VOTE TO MAKE RECONSIDER-ATION POSSIBLE.

Eighty-Six to Forty-Four in Its Favor.

Texas News Service Special. Austin, Tex., Feb. 5 .- Only one vote defeated the submissionists in the house this morning. Immediately upon convening the members plunged into the submission question. The call of the house to order found but three members absent-Goodman, who is an anti-submissionist; Pierce, a republican, and Walter, who is regarded as against the resolution. The vote was announced as eighty-five to forty-five ta favor of submission, less than the two-thirds necessary to carry. The actual vote was 86 to 44, but Mobley, a strong submissionist, changed his voteat the last moment so that he can call the question up for reconsideration.

A vote of 86 2-3 constituted a majority and the subraissionists would have needed but 87, or just one more vote. With three members absent, the submissionists really needed three more votes, since there is little likelihood of any member changing to the opposite side. It is believed here today that the vote sounds the death knell of submission and State-wide prohibition. 


