

RESULTS ON WHEAT FERTI-LIZER DEMONSTRATION --

The Bushland Experiment Station conducted an off station long time fertilizer test this past year on Donald Christian's farm. Donald's place is located 1 1/2 miles north of Lariat. The soil type on this place is a sandy loam. Amounts of 40, 80, 100, 120,

and 160 lbs. of nitrogen; 40 & 80 lbs. of phosphorus; and 40 and 80 lbs. of potassium were put together in various combinations in the test. There were 4 replications of each different combination. One fertilizer rate received an iron applica-The yields indicated that

Hope is composed of at least two elements: desire and logical grounds for expecting the desire to be fulfilled, Hope looks to the future (Romans 8:24), and must have a reason for existing as Peter shows in I Peter 3:15, "But sancify the Lord God in your hearts; and be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear." Naturally, the Christian's hope is based upon his trust in Christ, Eph. 1:13, "In whom ye also trusted, after that ye heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation . . . " However, we can only trust in Christ to the extent that we believe in and rely upon His word, John 12:48, "He that rejecteth me and receiveth not my words, hath one that judgeth him; the words that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day." Therefore the way we deal with the Word of God is the way we deal with the Son of God -- believe the Word, believe Him; reject the Word, reject Him, When God speaks, and man believes Him, hope can exist. This fact is illustrated in Paul's journey to Rome, in Acts 27; they were in a great storm at sea, and verse 20 speaks of all hope being lost; however, in verse 24 and 25, Paul told them that God had spoken to him to the effect that everyone would be saved. Therefore, on the strength of God's promise, Paul said to be of good cheer. In this place, notice Paul's strong faith, "Wherefore, sirs, be of good cheer; for I believe God, that it shall be even as it was told me." How can any person have hope that does not believe all that God said in the Bible? The Bible cannot be true in some parts and false in other parts. If man does not agree with what the Bible says, then the passage in Romans 3:4 comes into view, "... let God be true, but every man a liar." To have hope in the Lord, we must believe all of His Word and do His will.
