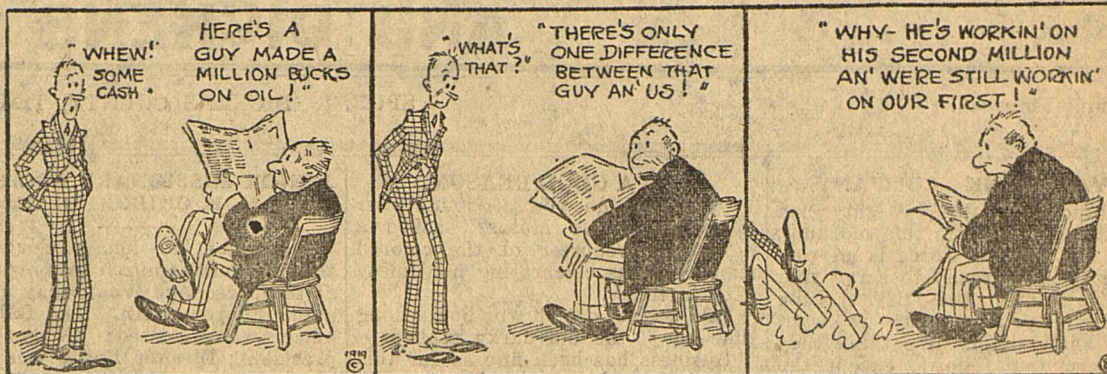

GARNER TAX PLAN WILL BE BACKED BY DEMOCRATS

Washington, Feb. 13.—The way was prepared for a speedy journey of tax legislation through the house by an agreement reached by the ways and means committee Wednesday, while democrats met in a caucus and agreed to stand behind the Garner tax bill, with a lone exception.

This decision of the democrats seriously threatens the republican bill, as they will be joined by several progressives, and it appears not unlikely now that the Garner tax plan, which brings greater cuts in normal incomes and higher surtax rates than the republicans desire, may be approved by the house. The caucus was attended by 168 out of 207.

The ways and means committee agreed on a schedule Wednesday whereby general debate on the bill which will begin Thursday, will be shut off next Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock and a vote taken on the various rate proposals, including the controversial surtax rate, next Tuesday, after which the administrative provisions will be considered. Chairman Green, of the committee, estimates that the bill will finish its journey in the house within two weeks.

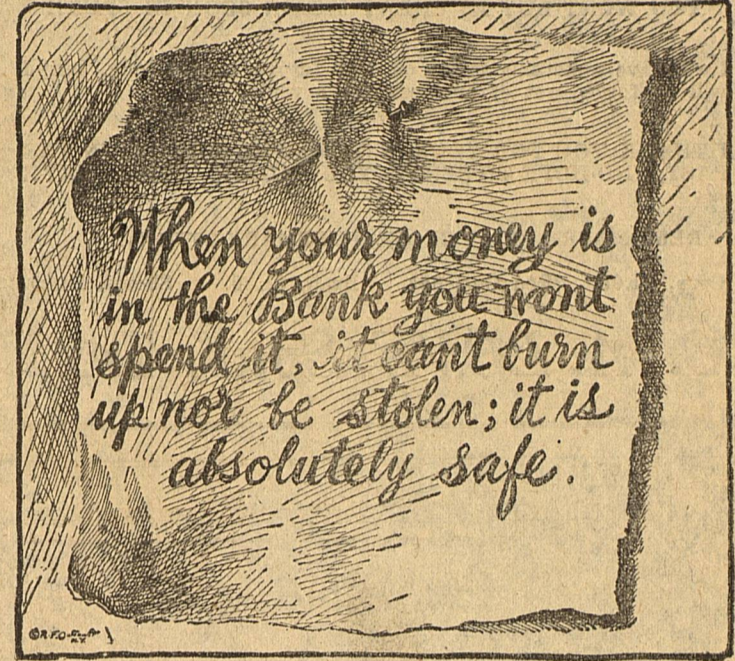

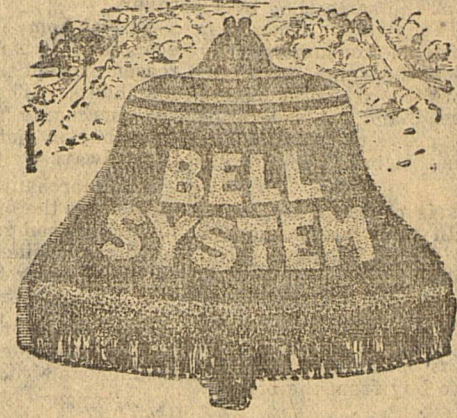

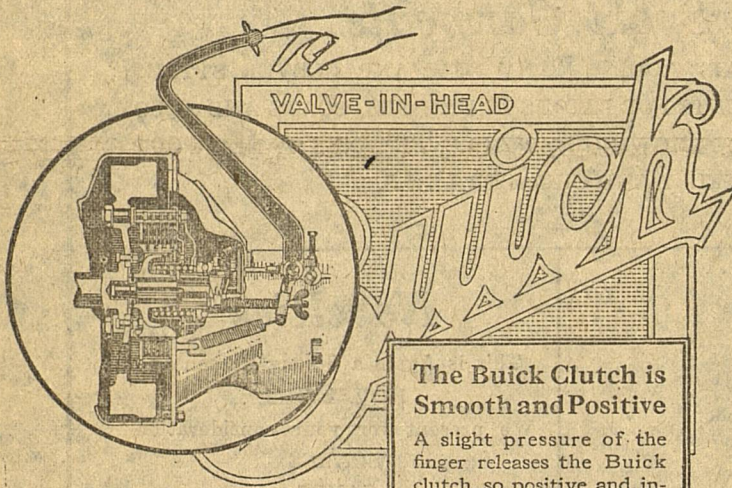

DO YOU MERCHANTS PATRONIZE EACH OTHER?

If "Buy at Home" is good for one, it is good for all. How many of the retail merchants of your town patronize the other merchants in lines that do not compete with theirs? For instance, does the baker buy his clothes and furniture in town? Does the druggist buy his shoes and hats at home? How much of his jewelry and dry goods does the garage owner buy in his home stores? How much printing is bought by the banker and merchant at home?

You will find that a large number of the retailers want people to patronize them, at the same time overlooking the fact that when they themselves become consumers they should practice the same plan. In our little town there are three bakers making bread, and yet, several of the grocers refuse to handle any bread but what is baked in the big town nearby.

Perhaps, as is claimed, the bread isn't good. In that case perhaps a small bakery cannot make as good bread as a large bakery. If such is true, why try to keep a local bakery alive? There is also a little ice cream plant, but only a few of the soda fountains patronize it. They much prefer to buy from the big city nearby.

A few days ago I was talking to the home town bank, who certainly should be interested in seeing the home merchants prosper. In the pocket of his coat I saw the label of one of the leading merchants of the big city nearby.

The trouble is that the merchants simply don't practice what they preach. They want you and me to buy at home, but they themselves reserve the right to buy where they please. The buying public cannot see the weight of an argument to "keep your money at home," when it only goes to increase the individual profit of an individual retailer.

Buy at home is not based on sound economics, it is not supported by any reason except the self interest of the merchants. The public knows that the merchants themselves don't always buy at home, so a slogan like that always irritates them.



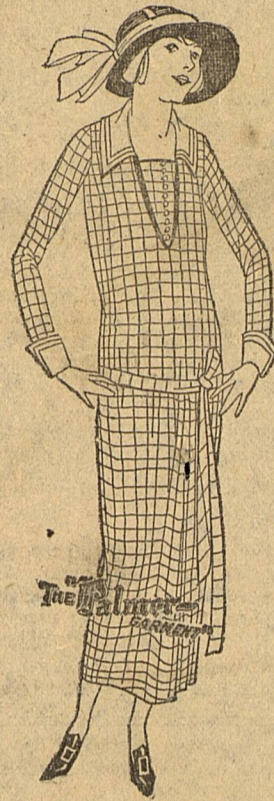

NEW HIGHWAY LAW.

Without discussing the value of the new Highway Law to the state in its final analysis, the Hesperian is almost positive that West Texas newspapers are incorrect in taking the position that the thinly settled counties of that state will suffer from his law and the heavily settled portions of the state grow fat on it. Our first impression of the probable effects of the highway law is that it will give back to West Texas, in some form of road aid, a lot of money it will take out of the big cities and thickly settled portions of the state where the road construction work has been completed in a large measure. This contention is borne out by the fact that Dallas county, one of the biggest taxpayers in the state, raised a lot of Cain about the mistreatment they anticipated. The officials of that county began figuring and found that whereas their automobile owners would pay into the highway fund considerably over a million dollars they couldn't expect to get back a great deal for maintenance. After a demonstration of considerable political power the best the Dallas folk could do was to get a promise of something over \$200,000 during the valedar year for the upkeep of their roads. Since that county, for instance, has already gotten nearly a million dollars of state and federal aid for road building they are ready to do away with the system entirely and let the more thinly settled counties do as best they can. Most of the West Texas newspapermen are playing into their hands, it appears to us. It might be well to stand by and watch the effects of the new law, and its application for a few months before we get too hostile. The most rabid partisans will have to admit that Texas wouldn't have a state system of highways in a thousand years of the unsystematic road building programs as followed by ninety per cent of the counties of the state the past ten years. The argument depends upon whether we want roads built with the state as a unit with the county or precinct as a unit. The questions of the constitutionality of the law, and the ability and willingness of the taxpayers to foot the bill are other angles of the matter. — Floydada Hesperian.

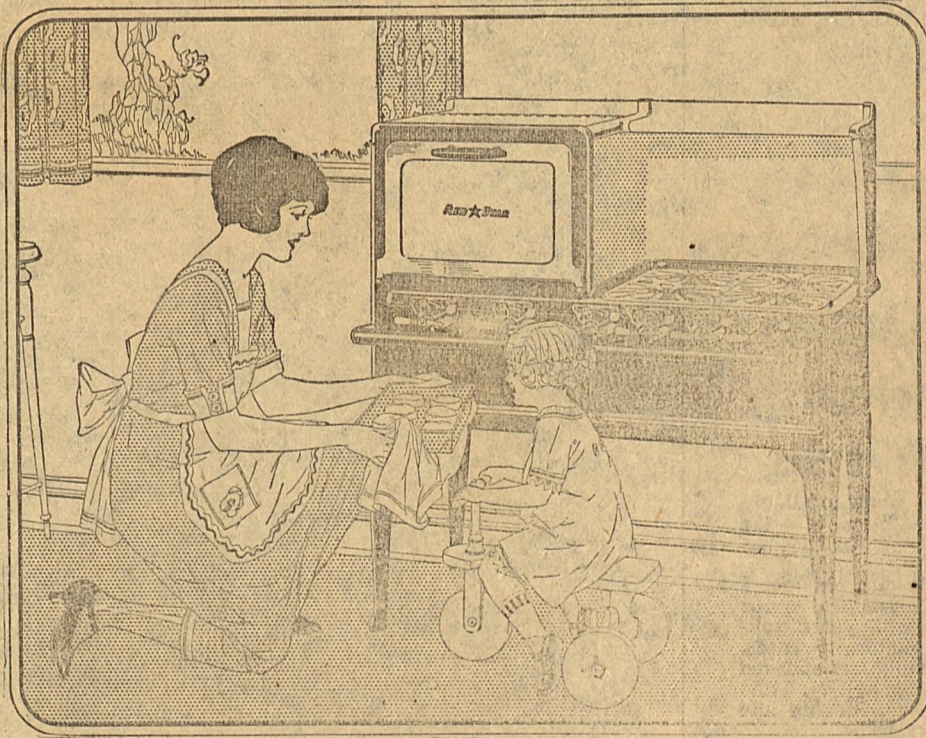
