BODY IS FOUND IN

REMAINS OF MISS ELSIE SIGEL, PROMINENT MISSIONARY, DIS-COVERED IN NEW YORK.

LETTERS TO CELESTIAL

Two Thousand Love Missives Found in His Room, Including Many Signed ''Elsle.''

New York, June 19 .- The body of Miss Elsie Sigel, grand daughter of General Franz Sigel, and said to be a home missionary worker, was found in steamer trunk in a room occupied by one Leon, a Chinaman, at 782 Eighth street. She had been choked to death with a window cord.

Leon, the Chinaman, is said to have sailed for Vancouver last Friday. In his room were found about two thousand love letters, among them a number signed 'Elsie.' One of the latter reproaches Leon for causing trouble between her father and herself. A

photograph of a young Chinaman was found in her room at her home, as were evidences of her having carried on correspondence with a Celestial. One letter indicates that she was sought by two Chinamen and that one had threatened the life of the other.

In Leon's room was found a notebook with the names and addresses of several hundred women and girls of this city.

The body of the girl was discovered when a neighbor of Leon's called the attention of the police to the fact that he had left home. The door was forced and the body discovered in the trunk. Death had occurred about a week previous. The body was almost nude.

The police regard as significant the fact that the girl's shoes and stockings were not found in the room, this being considered evidence that they had been taken from the girl to keep her a she is suffering.

THE NEW ORE.

One of Andrew Carnegie's Early Iron Experiences.

Andrew Carnegie once stated that a short time after the starting of his first plant in Pittsburg be had an odd experience with iron ore.

"I was offered some ore that sampled about the usual grade, so far as I was able to judge from appearances. at a reduced price," he said . "I bought several thousand tons-a big order for those days. The second day after we commenced to run it the foreman came to the office and told me the new ore was of no account, that it did not flow and that the furnaces were so choked they would have to be dumped unless some remedy was found. Those fires' were built to last two years, and to dump them at this time would mean so heavy a loss as to practically put me out of business. A young chemist had called on me a few weeks before. and, while I had not paid much attention to him, I had kept his card. It occurred to me that he might possibly be of some help, though I confess I to do with the iron business. But I sent for him, and he came at once. First be examined the new ore and then the old that we had been running without difficulty, and finally he looked at the furnaces. To avoid delay he made a little test of the two ores right there. I had told him when he arrived that I felt sure the new cre was worthless and admitted my mistake in buying it. Of course I did this as. I did not want him to think I was ignorant of the business. You can imagine my surprise, then, when at the conclusion of his test he quietly informed us that the new ore was so good we did not know how to run it. The fact was that the new ore contained 20 per cent more iron than the old, and all that it was necessary to do was to add a proportionate increase of flux to bring about reduction."-American Industries.

UNDER NEW LIQUOR LICENSE LAW THIS CITY CAN HAVE ONLY SEVENTEEN.

TWO FOR EACH THOUSAND

Population is Computed on Basis of School Census-Wichita Now Has Nineteen Places.

Under the new state saloon license law which is effective in August Wichita Falls will be allowed about seventeen saloons, or two less than are now in operation in this city. The new law allows one saloon to every five hundred of population. Population, under this law, is computed by the scholastic census, at a ratio of six to one, that is, allowing a population of six for every child that is enrolled.

Uunder the school census as taken by the regular enumerator this city would have been allowed only fifteen saloons as the population calculated on the figures he submitted was only about 7700. If the additional figures being turned in now are allowed to count, which is somewhat doubtful, the population can be figured at about. 8500. This would permit the licensing of seventeen saloons.

A BUCKET OF WATER.

In Right Place Whon Needed It Will Prevent a Conflagration.

A single bucket of water-even a cupful-thrown on a blaze at its start often does more good than a reservoir full ten minutes later. And yet in not one out of a thousand American homes is a single bucket of water dedicated to fire protection. The only excuses for this negligence are ignorance, carelessness, total disregard of property and life. Poverty may explain the absence of structural protection, but no one who has a home is too poor to afford a bucket of water. Even 25 cents spent for fire pails will measurably increase for years the safety of a house and that of its inmates. And the only attention this very effective are apparatus will need is an occasional refilling from the pump or tap.

The virtue of the bucket of water kept exclusively for fire purposes is that it is always there when you look for it and always full of water. There is, to be sure, lots of water around the has frozen), but by the time one can find a bucket, take it to the tap or pump, wait for it to fill and then take it back to the fire not one bucket-but ten are needed. 

Its Exactness Illustrated by the Discovery of Neptune.

There is perhaps no more striking illustration of the power of scientific method than that relating to the dis-\$\ \{\frac{4}{4} \frac{4}{4} \ covery of Neptune in 1846. The planet Tranus, until then the outermost known member of our solar system, refused to follow the path computed I WANTED-To place a few good men for it by mathematical astronomers. With the progress of time the discrepancies between its predicted and observed positions grew constantly larger until in the early eighteen-forties the discordance amounted to fully seventy-five seconds of arc. This is a small angle, not more than one-twenty-fifththe angular diameter of our moon, yet a very large angle to refined astronomy, for a discrepancy of two seconds would have been detected with ease. The opinion gradually developed that Uranus was drawn from its natural course by the attractions of an undiscovered planet still farther from the sun than itself. HAVE TO CLOSE UP

UNDER NEW LIQUOR LICENSE LAW THIS CITY CAN HAVE ONLY SEVENTEEN.

TWO FOR EACH THOUSANI

Population is Computed on Basis of School Census-Wichita Now Has Nineteen Places.

Under the new state saloon license law which is effective in August Wichita Falls will be allowed about seventeen saloons, or two less than are now in operation in this city. The new law allows one saloon to every five hundred of population. Population, under this law, is computed by the scholastic census, at a ratio of six to one, that is, allowing a population of six for every child that is enrolled.

Uunder the school census as taken by the regular enumerator this city would have been allowed only fifteen saloons as the population calculated on the figures he submitted was only about 7700. If the additional figures being turned in now are allowed to count, which is somewhat doubtful, the population can be figured at about 8500. This would permit the licensing of seventeen saloons.

The new law provides that the first to take out license get the ''call' and the first seventeen saloon men to go through with the requirements, such as filing bond, making affidavits, paying licenses and taxes and the like, will be the lucky ones.

In this connection, most of the larger cities of the State will see many of their saloons go out of business. About one-third of San Antonio's saloons will have to close and from onefourth and lower in the other larger cities, Galveston will have to close a number of others and all of the larger cities as well as most of the smaller ones will have to be content with fewer saloons than heretofore under the law recently passed, which is effective in

A BUCKET OF WATER.

In Right Place Whon Needed It Will Prevent a Conflagration.

A single-bucket of water-even a cupful-thrown on a blaze at its start often does more good than a reservoir full ten minutes later. And yet in not one out of a thousand American homes is a single bucket of water dedicated to fire protection. The only excuses for this negligence are ignorance, carelessness, total disregard of property and life. Poverty may explain the absence of structural protection, but no one who has a home is too poor to afford a bucket of water. Even 25 cents spent for fire pails will measurably increase for years the safety of a house and that of its inmates. And the only attention this very effective fire apparatus will need is an occasion-

al refilling from the pump or tap. The virtue of the bucket of water kept exclusively for fire purposes is that it is always there when you look for it and always full of water. There is, to be sure, lots of water around the house (except when the pipe or pump has frozen), but by the time one can find a bucket, take, it to the tap or pump, wait for it to fill and then take It back to the fire not one bucket but ten are needed. If, however, you can't dash into the hall, seize a ready filled bucket and souse the blazing curtain, all within twenty seconds, one bucket generally will be more than enough. as good as a whole fire department and far less destructive than its superfluity of water.

The family that cares anything at all for its belongings should keep at least one bucket of water on a little bracket in the hall on each floor and another bucket in the garret. Down cellar there should be a barrel of water and a bucket not far from the furnace. The water in the garret or cellar may be kept from freezing in cold weather by adding common salt. -Exchange.

In the Interest of Good Eyes. A noted oculist advises against using the eyes immediately after waking; therefore the habit of many young girls of reading or studying in bed is injurious. ASTRONOMY.

Its Exactness Illustrated by the Discovery of Neptune.

There is perhaps no more striking illustration of the power of scientific method than that relating to the discovery of Neptune in 1846. The planet Uranus, until then the outermost known member of our solar system, refused to follow the path computed WANTED-To place a few good men for it by mathematical astronomers. with small capital (partly trade) in a With the progress of time the discrepancies between its predicted and observed positions grew constantly larger until in the early eighteen-forties the discordance amounted to fully seventy-five seconds of arc. This is a small angle, not more than one-twenty-fifth the angular diameter of our moon, yet a very large angle to refined astropomy, for a discrepancy of two seconds would have been detected with ease. The opinion gradually developed that Uranus was drawn from its natural course by the attractions of an undiscovered planet still farther from the sun than itself. Adams in 1843 and Le Verrier in 1845 independently and each without knowledge of the other's plans attacked the then extremely difficult problem of determining the approximate orbit, mass and position of an undiscovered body whose attractions should produce the perturbations observed. Regrettable and avoidable delays occurred in searching for the planet after Adams' results were communicated to the astronomer royal in October, 1845. Le Verrier's results were communicated to the Berlin observatory in September, 1846, with the request that a search be made. The disturbing planet, later named Neptune, was found on the first evening that it was looked for less than one degree of arc from the position assigned by Le Verrier. If an energetic search had been made in England the year before the planet would have been discovered within two degrees of the position assigned by Adams.-Professor W. W. Campbell in Popular Science Monthly.



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

The Vermiform Appendix and Its Probable Function.

PROBLEM OF APPENDICITIS.

The Causes of the Disease and the Methods of Fighting It-The Way the Operation of Removal Is Performed-Disease as Old as Mankind.

Appendicitis is not a disease of modern times, though its nature and methods of treatment are the result of careful observation by one of our well known modern surgeons while engaged in postmortem work.

It may be safe to say that appendicitis is as old as mankind, for in studying very old histories wherein are given the diagnoses of the physicians we read of cases of inflammation of the bowels, intestinal disorders and like allments the symptoms of which prove that they must have been

Appendicitis is inflammation of the rermiform appendix, a small blind tube, averaging two and a half inches in length and a quarter of an inch in diameter, attached to the coecum at its inner and posterior part. It is made of a very sensitive mucous membrane containing several glands.

The appendix is part of the digestive tract, its function, it is believed, being to lubricate that part of the intestines though as yet there is no absolute proof of this. Careful study of a child from whom the colon has been removed until he reaches the age of manhood has revealed no irregularities of any nature.

The causes of this disease may be grouped under four heads stenosis, which means closing up; impaction, the entrance of foreign bodies, not necessarily seeds; exposure and injury. In fighting this disease nature takes three methods of disposing of the toxic materials-discharging them into the peritoneal cavity, sending them into the bowels and discharging them through an external wound. In the first, if the discharge be not too rapid while the peritoneum is taking them up, nature again makes an effort to ward off the threatened danger by walling the poisonous matters in, thus localizing them and so aiding the physician or surgeon in his work. If, however, the discharge be sudden, as is the case when the mass bursts, the whole of the peritoneum becomes involved, which is called septic peritonitis, and this is generally fatal.

After the diagnosis has revealed the disease the doctor decides whether the case be one for medicine or external treatment or for separation. In the latter case the greatest of care is demanded, as sometimes an immediate operation is necessary, while at other times it must be delayed, often for hours, until the condition of the pahas been brought to that point a which the surgeon can feel it is safe to

The operation determined upon, the most careful arrangements to secure perfect antisepsis are made, and the patient is placed in a full state of an-

The operating surgeon then draws an imaginary line from the navel to the anterior superior spine of the right hip bone, dividing that line into three parts. Under the inner side of the middle third the appendix in normal cases will be found, though in rare cases it has been found on the left side and in extremely rare cases otherwise

displaced. Having satisfied himself of the exact spot under which it will be found, an incision from two to five inches long is made in the skin. (Some of the best surgeons pride themselves on the smallness of their incisions in this operation.) The fatty tissues are then cut through, the small blood vessels. are secured, and then the muscular walls of the abdomen are separated, bringing into view the peritoneum. This is a serous secretive lining composed of two layers. On cutting through this the edges of both layers are clamped so as to enable the surgeon to reunite them when the opera-

tion shall have been completed. The intestines are now visible, and the affected section is very tenderly drawn through the opening, where the nature and extent of the infection are made known. Hot towels moistened with salt water are kept applied to the intestine while it is exposed. The word "tenderly" characterizes the whole of this operation, as the surgeon must be more than careful to prevent any rupture of the appendix, for should this happen while he is operating the pus would be quickly taken up by the peritoneum and other mucous membranes, and the resulting complications would make the outcome very uncer-

The mesentery, a large vessel adjoining the appendix, is next ligated, and then the colon is tied off, after which the diseased organ is cut away. The stump is pushed back into the intestine and the ligature is tightly drawn, this to prevent the forming of a pouch.
