

Fruit fruit juice should be, ested for pectin before making jelly, to determine how much sugar to use, and if there isn't enough pectin lemon or plum juice may be added. In making the alcohol test we place one table spoon of juice in a dish and add one table spoon of alcohol-wood or denatured. Do not taste the tested product. If sufficient pectin is present a jellyike mass will form which should be irm enough to lift with a spoon. If a small amount of pectin the juice will form into small, flaky particles. In using epsom salts, 1 table spoon of juice, 1 teaspoon of sugar, ½ teaspoon of salts, let



The basis for taxation was fixed at a time when about the only property in existence was real estate Since that time we have found new tonio visiting with her parents of things to tax, such as corporations, that city. intangible values etc., but even so, a large amount of wealth escapes taxation, altogether. There are many citizens with comfortable incomes claiming and receiving the protection of the Government, who pay very little or nothing at all toward the maintenance of the Government and its institutions, except such indirect taxes as may be assessed from which there is no escape. As a result, farmers, small home owners and others with tangible property are paying an unjust share of Government expense. This fact, apparent to all, is in itself a justification for a general revision of our assessing and taxing methods.

The suggestion of an income tax has not met with the hearty approval of many of our citizens. There are some, of course, who object to paying any kind of tax, but there are others who are voicing their disapproval of this method of raising revenue on grounds which appear to them to be reasonable. We do not know just what Constitutional provision, if any, stands in the way of assessing a tax on income.. If that form is desirable, the Constitution an be amended. But is it desirable In theory it is the most equitable form of taxation. Th Unitd States Government through the income tax has been able to meet its war obligations and retire many millions in indebtedness. The uncertainty and bother which first made this tax so unpopular has been partly removed by the simplification of the blanks and a better understanding of what it is all about. But, would a State income tax prove to be as practically perfett as it appears to be theoretically? Would it merely serve to increase taxes without equalizing the tax burden? Would it prove to be a double taxation on many who are already paying their

A proposed tariff on cotton is agreeable to the manufacturers and distributors of jute of which 1,160,000,000 yards are imported annually, is revolutionary, according to those interested in that industry.

Jute displaces cotton. It puts the American cotton grower in competition with labor which works eighty one hours a week at 10c to 15c a day and under these conditions the manufacturers of jute products, mostly Americans who have moved their mills to India, make an annual profit of 50 to 54 per cent. Notwithstanding this opportunity to give protection to the cotton industry which has been responsible for this nation's balance of trade for many years, influence brought to bear on our lawmakers seems sufficient to prevent any change in present conditions.
