LAST WEEK, our friend Ray Landrum published a petition which was sponsored by a former congressman, James Coyne, to instigate a drive for a constitutional amendment to limit to 12 years the time Congressmen and Senators can serve in office.

When you stop and consider this matter, it has a lot of merit.

Coyne says that the term limitation would be the most simple, direct and effective way of "cleaning house" in congress, and could invigorate congress with fresh blood, new citizen-legislators committed to solving our nation's problems.

The way it now stands, congressmen often hold their positions "for life." Almost 99 per cent of the incumbent house members were re-elected in 1988. *Newsweek* magazine reported that this was a "higher rate than in the Supreme Soviet under Leonid Brezhnev."

Underscoring Coyne's assertion as to the "lifetime" status is the fact that Sen. Strom Thurmond (R-South Carolina) has filed for re-election. Thurmond is currently the oldest member of congress at age 87, and if he "lives out" another term, he would be 94 years old at its end. It is doubtful that Thurmond is opposed in the 1990 race.

Coyne charges that congress has made itself virtually invulnerable to successful challenges in elections by voting themselves free mailing privileges, unlimited travel at taxpayer expense and other "perks" worth \$1.1 million for each incumbent House Member every election cycle.

Only six Members of Congress were defeated in 1988, and of this number, five were facing criminal indictments at the time of election! Since challengers face such a "stacked deck," fewer are running each election. In fact, almost 20 per cent of House incumbents had no opposition in 1988. Even then, Political Action Committees (PACs) contributed a total of \$15 million to these Congressmen running unopposed.

Coyne further charges that the only thing Members of Congress seem to be able to do with any degree of success is to raise their own salaries.

In spite of the national outpouring year-before-last on the congressional pay raise issue, Coyne says that the House of Representatives moved "like thieves in the night" with less than 24 hours notice to "satisfy their greed for money and lust for high living" with a 37 per cent pay raise.

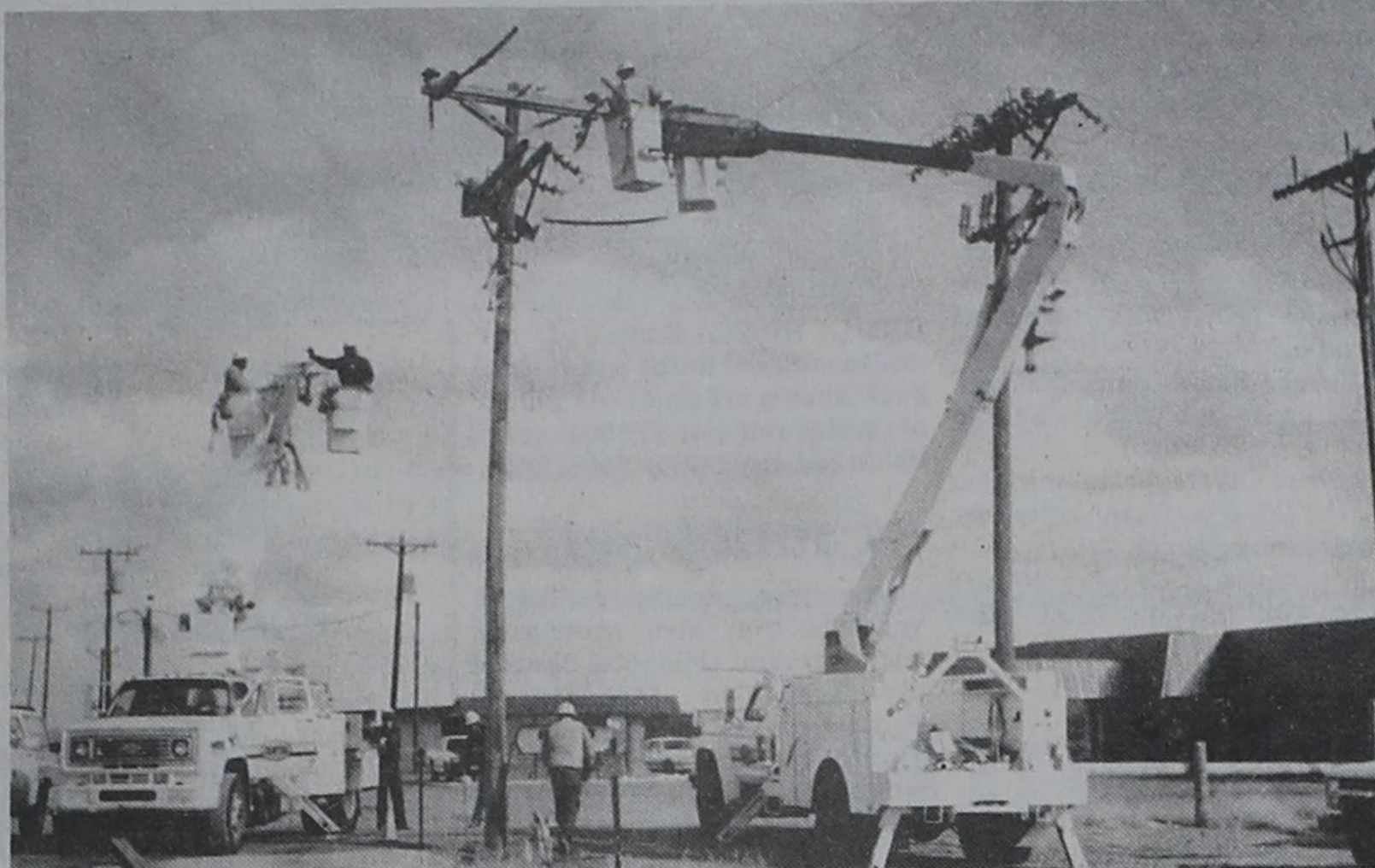
They passed this pay raise legislation despite the fact that they were already being paid \$89,500 a year, which put them in the top one per cent of all wage earners and in the face of massive public opposition.

Congress has become virtually a "sovereign nation unto itself," Coyne charges, "with a yearly budget of \$2 billion, a congressional staff of 35,000 bureaucrats and the ability to exempt itself from the rules and laws it makes for you and everyone else."

Earlier this century, congress passed a law to limit the term of the president. When you stop and think about it, the president has very little power compared to congress.

Coyne says it is time the American public went "over Congress' head" and demand passage of a constitutional amendment to limit the terms of office. He is asking financial support for the Americans to Limit Congressional Terms (ALCT), a grassroots organization.

ARRESTS NOTED

County Law Officials Crack Drug Ring

A month-long investigation by the Friona Police Department and the Parmer County Sheriff's Department has ended with the arrests of six men on felony charges of cocaine possession and delivery.

Capt. Bailey Roberts of the Friona Police Department said about \$11,000 worth of drugs were recovered.

Police also seized three vehicles, about \$1,100 cash and one residence and its contents in connection with the drug arrests. Arrest warrants have been issued for two other individuals in connection with the investigation.

Gonzala Reyna, 53, was arrested

Tuesday afternoon at his residence near Bovina. He was charged with aggravated delivery of a controlled substance after police seized \$10,000 worth of cocaine from his home.

Reyna was arraigned Wednesday in Parmer County and is being held on \$50,000 bond in the Parmer County Jail.

Roberts said the arrest of Reyna was a joint effort involving the Parmer County Sheriff's Office, the Friona Tactical Unit, and Clovis' K-9 division.

The Friona Police Department was responsible for the arrests of five other residents on drug-related charges, each involving about a quarter of an ounce of cocaine.

Luis Sanchez, 27, was arrested February 13 and charged with possession of a controlled substance. Sanchez is also being

held in the Parmer County Jail. His bail was lowered from \$20,000 to \$7,500.

Police arrested Gregorio Portillo, 48, last Saturday and

charged him with delivery of a controlled substance. Ray Rando, Jr., 29, and Ernest Mills were arrested at the same time and charged with possession of a controlled substance.

Portillo is being held on \$30,000 bond in the Parmer County Jail.

Prexedis Chavez, 24, was arrested Monday and charged with one count of delivery and one count of possession of a controlled substance.

Rando, Mills and Chavez were released after posting \$20,000 bail each.

"The police department feels they have curtailed the flow of drugs into Friona at this point in time," Roberts said.

Work Progresses On '60' Widening

Work is progressing on the proposal to award bids on the construction of two additional lanes for U.S. Highway 60 through Parmer County, according to District Resident Highway Engineer Rhea Bradley of Littlefield.

The bid-letting is scheduled for May of this year, and Bradley said this week that he expects the actual construction to begin "sometime in June."

"All of the right of way has been secured for the project from Friona eastward to the Deaf Smith County Line," Bradley said.

He said that the four major utility companies--Southwestern Public Service Company, Deaf Smith Rural Electric, Energas and West Texas Rural Telephone Co., are re-locating lines that will be affected by the expanded roadway.

"The utility companies have a couple of months' work to accomplish, but I don't foresee any problems," Bradley stated.

The official for the State Department of Highways and Transportation said he was expecting good participation from construction companies interested in bidding on the project. "It's a good-sized project, so it should draw some qualified bidders," Bradley said.

The building of the highway through Parmer County could pump a lot of dollars into the local economy during the construction period, which is expected to take approximately three years.

The first phase of the construction will be building an additional two lanes of highway from Friona to the Deaf Smith County line. The second phase will be constructing two additional lanes from Friona to Bovina, and the third phase will be a similar project from Bovina to Farwell.

Each of the stages of construction is expected to take around a year apiece to accomplish.

Lawrence and Carolyn Widner were honored on their 30th wedding anniversary with a quilt with names of all their family members on it.

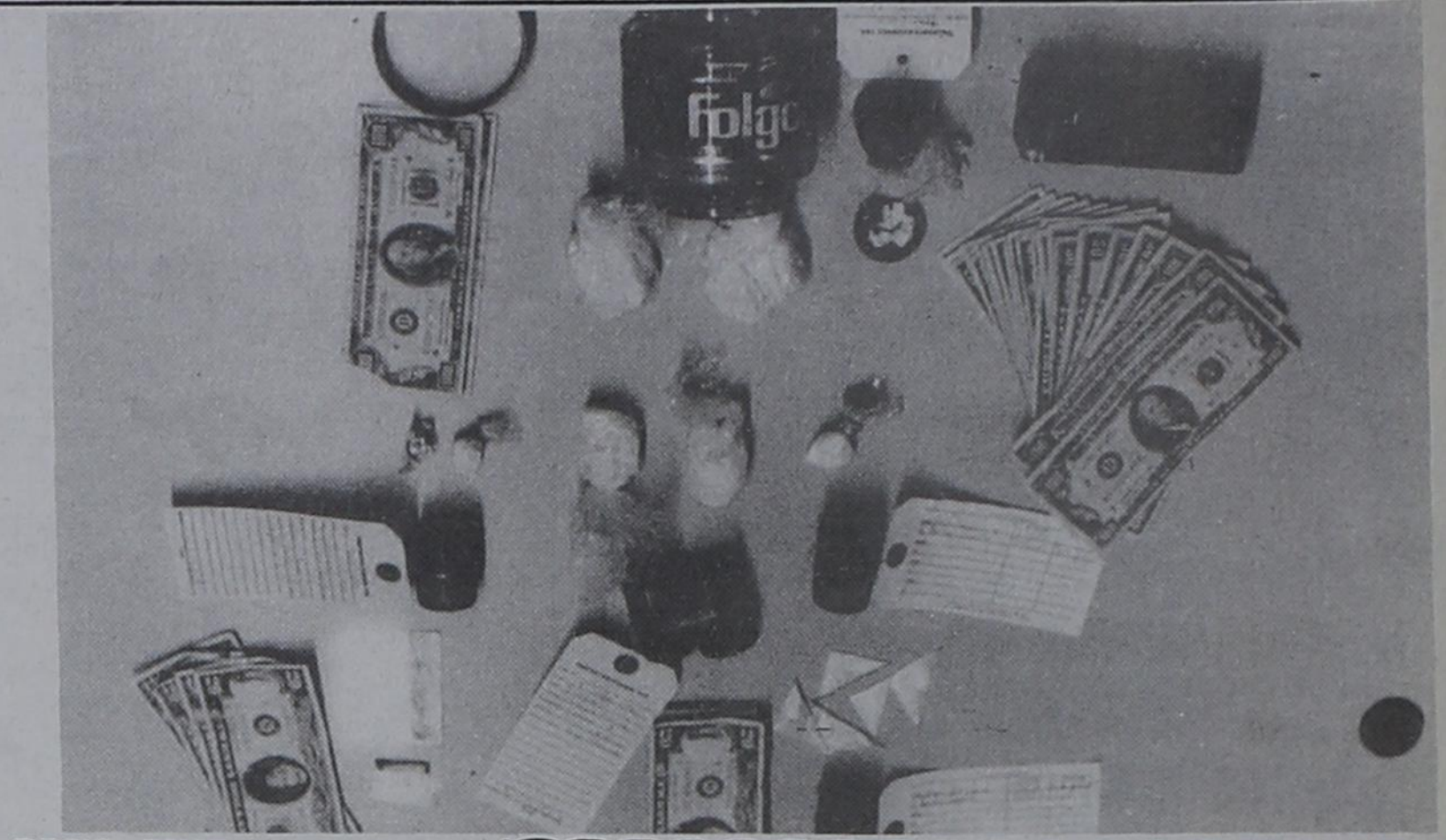
Extension Club Meets February 13

The Methodist Church in Bovina gave some leaflets out in Sunday's services and we felt they were worth sharing.

The title was "You can help stop TV's sex, violence, profanity and anti-Christian stereotyping." The article reads: Christian Leaders for Responsible Television (CLEAR-TV) has called for a one year boycott of the products of the Mennen Company and Clorox Corporation.

CLEAR-TV is composed of approximately 1600 Christian leaders, including the heads of over 70 denominations and scores of bishops and leaders from nearly every denomination in America. It is one of the largest and most diverse groups of Christian Leaders ever to address a single social issue.

According to CLEAR-TV, the two companies were leading sponsors of sex, violence and profanity during the recent sweeps period of April 27-May 24. CLEAR-TV officials had written all network advertisers—including Mennen and Clorox, asking that they not sponsor TV programs with gratuitous sex, violence, profanity and anti-Christian bias. If Mennen and Clorox sales drop during this period, then they and every other advertiser on television will get the message that the American public demands an end to the exploitation of sex, violence, profanity and anti-Christian stereotyping by advertisers and the television networks.

Of course, if the boycott fails then the network heads and advertising executives will know they can continue and even increase their violence and vulgarity. Cat litter: Fresh Step, Litter Green. Food products: Hidden Valley Ranch Dressing, Kitchen Bouquet Cooking Sauces. Charcoal: Kingsford and Matchlight. Mennen products are: Speed Stick Deodorant, Lady Speed Dry, Afta After Shave Lotion, Hawk Cologne, Mennen After Shave, Millionaire Cologne, Skin Bracer Toiletries, Baby Magic Shampoo, Protein 29 Hair Products, and Smooth Legs Shaving Lotion.

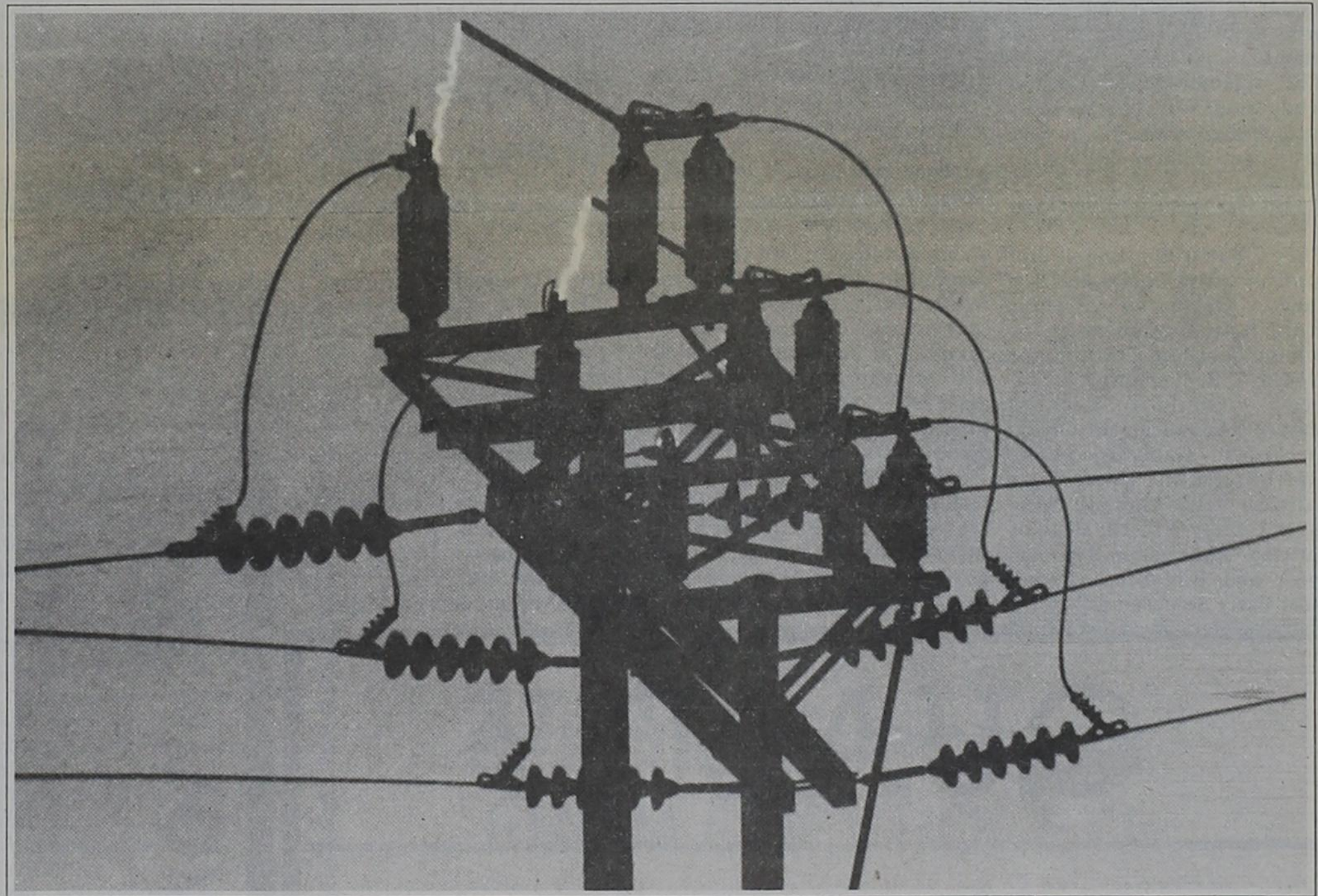

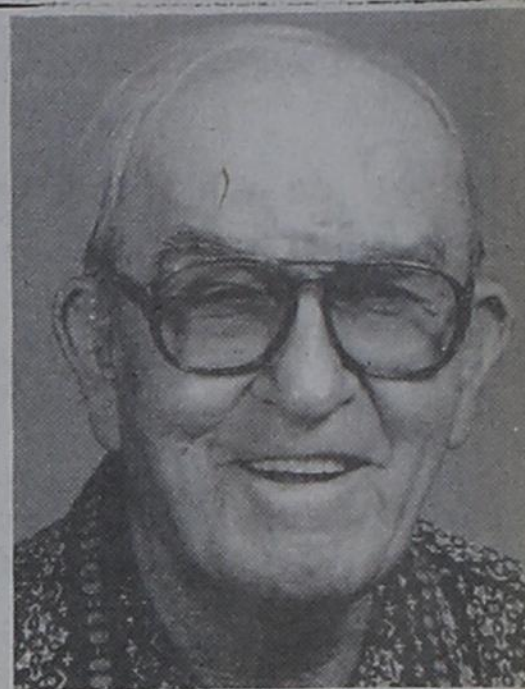

He married Ella Belle Smith on August 7, 1921, in Stratford. She died October 5, 1981. Six sisters and two brothers also preceded

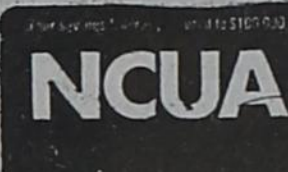
him in death.

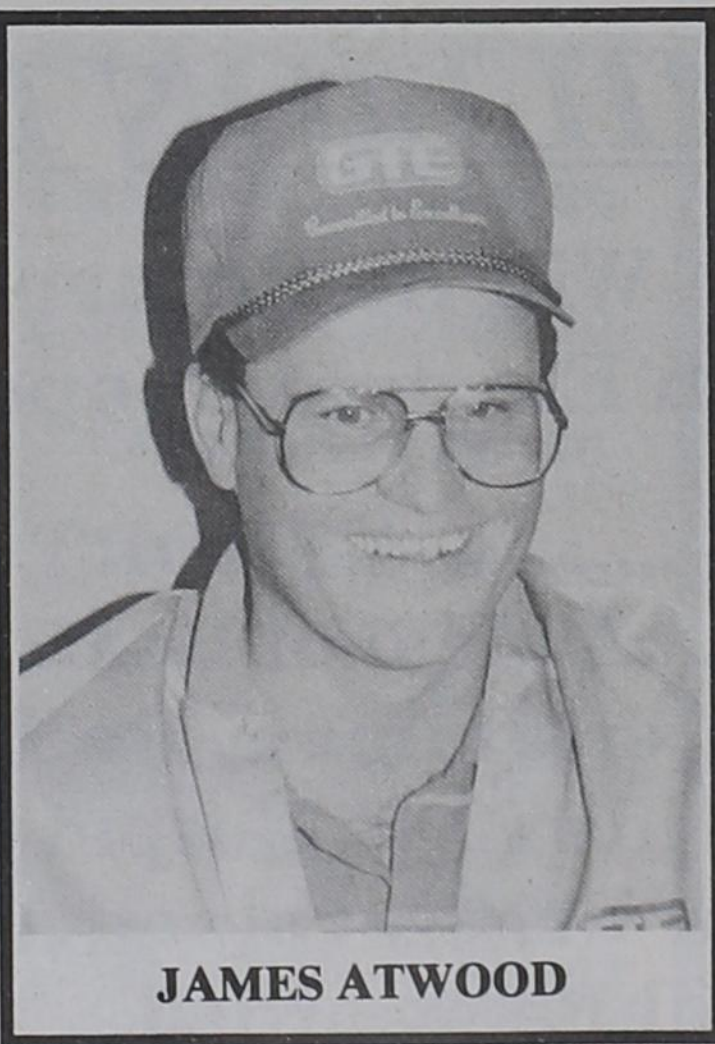

Cost-Share Programs Available

"The Food Security Act of 1985 disqualifies farmers from certain U.S.D.A. farm programs if they produce crops on highly erodible land without following an approved conservation plan," said Howard Sprague, Soil Conservationist for the U.S.D.A. Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

In Parmer County most of these plans require a crop rotation of high residue crops such as corn, milo, haygrazer, or small grains. Along with the crop rotation, the crop residues must be managed so that residue is left on or near the surface. However, there are farms which have severe water erosion problems on highly erodible land which may require other practices in addition to the crop rotation and residue management. Some of these practices include terraces, grassed waterways and grass planting.

There may be cost share to help cover the cost of installing these practices. Cost share may be provided through the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP). This program is for cost share on one particular practice and is not a long-term agreement.

Cost share may also be available through a Long Term Agreement (LTA). An LTA may last from one to three years and may provide cost share on more than one practice. Both the LTA and ACP programs are administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The Soil Conservation Service administers the Great Plains Conservation Program (GCP) which provides cost share on many practices. Under this program the landowner enters an agreement for three to ten years.

This agreement calls for a complete resource management system to be planned and carried out, which will provide the conservation measures needed on each acre of land the person owns.

"Cost share rates vary from 50-75% depending on the practice to be applied and the cost share program under which the cost share will be provided," concluded Sprague.

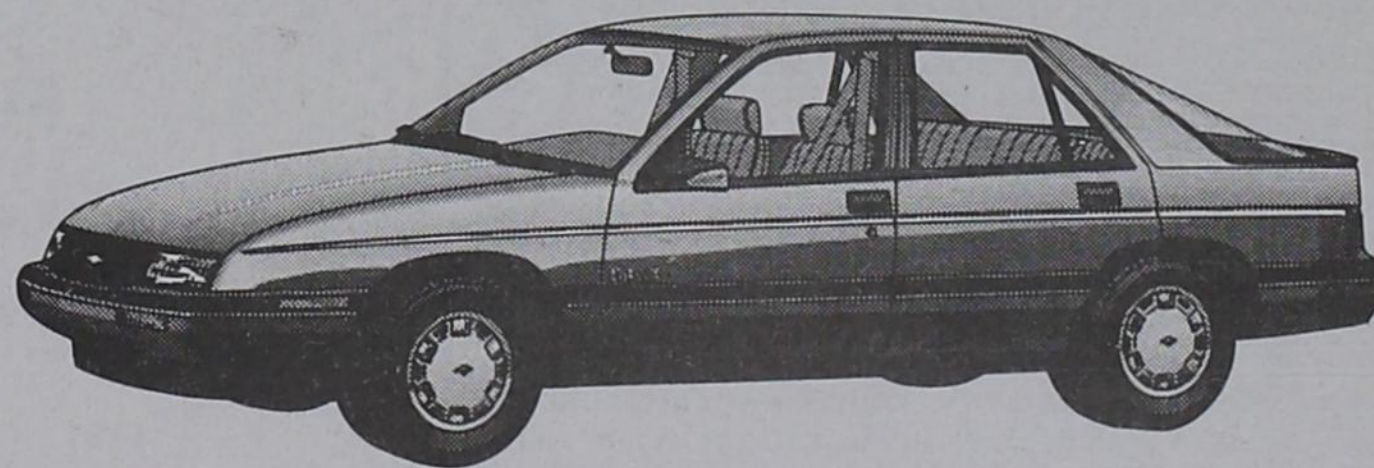

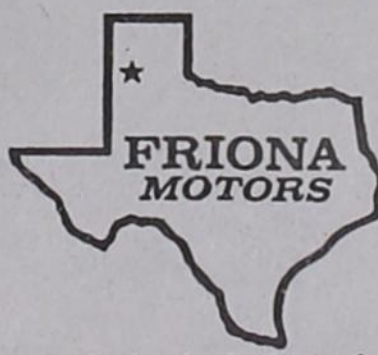

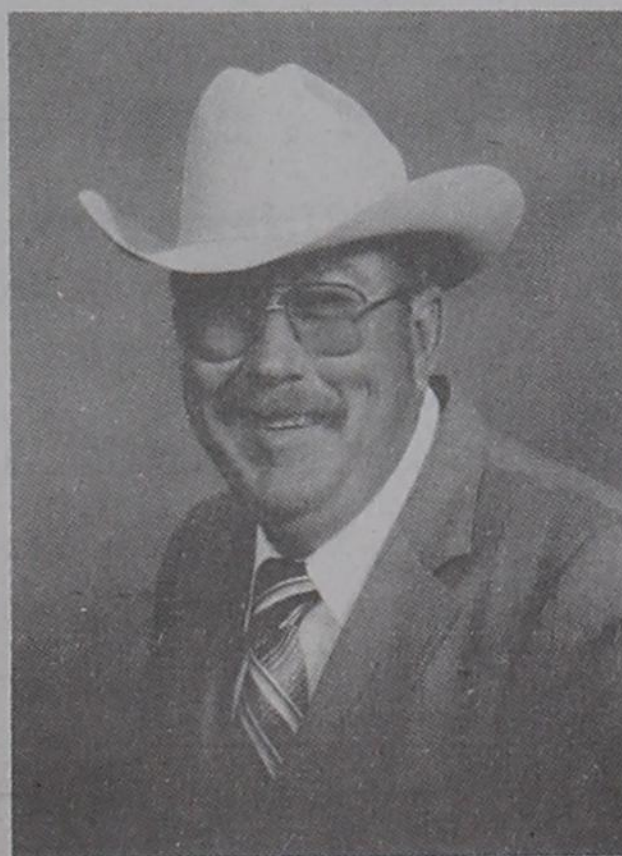
