> Getting Evidence of the Bumps. There is a new kind of device called vialog which records uneven surfaces on highways and shows where

Masie still presperously conduct.

they are most in need of repair. The record is taken on a roll of paper sufficient to make a graph for eleven miles of road. A new record can be put in in a moment and thus the status of each eleven-mile strip may be filed for future comparison.

The recording is done by a sensitive needle, self-inking. It is the seismograph in a modified form.

Personally one takes the record in his own anatomy on a rough road and when his head goes through the top of the automobile he knows exactly how rough it is, but the vialog inscribes the notes more imperturbably and accurately than one would with a paper and pencil.

Moreover, the vialog says nothing audible about it. But we should like to see the "graph" of the vialog after it has passed over a corduroy road. We'll bet it would be out of ink.

Writing to Indian Princes.

A letter sent to a native prince in India is a very elaborate affair. The paper is specially made for the purpose, and is sprinkled with gold leaf. Government in Isle of Man.

In the Isle of Man, an assembly having both legislative and judicial powers, composed of 24 principal commoners of the island, is called the "House of Keys." This body was originally self-elective; but in 1866 election by the people, every seventh year, was established by act of parliament. The house of keys is one of the two co-ordinate branches of the general assembly called the court of Tynwald, the other branch consisting of the lieutenant-governor and council.

A bill is separately considered by each Franch, and, after being passed by both, is transmitted for the royal assent. It does not, however, become a law until it has been promulgated in both the English and Manx languages on the Tynwald hill.

Spread of Whea Rust by Bar erry

Scientists Have Shown That they produce the red or summer stage Epidemics Disappear With Killing of Bushes.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

"Farmers proved that the common barberry spreads black stem rust to nearby wheat fields. Scientists showed why and how. Both have shown that rust epidemics disappeared when the bushes were destroyed," said Dr. E. C. Stakman of the United States Department of Agriculture. It is related that as early as 1720 a farmer in England became so angry at seeing a large barberry bush on a neighbor's farm, but near his own wheat, that he foured bolling water around the roots of the plant at night until he had killed it.

Busnes Source of Trouble.

A number of writers observed during the time from about 1750 to 1865 that wherever barberry bushes were found near wheat fields there also was found infected grain. Although it was not known just how rust could come from the barberry, it was natural that many farmers who had noted the damage to their own fields should be convinced that the bushes were the source of the trouble and should be removed. Differences of opinion between farmers and owners of barberry bushes became so sharp as to cause a so-called barberry war, which raged from about 1805 until 1855. Farmers whose grain had been destroyed by black stem rust often destroyed the guilty barberry bushes without even asking the owner's permission.

De Bary Solved Problem.

"Scientists," says Doctor Stakman, 'finally tried to find out whether the farmers were right. They were." The matter finally was cleared up in 1865 by De Bary, a German scientist, who made careful experiments and found that the life history of the black stem- sion division of the college suggests rust parasite is as follows: The black stage of the rust lives through the crude carbolic acid, twelve ounces of winter. Chickens and Eggs Sold Make Family Comfortable

Comfort and financial security were attained last year by a Colorado woman through her poultry keeping, although the main crop was almost a failure. The wheat crop was only 90 bushels and the barley 30, besides a small amount of corn to be fed to the live stock. A report received by the United States Department of Agriculture states that after culling her flock and selling the culls for \$106 this woman bought lumber to enlarge the poultry house so as to have more space for the pullets etained. The eggs and chickens sold brought \$597.20, which was sufficient to pay the annual taxes. to pay the interest on money borrowed for the farm, build the poultry house, add a new room to their tar-paper house, and finish the inside of two rooms. This enabled the family to have a cozy, warm, three-room house, which was much more comfortable than the one room and lean-to kitchen they had had before.

Flies Will Reduce Milk



Healthful Quarters for

Hogs of Big Importance If hog raising is to be a profitable business the animals must be kept healthy. This requires that sanitary

quarters and equipment be provided. Hog houses can be designed and built of concrete block so as to satisfy every requirement. They possess all the advantages of houses built of other materials and, when properly built, have none of the disadvantages.

The accompanying photograph shows a swine house which forms part of the equipment on a large farm in Illinois.



Swine Louse Made of Concrete Blocks.

Concrete block is the material used in constructing not only the walls of the house itself, but also in inclosing small runways at the front. The design shown is known as the half-monitor type. It is always built to face the south, so that sunlight may enter through both the upper and lower tiers of windows. A passageway runs from one end to the other, which facilitates cleaning the bins, which are located at both sides of the passageway.

At one end some space is set off for feed storage and mixing. Provision is made here for the cooking of feed, which is especially advantageous in cold weather and for early spring lit-

The swine house should be kept comparatively warm, either with a small heater or by insulating the walls so that the animal heat is retained. Adequate ventilation is also very essen-

Dry Mash Is Excellent

Feed All Year Around Many poultry raisers are feeding cockerels to get in shape to sell as broilers. Purdue university recommends for this use a ration composed of two pounds of corn, one pound of shorts, one pound of ground oats, and eight pounds of buttermilk.

This should be mixed and allowed to stand and sour for 24 hours before feeding. Feed in a trough placed outside the crate in front of the birds. The birds should appear ravenous and eat greedily. If they do not, there is something wrong with them, and they should be removed from the coop. When the birds have eaten for 30 minutes the trough should be taken away, thoroughly cleaned and allowed to dry. Give the fowls all they will eat in 30 minutes and no more.

Water is not necessary except in hot weather. It is advisable to feed grit every few days. Two weeks is a good average length of time to feed. The greatest gain should be made during the first week, but it is profitable to continue in most cases for another

The pigs should be given access to a small pen where the sow cannot go, to receive their supplementary feed. Skim milk fed in a shallow pan is very good for them. The pigs may be taught to run into the creep for feed by allowing them some shelled or ear corn. As soon as they begin to eat well, a slop made of milk, some shorts, a little bran and some linseed oil meal or tankage fed along with the corn will make a ration which with proper exercise should satisfactorily meet the requirements for rapid

This ration for the young pigs should include by weight: 4 parts shorts, 1 part bran and 1 part tankage. As the pigs become older the corn may be gradually increased until the amount has been doubled.







WAGE WAR ON TUBERCULOSIS

Besides Organized Forces There Are Thousands of Accredited Veterinarians Helping.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

of Agriculture.)
Tuberculosis of live stock is being attacked on all sides. In addition to the large force of federal, state and county veterinarians engaged in the nationwide campaign for eradicating this disease, there are thousands of accredited veterinarians assisting with the work. Records of the bureau of animal industry, United States Department of Agriculture, show that on March 1, 1923, there were 5,120 accredited veterinarians in the United States. As accredited herds are established the various states turn them over to accredited veterinarians, who test them annually at the expense of the owner. This permits county, state and federal vetterinarians to devote all their time to herds that have not been accredited.

The federal government keeps in close touch with the accredited veterinarians and furnishes them every few months with information regarding the disease and any unusual conditions that may be encountered in the herds under supervision.

The tuberculosis-free accredited herd list is increasing very rapidly. The report of the bureau of animal industry just published shows that on March 1, 1923, there were 24,132 fully accredited herds, 260,034 once-tested free herds, and 332,887 herds under supervision.

MUDDY BARN LOT IS COSTLY

Additional Work Heaped on Dairyman Every Way He Turns—Clean Stable Pays Best.

A poorly drained barnyard costs the dairyman more money than he imagines. In some cases, no doubt, it costs him more than the laying of the necessary tile through which to keep it dry. It means additional work for him pretty nearly every way he turnsdirty cows, dirty stables and an extra physical effort on his own part in the matter of going about his chores with mud-caked boots. If he sells his milk locally from house to house, he probably loses many a customer who assoclates thoughts of the general appearance of the barn and its surroundings with the milk which is being delivered to his home. Clean environment in the case of a dairy barn offers a telling argument, in an advertising way, for the milk produced amid these sur-

COW TESTING IS IMPORTANT

Record Showing High Production of Animal Greatly Increases Price of Bull Calf.

A farmer sold a male calf for \$35. Later its dam was tested for advanced registry. When the yearly record was completed it was found that the cow produced over 22,000 pounds of milk and 681 pounds of butter. Her next bull calf was sold for \$300. This indicates in a concrete way something of the value of testing dairy cows.

Production of Cows.

Average production of dairy cows in the United States is 3,412 pounds of milk per cow per year. In Holland it is 7,585 pounds; Switzerland, 6,950 pounds, and Denmark, 5,666 pounds.



"It grieved me sadly. And when I



Make a white sauce of butter, flour and milk, add the two and one-half cupfuls of salmon that has been soaked in warm water to remove the excess of salt, add one tablespoonful of lemon juice, one-half teaspoonful of onion juice, and pepper. Line a buttered bread tin with the rice; pack in the fish mixture, put a layer of rice over the top and steam or bake in a pan of water thirty minutes. Serve with creamed peas.

Summer Soup .- Let stew one hour in a quart of water one generous quart of fresh tomatoes peeled and sliced thin, one cucumber and a clove of garlic. Add salt, one teaspoonful, and one-fourth of a teaspoonful of pepper with one tablespoonful of sugar. Strain into the soup tureen and set aside to cool. Add a few pieces of ice and one and one-half cupfuls of thinly sliced cucumbers sprinkled with salt and pepper and vinegar. Let chill in the refrigerator one hour. Just before serving toss into the soup one cupful of croutons which have been sprinkled with tarragon vinegar.

Sponge Drops.—Beat the whites of three eggs until stiff, then add one-third of a cupful of powdered sugar, two egg yolks beaten thick and lemon colored, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt and one-third of a cupful of flour, flavor to taste. Drop by spoonfuls on baking sheet; sprinkle with powdered sugar before baking.

Pineapple Tapioca.—Cook until clear three tablespoonfuls of minute tapioca in two cupfuls of water; add three tablespoonfuls of sugar. Serve with pineapple juice poured over the tapioca and a spoonful of diced pineapple for a garnish.

Tutti-Frutti Cheese.—To one package of cream cheese add one-half cupful of sweet cream; chop six candied cherries, one canned apricot, a strip of citron, one dozen seeded raisins; mix with the cheese; add one teaspoonful each of nutmeg, grated lemon peel and sugar, and a small piece of candied pineapple, chopped. Mold in a shallow pan and cut in squares to serve with buttered toast for afternoon tea.

Marshmallow Dessert.—Whip one cupful of heavy cream; add one-half cupful of finely-cut pineapple and a dozen marshmallows, cut into quarters. Chill and serve with a spoonful of maraschino cherries with sirup over each.

Macaroon Wafers.—Cream one-half cupful of butter; add one cupful of sugar gradually, the yolks of three eggs and the white of one, four table-spoonfuls of cold water, one teaspoonful of baking powder, two teaspoonfuls of vanilla and flour enough to roll. Place on ice to stiffen, and they may be rolled with little flour. To the other two whites add sugar and put a teaspoonful of frosting on each macaroon.

Pineapple Fluff.—Beat the whites of three eggs until stiff, add three tablespoonfuls of sugar and four tablespoonfuls of grated pineapple; mix together. Butter cups slightly, fill gently and set into hot water to bake a light brown. Turn out and serve with whipped cream; garnish with bits of preserved pineapple or with maraschino cherries.





With plans for the departure completed, officials of the United States Veterans Bureau hospital at Camp Logan, Houston, Texas, are now waiting advices that in all probability will result in the personnel, patients, and equipment entraining for Kerrville, Texas, where in will be located the bureau hospital for treatment of tuberculosis.

The 35-mile per hour speed law, passed by the regular session of the Thirty-Eighth Texas Legislature, went into effect Wednesday, June 13. a letter to the Motor League of South Texas, J. D. 
