The terms of members of the Su preme Court are fixed at six years and they are afterwards to be elected by the people. However, in the case at hand, wherein it is incumbent on the Governor to select the In the varied array of plans you will be cer-1931, Jan. 1, 1933, and Jan. 1

> The term of Chief Justice C. M. Cureton expires on Jan 1, 1931, which means he and two of the six judges to be named by Governor Moody must seek re-election if they care for it, in the next Democratic primary. Terms of Associate Justices William Pierson and Thomas B. Greenwood terminate on Jan. 1, 1933, and Jan 1, 1935, respectively-It is considered a foregone conclusion that Judges Richard Critz and C. A. Leddy members of the Commission of Appeals, will be appointed to the Supreme Court. Their respective terms end in June, 1931, and they are appointees of Governor Moody. Others on the commissions whose terms were until June, 1931, are Judges J. D. Harvey and H. B. Short. Terms of Judges Luther Nickels and Acie Speer expired last month. Under provisions of the mendment increasing the Sur Court membership, the Commission of Appeals is abolished automatically with appointment by the Gover nor of the new court members.

The nine-member court will come into existence as soon as the state canvassing board declares the result of the election and Governor Moody names the new members. The can vassing board will meet 40 days after the election. Chief Justice Cure ton said he hoped to organize the new court about Sept. 1 and go to work on the docket. The costitutional three months' vacation thru July, August and September was abolished by the amendment and the court will stay on the job the year around.

Other appointments to be made soon by Governor Moody include the state auditor, who is to receive an annual salary of \$7,500, and five members of the state fish, game and oyster commission, who will receive no pay except reimbursement for actual expenses while on the job. The Governor recently selected former Senator A. E. Wood of Austin for a plcae on the commission and he has been picked by the forecasters for chairman of the board.

All farmers who intend to attend the Farmer's Short Course at College Station next week should prepare to leave Saturday in order to be at College Monday morning at 8 A. M. when the big show starts. Remember this is the chance to learn the latest in any line you are interested in direct from the College. You spend a week down there and get any information you want from the various departmets. Railroad fare will cost about one cent per mile. Meals down there are \$5 for the time there and room only \$1.50.

PLANT ALFALFA


If you want a nice crop of good hay after such a spell as we are having now I would advise you to plant alfalfa. Good alfalfa fields after a good rain any time from now on will make a supply of hay for keeping the mules and cows going that will cost a lot of good money should you have to buy it. And so if you want the hay plant this fall. There is not a farm in the county which can not find as much as five acres that will grow alfalfa. Get to thinking about it; get the seed on hand and be ready for the first fall rains. From this year on you will be setting right when it comes to a spotted season.

Fall plant is best. Luther Karr of the Espuela Community told about planting ten acres in the Fall three years ago. He prepared his land during the summer by twice listing it and following each time in the lister furrow with a small turnplow. He harrowed it down flat and sowed broadcast about ten lbs. of seed per acre, then harrowed it both ways to cover. This was after he got his season along in September. He says that this field was not bothered by weeds at all the next summer. He got one light cutting the next spring and two fairly heavy

Mr. Carr has five acres he sowed in the sping. In preparing the land for the spring plant he broke the land ten inches deep with breaking plow and kept it clean til the middle of May. He then got the season he was waiting for and sowed it. Covered by harrowing both ways with a section harrow. The stand was not as good as the fall stand and the weeds gave him a lot of trouble. However by clipping them back he kept a reasonable stand. He hauled off the first clipping and let the stock eat it which was mostly weeds. # To Buy or Not to Buy-Not "How Expensive"

Homemade Devices Serve Admirably.

A man fed from solid gold table service will be no better nourished over. than if his food were taken from dishes of the heaviest and cheapest any better in a bed made of mahogany than he would in a bed made the aid of expensive devices rather than something far cheaper. As a matter of fact, homemade devices serve just as well in many cases as anything one can buy.

Of course, there is ample justification for buying factory made equipment made of such materials as galvanized iron or earthenware. As a rule, it is more sanitary and also more durable. It is often essential however, to keep the investment for equipment as low as possible. If so, the right kind of homemade equipment will serve just as well as the most expensive factorymade article. Moreover, with but little more effort, if any, it can be kept clean and sanitary. As an example, I have some nests made from ordinary soap boxes that have' given satisfactory service more than ten years continuously.

Troughs, which undoubtedly the most generally used of all feeding appliances, are also easily made by the home workman. A number of excellent factory-made troughs are also available if wanted. The familiar V bottom trough made entirely of wood is, I believe, the most commonly used for feeding wet feed cannot lodge in the corners. 

#### Land Owners Must Protect the Soil

As the humus is taken from the oil, the more easily does that soil ash away. Humus soaks up and ores moisture for plant use durng the dry months of the year. Soil ot physically able to store up moise dissolves and runs off, and thus have lands in the Southwest that eroded very little a few years ago, because the humus was not exhausted, which are washing badly with every rain today. In some cases it has been observed that more than 18 inches of top soil has washed away during the past ten or fifteen years. This does not mean that the fields have developed gullies, but that the top soil has been removed in a manner known as sheet erosion, which leaves no visible evidence of bad washing except that the yellow subsoil or white rock, as the case may be, becomes exposed.

The only known method to prevent sheet erosion is to terrace and then restore the organic matter by plowing in cover crops. Owners of land, if they will make a careful survey, will discover why their farms are not producing either in quantity or quality the crops formerly harvested. They will note that much of the fertility of their lands has been removed with the top soil during the process of erosion. Lands once worth \$125 to \$150 per acre on a productive basis are today worth less than half that amount. and in another ten years, unless they are terraced and the organic matter restored in part, will be worth less than half of what they are priced

To save this investment it is necessary that owners appreciate the need for immediate attention and begin a program of terracing and soil moisture conservation at once.

Experiments have shown that in Texas the average amount of rainfall lost to crops because of the lack of humus in the soil and the absence of terraces is more than 25 per cent of the total. No matter how much rain we have during the spring months there comes a time late in June, July, and August when our crops need rain, and it seldom comes. In no state of the Union are crops dependent so much upon moisture at the right time as in Texas and Oklahoma. The rain is not properly distributed most years, tho the annual fall may be of considerable size. Nature once made proper provisions to take care of plant growth during the dry months. 


