Mining Near Spokane.

Spokane, Wash., June 16 .- Fifty-six lacer mines are in operation in the Florence district in central Idaho, where the entire topography is being changed by hydraulic sluices, a battery of which is tearing down the hills. The dirt is panned for gold with excellent results. Veteran prospectors say that not since the early days, when thousands of men battled with the forces of nature in their quest for the rich yellow dust and nuggets, has there been such activity in the camps. The heavy blankets of ice and snow in the mountains are slowly being converted into water, always a boon to the placer miners, and every indication is there will be sufficient water for a long run during the summer. The dirt is panning out from three to 20 cents worth of gold for each shovelful and the miners are happy. Experts report that the total clean-up will be anywhere from \$750,000 to \$1,000,000, most of which will find its way into the regular channels of trade.


