## dEAD MAN

Found Floating In Mill Pond

A dead man was found Sunday floating in the tank of the Lutkin Land and Lumber company mill. The matter was reported to the authorities who had the remains removed and prepared for burial. There was nothing upon his person to identify him, other than he was a white man about forty years, rather shor and weighed about 150 pounds indicating that it had been in the water for ten days or more.

A colored woman, however claims to have identified the man as her husband who
had been missing for ten days or more. She claims that the shoes and clothing worn by her husbands fit the description of those worn by the dead man Her husband was very black, and the fact that the floater was white disproves her identification. There was a gash in the back of the head of the deceased but the skull was not fractured and it is questionable if he was the victim of foul play or an a dent.-Lufkin Tribune

Any person living on o near the route and not within the corporate limits town or within so rods of an postoffice, who desires his mail deposited at a give point on the line of the rout by the carrier may provide an erect a suitable box or crane on the roadside, bated such manner as to be reached as conveniently as practicable by the carrier without dis horse, and such person shal file with the postmaster at the post office to which his mail is addressed (which shall be one of the two postoffices on the route on either side of and next to the box or crane) a re quest in writing for the de
livery of his mail to the car rier tor deposit at the desig. nated point, at the risk of the addressee. The small bag or satchel above described, be provided by the person fo whose use it is intended with put expense to the Department.
It shall be the duty of the postmaster at every such post office, upon a written order from any person living on the mail carrier for that route any mail matter-placing in the respective sachels, such are used, the mail for the persons to whom such satchels
