The Democratic Platform.
 Following is a brief outline of the Democratic national platform, adopted at the Denver convention:
 "Shall the common people rule?" is the overshadowing issue which manifests itself in all the questions now under discussion?
 A plea for economy in the administration of governmental affairs.
 A pledge to limit the arbitrary power of the speaker of the lower house of congress so that it may again become a deliberative body, controlled by a majority of the people's representatives.
 Condemns the misuse of patronage whereby the president is enabled to name his successor in office.
 Demands publicity of campaign contributions.
 Opposes the centralization of power in the federal government and insists on more comprehensive States rights.
 For a revision of the tariff.
 Applies a remedy for the trust evil.
 Better regulations of railroads and complete control by congress over interstate commerce.
 For the guarantee of bank deposits but in the event this cannot be secured favors postal savings banks so constituted as to keep the deposited money in communities where established.
 For an income tax.
 For a limitation of federal injunctions.
 For the eight-hour day on all governmental work.
 Demands the enactment of an employers' liability act.
 For a department of labor in the president's cabinet.
 For the upbuilding of the merchant marine.
 For a navy sufficiently large to protect the people and commerce.
 A rigid enforcement of the civil service law.
 Favors the election of United States senators by popular vote.
 Demands the admission to statehood of Arizona and New Mexico.
 For better waterways.
 Condemns the imperialistic tendency of the government in retaining the Philippines.
 For a speedy completion of the Panama canal.
 Opposes the importation of Asiatic labor.
 The platform further pledges the party to the enactment of a law to regulate rates and services of telegraph and telephone companies doing an interstate business; to the protection of

all American citizens in all parts of the world, lawfully entitled to such protection; demands full and regular territorial form of government for Alaska and Porto-Rico; favors the application of the United States land and homestead laws to Hawaii; favors federal aid for building post roads; favors application of a plan of strict reciprocity with other nations in the matter of foreign patents, and treatment of inventors; favors a generous pension policy; advocates the establishment of a national bureau of public health on lines not interfering with State health boards; favors further extension of agricultural education and experiment stations.
Stockdale Taken Back to Indiana.
 Stockdale, the thief and burglar, who, some two years ago, broke into Halton's jewelry store, was on Sunday last taken to Indiana, where he escaped from the penitentiary. He was conveyed back by Sheriff Watson. Two other officers were with them when they left Bowie. Stockdale is an old offender. He is of large physique, of German descent, and is about 45 years of age.—Bowie-Cross Times.
 Stockdale, it will be remembered, was under indictment here for burglary, but broke jail and was caught in Oklahoma. The Montague county officers got hold of him, but in the meantime it was learned that he had escaped from the Indiana penitentiary and he was taken back to that State.

as a constitutional amendment to the people of Texas, for their adoption or rejection, prohibiting within the State of Texas the manufacture, sale, gift, exchange and intra-state shipment of spirituous, vinous and malt liquors and medicated bitters, capable of producing intoxication, except for medicinal and sacramental purposes." Also mark out in the same manner the paragraph which immediately follows the one above quoted, which reads: "For the system of local option and appropriate legislative enactment for the perfection of our laws, so as to prevent the barter, sale or exchange of intoxicating liquors in local option districts." This last paragraph is deceptive and calculated to mislead the voter. In other words those who really favor our present local option system, in order to have their votes counted in favor of submitting the question of State-wide prohibition, will be forced to vote against local option at the election next Saturday. To make it still plainer: If there should be more votes polled for local option at next Saturday's primaries than are polled for submission of State wide prohibition, the matter of submitting the question of State-wide prohibition will be defeated, and nothing will be gained by voting for local option for the simple reason that there is already such a law in the State. It is democratic to submit any important issue upon which the people of the State are divided, to a vote, and neither anti nor pro should offer objection to such a manner of settling such an important a question as that of State-wide prohibition.
