. Fauntleroy and "Dusty" Rhodes were in a buggy near the curb at McCurran's corner, talking with Judge Scurry and did not see the automobile until it was nearly upon them. Rhodes escaped injury by jumping from the buggy, but Faunt Le Roy did not have time to jump. The automobile struck the buggy from the side and knocked it to one side. The machine then ran into a telephone pole and was stopped just as it was about to run into two blind women, who were singing on the street corner. Crittenden was picked up from the street almost unconscious and was carried home.

The buggy shafts were broken and one of the wheels were demolished. The wheels and the front of the automobile were also badly damaged.

Mr. Faunt Le Roy's injuries proved slight and Crittenden was later found not to be seriously injured.

### LOCKOUT IN GLASGOW.

Complete Stoppage of Shipbuilding Now Seems Imminent. By Associated Press.

Glasgow, May 2.—The Clyde shipbuilders this morning locked out 6,000 workers from their yards. This was due to a dispute as to a reduction in wages.

There seems to be every prospect for a complete stoppage of the shipbuilding industry, which affect directly not less than 250,000 men.

Mrs. Blount, scantily clad, fled with her babe in her arms into the snow storm. Blount gave himself up.

### FREIGHT HIGHER MEAT WILL GO UP

Washington, D. C., May 2.—The railroads in the Southeastern territory have filed with the interstate commerce commission tariffs effective on June 1st, increasing the freight rates on all fresh meats shipped into the Southeastern territory. The increase will amount to 3 cents per hundred pounds, and will probably result in an increase to the consumers of approximately 1 cent per pound on low grade meats, and perhaps as much as two cents on select cuts.

The railroads claim that this advance is necessary, owing to conditions confronting the railroads and that the rates must be increased or the wages of their employes reduced.

Now that the momentous question of whether Joe Bailey or some other man would go to the National Democratic convention at Denver has been settled, the farmers can return to the tilling of their fields, the merchant can resume his work behind the counter, the lawyers can practice in the courts of justice, the minister can speak the message of salvation from the pulpit, the newspapers can find time and space to print the news in the day, and everybody can join in the development of grand old Texas.

## SETTLERS COULDN'T FIND THE LAND

Lawton Democrat.

A number of the high bidders receiving awards of lands in the big pasture have had their places washed over into Texas by the waters of Red river. Two parties who have made their deposit when they came to file on the land could not find enough to build a house on.

When the matter was brought to the attention of these two would-be homesteaders, H. K. Price of Hastings and Elmer Robinson of Roosevelt were allowed their deposit back by a special order to the land office.

C. M. Cresse of Randlett bid on 160 acres on Red river south of Randlett but when he came to file could find only ninety-eight acres. He bid \$1,205 for this farm and the general land office has given him credit for what the waters of the river washed away before he made his filing.

If the Red river moves any more of it over into Texas he will have to stand for it himself.

Most of the settlers along the river south of Randlett found part of their land gone when they came to survey it out. R. H. Smith found only 143 acres. John H. Davidson only 89 acres; J. K. Griffith 144, Jeff McKee 139 acres, J. H. Scott 146 acres and C. G. Gillespie 148 acres.

In all these cases the government has notified the land office to give the settlers credit on their deferred payments of the amounts overpaid for the land washed away by the river.

There are probably some other cases of this kind along the river and possibly there are some cases where the river has extended some of the farms a few acres, but they have not been reported to the department.

The election returns, while not exactly to the liking of the Times, are not very disappointing. The paper has claimed all along that a majority of 15,000 or 20,000 for either Johnson or Bailey would not be a surprise. It also contended that the vote of Wichita Falls and Wichita county would be very close, and such it proved, but it is free to admit that it thought the Johnson ticket had a little the best of it. At 5 o'clock this morning more than 200,000 votes had been heard from and Bailey's majority, with nearly all the Bailey strongholds heard from, is less than 20,000. As to whether the result of this election is to be considered a Bailey victory is a matter that many will dispute. At the time of the legislative investigation (judging from the number of the members of the legislature who voted against him), less than 25 per cent of the democrats of Texas were against him. Accepting his own statement made at that time, the percentage was even smaller than 25 per cent, and if the Times is not mistaken, he made the assertion that less than 10 per cent of the democratic vote of Texas was against him. If he was correct in his estimate at that time, the vote of yesterday clearly indicates that he is rapidly losing in popularity.

In order to give its readers the very latest election returns the Times for the first time in its history makes its appearance as a morning paper. It trusts the people of Wichita Falls will appreciate the efforts put forth by the overworked force to gather in the news, edit it and put it in readable shape while they slept. The paper should be delivered to all readers in the city by 7 o'clock this morning.

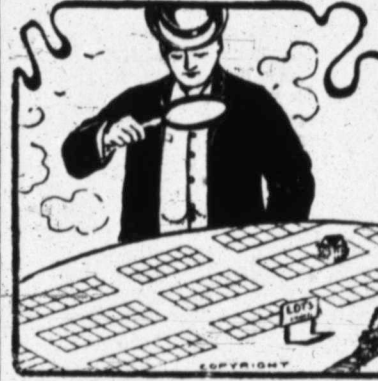

This good woman knows this truth  
well enough. There is no day she is  
not striving to broaden the horizon  
of her own life and that of her hus-  
band and children; no hour that she  
does not work and hope for greater  
knowledge, for greater opportunities, to  
do greater good and to gain greater  
wealth. But every day she does the  
best she can and, doing this, is satis-  
fied with her life and with her sur-

### ONE WRECK WAS FEARFUL

Tramps Seeking Revenge Believed to Have Been Author of the Explosion.

Butte, Mon., May 2.—The east bound Burlington train, which left Butte at 11:30 o'clock last night, was dynamited about a mile west of the Northern Pacific station. Carl Mange, who was riding on the blind baggage, had his arm and leg broken, and Fireman Enle of the second engine was severely scalded.

The mail car was hurled on its side and wrecked. A cold storage fish car was smashed into kindling wood. The baggage car was also derailed, but the Pullmans remained on the track.

It is believed that the dynamiting was the work of a tramp seeking revenge for being ejected from the train.

Three Bodies Taken from Ruins of Fire in Chicago.

Chicago, Ill., May 2.—Two additional bodies, making three in all were today taken from the ruins of the Chicago Reduction company's plant which was destroyed by fire last night, caused by the explosion of a naphtha tank. Six men are still missing according to police.

Berlin, Germany, May 2.—Baroness Von Enxleben shot and instantly killed her husband in a chateau near Dortmund last night just as he was about to retire. She then shot herself, but survives.

No explanation has been made of the occurrence.

Connelly is to appear at the city hall tomorrow at 10 o'clock for further investigation.

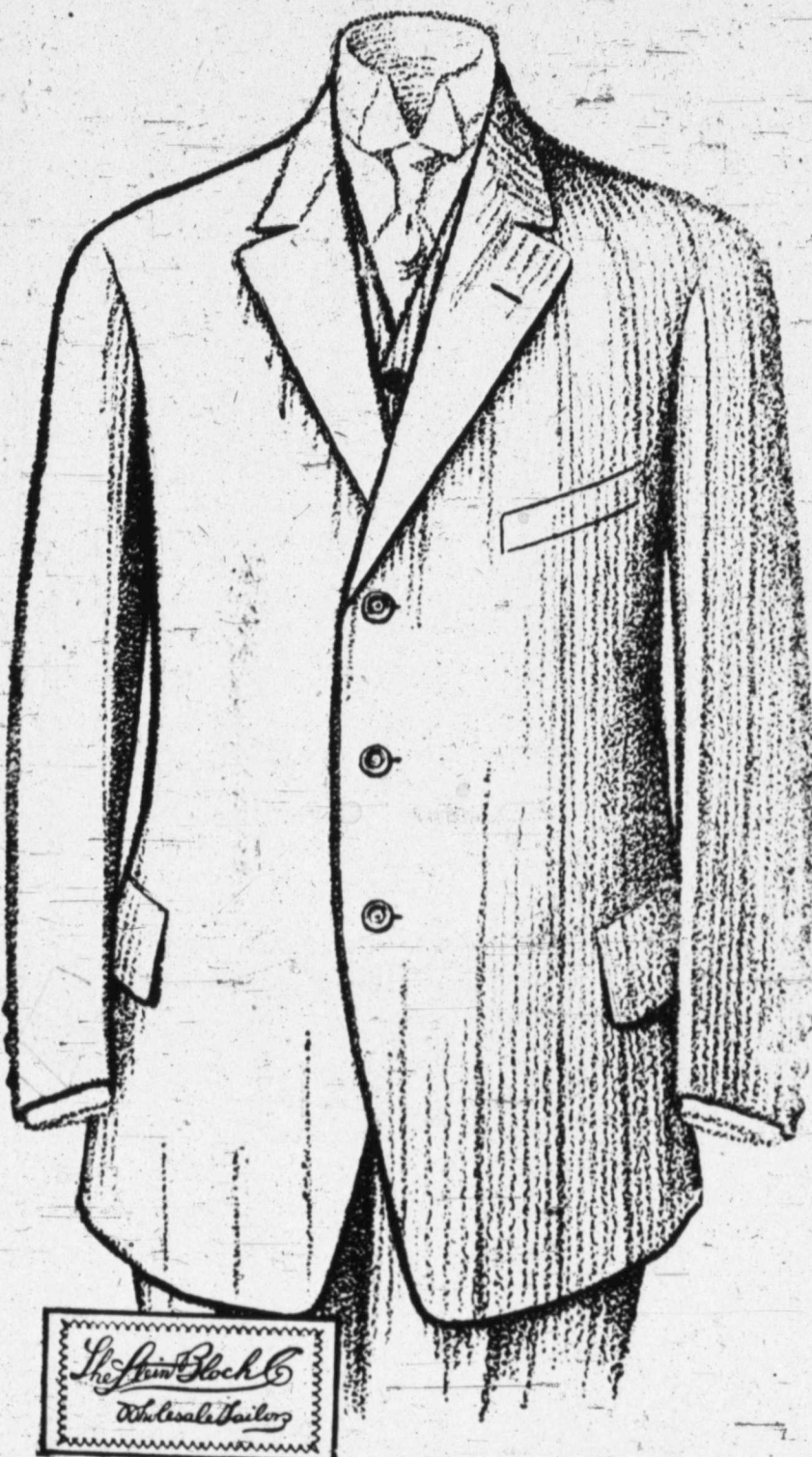
