Mr. Doherty of the H. E. & W. T. railroad addressed the meeting, and informed the association that all arrangements with the refrigerator people had been made, and that he was now in position to furnish cars at all loading points along his road, and that the same rates would be given the shippers made to Jacksonville, Tyler and other points heretofore engaged in this business. He also stated that his road was ready and willing at all times to aid in every possible manner in the diversification of crops.

Sam H. Dixon also presided with his usual grace, and spoke good words of encouragement and cheer to the truck farmer.

A resolution of thanks was voted to Messrs. Jarratt, Doherty. Mally and Dixon for their courtesies and presence.

There being no further business, meeting adjourned.
