Other Unusual and Interesting Names and Combinations Developed by New Directory.

Washington, D. C., May 13.—Any man can live on "Easy Street" if he wants to. This is not a conclusion drawn from reading the tariff bill or advertisements of Goldfield mining companies, but an absolute fact. Two cities in this country, Boston and Johnstown, Pa., have "Easy Streets."

A directory of all the streets, avenues, courts, alleys and lanes, where mail is delivered in 1,279 principal cities in the United States has just been prepared by the postoffice department, and it discloses some rather interesting information.

There seems to be a street for nearly every necessity of life, every profession, every mood and condition of man. There is a Rich Place in West Seneca, Buffalo. And there are one Poor Farm road and one Poor House Lane.

Three towns boast Rubber streets and one a Rubber alley. There is a Champagne street, seven Wine streets, two Whiskey hills, several Brewery streets, one of which is located in Cincinnati, and to offset these, seven Coffee streets and one Coffee alley.

There's Limberger street, a Switzer street, a Pickle street, a Ham street, a Ham alley, a Bee Hive street, a Bread street, a Butter street, an Onion street, a Fork street, a Plate street, a Tin Cup alley, an Oyster alley, a Lemon street, several Olive streets, and Bean streets, a Pea alley, a Salad Place, a Turkey street and finally several Cranberry streets, as well as Cranberry avenue and a Cranberry alley, a Pumpkin hill and a great number of streets named after various fruits.

Spring, Summer, Fall and Winter are all represented. There are several Ice streets, some Snow streets, Flood streets, and one Not-Hole road, as well as twenty Sunnyside streets, number of Sunnyside avenues, drive and places with several Sunset streets and places. There are also a Sunday street, a Monday street and a Friday street.

Four Coffin streets, two Coffin avenues and one Coffin alley may be found in the list, also a Doctor street, Lawyers row, Merchant street, Tailor street and Baker street and even some Parson streets, and a Deacon street, as well as a Butcher alley and a Butcher lane.

Paradise alley is represented in eight towns and there is one Paradise street, one Paradise place, and four Paradise avenues. And there's also an Eden avenue and an Eden alley. Hogan's alley is represented in one city, and there are two Hell's Half Acres.

There's a Love road and nine Lovers' lanes, besides a Sweet street and a Bitter street. There's one Brecht street, eighty Long streets and two hundred Short streets, as well as a Rapid street, a Swift street, a Quick street, a Work street, a Quiet, and street, but a great number of Joy streets and one Joy alley. Faith, Hope and Charity are all represented.

Of all the streets in the country, Main street appears most frequently. It is found in over 1,000 cities. Washington street follows a close second. Of the numbered streets Ninth and Tenth streets are more numerous than any others. New York has up to the One Hundred and Sixty-second street, and is alone in the field up to the Two Hundred and Sixty-Second street, the highest numbered street in the world.

There are 163 Wall streets and 340 Broadways and 15 Boweries. Dewey is honored in nearly 200 cities. Many cities name streets after Presidents. There are 37 Roosevelt streets, 34 Roosevelt avenues, one Roosevelt court, one Roosevelt lane, four Roosevelt Terraces and one Roosevelt Way. Oswego, N. Y., has followed simplified spelling and has a "Rosavelt" street. There are also 20 Bryan streets. Besides, Taft street Cincinnati, which is named after the Taft family; there are seven Taft streets and two Taft avenues.

Wichita Falls, Texas, May 13th, 1909.

If the people of Wichita Falls do not expect to continue in the future as in the past to pull together and work together for a greater Wichita Falls, we now have as good streets as we need; we also have sufficient and probably more business and residence houses than there will be demand for. There will be no immediate or even a prospective need of a street railway. In short, the enterprises, both public and private, which we now have, will be sufficient to meet the demands of a city the size of Wichita Falls. But, on the other hand, if Wichita Falls expects to continue to grow and prosper, nothing which has a tendency to block prosperity should be done at this particular time. Our schools need enlarging. In order to do this, more buildings will have to be constructed. So far as can be learned, but little or no opposition will show itself on the 18th (election day) to the proposition to vote \$60,000 worth of school bonds. On the same day another election which carries with it a proposition to vote \$17,000 worth of city street paving bonds is to be voted on, and to this proposition some of our largest property owners are opposed. However, it is to be hoped this opposition will not be sufficient to defeat the issuance of these bonds. If it should succeed, it will be the first backward step Wichita Falls has taken in four years, during which time property values—more especially that of business property—have more than doubled in value. The cause for this doubling in values can be attributed directly to the efforts of our enterprising business people to build up Wichita Falls.

Senator Vgale of Amarillo has announced that he will not again be a candidate for renomination. It is predicted that there will not be any unseemly scramble for his seat in the senate. The average Panhandle citizen is too well satisfied with staying at home to desire political preferment.

If anything is to be accomplished by the anti-tuberculosis association, the work so well begun in Texas several months ago must not be allowed to lag. Tuberculosis is an insidious and constant foe which is making its attack every minute and every hour in every day of the year. It is only by equal vigilance and activity that any effective progress can be made against the disease. Spasmodic effort will be of little avail. Every community should have a live, active anti-tuberculosis association and should keep in constant agitation the campaign of education which has been well started throughout the length and breadth of the State. The newspapers of the State stand ready to render whatever service they can in this campaign. The medical profession should not be outdone by their journalistic brethren in any movement for the health of the general public.

The building of cement sidewalks has done as much or more in the way of enhancing property values in Wichita Falls than any other one enterprise that has been carried out during the past three or four years. The paving of our business streets will do likewise and while some of our largest property holders are opposed to the proposition, the indications are that a majority of the property holders favor it, and the wishes of the majority in this particular instance should govern.

Although the wheat crop will be light the price will be unusually high and many thousands of dollars will soon be disgorged among the farmers of Wichita county. Many farmers believe that their wheat will yield ten bushels per acre and some wheat premises to yield as much as twenty or twenty-five bushels. Oats, too, promise a much better crop than was thought possible a few weeks ago.

There is ample room for two cotton compresses at this point, and from the best information at hand both will make good money on their investment.

To Represent Texas.  
Spokane, Wash., May 13.—A. M. Barton, private secretary to Governor T. M. Campbell, writes from Austin, Texas, that the governor has appointed the following committee to act with the officers of the National Irrigation congress, which will have its seventeenth sessions in Spokane the second week in August, to perfect the best means of making the meeting of the greatest benefit to Texas:  
Ed R. Kone, commissioner of agriculture, Austin; W. C. Chaplain, Mercedes; B. H. Collins, Anahuac; L. C. Hill, Harlingen, and P. A. Hayes, Barstow.

"We are pleased with the appointments by Governor Campbell, who has named a strong committee," said Mr. Insinger, "and we believe that the State of Texas will derive a great deal of benefit from the congress, of which George Eames Barstow of Barstow, Texas, is president.

"We look for large delegations from various parts of Texas, one of these coming from El Paso, where the commercial club is working up a fine interest in the Spokane sessions. We have been informed that the El Paso delegation will be accompanied by its famous Mexican band and that the party will travel in a special train. It is expected to make a strong showing for Texas."

Mr. Insinger announced also that it is expected to have as special guests the president of the United States and several members of his cabinet; also that statesmen, scientists, railroad presidents, financiers and experts in irrigation, forestry, deep waterways, good roads and home building will participate in the program at the six days sessions.

### Kentucky's Political Crime.

Governor Wilson of Kentucky closes the notorious Goebel murder case of nearly a decade ago by a sweeping pardon for all concerned, except the unfortunate Youtsey, who is serving a life sentence. William S. Taylor has had a most fortunate time of it since the morning the young Kentuckian Goebel was shot as he walked through the State house grounds, from a window of a roof at least near where Taylor is alleged to have been seated. Goebel had been the democratic candidate for governor against Taylor. The contest was close, and there was much fraud. The courts had declared Goebel to have been honestly elected and his appeal for the right to occupy the office was before the legislature at the time of his cowardly assassination. From a prison cell at Frankfort, Henry Youtsey, under life sentence for participation in that murder, declares he is as much entitled to a pardon as Taylor or Finley. Over in Indiana Taylor and Finley received word of the pardon with the declaration that there is still 'A God in Israel.' The State prosecutor regrets that Kentucky should have granted a pardon to those men without ever having brought their case to trial. Politics has certainly played a most important part in that most interesting case. For politics Goebel was murdered. Through politics Taylor was given refuge by the republican governor in the neighboring State of Indiana. By the aid of politics all the force of a sovereign State's extradition machinery was nullified, and now Governor Wilson has repaid a debt—if not expressed, implied—to the Taylor adherents in Kentucky contracted in the last gubernatorial campaign. Poor Kentucky! Her lot in this regard has not been a happy one. How much nobler would have been her course had William S. Taylor been brought to trial. And if justice had not then been done, the pardoning power might properly have been invoked. The nation would have applauded. Now it lives to regret.—National Monthly.

STAMFORD WILL GET THE BAPTIST SANITARIUM.

Stamford, Tex., May 12.—The locating committee of the West Texas Baptist Sanitarium decided at a late hour last night to accept the bid of Stamford for this institution. The committee spent today in the city and the terms of the contract were agreed upon. The same will be submitted to the West Texas Baptist Association, which will be held in Rotan on June 8th.

The movement for the West Texas Baptist sanitarium began several months ago and it was decided to build an institution to cost not less than \$75,000, said institution to be located in some town in West Texas that would pay not less than \$25,000 for the institution.

The committee on location had its first meeting in Sweetwater in April to receive the bids and it was found that Haskell, Abilene and Stamford were competitors for the location of the sanitarium. The bids of the different towns were as follows: Abilene, \$46,000; Haskell, \$60,000, and Stamford, \$56,000. The committee deferred action until they could visit the several sites and a couple of weeks ago Abilene withdrew from the contest because of the high price asked for land and Haskell.

The committee came to Stamford today and a memorandum of the contract was agreed upon. This contract as stated will be submitted to the West Texas Baptist association for final action.

A CAMPAIGN AGAINST TUBERCULOSIS.

Washington, D. C., May 13.—Much interest and importance attaches to the fifth annual meeting of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, which assembled at the New Willard Hotel today for a three days' session. Nearly all parts of the country are represented in the attendance, which embraces many prominent medical men, educators, sociologists and others.

Reports showing gratifying progress during the past twelve months will be presented to the convention. Since the last annual meeting a large amount of work has been accomplished by the organization. One of the events of the year which was planned and carried out by the association was the successful meeting of the international anti-tuberculosis congress in the city.

Another feature of the year's work of the association has been its traveling exhibits. Three of these exhibits are now conducted by the association and during the past year they were displayed in all large cities. As a direct result of these efforts, the State legislatures of Kansas, Tennessee and Nebraska have passed laws and made appropriations to carry on the campaign against consumption.

Reports have it that the Denver road will make quite a change in their passenger trains on the 6th of June. Trains Nos. 5 and 6, now running between Fort Worth and Wichita Falls, will be extended to Amarillo. Trains Nos. 3 and 4, now running between Childress and Fort Worth, will be continued as at present. Trains Nos. 1 and 2 will be made fast trains and will only stop at county sites and terminals. These trains are expected to make the run from Fort Worth to Childress in six hours, and cutting down the time between Fort Worth and Denver about six hours. The competition for Colorado travel is getting harder each year, and while the Denver road has the shorter route, yet the other roads were getting a good portion of the travel, but with the new schedule and running time the Denver road will have them all bested by no little.

The road bed has been put in a condition that fast running can be made with perfect safety, while the rolling stock is the best that can be secured and there is no reason why the Denver should not do the Texas-COLORADO business.

Seventh Day Adventists.

Washington, D. C., May 13.—The world's quadrennial general conference of Seventh Day Adventists assembled today at Tokoma Park with the largest attendance by far that has ever gathered for council in the history of the denomination. Eight hundred delegates, were present at the opening, of whom nearly one-fourth came from foreign countries. Nearly all of the countries of Europe are represented, together with Japan, India, Korea, China, Central and South America, Africa, Australia and Asiatic Russia.

The conference will remain in session three weeks, with the Rev. A. G. Daniel of the city presiding. Reports prepared by officers and committees for presentation to the conference show that the last four-year term has witnessed the greatest growth in the history of the denomination.

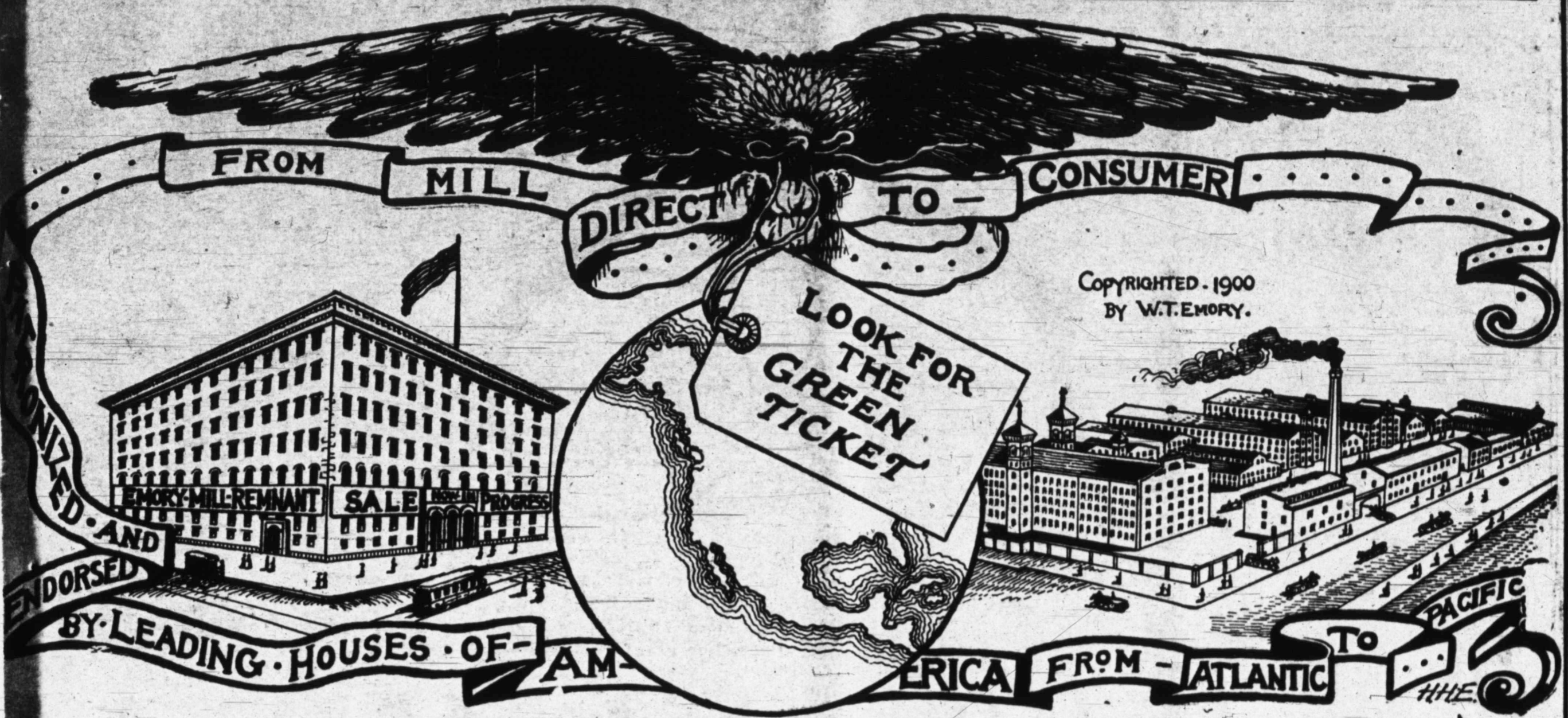

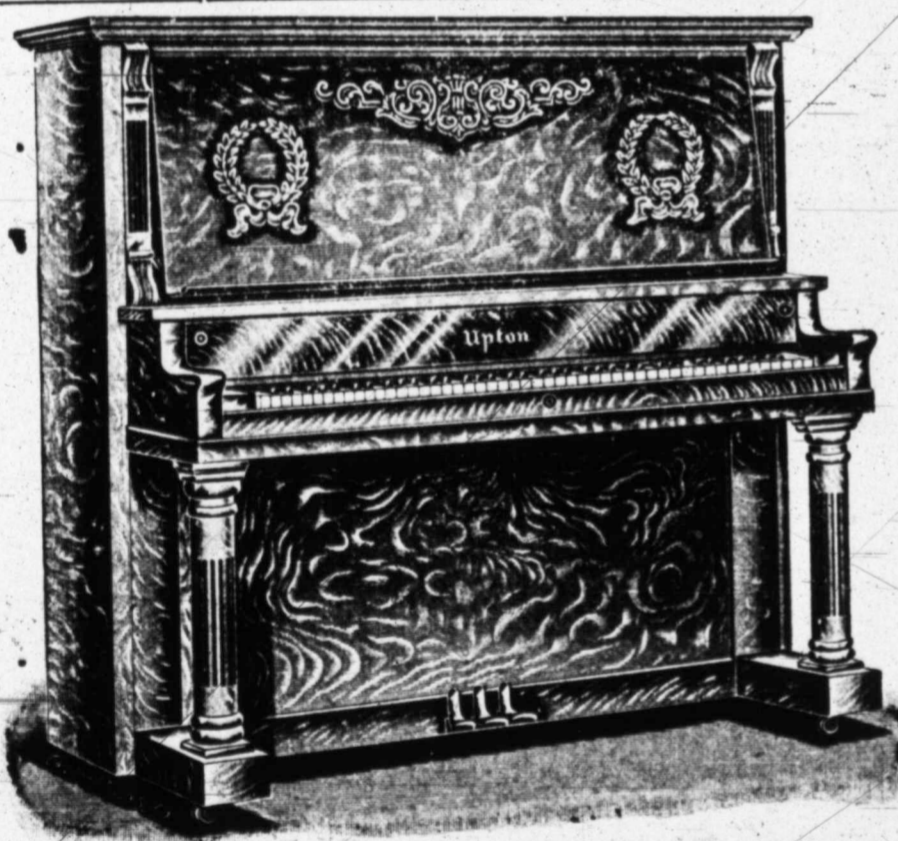

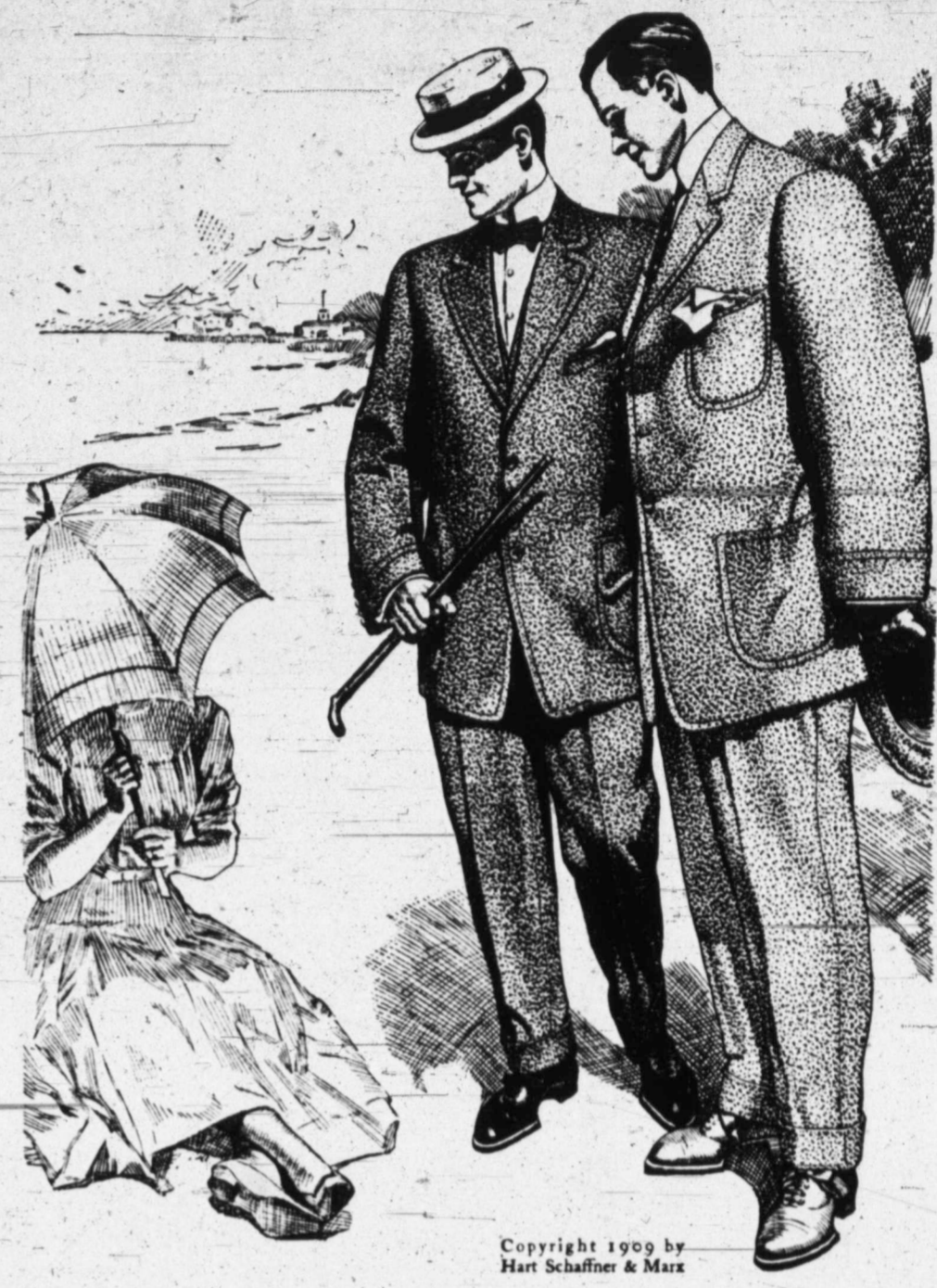
