Never before has such a constant, incessant rainfall visited this section. At 5 o'clock yesterday morning the rain began to descend in a slow, steady sprinkle, gradually increasing until about 8 o'clock when a heavy downpour set in, which continued with very slight inter ruption for 20 hours.

At 6 o'clock yesterday evening the creeks were only slightly swollen, but at that time they were rising rapidly. Yet there was no uneasiness among the people, and as the creeks had not nearly reached the high water marks at bed time, the people fetired to rest, not anticipating the sughtest danger. 


