IN JUST UNDER two months, Barry Switzer removed himself from virtually every Dallas Cowboys fans' doghouse, to at least a measure of respect, following last Sunday's Super Bowl win.

Switzer wasn't exactly the first choice of dyed-in-the-wool fans to replace Jimmy Johnson, after he fell out of favor with the team's ego-maniac owner, Jerry Jones.

Many football fans across the Lone Star state remembered Switzer as the coach of the rival Oklahoma Sooners, who came to Dallas every year to battle the University of Texas. In other words, he already had two strikes against him when to took the job.

But Switzer persevered, and even though the Cowboys didn't make it to the Big Show after the 1994 season, the fans didn't hold it against him, since runningback Emmitt Smith came up with one "bad wheel" at the time the team met San Francisco for the divisional title.

However, the fans' animosity resurfaced after Dallas visited Philadelphia for a game they were expected to win easily last December 10. All of you Dallas Cowboy fans recall the "low-lights" of that game.

Switzer elected to have the team try to make a yard on fourth down from their own 29-yard line. They failed, but got to re-think the situation when an official's whistle

had stopped the previous play. Once again the Boys were given the nod, and once again Emmitt Smith was stopped for no-gain. The game was tied at that point, and the Eagles kicked a late field goal for a 20-17 win.

The national sports press, and even commentators and writers in Dallas panned Switzer for his playcalling. "Fourth and Dumb" was the way one Texas writer summarized the situation.

The coach's decision to try to make the yardage was the number one subject of talk-show call-ins in Dallas for a couple of weeks.

Switzer's players rallied to his defense. Some of them, such as Michael Irvin, defended him by using a four-letter word in an interview broadcast by live network

Switzer was not swayed by the criticism. "We only needed a stinking foot. I'd do it again," he told reporters.

Fans who followed the pre-Super Bowl hoop-la may have learned something about Switzer that they had not previously known. Switzer was the son of an ex-convict father who was murdered by his mistress.

His alcoholic mother was said to have kissed Switzer, then went out on their back porch and blew her brains out.

Thus, many defenders of the current Dallas coach pointed out that compared to these episodes in his personal life, failing to make a fourth-down-and-a-foot in a football game was probably not that big of a deal. How can anyone in football today possibly coach a group of ego-inflated multi-millionaire players, and keep them focused as a team?

Personally, we miss the days of Tom Landry, Roger Staubach and Bob Lilly--when \$25,000 a year was a top salary. Those guys played football mainly for the enjoyment of it, and players stayed on the same teams for more than a year or two at a time.

But even though we can't quite admire the current Cowboys as much as teams from the earlier days, you have to admit that it felt good to watch them finally beat the Steelers in the Super Bowl.

From that point he doesn't remember details until he awoke in the hospital in Lubbock where he remained for three months.

A broken neck paralyzed him from the waist down. Further damage to a nerve in his left shoulder has also impaired the use of his left hand.

Today, he is a soft spoken, articulate young man who navigates the high school hallways in his wheelchair. Most days he wears a Bovina letter jacket given to him by older brother Cruz, a senior and star football and

basketball player for the Mustangs. By his own admission, he does not try as hard as he could in school or rehab.

He says he misses a lot of school because "he gets real tired". Math is a favorite subject.

His rehab schedule at a Clovis rehab center is irregular. "Once I walked the bars for 200 feet", he says, but goes only "every couple of weeks" now.

The Marrufo family has five boys and one girl. He said his brothers "make me get up and get out to play football with them instead of watching TV all the time". The brothers also transport him

to school and back, as well as other places he needs to go. He has hopes of someday being able to drive himself, but for now it is only a The other youths involved in

Two years later, whether speed or youth was a factor in the accident doesn't seem to matter. For Pedro Marrufo, life took an unscheduled turn at an early age.











