**ALL OF THE CURRENT** debate in congress, regarding the attempt to restore public prayer to the school systems, as well as the Supreme Court decision upholding (by the narrow margin of one vote) a community's right to sponsor a Nativity scene at Christmas almost defies belief.

Given the fervor with which the issues are being debated, one would almost think that the Russians had taken over our country, and that our basic freedoms had been lost.

It almost amounts to that when you stop and think about it. The only difference is that for the past generation, our country has been dominated by an ultra-liberal Supreme Court, rather than by communists.

Now, after more than 20 years of anti-American, demeaning decisions by the court, Congress (given a boost by President Reagan) is attempting to re-capture some of our lost freedoms. In a way, Americans are having to re-capture their country.

Can you believe that our nation's highest court would even debate the matter over whether or not community funds could be used to display a Nativity scene? Or, if such a preposterous subject found its way to the court, that after much discussion it finally was approved, but by only one vote??

If our founding fathers could see some of this activity, they no doubt would literally "turn over in their graves."

Can this be the same America, to which so many thousands of people fled, in order to be able to worship without the threat of government or other forms of persecution?

These early patriots would never have believed that such a rule as the one disallowing prayer in the public schools could ever have been passed in the first place--let alone have to be abolished by a two-thirds vote of the congress.

One of the first acts by our early-day leaders was to have the words "In God We Trust" engraved on our nation's coins, and also printed on the country's paper money, so proud were they in their belief in the supreme being.

Given all of the liberalized courts we have had, it is surprising that this custom has survived. (I just checked what coins I had in my pocket, and the two bills which survived the weekend--and at least the motto was still on all of them).

This is a good example of what can happen when people take a nonchalant attitude toward their government. Too often folks think "This really doesn't affect me, so I just won't get involved."

The fact of the matter is that everything that comes before congress affects EVERYONE, and it is vitally important that the individual express their feelings on the issues.

Americans are beginning to realize the importance of speaking out to their representatives on the issues, and it's not a bit too soon.

If we have another generation of decisions and edicts like the nation has had during the last one, our people could very well be told whether or not they could worship at all, or hold a public meeting.

After all, this IS the year 1984, and thanks to George Orwell, we're all on the lookout for too much government take-over.

**DID YOU HEAR** about the mayor, upset by non-attendance at city council meetings, who added the agenda item "Doubling the salary of the mayor and council members." No one comes to city council meetings unless they're mad about something, the mayor pointed out (sad, but true in most communities). In the case mentioned, there was no big deal, since the mayor and council members received no salary in the first place. But it got some people to the meeting.

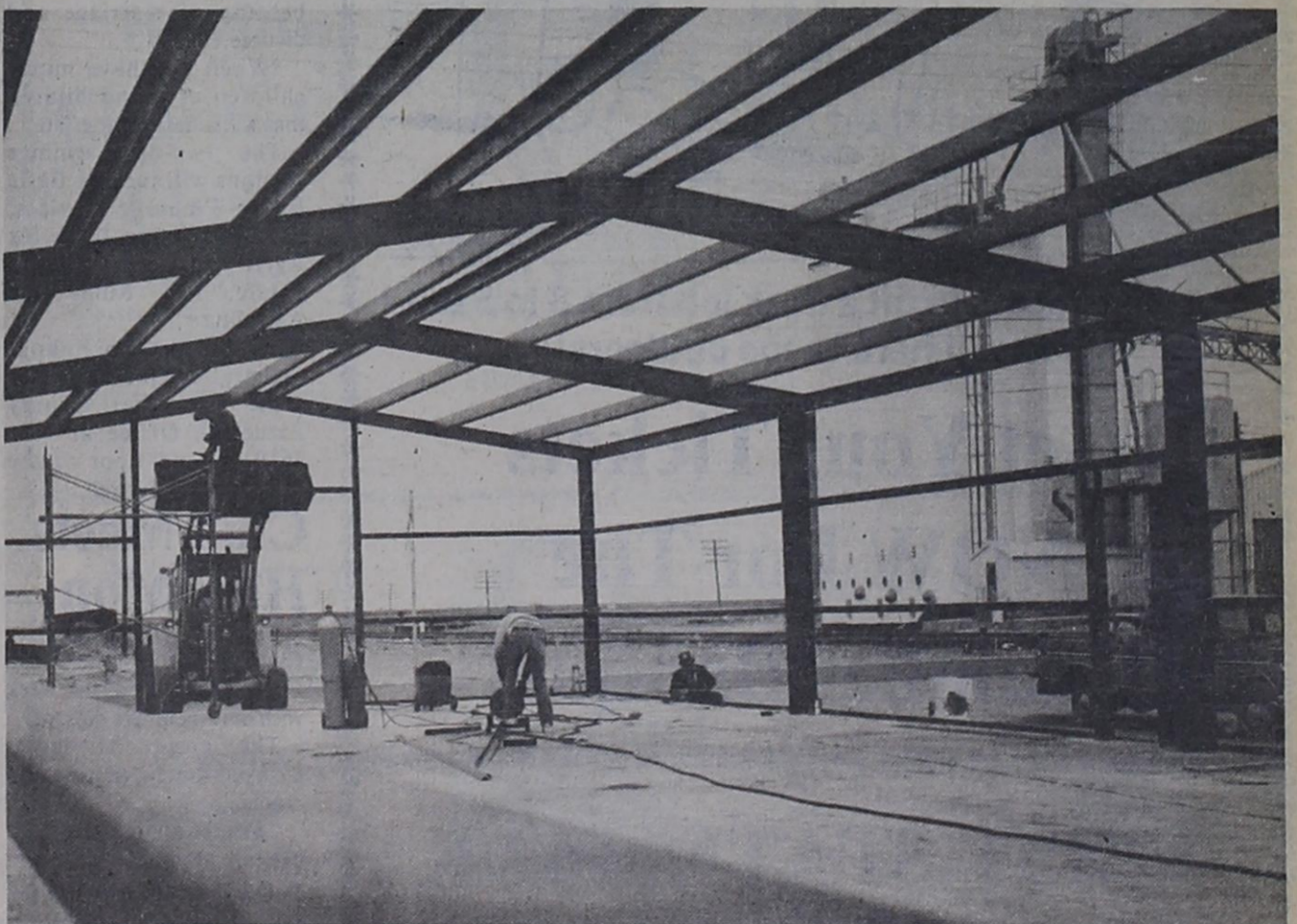
Nightly services will begin at 6:45 p.m. with prayer.

# Local Barrow Is Houston Winner

Bovina youngsters had better than average luck at the 1984 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, which was concluded last week.

Best luck of all was by Misti Boozer, whose home-grown barrow, "Pig," was judged Reserve Champion Hampshire Barrow of the 1984 show.

Third time turned out to be "charmed" for Miss Boozer. It was her third time to enter the Houston show. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Boozer of Bovina and is a junior.

In the premium auction, Miss Boozer's barrow sold for \$30 per pound, helping her project cause to the tune of \$7,080, as the barrow weighed 236 pounds.

Misti's barrow had been placed second in the middleweight class of Hampshire barrows, but joined those in the judging for reserve champion after the first place middleweight, "Mega Buc," owned by Tammy Harkins of Idalou, was tapped for Grand Champion Hampshire.

Misti's brother David Boozer, exhibited the second place lightweight Hampshire barrow, and his pig sold for \$10 per pound, weighing 212 pounds.

Denver Riddle, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jon Riddle, had the 26th place medium wool lamb and a lightweight Duroc barrow.

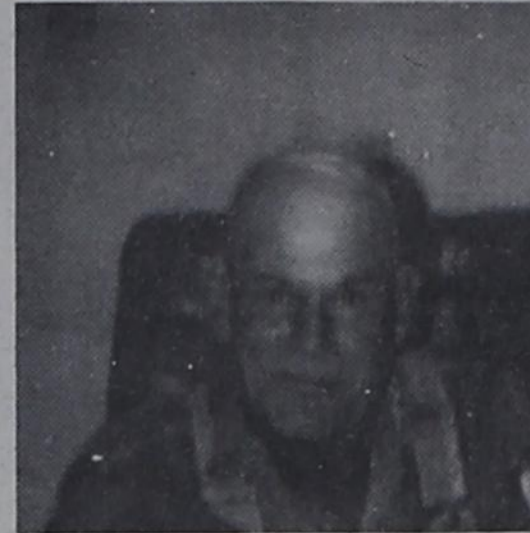

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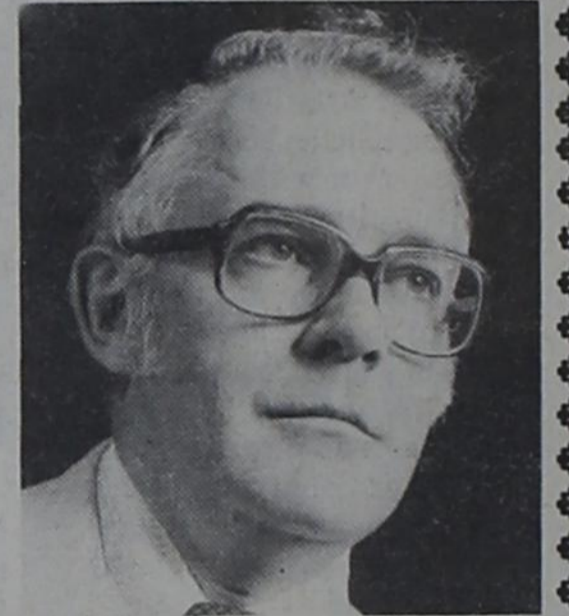

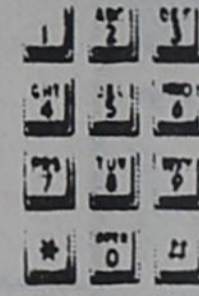

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# FI Report Shows Nice Increase

Friona Industries, Inc. achieved an increase of 49 per cent in net earnings on a 21 per cent gain in sales for the second quarter ended December 31, 1983.

"Higher cattle feedyard occupancy and increased poundage of hamburger meat processed and delivered to more restaurants accounted for most of the improvement in the financial results," said Ron Davenport, chairman, president and chief executive officer.

Net earnings of \$1,133,000, or 48 cents per share, on sales of \$78.3 million compared with net earnings of \$761,000, or 36 cents per share, on sales of \$64.4 million in the same quarter of fiscal 1983.

"The second quarter benefitted from the same factors present in the first quarter. All segments of the company's operations reported increased operating profits for both the second quarter and first six months with the exception of Company-owned Cattle and Animal Health Supplies," said Davenport.

In the first half of fiscal 1984, net earnings were \$1,821,000, or 78 cents per share, on sales of \$144.3 million. For the same six months of fiscal 1983 net earnings were \$1,989,000, or 94 cents per share, on sales of \$126.4 million.

Meat Processing and Distribution had operating profits significantly above those of the first six months of fiscal 1983. The number of Wendy's Old Fashioned Hamburger Restaurants provided with ground beef, dairy products and produce climbed 105 units for a total of 879 restaurants in 15 states by the end of the second quarter.

# County's Bond Sales Announced For 1983

Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds in Texas during 1983 were \$263,956,322, an increase of 22.7 per cent over the same period a year ago, T.J. Morrow, District Director for the U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas, announced today. These sales represent 117.5 per cent of the state's 1983 assigned dollar goal of \$244,700,000.

Country Queen Foods has plants in Grand Rapids, Mich., Bellview, Fla., and a 50 per cent interest in Country Queen Foods, Ltd., Brampton, Ontario, Canada. These plants process egg products such as frozen chopped, hard cooked and fried eggs and omelettes for the restaurant industry and institutional users. Country Queen Foods had sales of \$7,175,000 and \$8,649,000 in calendar years 1982 and 1983, respectively.

Season statistics for the 1983-84 Bovina Fillies' basketball team, the regional semi-finalists, were released this week by Coach Marks Lanham.

To no one's surprise, the figures showed that 5-11 sophomore Marie Pesch led the team in virtually every statistical department.

Miss Pesch was the team's leading scorer, with 539 points in 31 games, a fine average of 17.4 points per game.

Marie also was the team's leading field goal shooter, hitting 221 of 434 attempts, or 50.92 per cent of her shots from the field.

Randee Cupit was the team's second-leading scorer, although the main battle was for second place. Miss Cupit scored 237 points for a 7.6 average in 31 games. She was the team's leading free throw shooter, hitting 73 of 129 attempts, or 56.6 per cent.

Miss Pesch also was the team's leading rebounder, hauling down 162 offensive rebounds, and 231 defensive caroms, for a total of 393

rebounds, or 12.6 per game.

"The Super Sophomore" had her high-scoring game in the second Springlake-Earth game, in which she scored 33 points, hitting 15 of 22 shots from the field and three of five from the charity line. Marie had a 31-point game against Adrian, making 13 of 25 from the field and five of eight from the line.

She had a 28-point performance against Melrose, making 13 of 16 shots from the floor and two out of four from the line.

Marie scored over 20 points in 12 of the team's 31 games, including 22, 21 and 23 in the team's three playoff games.

As a team, the Fillies made 618 of 1635 shots from the field, 37.7 per cent for the year. They made only 274 of 578 shots from the free throw line, 47.4 per cent. This was perhaps their weakest spot for the season.

The team scored 1510 points, averaging 48.7 points per game. The Fillies had 1133 rebounds, or 36.5 per contest.

Let's encourage our public officials to think about the results of their education proposals before they shoot off their mouth.

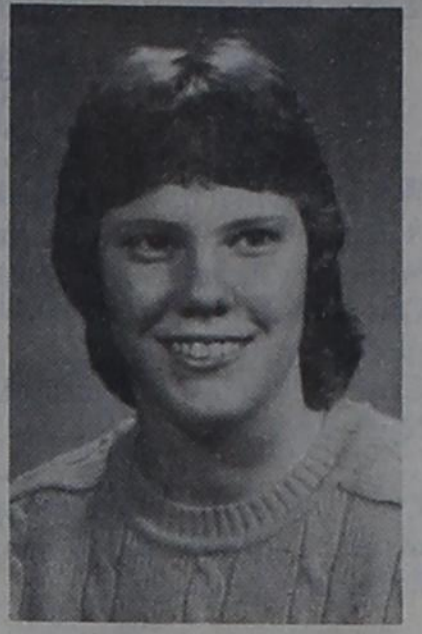
