KILL THE MOSQUITO

DR. WILLIAM BRUMBY TELLS HOW TO REMAIN WELL DURING THE SUMMER.

INSPECTING SANITATION

Visiting Principal Cities of Texas to Observe Precautions Being Taken to Prevent Sickness.

Houston, Tex., July 10.—Dr. William M. Brumby, in pursuance of his intention to visit the principal cities of Texas to ascertain their sanitary preparedness for the hot summer months, arrived in Houston Wednesday morning. After a conference at the city health office with City Health Officer Larendon, Dr. Brumby, who was accompanied by Dr. F. C. Ford, quarantine officer at Sabine Pass, secured a rig and drove through the different wards to see for himself the condition of the ditches, drains, vacant lots and other places where unsanitary situa-

tions might be encountered. "In other cities of Texas which I have visited," said Dr. Brumby, "I have found a very commendable adherence to the rules of sanitation and health. The city physicians have awakened to the need of destroying all breeding places of mosquitoes, which are now recognized as carriers of malaria, yellow fever and half a dozen other diseases. It especially behooves the coast cities to clean up, thus preventing the growth of the mosquito and killing all chance of infection arising from its propagation."
"Here in Houston, from the superficial examination made after my arrival, I find your city health department has been most active in working along the lines of sanitary progress. I have not yet gone over the city, as I shall later during the day, but I feel confident that Houston will prove one of the cleanest cities in the State. It is due the citizenship that such a condition should prevail, for disease cannot very well originate in a sanitary town. Every precaution should be taken at the very outset of the hot months and then the summer will pass without trouble."
"I am not a bit afraid of yellow fever," continued Dr. Brumby. "It is the

home grown variety of malaria that is to be fought. Kill the mosquitoes and there will be no malaria or any other kind of sickness. I am a firm believer in the mosquito theory, which has been subjected to the severest tests and has come out victorious every time. For this reason the best piece of advice that I can give to Houstonians is to kill off the pest and all chance of sickness will be slain at the same time."

TAXATION COMMITTEE TO MEET IN FORT WORTH JULY 20.

Fort Worth, Tex., July 5.—Mr. B. B. Cain, chairman of the committee on taxation of the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association, has appointed the members of the committee and called a meeting of the committee in Fort Worth Monday, July 20th, at the rooms of the association in the basement of the Wheat building. The Galveston conference felt that careful thought and study should be given this important subject, and authorized the appointment of a tax committee which, in conjunction with the executive committee, is empowered to outline the position of the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association on the subject of taxation.

All available information is being assembled and data prepared to submit to this committee. They will deal with the subject strictly from an economical standpoint, and will consider the tax laws and conditions in Texas as compared with other States, as well as taking into consideration their own experience and observations on the effect of taxation on material development.

The consideration of this subject by a committee of citizens representing the taxpayers of Texas and entirely freed from the political fortunes of any individual or faction will be a welcome innovation to those who pay taxes, and is an encouraging sign of the times.

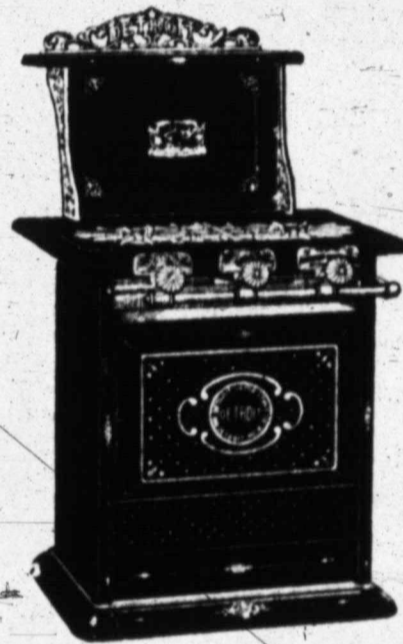

Some competent physician of Childress would do a great service to write an article, or series of articles, on disinfection for typhoid fever. All medical experts agree that in this altitude and with our favorable local conditions we should be practically free

from this deadly disease. During the past year dozens of deaths and many more heavy doctor bills, with the attendant human suffering, have been caused in Childress by this enemy to human life. Doctors tell us that this could and should be obviated by proper sanitary precautions on the part of our people. From local environments one would judge that nature intended this to be one of the healthiest countries in the world and if it is not we have only ourselves to blame. The Post will gladly give space to any matter along this line and asks that some local physician prepare the articles of humanity. It will cost nothing and do much good.—Childress Post.

There is no doubt but that many cases of typhoid fever and diseases classed as contagious might be prevented if the public would observe reasonable sanitary precautions. In many instances ignorance as to the proper sanitation and disinfection is responsible for the failure to exercise simple precautionary measures. Health officers should not be too modest about getting their names into print, especially when they are attached articles which in plain simple words tell the public what diets and sanitary rules should be followed to render the people less liable to contract epidemic or contagious diseases. The Times stands ready at any time to give space to such an article or as many articles as may be necessary to enlighten its readers.

The town of Black Jack Grove became so famous at one time as a "wide open, lawless town" that its best citizens held a mass meeting and determined to clean things out. After doing this, they were still not satisfied, and in order to entirely rid the town of the bad reputation it had gained abroad, changed the name to Cumby and disappeared, apparently, from the map, until about a month ago when R. R. Williams, one of the town's oldest citizens and the village blacksmith, took a notion to enter the race for governor, and now everybody knows where Cumby is. Schlitz made Milwaukee famous and Williams promises to do likewise by Cumby.

Early Hedricks of the Chillicothe Hornet is all that the first part of his name stands for, if not more. The Hornet came out on the evening of the 9th with the announcement in red headlines that Bryan had been nominated on the first ballot at 3 p. m. This was just eleven hours and forty minutes ahead of all other papers, and of the actual happening itself. Bryan was nominated on the first ballot, but not until 3:40 on the morning of the 10th.

Thinks Verdict a Just One.
In the case mentioned last week as being on trial before the district court at Wichita Falls, J. S. Wallis vs. R. J. Brown et al., the jury was out two hours (including the noon hour) and returned a verdict giving plaintiff \$7,500 damages for the injuries received. This is the second time a jury of twelve disinterested citizens, of another county than Clay and unprejudiced, has given Mr. Wallis this amount for the bodily injuries received that night in December, 1905, when the "yellow-back" deputies of a dime-novel sheriff shot him and Bud King while they were passing along the public highway. At the trial last year in Wichita county there was a failure to prove that Deputies Allen and Cozart were deputies of Sheriff Brown, the \$7,500 verdict being against the two men only. The case having been returned by the court of civil appeals for retrial, the former oversight was avoided and Brown is now included as a party to the judgment. We are informed that the official bondsmen of the ex-sheriff are liable only in the sum of \$5,000, as also that the case will probably be again appealed. But plain and simple justice would give Sank Wallis, a young man permanently injured in a most serious way, at least the amount of damages awarded by these two impartial juries.—Henrietta Review.

Arm Broken in Belt.
W. A. Hendon, while working at the Hardin elevator on the north side of the river Wednesday, had one of the bones of his right arm broken and some of his teeth knocked out by being caught in a belt used to empty cars of grain. The belt was working slack, and Mr. Hendon was drawing it tighter by holding a stick upon it. How he was caught and how he got out Mr. Hendon is unable to tell, because it happened so quickly.

Piner Avis is carrying his right hand in a sling as the result of trying to open a broken handled umbrella yesterday afternoon. The handle was broken in such a manner that a sharp point projected and Mr. Avis' hand struck this point when he attempted to raise the top, inflicting a long deep cut in the flesh at the base of his thumb.

FREIGHT RATES WILL BE RAISED BY TEXAS ROADS.

Fort Worth, Tex., July 10.—It was learned today through railroad officials here that all lines entering Texas will increase their freight rates on August 10th to such an extent as will take \$900,000 annually from the State. All roads from here to St. Louis, Denver, Kansas City and Chicago are co-operating in the scheme. All Texas freight bureaus are protesting and will complain to the interstate commerce commission, claiming a violation of the law.

Alleged Assault Reported.
A farmer whose name could not be learned, but whose home is said to be about eight miles north of town, drove into the city early this morning and reported to Marshal Gwinn that two men, who had stopped at his house last night, had ravished his 14-year-old daughter. The farmer was deputized as a special officer and set out at once in company with Constable Randolph to arrest the men.

According to the meager details secured by Marshal Gwinn, the farmer knew the two men and stated that they were headed toward Oklamona.

After making the assault they hitched their horses to their buggy, and fled. No word has been heard from the men who started in pursuit up to a late hour this afternoon, and further details of the affair had not been learned.

HE SOUGHT DEATH.

The Unfortunate Napoleon III. at the Battle of Sedan.

Sarah Bernhardt mentions in her memoirs that Napoleon III. had two horses shot under him at Sedan. Some having thrown doubt on her statement and denied that the emperor was ever in personal danger at the time, Baron Verly, son of the late colonel of the Cent Gardes, gives what he affirms to be the authentic account of the unhappy sovereign's persistent attempts to court death when he saw that defeat was unavoidable. On Sept. 1, 1870, at 6 o'clock in the morning, Marshal MacMahon, returning wounded to Sedan, met the emperor riding out to Bazailles. Napoleon III. realized that the situation was desperate. He rode slowly out, depressed and thoughtful, under a hail of shot. During an hour he inspected the positions. Bullets rained on his escort. Captain d'Hendecourt was killed a few feet away from the emperor. The latter, deliberately seeking death, alighted, ordered his escort to remain behind an embankment and walked up to a cemetery on a height, where he stayed for another hour, exposed to fire. He mounted again and rode to another part of the field. General de Courson and Captain de Trecesson were dangerously wounded by his side, but not a bullet hit him. The emperor at last seemed to despair of meeting his death as he sought it and rode back to Sedan at noon. In the town itself shells fell thick, and while the emperor was riding with his escort up the Grand Rue one burst just in front of him, wounded one of the Cent Gardes and killed the horses of two aids-de-camp. Napoleon III. looked on stolidly, understanding, perhaps, that it was not his fate to die in action. The story that he had two horses killed under him is, therefore, not correct. But there is no doubt that the unfortunate emperor, beaten and ill, a pathetic and tragic figure, did deliberately seek death on the field to escape the disgrace of Sedan which he foresaw.—Paris Letter.

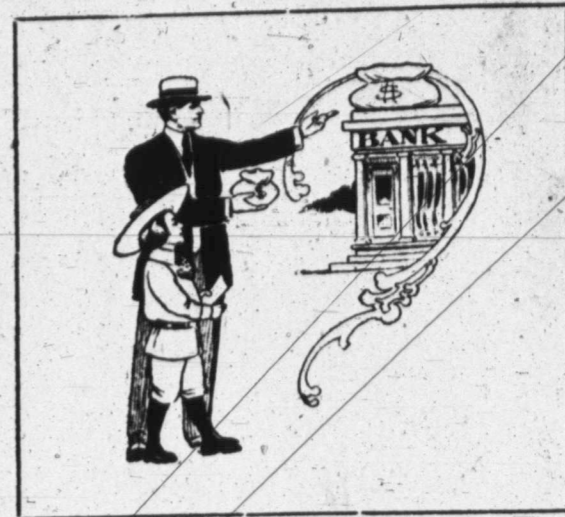

of expediency; neither political bosses nor corporate masters sent us here. We are here at the summons of the rank and file of that political organization which is the special defender of the rights of the common people.

We are here representing all that is best in the traditions of our party; we feel again that the spirit that animated the democracy in the days of Jefferson and Jackson.

The voters have spoken and we assemble to give expression of their will. The voice for the third time calls Nebraska's favorite son to be the standard bearer of his party in this gigantic contest.

Since time began no grander tribute was ever paid to any man by a free people. He is recognized today as the most representative citizen of the nation, the peer of any living man.

Friends and foes have learned that he was shaped in that heroic mold in which the world's great patriots, statesmen and leaders have been cast.
