

"MY TURN"

IF YOU ARE among the group of folks who used to wear penny loafers, poodle skirts and pony tails, then perhaps you can remember the three-cent postage stamp and the penny post card.

The last letter you ever mailed for three cents would have been on July 31, 1958. In that same month, Alaska had just become a state and President Eisenhower signed a bill creating the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

Earlier that year, Joanne Woodward won the Oscar for "Three Faces Of Eve" and Alec Guinness won for "Bridge On The River Kwai." This "My Turn" column-writer had just received an engagement ring from a fellow journalism student at Texas Tech (you know the guy who writes "Star Lites" in this space every other week).

Drive-in movies were all the rage. Elvis Presley and rock and roll had taken over the music industry. Music has been getting louder and postage has been getting higher ever since that time.

On Monday of next week, April 3, 1988, you will pay a quarter to mail a letter first class in the good old USA. This is an increase of 1150 per cent since first class postage was established at two cents per ounce 103 years ago in 1885.

The three cent stamp was in effect for 28 years. There have been 11 postage rate increases in the 30 years since we said goodbye to that three cent stamp. However, the postal service prefers to put it in a different context. A recent release by the USPS points out that, with adjustments for inflation, the three cent stamp in 1932 would have been worth 25.5 cents.

Perhaps we are simply going backward in time. Before postage stamps and a standard postage rate were established, it cost 25 cents to send a letter of one sheet of paper going 450 miles or more. A letter going 40 miles or less was around six cents. This was in the early 1800s and these rates were considered quite high even then.

I don't know how they delivered mail in those days. The Pony Express method was not begun until 1860. No envelopes were used and there were no stamps. Letters were simply folded over so as to show how many sheets of paper were being mailed. The postmaster wrote the amount of postage due on the outside of the letter, and I suppose anyone along the way would be free to read your epistle if he desired to do so. This would tend to make writing love letters rather public and embarrassing.

Since the start of the current one ounce standard system, the rates have been:

Jan. 7, 1963: 5 cents
Jan. 7, 1968: 6 cents
May 16, 1971: 8 cents
March 2, 1974: 10 cents
Dec. 31, 1975: 13 cents
May 29, 1978: 15 cents
March 22, 1981: 18 cents
Nov. 1, 1981: 20 cents
Feb. 17, 1985: 22 cents
April 3, 1988: 25 cents

Longtime postmaster Gene Ezell was always extremely accommodating, as is the present postmaster, Laura Bartlett. Bill and Scooter tell me that when the Blade used to arrive back in town during the noon hour, another former employee, Flossie Rhinehart, would stop by on her way to work and take the papers to be put in the post office boxes. You can't beat that kind of service.

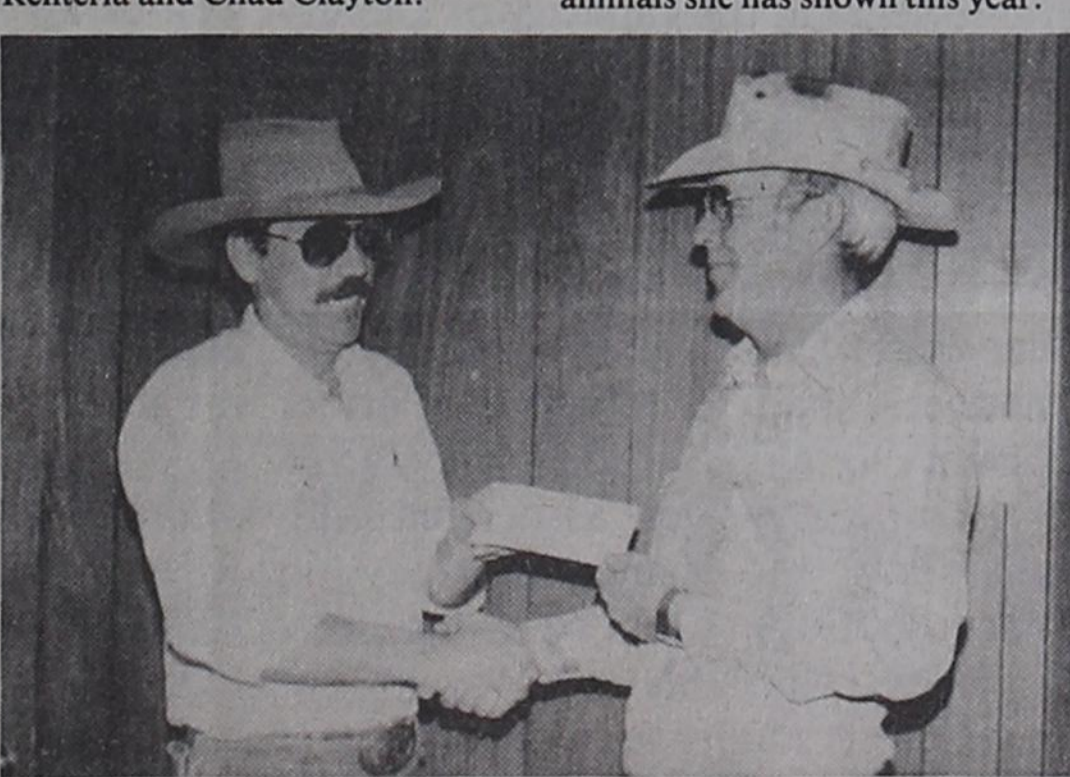
In the early morning hours Friday, April 1, the area experienced falling snow that mostly melted on the streets and

Runoff Election Is Set Tues., April 12

Parmer County voters will return to the polls next Tuesday for runoff elections in both the Democratic and Republican parties.

Highlighting the runoff in the county is the sheriff's race, where Rex Williams of Friona and John Armstrong of Farwell square off for the nomination.

In the March 8 primary, Williams led the voting with 41.5 per cent, and Armstrong came in second with 31.8 per cent.

In the other race, Mel Phillips and Bryan Poff face off for the nomination for the state senate.

Phillips, who has campaigned vigorously in the county, was favored in the March primary with 817 votes, or 56.5 per cent of the vote. Poff received 362 votes.

Those voting in the Republican runoff will have three races.

One is the nomination for U.S. Senator between Beau Boulter of Amarillo and Wes Gilbreath.

Another is the Railroad Commission race between Ed Emmett and P.S. Ervin. The other is the Supreme Court Justice race

putting Ronald S. Block against Nathan Hecht.

Blade Gives Choice In Senate Race

The Bovina Blade heartily endorses Democratic candidate Mel Phillips in the runoff election for nomination to the state senate.

Phillips, a small businessman, has said that under no circumstances would he support a state income tax if elected. He has even filed a public notice to that effect.

Phillips understands the needs of the rural area, and promises he will be responsive to the voters if elected.

Since announcing for the senate race, Phillips has campaigned extensively in Parmer County. In addition to other visits, Phillips has attended such things as the Sausage Fest in Bovina, the Farwell Chamber of Commerce banquet and the Friona Chamber of Commerce banquet.

He has shown a sincere interest in the welfare of the rural areas as well as his hometown of Amarillo.

Conversely, to our knowledge, Phillips' opponent in the runoff has not campaigned locally at all.

A good turnout on Saturday is vitally important in this runoff. As rural residents, we need to cast our vote for the man who has shown an interest in our area--Mel Phillips.

Bovina was host to the Parmer County Democratic convention on Saturday, March 19 at the Community Room of First Bank.

A couple of resolutions were passed, to be forwarded to the state convention. One dealt with taxing mineral rights separately from the land, when both are separately owned. The other was to put "teeth" in forcing child support payments being made when they were owed.

POLLING SITES GIVEN

The absentee voting period goes through Friday at Farwell. There are four polling sites for the Democrats for the runoff: The American Legion Hall in Bovina; Calvary Baptist Church in Friona; the Farwell Community Center in Farwell and Lazbuddie High School.

Republican polling places are at City Hall in Farwell, Reeve Chevrolet in Friona and Lazbuddie School Auditorium.

Voters may vote in the poll closest to where they live.

If you voted in the primary, you must vote in that party's runoff. However, if you did not vote in March, you may vote in the runoff primary of your choice.

Rate Hike In Effect

Postmaster Laura Bartlett announced that a decision has been reached by the Board of Governors concerning the proposed increase in postage rates.

Effective April 3, 1988, the new rate for first class postage will be 25¢. This is the first increase in postage costs in three years. Although no one welcomes an increase in postage, it should be placed in perspective. For example, in 1932 a first class postage stamp cost 3¢. With adjustments for inflation, that same stamp would cost 25.5¢.

The new "E" stamp, which will cost 25¢, went on sale March 23. The Post Office will also have an ample supply of 3¢ stamps and other postage to meet your mailing needs.

April Clinic Schedule Given

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for April.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella and mumps.

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

The clinics nearest Bovina are at Hereford and Dimmitt. There will be a clinic in the Hereford, Texas Department of Health Office, 914 East Park Avenue, on April 7, 14 and 28 from 8 a.m.-12 noon and 1-4 p.m.

The clinic in Dimmitt will be at the Dimmitt Middle School Auditorium, S.W. Seventh and Jones, 10 a.m.-12 noon on April 11.

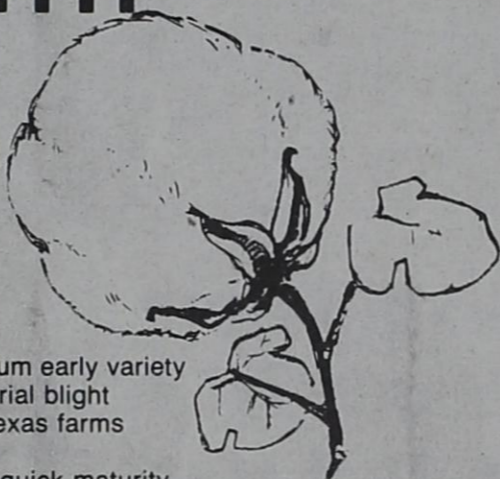

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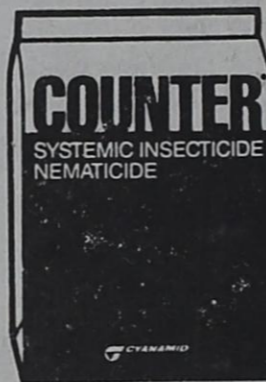


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AN OPEN LETTER TO THE RESIDENTS OF PARMER COUNTY:

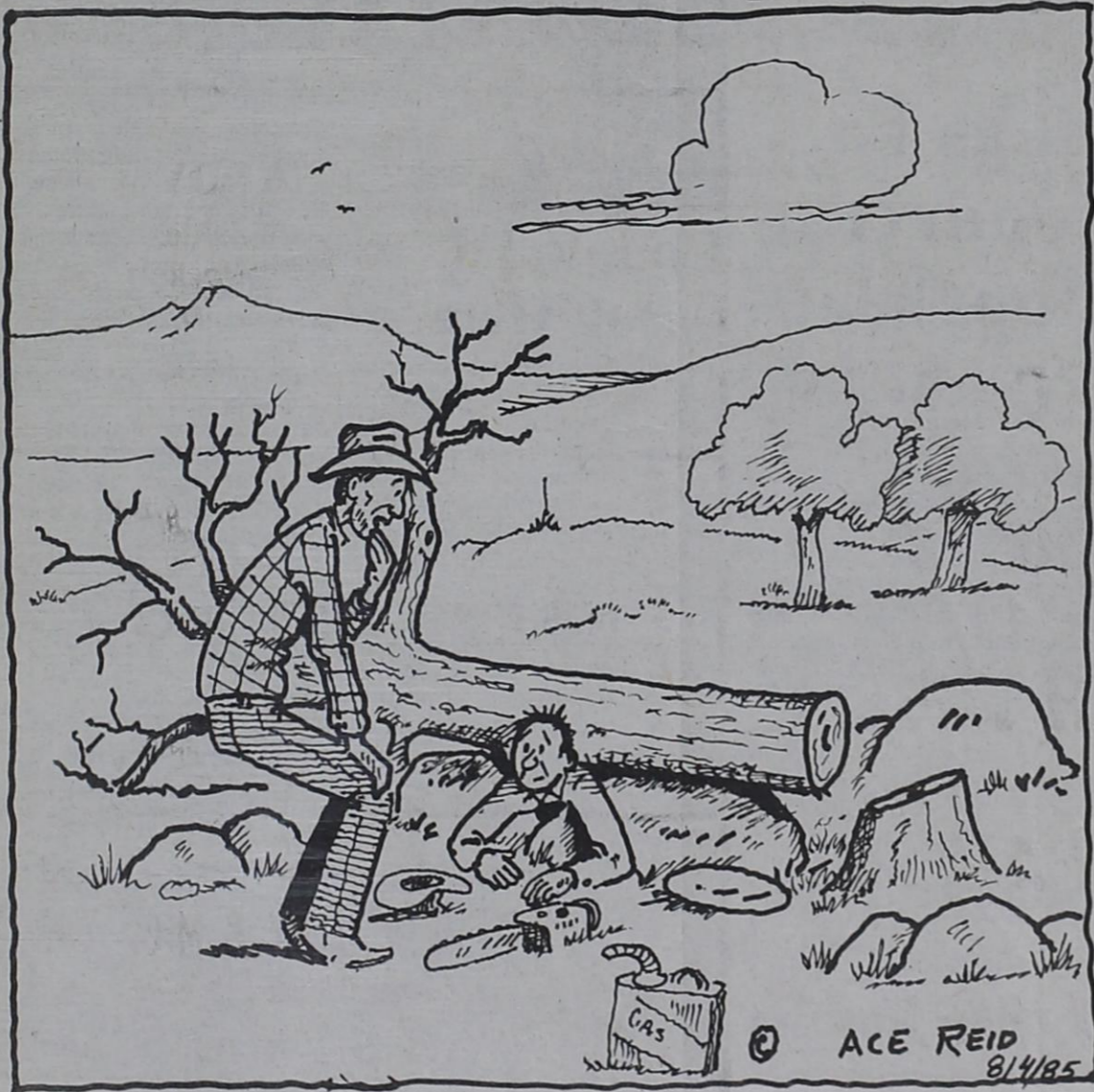
necessary.

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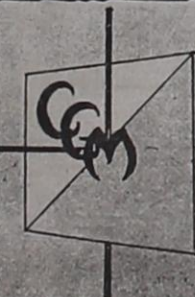
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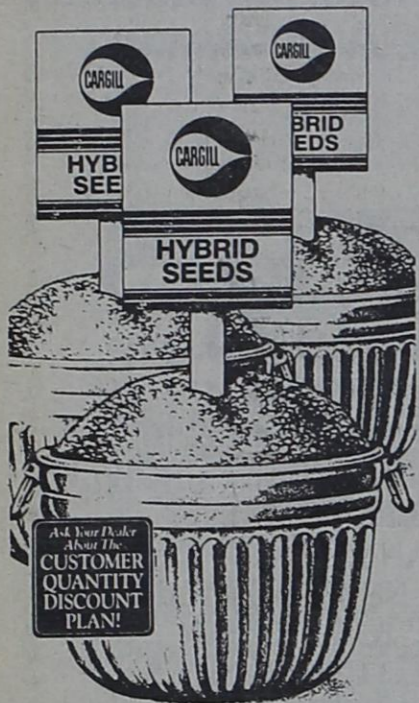


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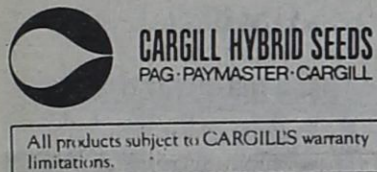
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passed the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) which will affect schools all over the nation. Every school district will have to be inspected for asbestos by a qualified inspector and by October 1988 have a plan written, by a qualified person, for the management of any asbestos that is found in the building. These services will cost the school districts on the average of \$5000 per 100,000 square feet of building.

In Bovina, we have asbestos, but it is in the tunnels that run under the school. There is no danger at the present time of any student or employee being affected unless they enter the tunnels.

The presence of this asbestos will force the school board and the administration to make some decisions in the near future. These decisions are going to be forced by the fact that those school districts that are not in compliance with the act by October 1988 can be fined from \$5,000 to \$30,000 a day until they get in compliance. I do not know of many school districts that could afford this kind of penalty.

AHERA is a federal mandate—a law. There have been no federal funds provided for school districts to get in compliance, therefore, each district will have to foot its own bill. This type of mandate does not set well with us, but really the number one consideration should be the safety of those who must occupy our buildings.

We are presently in the process of securing professional help to assist us in getting in compliance with the act. Even though there is asbestos in our building, it poses no threat to occupants because it is contained in the tunnels beneath the building.

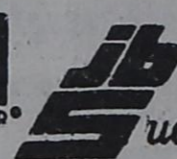

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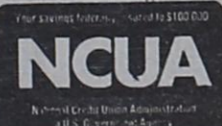
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
