

past few days a number of complaints have come to this office of injury to the tomato crop from boll worms and the blossom end rot. The latter especially is a very serious matter and needs the attention of every grower without delay. Use Bordeaux mixture and a good spraying machine just as soon as possible. Any of the sprayers listed in my bulletin upon insects attacking truck crops are what the truck growers should have. Then prepare Bordeaux mixture as follows. Take 6lbs. coppersulphate and dissolve in water by placing in 11 gals. water in a loose cloth bag overnight. At the same time slak 4 lbs. unslaked lime in 1 gals. water. Stir well allow to cool and then settle. In morning pour off this lime water make equal quantities of the Irme water and sulphate water and pour simultaneously into a larger vessel holding about 50 gals. Be careful to have the two streams mix as they are being poured into the larger vessel. Stir and mix well. Then add watar to make forty five gallons. Spray the plants thoroughly each week to protect those fruits not yet injured. Those already diseased cannot now be saved. They should be all carefully gathered from the plants and burned as they are a menace to the rest of the crop every day they are allowed to remain.

For the boll worm add one pound of arsenate of lead well dissolved this bordeaux and spray as before. This arsenate of lead however should not be used within three weeks or month of picking time, unless the fruit gets quite ripe. growers are confronted with a grave and important matter and delay in giving attention
