Pitchfork Test Well Now 1,750 Feet and Waiting for Cable

Cliff Lovelace, who is superintending drilling operations on the Pitchfork Ranch test well for oil, was in Spur this week. The hole is now approximately 1,750 feet deep, and drilling operations are temporarily suspended awaiting the arrival of a new 4,000 foot drilling cable.

Cliff is optimistic at the formations encountered, and states that the well will be drilled on down 4,000 feet or hit the pay sand.

The Davis Test Well for Oil Was "Spudded in" Thursday Morn.

The test well for oil on the Davis blocked acreage six miles northeast of Spur, was "spudded in" Thursday morning of this week at ten o'clock, and the drill is now going down to determine the underground resources of that territory.

Dickens County Alfalfa Club Urges Planting of Alfalfa this year

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Dickens County Alfalfa Club, held Monday at Spur, it was urged that alfalfa be planted at this time and for the next thirty days. Committees were appointed to visit communities of the county during the week, holding meetings in various communities urging that farmers sow every available acre at this time to alfalfa. Due to moisture conditions now prevailing, there could not be a better time and season for planting, and since such conditions prevail only once every three to five years, the opportunity for ideal alfalfa rooting should not be overlooked. A recent soil survey showed that in Dickens county there are ten thousand acres of land specially adapted to alfalfa production, and a number of farmers have already demonstrated that on the sub-irrigated bottom lands it will produce abundantly even in dry years. It is urged that 25 to 100 acres on bottom land farms be sown to alfalfa at this time.
