

The successes of co-operative organizations of co-operation is fundamentally sound. Methods and practices directed by those who occupy executive positions are dependare just as apt to occur whether the Star. organization is co-operative or competitive. Success in business, whether agricultural or industrial, is dependent upon adequate financing, is Now Coming Into sufficient volume to prevent excessive overhead costs and knowledge of the business on the part of those who direct it. Integrity and energy are even more essential in officers of co-operative organizations than those in private business.

Joint-stock land banks, based upon co-operative financing, have been of tremendous assistance to farmers. Two of them ar . in difficulty because of the behavior of their officers. Others operating under identical laws and conditions are not in distress. Farmers' elevators throughout the grain belt have corrected many abuses which had developed before their formation, yet the percentage of failures among them is entirely too great. These failures are usually due to mismanagement, incom petency or lack of operating caital.

Co-operative marketing organizations are functioning in a satisfactory manner in the disposition of many agricultural commodities. Holding commodities off of the market would be effective if there were some way devised to limit future production. Unfortunately the only effective method yet devised for reducing production has been the establishment of prices so low that producers have been forced to devote their efforts to other lines of production.
