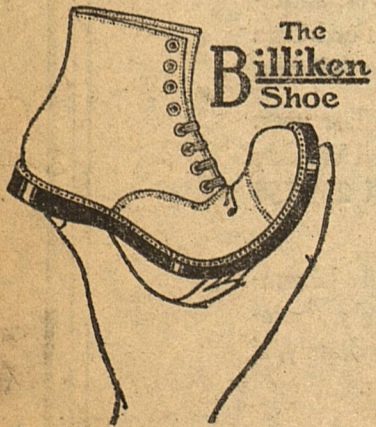

Wichita with an enrollment of 26, had 25 depositors. This being so close to Third, we are giving them \$5.00 in Gold.

You will, no doubt, be agreeably surprised, as we were, to know that the total deposits made by these youngsters aggregates, \$7,663.83. It is also very gratifying to find, in checking over these accounts today, just sixty days since the contest closed, that only 38 of the 532 accounts have been closed, and a number of these are boys and girls who have moved out of this territory. It is a matter of much satisfaction to notice that a good majority of these young depositors are adding to their accounts regularly. Of course, a number of them are checking on their accounts for little items in connection with their school expenses, which is entirely proper.

It may seem foolish to some people that we are spending our time, efforts and money in these, seemingly small things, but we do not view it in that light at all. We feel that we are rendering a real service to the various communities, and especially do we feel and know that we are rendering a distinct service to the school boys and girls when we teach them the value of a Dollar, and give them an opportunity to learn to transact business for themselves early in life.

We are highly pleased with the way these boys and girls are handling their accounts, but we will not be satisfied until every school boy and girl in Dickens county are carrying bank accounts with us. We solicit the continued support of the teachers of the County, and the parents of the children, to assist us in making "depositors" instead of "spenders" out of all of the school boys and girls.

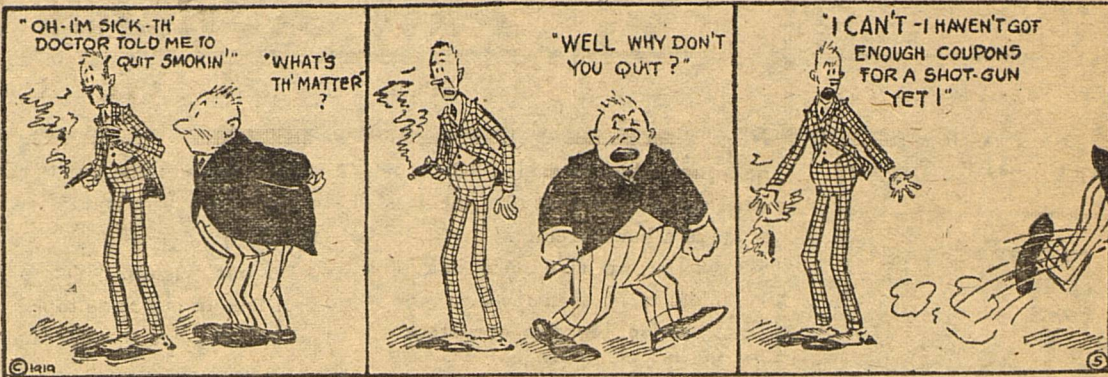

**10,000 BALES OF COTTON GINNED TO SATURDAY IN SPUR**

Up to Saturday night of last week there had been ginned a total of ten thousand bales of cotton by the several gins of Spur, as follows:

The following is reported the number of bales ginned up to Saturday night at gins at points in Dickens county outside of Spur:

Total bales ginned in county	17100

There remains in Dickens county only a few hundred bales yet to gin of the last year's crop, therefore it is very likely that Dickens county will fall short a few bales of ginning the estimated twenty thousand bales for the year. 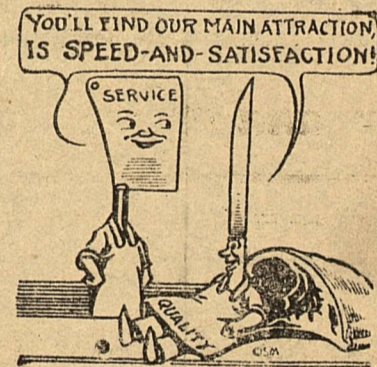

### THE ONE DAY POULTRY SCHOOL A BIG SUCCESS

A real one-day poultry school was conducted Saturday, February 16th when the poultry special operated by the Fort Worth & Denver Railroad, and the A. & M. College of Texas, cooperating, spent the day here.

About 150 boys and girls gathered in the Christian church and ninety adults in the Gem Theatre to take part in the program of the poultry campaign.

Last year Spur greeted a similar train with an attendance of three thousand which proved too large a crowd to be handled to advantage. This year invitations were issued to only those interested in a poultry school rather than a poultry show by County Agent R. B. Johnston and Home Demonstration Agent Miss Wynny Wilkins.

Added interest was given to the occasion by the presence of Miss M. Helen Higgins, State Home Demonstration Agent, and Miss Helen H. Swift District Agent Extensive Service A. & M. College of Texas, also Miss Mabel Marsh, County Agent of Lubbock county, Miss Pearl Carlisle County Home Demonstration Agent Crosby county, Miss Norfleet Grimes County Home Demonstration Agent of Motley County, and Mr. S. A. Palmer, County Agent of Crosby County, each of whom gave interesting and instructive talks, while the poultry specialists from the A. & M. College made their usual demonstrations and lectures, also answered an unusual number of intelligent questions about improved farm poultry.

Reed Estes, a seventeen year old club boy of Iowa Park, who is traveling with the train, told an interesting story of how he got a start in poultry and the effort it took to win a number of prizes and ribbons which he displayed on a large card for a background. Also how he won a free trip to the Short Course held at the A. & M. College, as well as the free trip on the poultry special. He declared that he received such an inspiration while at the college that he determined to make his poultry pay his way through a four year course at A. & M.

The afternoon was devoted to an inspection of the exhibit car. This car contained seven of the popular breeds of standard bred poultry, showing good type, and seven birds showing poor type of same breeds. There are also a number of approved types of approved poultry houses, brooders, mash hoppers, etc., and samples of the market grades of eggs.

One feature which is attracting much interest is a comparison in egg production. One pen contained a hen of a trapnested record strain, which had been fed a balanced ration and produced 210 eggs in a year. Leading from her pen were a number of ribbons going to the rations fed, giving kind and quantity, while a cylinder holding the 210 eggs stood nearby. In another pen was a mongre hen which had been fed corn only and produced only 37 eggs in a year. Ribbons likewise lead to a sack of corn and a card telling of the hen and her record.

The hen of mystery was the last in the car. Cards were handed out to be used in guessing the number of feathers on the hen for which a cash prize of twenty dollars was offered. These guesses ranged from forty to 172 million.

Bulletins and literature dealing with poultry production were also handed out. One of these, "Successful Methods of Poultry Keeping" and written by M. B. Oates, Agricultural Agent of the Fort Worth & Denver Railroad, gives valuable information about the methods and results of successful poultry production, and is proving very popular; while another bulletin on "Feeding for Egg Production" by E. O. Edson, Poultry Husbandman of A. & M. College, is being used and distributed freely.

There were several hundred who passed through the exhibit car during the day, and the general expression was that they had been to a real poultry school.
