This week the County Commissioners commenced the work of improving the highway to the east of Dickens to the county line on the Guthrie road. Some two or three thousand dollars will be expended on this work in getting the road in first-class condition for acceptance by the State Highway Department for further and more permanent improvement work which will immediately follow

This roadway has been designated as a state highway, and the state department will take it over for maintainance and further improvement when placed in proper condition. This roadway, which connects Dickens and Guthrie, as well as other county site points, has been placed in first-class shape through King county, and when graveled by the highway department will become a most important highway link from Fort Worth, Wichita and other East Texas points to the Plains.

The graveling of this roadway will also give Dickens county a complete system of graveled roads from north to the south and the east to the west. Hereafter all county road funds will be devoted to the improve ment of lateral roads, since the cardinal roads will be maintained altogether by state and federal funds. Within a short time Dickens county will have the best "country roads" as well as main highways of any other county in all of Western Texas.

Mr. Oran McClure,

Editor Texas Spur & Dickens Items, Spur, Texas. Dear Sir:

I am assuming that you know our grand old State of Texas is in the grip of a drought such has not been known in the history of the State and that, unless some organiz ed effort is made to relieve the situation, there will be unprecedented suffering within the next year while the farming communities, in the drought districts, will be retarded for five to ten years. Our local banks will be unable to cope with the present situation.

We are engaged in the organization of the Producers Pretectorate, chartered under the laws of the State of Texas. Our ultimate purpose is to combine the farmers and laboring class of people in a movement to bridge the gap between the producer and consumer.

We have, as you will observe from our letterhead, a number of prominent citizens on our Board of Directors, and prominent citizens on other committees in connection with our work.

We are now laying plans, and expect soon to start a campaign to raise money in the East to help finance the farmers of the drought stricken districts, to enable hem to maintain themselves and their stock for the coming year, arranging for them to repay the amounts furnished in from two to five years. as they

We feel confident that by a close system of organization, we can raise, in the East, all the money that is necessary to finance the drought districts. at 6 per cent, giving them from two to five years to make payment; and that, in this way, we will be able to put the farmers in a condition to put in crops next year, and the country will only lose out from one year of drought. whereas, without such financing, they would

I am one of those who believe that cooperative marketing will be an important factor in the solution of many of our production and marketing problems. I do not by any means regard it as a "cure all" for the troubles of the farmer, - but it has eal possibilities. I wonder if you fully appreciate the extent to which co-operative marketing activities in this country have been eveloped. The first farmers' co-operative in this country was organized shortly before the Civil War. Today there are over twelve thousand farmers' co-operative organizations. with a membership of about two and one-half million farmers and doing an annual busi ness of approximately two and a half billion dollars. .

Farmers in this section of the coontry are particularly interested in the violent fluctuations of grain prices during more recent months. During the investigation carried on by the department of agriculture to determine the cause if these disas trous price changes I made certain suggestions to representatives of the Chicago Board of Trade and called upon them to consider constructive measures to prevent a similar situation in the future. I see it, the grain exchanges of this country perform a useful function—at least, we have perfected no better system of marketing. But when the price of what fluctuates 12 or 13 cents in a day it indicates to me that there is something wrong. There is no agency that can bring about more effectively a correction of this situation than the grain exchange themselves. They must realize that they have to a large extent lost the confidence of the people and can retheir houses in order. 





## Move for Consitutional Amendment May Resulf From the Evolution Trial

Dayton, Tenn., July 8 .- A move for new constitutional amendment was see Wednesday by defense counsel as the outstanding inference to be drawn from the address Tuesday night of William Jennings Bryan before the Progressive Dayton Club.

In a statement issued by Dr. John R. Neal. chief defense counsel, in which he summed up the inferences drawn by the defense attorneys from the address of Bryan Tuesday night, he declared:

"He forecast that he will move apidly from the lower court to the Supreme Court of Tennessee, then to the Supreme Court of the United States and having lost his fight on account of the existing constitutional liberties. he intends immediate ly to wipe out the constitutional immunities by a new constitutional amendment.'

The statement, issued shortly beore noon, follows:

"We regard Bryan's speech as the most remarkable utterance ever made by a lawyer just before his entrance into a trial of a criminal

"His speech comes as a challenge to the defense not to confine the test of the anti-evolution law to the existing limitation of the Constitution of Tennessee or even the United States. but instead to put on trial the truth, or the lack of truth of the theory of evolution, the con- nessee and the Constitution of the science and religion.

Good prices for cotton during the past few seasons have tempted many farmers to abandon the safe plan of farming and pulled them into game where the percentage again't them. Every acre under their control has been put into cotton and there is sure to be a shortage of feedstuffs with prevailing high prices this coming winter. Allcotton is gambling for any farmer and this year it seems as though it was a case of "heads I win tails you lose." Texas has over 18,000-000 acres planted to cotton. In many sections of the State ithere is but little promise of a profitable yield. In other sections prospects are good at this writing. but the prevailing lack of sub-moisture makes the outcome extremely uncertain.

In the beginning, farmers took a long chance in planting 18,000,000 acres to one crop. A normal yield of a third of a bale ito an acre would make more than 6.000,000 bales for Texas alone. with prospects for an American crop of nearly 15.000,000 bales. Favorable weather conditions would have insured a crop large enough to have depressed prices so far that there would be no profit in it for the grower.
