STETSONS OFF to our neighbor city of Muleshoe for landing Governor Ann Richards as the keynote speaker at their annual Chamber of Commerce banquet last Friday evening. What a coup!

This was probably the only time that the Governor will make a scheduled public appearance in a city smaller than 5,000 except for possibly some quick stops on a campaign tour for re-election.

Muleshoe's pioneer businessman, Harvey Bass, as chairman of Muleshoe Activities Committee, was one of the civic leaders who was instrumental in bringing the Governor to this part of the state.

Bailey County Commissioner Bennie Claunch grew up in the Hill Country of Texas and is a personal friend of the Governor's family. He also played a large part in convincing the Governor to come to Muleshoe.

By the way, Hale Center won the game that Laney missed, but lost out in their bid for the state tourney on Saturday.

County officials came from as far away as Post. Our Parmer County elected officials were noticeable mainly by their absence, though I did see District Judge Jack Young and District Attorney Johnny Actkinson among the crowd.

Members of "The Press" were invited to come early for a sort of informal press conference, in which we would get to ask the Governor a few questions prior to the banquet. We all stood around on one foot for about two hours with cameras focused on the door. Well, of course, she got there really late and then stopped off at Joe's Boot Shop to buy some boots for her pal, Railroad Commission member Lena Guerrero.

Anyway when the Governor finally arrived, very late, there was only time for her to sign the guest register, answer about two questions, make a mad dash to the ladies' room (I thought the television people were going right on in there with her) and then she was rushed into the banquet scene. I, being a pushy old broad myself, elbowed my way up close to the front when she first came in and she shook my hand and told me how glad she was to be there. I guess she naturally assumed that I was one of the welcoming committee. I was pretty tickled about that.

She is a warm, friendly "folksy" person with a magnetic personality and said she would come see us in the Panhandle more often if it didn't take so long to get here and back. (Approximately 475 miles from here to Austin.) She is a good speaker and really held the attention of the audience, starting out with some amusing stories about how she got started in the political scene as a county commissioner. A highlight of the banquet will be the naming of the Chamber's Man and Woman of the Year and the community's outstanding boy and girl.

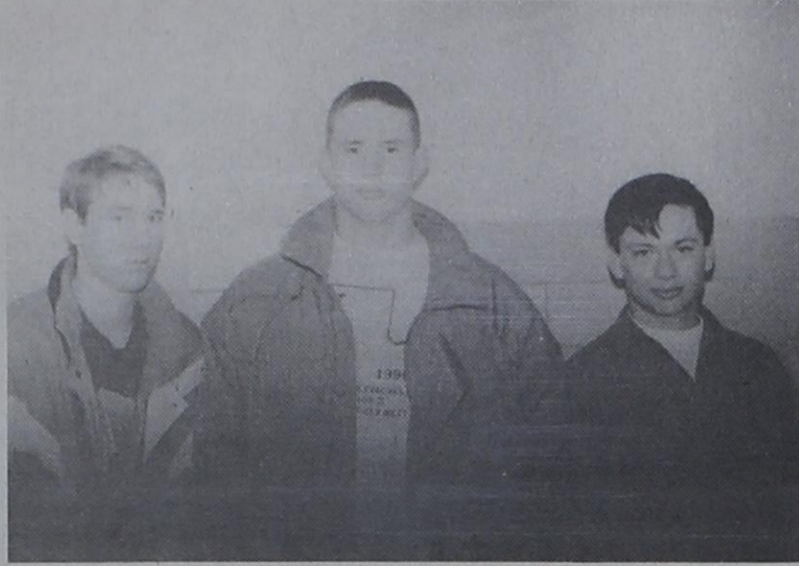
New directors will be recognized at the banquet and also new officers.

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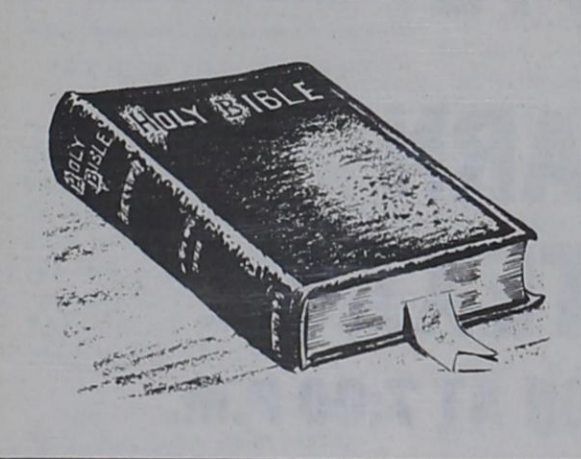

Governor Richards Is Big Hit At Muleshoe Banquet

Governor Ann Richards assured the capacity crowd attending the "Biggest Little Banquet in Texas" last Friday at Muleshoe that although they live a long way from Austin, that they still have some political clout with her.

"I know you feel that you don't have much clout here in West Texas, but you do. I hear the same thing at El Paso, Brownsville and Texarkana," the governor said. "But I would come out here more often, if it just didn't take so long to get here," she added.

Having grown up in a small community herself--Lakeview, which has been swallowed up by Waco, she said "Deep down in my soul, I'm still just a good 'ole girl from Lakeview. And the action may be in Austin, but the heart and soul of Texas is where it's always been--in places like Muleshoe," Richards proclaimed.

Governor Richards praised the work of the area's lawmakers, most of whom were in attendance, such as state representatives Pete Laney of Hale Center and Delwin Jones of Lubbock, and state senators Teel Bivins of Amarillo and John Montford of Lubbock. "Teel even votes with me every so often," she joked.

The agricultural economy in the state has taken a real beating in recent years, the governor said, adding that the federal government through its agriculture program has only made the situation worse.

"It's like the barn is on fire and the federal government has come in and closed all the doors, with the animals inside," Gov. Richards said.

The governor stated that we need tanneries in the state of Texas, instead of shipping all of our hides "off to Italy, and then buying them back as Gucci merchandise." But she explained that federal

regulations are such that there is no experience loaning money for tanneries--and the loans have to be classified. "We need to convince those with the money to invest it," she stated.

Taking a slap at the federal government's intervention in the oil industry, Richards said "The federal government has allowed the market to be flooded by cheap, Middle-Eastern oil. Not only that, they sent the U.S. Navy to escort that oil over here. Now the Defense Department may not call that a subsidy, but you can put lipstick on a hog and call it 'Monique,' but it's still a pig," she said.

"We've taken just about every kind of economic hit we can take, and we're still standing, like neighbors banding together,"

Richards said.

The governor was about 45 minutes late to the affair. Having brought Railroad Commission candidate Lena Guerrero with her, she stopped in at Joe's Boot Store prior to the banquet, buying herself and Mrs. Guerrero new boots. That caused her to have to hurry through a scheduled press conference prior to the banquet, but her shopping spree was turned into a plus for the governor.

"She never saw an open boot store she couldn't pass up," said Sen. Montford in his introduction. "I told Lena, who has been wearing Ropers, that she needs some pointed-toe boots to really do some kicking. No, I'm not telling how much we spent, nor our boot size," the governor concluded.

ELECTION RESULTS

Herington Re-elected; Mars Tops Anthony

Parmer County Tax Assessor-Collector Doris Herington defeated Bob Stafford in the first defense of her office, but longtime Friona Commissioner Ernest Anthony lost out to first-time challenger John Mars in somewhat of an upset, during Tuesday's Democratic Primary.

Mrs. Herington received 617 votes, to 450 for Stafford. Stafford won just two precincts--Bovina's 201, with 142 votes to 66, and Friona's precinct 202, with 33 votes to Herington's 31. Herington won Friona's precinct 101, 188-100, and Farwell's 301 (courthouse), 152-65.

Mars downed Anthony, who is serving his fourth term as commissioner, 175-162. He won Tuesday's vote, all conducted at Friona 101 precinct, 158-152, and led the early voting, 17-10.

County voters went overwhelmingly for Bill Clinton in the Democratic presidential primary with 627

votes. Paul Tsongas finished a distant second with 209 votes.

In the Railroad Commission race, Lena Guerrero led the voting with 359 votes to 295 for David Young. Mrs. Guerrero was appointed to the position by Governor Richards, and is making her first statewide race.

Morris Overstreet of Amarillo was favored in the Place 2 Court of Criminal Appeals race, 630-282 over Gene Kelly, and Charlie Baird was favored in the Place 1 race by county voters, 517-231 over Sam Paxson.

In the Republican primary, challenger Pat Buchanan received 39 per cent of the vote, and won the vote at Farwell, 27-26 and at Lazbuddie, 17-16. Bush won the county vote, 139-95, winning at Friona 64-40 and at Bovina, 19-9. County Republicans favored

Barry Williamson in the Railroad Commission race, 123-64 over Carole Rylander.

In the Supreme Court justice race, Place 3, John D. Montgomery polled 106 votes to George Barbary's 52.

In the Court of Criminal Appeals Race, Place 1, Joseph Devaney received 111 votes, Lagarde 89 and Jim Vollers 50.

In the Supreme Court justice, Place 1, Craig Enoch received 91 votes to 89 for Charles Ben Howell.

A total of 1,034 voted in the Democratic primary, to 238 in the Republican primary. Democratic turnout was as follows: Precinct 101--313; 201--214; 202--65; 203--32; 301--222; 302--63; 303--24; 401--53; 402--53; Early votes--48, Total--1034. Republican turnout was: Friona 105; Bovina 30; Farwell 53; Lazbuddie 33; Early, 17; Total--238.

Cancer Screening Program Locally

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination every month; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age--35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; and over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Tuesday, April 21 from 10 a.m.

Bovina High School's Donna Griggs won the high point individual award at the Lubbock Roosevelt Track and Field meet last Saturday.

Miss Griggs placed first in the 100-meter hurdles, in 16.37; and in the 300-meter hurdles, in 51.85. She also was second in the high jump, clearing 5-0, to account for 28 points.
