FOR THE PAST several years, our nation has experienced a trade deficit which has mushroomed into the billions of dollars, and threatens to bankrupt our economy.

Most of us are aware of our plight in regard to the country's oil imports. Due to our massive needs for consuming oil products, it has become necessary to import the bulk of the country's oil needs, at least so our own domestic supplies are not quickly depleted, the experts say.

At last, our leaders are making at least token progress toward our trade imbalance with Japan. It has been a standing joke for years that although Japan may have "lost" to the United States and its allies in World War II, they came out better than if they had won, through the tremendous trade imbalance, with Japanese products flooding our shores, and putting American manufacturers out of business.

America poured millions of dollars into Japan following World War II to get the nation back on its feet.

One consolation is the fact that Japan has been a buyer of our agricultural products, particularly our grain crops, which benefits this area's farmers. So, even though the trade deficit should continue with the country of Japan, you could justify a certain amount of imbalance in the manufacturing industry, since Japan is a customer for our grain.

But the part that makes absolutely no sense at all, and should make all our citizens in general, and business people in particular, boiling mad, is the way the United States continues to subsidize undeveloped nations by importing their goods.

Where many of these countries are concerned, they have nothing that we cannot produce here in our own country. Yet, the importation of goods from these places threatens to close factories and put our own citizens out of work simply because they cannot compete with the imported goods, which are often times produced with very little labor cost.

This situation prompted a letter which was printed this week in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, from a housewife in Spade. Her comments pretty well sum up our feelings on the matter:

"Editor, Avalanche-Journal: If the government in Washington won't protect us from foreign invasion, or flooding our nation with foreign goods, we must protect ourselves, our farmers and our workers' jobs.

We read every day about our American citizens losing their jobs and plants closing because our people can't compete against 20-cent-an-hour workers in Third-World countries. But we can stop buying anything bought from foreign nations.

In our family we made a resolution the first of the year not to buy anything not made in our country, and by American citizens. You would be surprised how easy it is and how proud I have been to look for our USA brand on what I buy.

It is not any higher than what is shipped in duty free from all the nations taking our jobs and our money from our own people.

Besides, foreign nations don't pay our taxes. We do. They don't pay for our roads, schools, government expenses. They take all our money back to some foreign country, to take care of their own people.

I have bought the last thing I ever expect to buy from other nations that don't buy the same amount from my country.

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New Pastor Named For First Baptist

Richard L. Grisham will be moving with his family to pastor the First Baptist Church in Bovina beginning June 2.

Richard was raised on a West Texas irrigation farm at Edmonson, Texas. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Grisham and he has one brother and two sisters.

During his growing up years, he was active in R.A.'s and youth activities and says he accepted Christ as his personal Lord and

Savior in March 1958 at the age of nine. Grisham later confirmed his call to become a preacher at the age of eleven. He preached his first sermon at the age of fifteen.

He graduated from Plainview High School in 1967 and received his bachelor's degree from Wayland Baptist University. He graduated from the Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Kansas City, Missouri in 1973.

During high school and college, Richard did supply preaching, weekend revivals and worked with the youth. In 1968, he was interim

pastor during the summer for Mt. Whitney Baptist Church, in Lone Pine, California, while serving as a Home Mission Board Summer Missionary.

Richard pastored the Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church in Blythedale, Missouri, while he was a student at the seminary. He pastored the Date Street Baptist Church in Plainview for five years and in 1978 he began pastoring the Bledsoe Baptist Church, where he is now located.

Included in his associational work, Richard was at one time president of the Staked Plains Associational Youth Council and served as Vacation Bible School Director of Stake Plains Association.

Presently he is Association Representative to area committee and secretary of the area board.

He is a member of the South Plains Baptist BSU Student Work Committee and is presently serving as chairman of the SWC, South Plains Association. In 1983, he was leader of Associational River Ministry for South Plains Association and in 1983 he was South Plains Associational representative on Area Search Committee for a new Area Missions Director.

Richard and his wife, Velma, a former Muleshoe resident, met at Wayland Baptist University and were married June 13, 1969. Velma teaches Sunday School, enjoys WMU work, singing, painting, art work and is a ceramics buff.

We talked Monday morning with her mother, Mary Evelyn, and she said that Sharon underwent surgery and they put a pin in her ankle, which was broken. She came home from the hospital Sunday and her ankle is now in a cast. Her mother said she is in a cast and will be for several weeks, but other than the discomfort of the cast, she is getting along real well and they feel very fortunate that the accident didn't cause more serious injuries.

County Will Share In Highway Work

How to get from point A to point B?

According to William M. Pope, the man who is in charge of highways in the 17-county Lubbock area, that's the question Texans should be thinking about during National Transportation Week, May 12-18.

"America's high standard of living depends, to a large extent, on the high degree of mobility for its people, goods, and services," said Pope, District Engineer for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation's Lubbock office.

"A good transportation system utilizes the best features of highway, air, water, rail and pipeline transportation, but in rural areas, highways continue to be the principal need."

"Here in the Lubbock area, Highway Department employees continue to strive for the best highway system possible, while never forgetting they work for the citizens of Texas. We always look for new ways to stretch the taxpayers dollar without compromising the top quality

highway system that Texans demand."

Pope pointed to several highway projects under way in the area to show how the Highway Department is working to meet the needs of citizens.

"We are building a new Farm-to-Market Road in southwest Castro County because citizens there asked for it and we were able to fund the project through a special program set up by the Texas Legislature. Steps are being taken to widen U.S. 60 in Parmer and Castro Counties, a highway that area residents have long wanted widened, but one we couldn't get funding for. We are continuing to work on I-27 between Lubbock and Amarillo. Once it's complete, motorists will have the benefit of a top-notch interstate."

There is a lot of work to be done and highway department employees will continue to do the job, said Pope, because "a strong transportation network is a major concern of all Texans."

Clean-Up Continues In City

Clean-up, fix-up month of May continues and residents are urged to participate in making Bovina more attractive.

Residents are asked to clean up their yards, around their property and alleys behind their homes.

"If you have limbs, stack them in the alleys and we will pick them up. Also, if you have wrecked vehicles or other debris too heavy to handle, give the city a call and these, too, will be picked up," according to city administrator, Wayne Spears.

"The people of Bovina can make a difference if you will pitch in and do your part," Spears said.

REMEMBER THESE SAFETY TIPS

- Watch for power lines when climbing in trees.
- Do not climb electrical poles, towers or structures.
- Do not trim trees near power lines.
- Do not set ladders or scaffolds near power lines.
- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

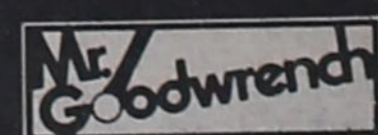

**Producers
Receive
Payments**

Corn and sorghum producers who participated in the 1984 acreage reduction programs received deficiency payments for these crops, according to Martin L. Chandler, Parmer County Executive Director. Checks totaling an estimated \$6,967,651.97 have been issued to 1889 farmers in Parmer County this month.

Deficiency payments are made when the national average price received by farmers during the first five months of the marketing year for a program crop falls below the government-established target price for that crop. Nationally, farmers received a weighted average market price of \$2.60 per bushel for corn, and \$2.30 per bushel for sorghum during the first five months of the marketing year.

Chandler said eligible farmers have received deficiency payments at a rate of 43 cents per bushel for corn, and 46 cents per bushel for sorghum. The payments are computed by multiplying the program yield for the farm by the acres planted for harvest times the payment rate.

Nationally, ASCS will disburse about \$1.7 billion in deficiency payments for 1984-crop corn and sorghum.
