YOU'VE PROBABLY heard the expression: "It's as American as baseball, hot dogs and apple pie." This week we did a little research on the hot dog.

According to the National Hot Dog and Sausage Council, hot dogs are served in 95 per cent of American homes, with an average of 50 million being devoured in the United States every day, on the average.

This comes out to 80 hot dogs per person per year, if you want to figure out if you are eating your share of hot dogs, or if someone else is eating most or all of your share. That's more than one hot dog per person per week, if you're bad at math.

Surveys show that adults eat more hot dogs than children, and that women eat them more often than men do. They also are popular with everyone. President Franklin D. Roosevelt once served them at a royal banquet for the American Bar Association.

Hot dogs are traditional favorites at fairs, circuses, amusement parks, political rallies and picnics. They are especially popular at sporting events, where those in charge of concessions say 60 per cent of the fans in attendance end up eating hot dogs.

The basic hot dog is made of meat (all beef or combinations of beef, pork, chicken, turkey or veal), that is cured, seasoned, finely ground, stuffed into casings and sometimes linked. Variations in flavor are the result of spices and seasonings used in guarded secrets by the various companies.

Hot dogs range in size from bite-size to foot-long. According to the National Hot Dog and Sausage Council, the longest hot dog on record was 165 feet long and was made for the First Baptist Church of New Philadelphia, Ohio.

What makes the hot dog so popular? They are inexpensive, convenient and come ready to eat. A wiener in a bun provides as much protein as a container of yogurt or two slices of bacon. They are low enough in calories to be included on the official weight watchers program.

They can be boiled, broiled, barbecued, fondued, stuffed, simmered, stir-fried, battered, kabobed, or cooked in a casserole. Hot dog fans can either enjoy them plain or make them fancy.

The way to eat your hot dog appears to be a matter of geographical location. In New York, where vendors sell 100,000 of the dogs on a given weekend on Coney Island, they come smothered in a special chili sauce. Sidewalk vendors often top theirs with stewed onions, although the "official" New York hot dog is topped with cheddar cheese and bacon.

In the Kansas City area, the preference seems to be to serve the hot dog with sauerkraut and melted Swiss cheese on a sesame-seed roll.

In Chicago, where over two million hot dogs are sold annually at the O'Hare International Airport alone, the style is to make them with mustard, dark green relish, tomato slices and a dash of celery salt.

Californians prefer to dip their hot dogs in a corn meal batter and deep fry them, while Bostonians like theirs mixed with either onions or sauerkraut and mustard.

The Hot Dog Council doesn't give an "official" hot dog for the state of Texas, and probably if you asked six people you might get six different answers as to their favorite method. (Note to grocers: better stock up on your hot dog buns, after my readers finish this piece.)

Electricity Prices To Remain Stable

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) expects to file a request Friday to restructure rates within 35 days for retail electric service in Texas, leaving prices essentially unchanged.

Residential electric bills will neither increase nor decrease under the plan.

SPS chief executive officer Bert Ballengee said the utility will petition SPS-served communities in Texas, and the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), to increase base rates by \$40,842,255, but to decrease the boiler-fuel charge in bills by \$40,933,368. The difference is a \$91,113 decrease.

"Some costs to us have increased, and some costs to us have decreased," Ballengee said, "So, we must restructure our rates to reflect those changes. But prices to almost all of our Texas retail

customers will remain the same."

The utility is petitioning the PUCT to decrease fuel charges, and is asking for a one-time fuel-charge credit to customers. Details on the fuel-charge credit will be available later, Ballengee said, after the PUCT has issued an applicable order.

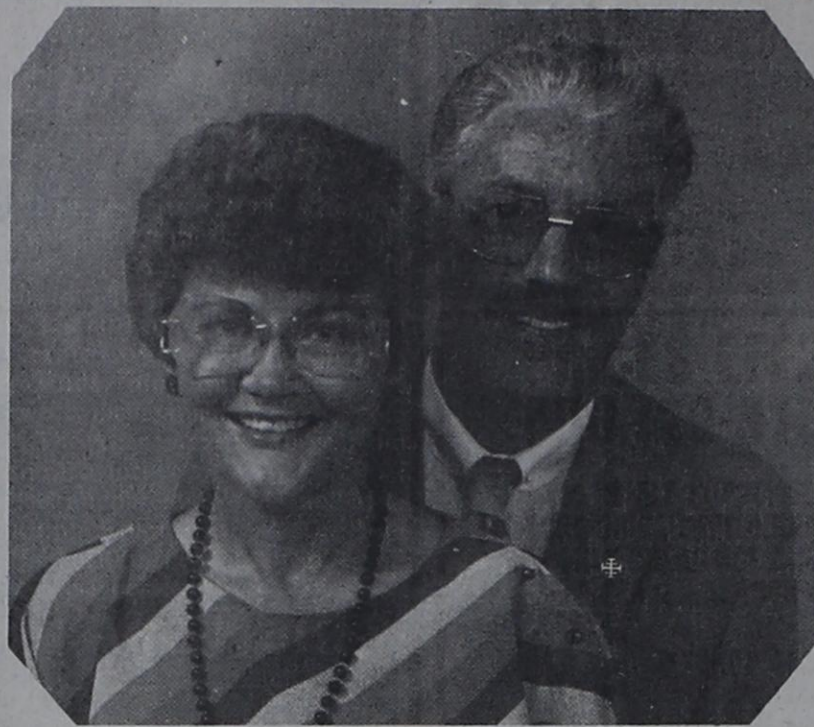

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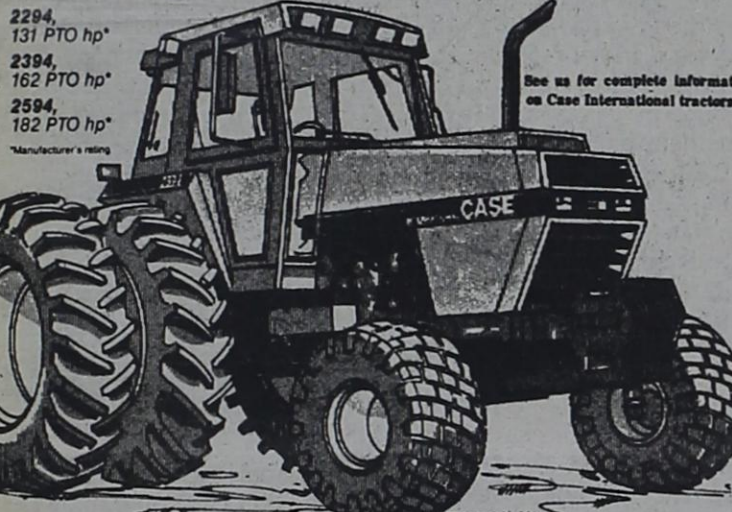
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J. Allen's Services Held

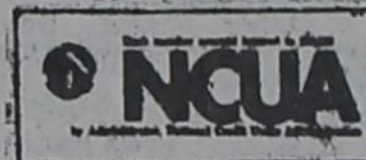

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HR64 FOR INTENSIVE MANAGEMENT This high yielding, very short, semi-dwarf hard red winter wheat variety has exceptional straw strength and the capability to resist lodging under high management conditions. HR64 is an inch shorter than Vona, blooms a day later than Newton, and has significantly more winter hardiness than either. It is resistant to SBMV and stem rust, and moderately resistant to leaf rust. HR64 is widely adapted--responding well to heavier than normal planting and fertilizer rates, or to drought stress.

These two varieties, like other semi-dwarfs, have a short coleoptile and should be planted shallow in a firm seed bed for best stand establishment.

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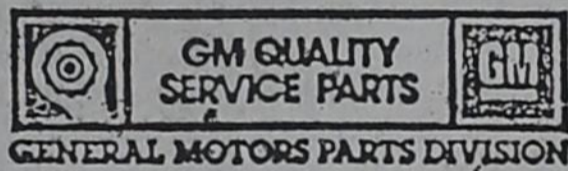

Dear Parent or Guardian:

The Bovina School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students K-5 may buy lunch for 90¢; 6-12 for 1.00; and breakfast for 50¢. Extra milk will be 20¢.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals priced at 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out this application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) OR your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years old or older or the word "NONE" for any household member who does not have a social security number, and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

VERIFICATION: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

REPORTING CHANGES: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

REAPPLICATION: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

FOSTER CHILDREN: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

NONDISCRIMINATION: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official:

CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.
