# Telephone Company Seeks Rate Increase

(Editor's note: If the proposed September 1986. rate schedule for GTE is approved, here is how it would affect Bovina customers, on local exchange access rates: the one-party business rate would jump from \$22.15 to \$33.65 per month, an increase of \$11.50 per month or 51.9 per cent.

A one-party residence rate, currently paying \$8.55 per month, would go to \$14.45 per month, a hike of \$5.90 monthly or 69 per cent. Extended Area Service (EAS) would change very little, dropping from \$3.55 to \$3.25 for business telephones and increasing from







- ·Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation


