

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any owners or managers of any circus, or show of any kind to appear upon the streets of Spur for the pur pose of parade, or to parade on the streets of Spur, in any manner what ever without first obtaining a permit

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any owner, manager or performer of any shows commonly known as medicine shows to give any exhibition or performance within the prescribed fire limits of the City of Spur, or within one hundred and fifty feet of any store, shop, business house, or dwelling.
Sec. 3. Any person violating any

provision of this ordinance shall up-on conviction be fined in any sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED DOL




