He was buried at $50^{\circ}$ clock Sunday evening, with Masonic honors, the tu neral taking place from the residence of his half brother, F. D Huston, Esq., on West Main street. The burial was attended by an unusually large crowd, many present being relatives and close personal friends of the deceased. Mr. Huston was 53 years of age and was a native of San Au gustine county, though he was raised and lived the greater part of his lite in Nacogdo ches. In his early lite he was an active business man, and experienced great successes and reverses But in later years he was less venturous though successful in business affairs. For several years he has lived an inactive life, hav ing retired from the mercan tile business with the dissolu tion of the firm of Richardson \& Huston, and remaining out of business ever sipce. He was not considered a wealthy man, though he was independent. In addition to his property he had a life insurance policy in the Pacific Mu tual.

The deceased has relatives in San Augustine and Chero kee counties, and was a hal brother to F. D. Huston, Esq., of this city and Mrs Zoe Ridley, of Beaumont and a step brother of Mrs. J. O Ray. He was a Master Ma son and an Odd Fellow.

His death is regretted by scores of friends as well as his relatives.
