MEN'S AND BOYS' OUTFITTERS.

Visit to Wichita Falls:
Mayor Bule, President Hastings of the Commercial Club, R. L. Penick, a member of the street committee, and Secretary Wade of the Commercial Club recently spent a half day in Wichita Falls making a study of the street improvements there. They found hustling Wichita Falls had twenty-five miles of cement sidewalks, all of which are connected with cement crossings of uniform width.

Wichita Falls has an ordinance on sidewalks, based upon the general statutes and it is quite likely that Stamford will pass a similar ordinance. The Stamford citizens who made an investigation at Wichita Falls came back enthusiastic and say that they will not be satisfied until Stamford has as many sidewalks and street crossings and in addition will urge permanent street paving.

The council and committee are now in correspondence with street paving men, some of whom will visit Stamford and as soon as the details can be agreed upon and an engineer selected, sidewalks and street paving will be taken up systematically.

Are Already Paving.
Some citizens are not waiting for the general movement to begin. MeHarg avenue is perhaps in the lead, but Ferguson street, which goes to the Wichita Valley and will lead to the union station, is a close second, and the property owners on that street say that they are going to take the lead. Contracts have already been let for cement sidewalks on Ferguson street to the Wichita Valley station on the east side of the street and this work will begin at a very early date. Other portions of the town are also worked up over the movement and the interest is growing.—Stamford News.

In 1906 the receipts of the Shantung Railroad company amounted to \$1,010,706 and expenses to \$424,870, and a 4 1/2 per cent dividend was paid to stockholders. The passenger rates are 2.5 cents first class, 1.3 cents second class and .4 of a cent gold third class.

According to the report of the geological survey of British India the production of coal in that country in 1907 was 9,783,250 tons.

Interesting Items.
Brazil is using an immense amount of cement, but none of it from the United States.

Italy's imports from this country are not quite \$67,000,000 a year, and ours from that country are only \$36,000,000.

Belgium is now importing yearly about \$1,500,000 worth of automobiles, motor cycles and bicycles. These imports have been quadrupled in four years.

America in 1906 supplied the South Manchurian railway with 50,900 tons of steel rails, 7,422 tons of bridge materials, 205 locomotives, 2,040 freight cars, seventy-two passenger cars and 123 cabooses.

The boys of the Kishoregamz school football team recently refused to play for a cup on the ground that it was of foreign manufacture. As a result, 12 of the head scholars were expelled.

In 1906 the imports of wheat and flour into the United Kingdom were 78 per cent of the total supply. In 1905 the imports were 35 per cent and in France 3 per cent. In the United Kingdom in 1906 the imported supplies of meat were 47 per cent.

It is related that in passing through her husband's library recently the attention of the Empress of Japan was attracted by a peculiar-looking machine. On learning that it was a typewriter and having it explained to her, she became interested and began to hit the keys. Now it is said she does the correspondence for the Emperor.

A golden eagle supposed to be the oldest ever captured in this locality was shot by George Bates in the Crow Creek District. From the tall feathers of the bird and other characteristics Curator Adams of the State-Normal School, believes the bird at least seventy-five years old. It measured over six feet from tip to tip and will be mounted.—Greely correspondence Denver Republican.

It is reported that Queen Alexandra of England, Queen Maude of Norway, the Czarina and the Queen of Portugal are all fond of using the typewriter in corresponding with their intimates. THE STOCK MARKET.

Accuracy of the Exchange in the Analysis of Events.

Barring the case of manipulation, which carries its own remedy and which is one of the evils of speculation, the stock market tells the truth. Temporarily indications may be misleading, but it is eventually shown that its analysis of events is correct. The silent panic of March, 1907, was a prelude of the panic of November. During the intervening seven months prices dropped steadily, showing plainly that there was a weakness in the financial and industrial structure. The utter foolishness of blaming speculation for the downward movement is obvious. The stock market with its record of prices said as plainly as it was possible to say: "Danger! Stand from under!"

Something similar happened in 1893. Bradstreet's for July 29, 1893, shows that twenty representative stocks fell on an average 45 points, or more than 50 per cent, between January and July. This mitigated the effect of the panic.

One of the most striking illustrations of the cold blooded accuracy of the exchange is recorded by Proudhon in the Speculator's Manual, published at Paris in 1857, in which he shows that in the later days of Napoleon and the restoration, while French patriotism was at white heat, prices on the bourse advanced with each victory of the allies, reflecting the belief that the defeat of Napoleon meant more for France than the success.—John Paul Ryan in Metropolitan Magazine.

ROYAL SCHOOLMASTERS.

Kings Who Turned to Teaching to Make a Living.

In the early part of the life of King Christian IX. of Denmark there was no prospect of his ever becoming the ruler of that country. With this in view he became a schoolmaster at the German university of Halle.

Being too poor to keep a servant, the Dowager Czarina Dagnar of Russia, one of his daughters, used to help her mother to do the household work and take care of the younger children. During this period there were King Frederick VII. and several others in the direct line of succession that stood before Prince Christian; but, by a succession of deaths that occurred, he became the heir apparent, and after the death of King Frederick VII. in 1863 he was proclaimed King Christian IX. of Denmark.

Another instance of a similar nature is that of Louis Philippe. During the time he was exiled from France, then being the Duc de Chartres, he became a teacher of mathematics and geometry in Switzerland. About thirty-six or thirty-seven years afterward, on Aug. 9, 1830, he was proclaimed King Louis Philippe of the French.—London Answers.

Puzzling Differences in Weights.

Which is heavier, a pound of feathers or a pound of lead? They weigh the same.

Which is heavier, a pound of feathers or a pound of silver? The pound of feathers is heavier, because feathers are weighed by avoirdupois weight, which has 7,000 grains to the pound, while the precious metals are weighed by troy weight, which has only 5,760 grains to the pound.

Which is heavier, an ounce of feathers or an ounce of silver? An ounce of silver, because in the troy ounce there are 480 grains, while in the avoirdupois ounce there are only 437½ grains. The avoirdupois pound of 7,000 grains is divided into sixteen ounces, while the lighter troy pound of 5,760 grains is divided into twelve heavier ounces.

The First "Coin Sweater."

"Coin sweating," which so often figures in the Old Bailey calendar, is a very, very old crime. More than six centuries before Christ there was a coin sweater, one Alexander of Byzantium. He was chief officer of the public treasury, and he amassed an immense and sudden fortune by "clipping" the money in so skillful a manner that his frauds could only be discovered by weighing. The Byzantines gave him the nickname of "The File" from his making such dextrous use of that tool, whence probably comes the modern term of "file" applied to thieves, pickpockets and cunning hard-headed scoundrels.—Pearson's Weekly.

Up to the age of sixteen Dick had retained the proper scorn for things feminine; then he went to dancing school and fell smitten by the charms of several youthful eyes. Accordingly Dick approached his father and requested theater tickets for two.

Father complied and merely asked as he turned over the seats, "Which girl is it?"

"Then she's the one you like best?" father continued.

Dick turned a superior and pitying eye upon his parent. "Oh, no; I don't like her best! You don't understand the situation, father. It isn't the girl I care about. It's the experience I want."—New York Times.

The latest election returns confirm what the Times said editorially Sunday morning—that Senator Bailey's majority would be less than 20,000 in the State, and it must be remembered that the voting was done under a strict party test, which was prescribed by the State Democratic Executive Committee, a majority of which was in favor of Senator Bailey. Under this strict test none but democrats could vote, and it safe to say but few other than democrats offered to vote. Considering that the Bailey forces had al-

most complete control of the party machinery, the Waco ticket, in polling 45 per cent of the democratic vote, has not done so bad. It was the first real test. Until the proper time comes for another to be made, the matter should be dropped.

Both Sides to Blame.

In a clear-sighted review of the railroad situation in the United States at the present time, a contributor to the Broadway Magazine says what is now most needed is a series of public conferences in different parts of the country so that the whole matter may be thoroughly thrashed out. There are three big facts, says the author of this article, on which all parties must sooner or later agree.

1. The railways have been guilty of many offenses. In the one item of rebating, they have been persistent law-breakers for twenty years. They have given special favors to the big shippers. They have been too reckless in watering their stock, and in playing the Wall street game. Worst of all, they have controlled and corrupted legislation by means of hired gangs of lobbyists and by having their own partisans elected to public office. All the trouble that the railway men are suffering at present from politics is nothing more than the inevitable back swing of the pendulum.

2. The railways have been terribly punished. Their traffic has fallen off ten million dollars a week. They have lost their political grip in at least three States out of four. The interstate commerce commission, and forty-three State commissions, have suddenly become seats of authority. Their stocks are selling at half-price. They need money for improvements—"A billion a year for five years," says J. J. Hill; but they are unable to borrow it. They have been fined and regulated and enmeshed in a vast network of red tape. Seven railroads, with six thousand miles of track and half a billion dollars of liabilities, are now in the hands of receivers.

3. The railways and the people must learn to co-operate, for neither can prosper in the long run, at the expense of the other. The days of the stage coach and the canal boat are gone forever. The railroad is an absolute necessity to the people; and the people are an absolute necessity to the railroad. In a country as vast and as highly civilized as ours, the railroads are the veins and arteries through which flow the life blood of the nation.

Of the three propositions stated, only the last shows the weakness of Utopianism. Both sides in the struggle between the railroads and the people are to blame, but the question of co-operation between them is a problem somewhat large for even magazine writers to attempt to solve.

Supposing that the question of co-operation is dropped and in its place there be substituted a mutual spirit of fairness. Such a spirit would require of the people having privileges to give the railroads that they demand an honest return for those privileges; and on the other hand, since railroads increased the taxable values of the whole community, they ought to receive the benefit of a lower rate of taxation than other industrial corporations. Fairness on the part of the railroads would require that with the privilege of lower taxation rate and less restrictions that are imposed on other industrial enterprises, they would make a full rendition of their property values and would so endeavor to obey—the spirit as well as the letter of the laws that the people would not constantly be at the expense of costly prosecutions to force the railroads into obedience.

Several months ago the Telegram pointed out that the first step toward attaining that desirable mutual fairness is more publicity and it is the railroads' turn to deal. The Telegram argues that when the railroads of Tex-

as tell the people more about the expenditures they are making and have made and take the public into their confidence, at least to some extent, about their earnings, much better feeling will begin to prevail on both sides. President Trumbull of the Fort Worth and Denver is a believer in this policy and in a recent article appearing in the Telegram it was frankly admitted by the Denver road that it is holding its own in the matter of earnings this year as it did last. On the other hand it is as frank to tell of its plans for spending \$700,000 in improvements.

More publicity, not of the speculative or theoretical variety, but the publicity which deals with simple facts, will be of value both to the railroads and the people. It will lead to a better understanding on both sides and a better understanding is a prime essential before the desirable mutual spirit or fairness can be secured.

Carry Home Counties.

All of the men who were candidates for delegates at large on the Johnson ticket seem to have carried their home counties, the only doubt being as to Harris county. The returns from that county last night indicated that the Johnson ticket had been successful. Smith, Johnson's home county, went for him overwhelmingly. McLennan county, the home of Cullen Thomas, also gave a majority on the ticket on which he ran, while Erath county, the home of Hon. Lee Young, also showed a partiality for the Johnson ticket. Of the candidates for delegate at large on the Bailey ticket, Senator Bailey himself and perhaps Mr. Storey were the only ones to carry their home counties; Judge Brooks lost Dallas, while Tom Grene county, the home of Col. Andrew Jackson Baker, joined with the enemy.

Johnson Carries Johnson.

Johnson county went for Hon. Cone Johnson, and it might be added, that box No. 2 in Cleburne, where Hon. D. W. Odell and Judge William Poindexter cast their ballots, also gave a majority for the Waco ticket. The town of Bailey, named after him, gave Senator Bailey its majority.

Bailey's Majority Stender.

That Senator Bailey's majority in the State, considering the size of the vote, is an extremely slender one, so far as the present returns reveal the fact, may be shown in two ways. For example, the returns show that he got only 51 1/2 per cent of the total vote cast. The same fact may be shown by referring to the vote given to him in the old Fifth district. Here his majorities were overwhelming, and without the partiality it may be assumed he enjoyed in those counties, it might have been that his majority would have been so small as to have left the result in doubt even till now. The old Fifth district, when Senator Bailey was its representative, was composed of Rockwall, Collin, Tarrant, Grayson, Denton, Montague, Cooke and Wise. These eight counties gave him a majority of 10,948, which is more than half of the whole majority.

ASSASSINATIONS.

Crimes That Have Changed the His-
tory of the World.

Step by step throughout the world's
history assassination has been a factor
in determining the course of events
and in molding the life of nations.
Frequently the assassin's weapon
which sent a ruler to death has sent
upon the world's stage a successor
whose career set irrevocable milestones
upon the pathway of the peoples of the
world. Especially was this true in
those days when conquest was the
guiding star of the rulers of the world.

Probably one of the most important
and early assassinations was that of
Philip of Macedon, which occurred in
the year 336 B. C. Not only did it ter-
minate the career of one of the most
remarkable men of his time, but it led
to the accession of Alexander the
Great, an event which very likely
would not have taken place at all had
Philip continued to rule and had him-
self selected the successor to his throne.

Philip of Macedon then was at the
height of his power, and the battle of
Chaeronea had made him the undisputed
master of Greece. When leaving the
theater in which his sister had been
united in marriage to Alexander, king
of Epirus, a man sprang toward the
ruler and thrust a sharp, short sword
into his side. As the assassin ran to-
ward a swift horse his sandal caught
in a vine stalk, and his pursuers killed
him with their spears and tore him to
pieces.

Olympias, his former wife, was said
to have aided in the conspiracy. This
assassination, one of the earliest in
point of time, bore a strong resem-
blance in its surroundings to that
which claimed President Abraham Lin-
coln's life. In both cases there was an
individual murderer, the scene was a
theater, the act was done with incredi-
ble audacity in the presence of a large
concourse of people, and the murderer
was crippled by a misstep after the fatal
blow.

In the history of ancient Rome there
stands out one political assassination
which marks the first occasion on re-
cord in which the conflicting economical
interests of different classes in a re-
public were settled by resort to the
weapon of the assassin. This was the
murder of Tiberius Gracchus, which
soon was followed by the enforced sui-
cide of his brother, Caius Gracchus.
This deed was the direct result of the
former's attempt to enforce an agrarian
law passed as an act of justice to the
poorer classes of Roman citizens.

In the turmoil that attended the vot-
ing of the tribes Tiberius was struck
down to death by one of his own col-
leagues, a tribune of the people. This
chapter of death was written in 133
B. C. History has dealt at length with
the assassination of Julius Caesar on
the Ides of March—the 15th of the
month—in the year 44 B. C., and of the
import of this event in the history of
ancient Rome.

At the time of the assassination of
Julius Caesar the Roman people had
reached a degree of perversity and de-
generacy almost impossible of modern
comprehension. His death had a most
demoralizing effect upon the people.
The hand of the master who might
have controlled the unruly masses and
restrained the degenerate nobility lay
palsied in death. Later events had
their mainspring from this source, and
the years from 37 to 68 A. D. were
marked by the assassinations of Tibe-
rius, Caligula, Claudius and Nero.—
New York Herald.

whom in the Latin manner he paid a
Latin compliment, assuring her in her
private ear that to him she "seemed
like a flower among vegetables."
"Then I can scarcely hope to occupy
first place in your thoughts at dinner,"
she responded demurely.
And the eminent singer could not
think of an answer.—Harper's Weekly.

BIRD VISION.

Keen Eyesight of the Kingfishers and Water Birds.

So far I have determined that the keenest eyesight is probably possessed by water birds and kingfishers, although every kind of bird possesses keener eyesight than does man. It is a fact that the eyesight of man is going to get worse in the future and is getting worse all the time—that is, we are growing more nearsighted. The occupations of a majority of men in cities compel them to do their work at very close range. This removes the necessity of the farsighted eyes with which most men are endowed. It is probably a good thing that we are becoming nearsighted.

As an example of the visual capacity of some birds one has to think for a moment of a hawk poised several hundred yards above a meadow in which a field mouse or a small chicken is hidden. In a few seconds after the quarry is sighted it is seized by the bird, whose sharp sight has not only detected it, but whose wonderful accommodative apparatus permits of a sure and continuous fixation from hundreds of meters to less than a meter within an incredibly short space of time. Variations in the character of this acute vision are seen in many other birds—in the humming bird, that darts here and there so quickly that the human eye cannot follow it and yet comes suddenly to rest on an almost invisible twig; in the woodcock, that flits through the dark woods, avoiding every tree, shrub and branch as if they were nonexistent; in the owl, that combines good diurnal with good nocturnal vision, and in the kingfisher, that sees as well in the air as he does in water.—Dr. C. A. Wood in Chicago Inter Ocean.

CURES FOR LOVE.

Sages and Writers With Widely Differing Prescriptions.

Absence is one of the means of curing love. Two thousand years ago Ovid advised his readers who wished to cure themselves of an unlucky attachment to flee the capital, to travel, bent of till the soil.

"Love," said Coleridge, "is a local anguish. I am fifty miles away and not half so miserable."

But other men have found that absence increases love. La Rochefoucauld probably hit upon the truth when he said that "absence destroys weak passions, but increases strong ones, as the wind extinguishes a candle, but blows up a fire." If the love is all fancy and has little strength it may be cured by personal contact with the object. But the safer plan perhaps is to keep out of the way; hence travel is a good expedient. Business perhaps is a better one. Ovid said, "If you desire to end your love employ yourself and you will conquer, for love flees business."

Still another expedient is reflection upon the unhappiness of married life. A man in search of this view can find it everywhere. Addison said that "beauty soon grows familiar to the lover, fades in his eye and falls upon the sense," and Hazlitt that, "though familiarity may not breed contempt, it takes the edge off admiration."

Goldsmith said, "Many of the English marry in order to have one happy month in their lives," and Colley Cibber, "Oh, how many torments lie in the small circle of a wedding ring!"
