DISCUSSION OF BANK GUARANTY.

Wichita Falls, Tex., April 19.--I have read with great interest your editorials on guaranty of bank deposits and also several of the bills proposed on this subject.

It seems to me, however, that both the News and some of these bills prosed on false theories. When Controller C. G. Dawes first recommended that each National bank be compelled to pay over and have set aside a common fund, to be held by the United States Treasurer for protection of depositors in such banks as had failed, he took the record of all National banks for the eatire period the National banking system had been in operation, and estimated that an annual payment of one-twentieth of 1 per cent of the average deposits of all the National banks in the United States during that time would have provided a fund sufficient to have made good all lesses sustained by depositors.

He therefore recommended that such a fund should be set aside annually and its payment made compulsory on all National banks. His recommendation was based on a record of about forty years and included the period of the panics of 1873 and 1893. I have have not his report before me and may be in error as to the exact amount to be set aside, but I am sure it was not as much as one-fourth of 1 per cent.

I understand that Hon. T. B. Love has estimated that thirteen one-hundredths of 1 per cent on Texas National banks alone for the same period would have provided a sufficient fund to have paid all Texas losses.

Now it may be that a compulsory ssessment or tax to the amount that experience has shown would have been heretofore sufficient would be upheld as a matter of public policy. But a system such as is advocated by Hon. W. J. Bryan for putting "every bank behind every other bank," thereby making them partners for payment of losses when they have no possibility of sharing in profits, is more vicious than his ''16 to 1'' theory on the coinage of silver, which the News so vigorously opposed.

Now, even with such a system as Controller Dawes recommended, every honorable banker is willing to get behind his bank in time of storm and bolster it up with his private fortune and credit, but if all banks were chained together (as proposed by Mr. Bryan and some of our State officials) one failure anywhere would intensify the scare in time of financial stress and banks would go down like forests in a

would be no panies. There was no real good reason for the last one, but people are affoat. I have witnessed two pannever before seen the 'closing sign' have rushed home after noting these signs and told their neighbors certain banks had 'closed;' and they do many other things equally as unreasonable or foolish.

My idea would be that all of the guaranty fund should be kept in such shape as to be immediately available if any bank should fail, for nothing allays a panic like quick payment. I am rather inclined to think the whole guaranty idea tends to cramp individuality and promote reckless banking, but would have no objection to a reasonable law along the lines recommended by Controller Dawes.

conservative banker pays his annual percentage (either one-tenth of 1 per cent or such amount as past experience has shown would suffice under conditions heretofore existing) that his duty is done and his responsibility ended, and the State or United States should have no more right to call onhim again than an insurance company would have to levy an assemment on a paid-up policy to make good unexpected losses.

The great trouble, however, is that some of our would-be statesmen think that 'bank guaranty' is a good hobby horse to ride into office, and politicians who have never had any business or financial experience think themselves qualified to 'regulate' the business affairs of some one else to promote their political advance-

No better ilustration of the folly to which regulation might be carried is needed than one of the late bills offered requiring State banks to invest 37% per cent of their deposits in government, municipal or county bonds. If those who pose as friends of State banks load them down with restrictions like that, National banks need never fear the results of the agitation! The News in its anxiety to protect the depoistors should not go so far as to attempt to make every man who enters the banking business responsible for his neighbor's losses

The papers that have all along done that they could editorially and otherwise towards defeating the suit against he Waters-Pierce Oil Company for violating the Texas anti-trust law, are now, seemingly, worried about what disposition should be made of the \$1,-800,000 fine since it has been paid into the treasury. Some of them have made the suggestion that State taxes had they been given the proper inducehe reduced to something like 1 cent on the \$100 valuation until this \$1,800,-000 fine shall be exhausted in paying the expense of the State government. This plan would make a splendid showing for the present State administration, but would cause trouble, and plenty of it, for the next. At present, State taxes are not so very high and there is very little complaint from the tax payers. By placing this \$1,800,000 out on interest, or using it as a fund for the purchase of county and municipal bonds might be a better plan than fixing a low State tax rate for one year 12,000 bales. and being forced to place it back where it was, or perhaps a little higher, for the year following. If this could be done, the interest on the \$1,800,000 could be used toward paying the expenses of the State government and in that way the State taxes could be reduced to some extent to cover a period of several years. It is not likely that another \$1,800,000 fine will be paid concerns which have heretofore had a lower than yesterday's close. RAW DRUGS.

Castor Oil Comes as Pretty Little Brown and Black Beans.

Upon going into a pharmacy and looking over the mysterious jars and bottles and boxes that line the shelves did you ever wonder where on earth all of the drugs came from and how they appeared before they were ground up and made into oils or dried or pulverized or crystallized into queer shaped lumps? Each jar and box seems to hide some secret which you immediately become curious to solve. How many different lands do they represent? And, after they leave the jars that hold them now, what are they

Who, for example, would connect a great pile of dry, thin twigs, neatly tied into small bundles, with sarsaparilla? These twigs are the creep ing roots and rootlets of a prickly shrub that grows in Jamaica, and they are worth from 10 to 50 cents a pound.

Somewhat similar in appearance is ipecacuanha, which also comes to us in dry twigs, which are part of the trailing root of a plant found in the damp forests of Brazil.

These roots receive no preparation save drying before they are shipped off to the United States. They are packed in large sacks, and the workmen who open the bales must beware of breathing the pungent, irritating dust given off, which is productive of unpleasant results if incautiously inhaled.

Castor oil, too, is hard to recognize in the pretty little brown beans, spotted with black and with polished skins, that arrive in bags from India. They look far too attractive to suggest the much hated dose of our early days.

Aloes, the base of many nauseous medicines, may be seen in its crude form as a solid mass resembling brown sealing wax, packed in heavy wooden boxes, from which it is chipped out in flakes with a chisel and hammer. It is of different qualities and prices,

according to whether it comes from Arabia, Socotra or the West Indies, and may bring any sum from \$4 to \$45 per hundreweight. Aloes is the juice of the big fleshy leaves of the plant of that name. This juice is pressed or evaporated from the leaves and poured into chests or kegs in a semifluid state, hardening presently into a solid block. Not infrequently it is inclosed in the dry skins of monkeys and in this strange form brought

One of the most interesting of drug is opium, both on account of its awful potency and by reason of its great value. A case of optum about 225 pounds, is worth \$400 foughly. The case is of rough seal lined with tin and contains p number of soft, dark lumps, like large handfuls of dough packed very closely together in a

quantity of dry, chaffy seeds.

The optum which reaches America is of two qualities, one for medicine, the other for smoking, and comes from Persia and Asia Minor, China and India.-St. Louis Republic

Throughout the United States last night the Odd Fellows celebrated the ninetieth anniversary of the founding now sovereign grand lodge, legislated, of that fraternity in America.

Fellowship in America, was born in third degree members. London, Jan. 15, 1782. The title 'Independent Order of Odd Pellowship' was given to American Odd Fellowship probably because Washington Lodge No. 1, Baltimore, was chartered by the Duke of York Lodge, Preston, England, one of the ubordinate lodges of the English Independent Order of Odd Fellows, Manchester Unity. The main English branch at that time was known as the United Order of Odd Fellows, but a division came, which resulted in the independent order. The United Order

never obtained a footbold in America. Wildey lived to see grand lodges formed in Pennsylvania, New York and Massachusetts within four years after the formation of the Grand Lodge of Maryland and United States. On Jan. 25 the Grand Lodge of Odd Fellowship of the United States was organized. On March 30, 1825, Wildey wa sinstalled grand sire. He died October 19, 1861, or forty-two years after the organization of Washington Lodge No. 1, At his death there were forty-two grand jurisdictions and 200,000 members of the order.

In 1894 the eligibility law was extended so as to include all unmarried white women who had attained the age Ruby, Gafnesville; C. R. Watkins, Pitts- of the Seven Stars, on April 26, 1819, of 18 years who believe in a supreme, intelligent Creator and Ruler of the Universe and who are of good moral character.

Thus the years 1868, 1878, 1888 and 1894 were eventful years in the Rebekah degree and mark epochs in its history as the liberal legislation which aided greatly in its growth, and each year more liberal legislation is granted. Odd Fellowship was the first frater-

nal order to admit women to its ranks. The first Rebekah lodge in Texas was organized in Houston by Jacob De Cordova. The total Rebekah membership now exceeds a half million.

The membership in Texas is about 12,000, having more than doubled the

past five years. It was not until women were admitted to the order that Independent Order of Odd Fellows' homes for widows George M. Bearce and orphans were built, the first being built in 1882 at Corsicana, Texas, since which time almost every State in the Union has followed our example.
