There are heard today in Memphis the sounds of music, the songs of other days, the tramp of many men, and banners float and wave on every hand, all because the lingering legions of the gray battalions are gathering there in annual reunion.

That is the most remarkable gathering of which there is a record in history. It is absolutely without precedent or parallel, and it would be possible in no other land but this.

No country in Europe would for an instant permit any gathering or tolerate any ceremony or exercise which would recall or perpetuate the memory of what had been officially designated as a "rebellion."

The gathering in Memphis will bring together representatives and remnants of an army which as yet stands unpassed in history. This is not said from a sectional standpoint, or because of any sentimental association, but it is said because history attests its truth.

No army ever on the earth, certainly not an army prosecuting war in accordance with the usages of civilization for so long stood against such odds or won so many victories.

Six hundred thousand of the same men, not new levies, met twice their number, which number was recruited from every land under heaven till it reached two millions, and for four years withstood them and resisted their advances. The six hundred thousand were poorly equipped and poorly fed and thinly clad, while the men in the opposing ranks were provided with every device of war and every provision for comfort that a great nation could provide; yet the few yielded only at the end of four years.

It is a record standing unapproached. It is a record lighted by deeds as daring, devotion as unselfish and heroism as dauntless as ever glorified a land or a cause. The right or the wrong of it all has now become a barren abstraction, and discussion could avail nothing.

The men at Memphis feel no reproaches. Casuists and theorists and jurists may argue and discuss, fanatics may rant and denounce, but the man who stands between his fireside and an invading foe needs no defense. God and nature speak for him, and he stands acquitted and approved by all men whose opinions are entitled to respect.

No man can render a nobler service or die a nobler death than

"When fighting 'gainst overwhelming odds

For the ashes of his fathers and the altar of his gods."

And when that supreme duty called, the sons of the South answered, "Ready."

They were products of the loftiest civilization the world ever saw. They were the subjects of no rule; the peons of no master, the tenants of no landlord, but, lords of their own homes and holdings, they went forth as freemen to defend all that made life worth living, all that brightened and sweetened the fountain of life at its springs.

What they did is written deep in lines of fadeless glory on history's page, and will live in song and story as long as the hearts of men are responsive to the influence of noble deeds.

'Tis men like these who have gathered at Memphis and for many it will be their last reunion 'mid earthly scenes.

The band will play, the people will cheer, many will weep as Memory touches with her magic wand the fountain of treasured recollections; fair women will strew flowers on the pathway of war-worn heroes, and perchance above them will hover unseen messengers, and, keeping step and time with them, will move a phantom phalanx.

Glorious survivors of a glorious host, gallant remnants of the gray battalions, God be with you.

Judge Yeager Denies.

Mr. Editor: Permit me to call your attention to two articles appearing in your yesterday's paper, one containing an absolutely false statement, the other false inferences.

The false statement is in the article about the man found dead in a box car. You state that said party had been before me for admission to the county hospital, and that I had told him there was no room there. Said hospital had only one inmate, and it is not true that I made a statement that it was crowded. The only male person applying to me within the last ten days was a person who said he was sick and that he got sick on the Valley railroad in some county west of this and that he had been discharged by said railroad and sent here. I told him he should have applied to the county officials in the county where he got sick. But I also told him that he could go to the hospital in this county if he was destitute and really sick and referred him to the county health officer to pass upon his health. The next day he came back and insisted that I send him to the hospital and said he had not seen the county physician, and was told that it was not necessary to see him. I then told him that it was necessary, relating to him the fact that I had, at the instance of a citizen, sent a party there who left as soon as he had recovered from a drunk. He seemed

satisfied and left, saying that he would go to see a doctor.

The false inferences appear in your comments on the report of the city engineer as the condition of the county jail. The article leaves the impression that the whole jail is in an unsanitary condition. A little over a year ago the county employed a reputable plumber at an expense of about \$167.00 to remodel the sewerage system in the main jail, and I understand that said inspector finds little or no fault with this. The sewerage in the calaboose and room above is as first constructed and, as it now has an unobstructed outflow, is in better condition than ever before. The fault is in the construction.

While it is not expected of an ordinary citizen that he possess full knowledge of technicalities of the plumbing business, yet the manner of giving out for publication said report would imply otherwise unless county officials are not ordinary citizens, yet, we can state that we had discovered the defect in the calaboose sewerage and had sought to remedy it. About ten days ago the jailer called my attention to the fact that something was wrong and I immediately went to the workman on court house sewerage and requested him to examine the jail sewerage, which he did and reported no serious trouble. I then requested him to notify the plumber having contract for court house sewerage that I wished the job or repairing jail sewerage added to

contract for court house sewerage. He left the impression upon me that he would do so. The contract for court house sewerage is still pending, though about complete, and I presume the jail work will begin soon.

Plumbers are very much crowded with work, so much so that they resort to Sunday labor in order to satisfy the demand. The county was compelled to let contract for court house sewerage without competitive bids.

The inference that the county has failed to appropriate funds necessary for said repairs is without any basis in fact.

The inference that county officials are too narrow to sympathize with the unfortunates incarcerated in the jail, is without any basis in fact.

Note—Judge Yeager is referred to the city authorities, especially Mayor Noble and City Engineer Hinckley for the correction of any errors regarding the condition of the jail. The Times secured its information from these gentlemen and whatever 'inferences' are to be drawn as to the jail's sanitation are based upon information furnished by them.

In regard to the hospital matter, according to Judge Yeager's own statement in the above letter, he did, for one reason or another, refuse admission to the hospital to a sick man because the latter came from another county. The Times is possibly some-

what to blame for not ascertaining just why the man Cunningham was refused admission, if it was he that was refused, and if this paper is in error on that score, it is more than glad to retract.

The Times did not intend, in either of the articles of which the judge complains, to cast any reflection upon him and while we do not object to printing the judge's reply, we feel that it only serves to call the public's attention to a matter that would otherwise have passed practically unnoticed.

Mining Near Spokane.

Spokane, Wash., June 16.—Fifty-six placer mines are in operation in the Florence district in central Idaho, where the entire topography is being changed by hydraulic sluices, a battery of which is tearing down the hills. The dirt is panned for gold with excellent results. Veteran prospectors say that not since the early days, when thousands of men battled with the forces of nature in their quest for the rich yellow dust and nuggets, has there been such activity in the camps. The heavy blankets of ice and snow in the mountains are slowly being converted into water, always a boon to the placer miners, and every indication is there will be sufficient water for a long run during the summer. The dirt is panning out from three to 20 cents worth of gold for each shovelful and the miners are happy. Experts report that the total clean-up will be anywhere from \$750,000 to \$1,000,000, most of which will find its way into the regular channels of trade.
