SPOKESMEN FOR RURAL hospitals are charging that a federal review process which was designed to see that Medicare patients receive high-quality care is penalizing rural hospitals, and threatening sorely-needed doctors who practice in these hospitals.

Rep. Charles Stenholm of Abilene, testifying before a Senate Finance subcommittee recently, told the committee: "The current insensitivity to rural realities threatens the availability of health care not only for Medicare beneficiaries, but for entire communities."

The Texas lawmaker pointed out that Peer Review Organizations (PROs) whose duty it is to monitor the cost and quality of care given to Medicare patients, have recommended or were considering sanctions against 36 Texas doctors at the beginning of this year, and that of the 36 cases, 32 involved rural physicians.

"It is difficult for me to believe that 88 per cent of all the questionable physicians in Texas practice in rural areas," Stenholm said in his testimony.

Under the "P.R.O." set-up, which has been in operation for three years, the panel can deny Medicare reimbursements to doctors and hospitals if reviews of patient charts and records disclose that they have overcharged the elderly recipients or given them substandard care.

Spokesmen for the hospitals have criticized the PROs for holding rural doctors to unrealistic standards, arguing that different treatment practices are not necessarily worse.

Dr. William Roper, administrator of the Health Care Administration, said that the PROs were reminded recently that rural care must be evaluated by doctors who are knowledgeable about standards of medical practice in the area and practice in a like setting.

"Rural physicians ought to be reviewed by rural physicians," Dr. Roper said in his testimony before the senate subcommittee. Whether this has been the case in the past seems to be questioned by those taking the part of the rural hospitals.

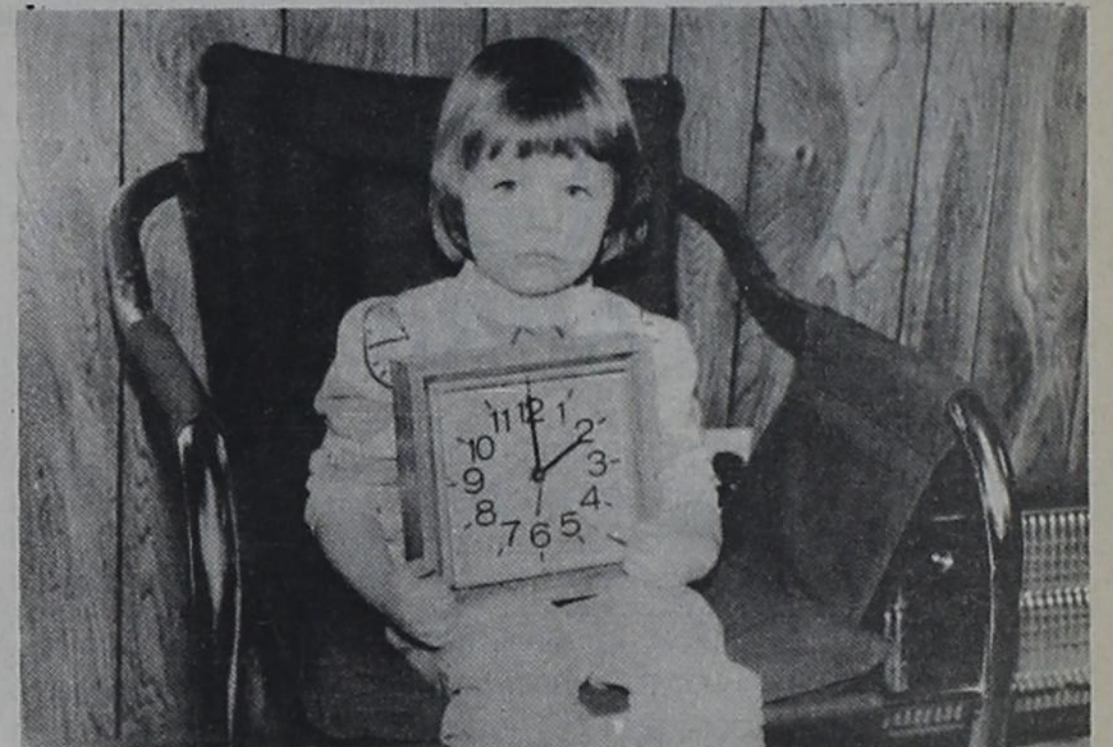
Whitecotton said that all of the present employees will continue with the business. Joe Olvera, who has worked in the meat market for ten years under Smith, will be in charge of the market.

Daylight Time To Debut On Sunday

If you have been enjoying those last few minutes of sleep these spring mornings, we have a bit of bad news.

Daylight Savings Time will begin its run on Sunday, April 4, this year, instead of the last Sunday in April. So you're going to have to retire earlier, in order to get the same amount of sleep Saturday night.

At 2 a.m. local time Sunday, residents will observe the "spring forward, fall back" rule, which will give everyone except residents of Arizona, Hawaii, most of Indiana and Puerto Rico an extra hour of daylight in the evening.

Daylight Savings Time has been virtually a national phenomenon since 1966, when Congress passed a law setting Daylight Savings Time from the last Sunday in April to the last Sunday in October.

Prior to 1966, Daylight Savings Time had been invoked in some localities during the summer months, beginning as early as

1920. This made it a bit confusing, however, as to what time of day it was in various locations.

Congress first passed Daylight Savings Time legislation in 1918, but it was repealed a year later.

Between 1920 and World War II, various states and cities passed their own Daylight Savings Time, and the practice continued after the war. During World War II, DST was observed nationally, and during the 1974 and 1975 energy crunch, Daylight Time was instituted earlier in the year, although it was debatable how much energy was saved, due to businesses and schools having to start up in darkness in some sections of the country.

At any rate, change your clocks Saturday night--and smile. In just six months and three weeks, we'll get that hour of sleep back.

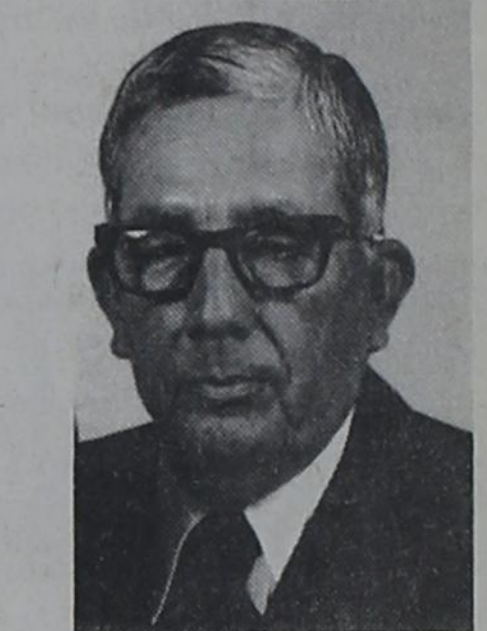
Rejino Services Are Set


