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



Christmas Trees. The Independent

About 4,000,000 Christmas trees were cut down in the forests this year, and in these days when we begin to think of preserving the forests the question has arisen in many a mind whether i is right thus to endanger the water supply from the hills. But let us do a little-ciphering over it, or, rather, take the figures given out by the Forest Service at Washington. Four million trees one tree for every fourth family -is a small number in the forest. If planted four feet apart they could be grown on 1,500 acres-that is, on two and a half square miles, the space of a rather large farm. This need not worry us when we remember that th supply of lumber requires the cutting of 100,000 acres every day in the year Of course, there has been damage in places by the cutting of Christmas trees, particularly in the Adirondacks and some parts of New England; but the damage is insignificant beside that of forest fires. In Germany they use more Christmas trees than anywhere else in the world, and they have the best system of forest preservation. They grow the Christmas trees, and then cut them out to thin the forest. and make a good profit out of them. The Christmas sentiment and the pleasure to children are reason enough for using the land and cutting the trees, even at some loss, just as it pays a use land for a flower garden. What we need is more intelligence in caring for our forests, so that the small Christmas trees may be a sort of byproduct; filling the interspaces, while the permanent trees are growing for lumber. Or, indeed, it would be just as legitimate to cultivate ten acres of farm for Christmas trees as for potatces or grapevines or roses. We thank the Forestry Service for setting all this plain. Our consciences need not be disturbed.



HISTORY OF THE PETROLIA OIL FIELDS

Round-Up. The subject of this biographical relew has the credit and distinction of having brought to the attention of the world the existence of the North Texas oil fields. Although purely accidental, the opening up of this region to oil operations, and the consequent influx of capital to that end, marks an important era in the development of the resources of Clay county and Northern Texas. While still in its infancy the busy spot where hundreds of barrels of oil are daily being pumped into tanks for ultimate refining a few years ago was a broad undulating and uninhabited plain, save for the modest abode of him whose lucky star led to the recent startling discovery. While a recent settler of North Texas, Mr. Lochridge has passed a third of a century in the State, having come into it in 1870 and made his first location in Kill county. Two years later he took up his residence in Falls county, where he continued his ocupation as a farmer, twenty miles southeast of the city of Marlin. A president for the Fort Worth and For good pies, use Empson's pump- Denver will be elected in this city 178-tf about Jan. 28 at a meeting of the directors to succeed Frank Trumbull, who retires on account of the Burlington's purchase of the Colorado and Southern system.

The general report in Fort Worth is that A. D. Parker, now vice president of the Colorado & Southern, will succeed Mr. Trumbull. However, it is also stated in some circles that George B. Harris, president of the Burlington, who on Thursday was selected to succeed President Trumbull on the Colorado & Southern, will also be president of the Denver, Wichita Valley and Stamford and Northwestern.

Mr. Harris, president of the Burlington, will leave Chicago about Jan. 20 for Denver, and his special train will be in Fort Worth about Jan. 28. It is expected that the younger son of James J. Hill, Louis, will be in this party also.
