On May 3 the British steamship Yucatan arrived this port from Curacoa, having on board a Spaniard who was ticketed to this city. It is related that before arriving at the port he informed Captain Dickinson that he would continue on board until the vessel arrived at Liverpool, and as the result the captain reported him as a passenger in transit, and his baggage, which consisted of about 1500 Panama straw hats, was not disturbed. During the stay of the vessel at this city the Spaniard informed the captain that he had decided to go to New York by rail and ship for England from that port. Upon receiving this information the captain reported the case to the Custom House officials, who began an investigation for the alleged smuggler and, incidentally, the hats. TAR ROUTE BOX DELIVERY.

The following bulletin ismed by the post office department is published for the information of the people of Nacogdoches county, many of rulings upon the Star route service.

Notice is hereby given to the public that the contracts effect July, 1, 1902, for the reformance of mail service the star routes in the states d territories hereinaster amed provide that, in addition to carrying the mails to the various post offices, the carrier will be required to deliver mail into all boxes and hang small bags or satchels containing mail on cranes or posts that may be erected along the line of the route, under the following regulations of the department:

Any person living on or near the route and not within the corporate limits of any town or within 80 rods of any postoffice, who desires his mail deposited at a given point on the line of the route by the carrier may provide and erect a suitable box or crane on the roadside, located in such manner as to be reached as conveniently as practicable by the carrier without dismounting from the vehicle or horse, and such person shall file with the postmaster at the post office to which his mail is addressed (which shall be one of the two postoffices on the route on either side of and next to the box or crane) a request in writing for the delivery of his mail to the carrier for deposit at the designated point, at the risk of the addressee. The small bag or satchel above described, as well as the box or crane, must be provided by the person for whose use it is intended without expense to the Department.
