Ray succeeds Zeno Cox as county treasurer. Beeman Strong Esq., was elected to his first term, but as he was already holding the county attorney's office by appointment to succeed Geo. S. King, Esq., resigned, it is not considered a change. E. M. Weeks, Clifton Wells, H. L. Turner and R. A. Hall are starting in for their third term, while A. J. Spradley is elected to his second term consecutively.

He was found a short time after he committed the deed, and it is supposed death was instantaneous with the firing of the gun. Bad health and despondency are doubtless the cause of his self destruction.

THE precipitate decline in silver in Europe, caused by China's flooding that country with silver in payment of the indemnity to the powers, has caused considerable uneasiness in financial circles. IT has been filed in New York by a London lawyer, against the estate of the late Collis P. Huntington, for a hundred million dollars. The plaintiffs are stockholders in some big railroad schemes in which Huntington had the disposal of the money and they allege they were entitled to a rebate of the amount sued for because it had not been used, or if used was used fraudulently. Viewed from this distance it looks like a scheme to "work" the Huntington heirs.

THE mysterious killing of Mrs. Ellen Gore, a beautiful and wealthy American lady, in Paris, France, which occurred a few days ago, has aroused the state department of the U. The killing took place in the room of a wealthy Russian musician under suspicious circumstances, and while the Russian claims the killing the result of the accidental discharge of a pistol, there is suspicion of murder, and officials of both France and the U. S. government have entered into a formal investigation. The dead woman was a student of music in Paris and had met De Rydzewski, in whose room she met her death, while pursuing her studies.

THE Texas and Louisiana railroad surveying corps have located the extension of that line from Monterey east five miles, and Mr. E. A. Frost informs the Tribune that the contract for the extension will be let and the work done as soon as possible. This extension will penetrate one of the finest pine forest in East Texas and will give to the road and Angelina county that much additional railway mileage. The Texas and Louisiana will eventually be extended into San Augustine and Sabine counties and to some points in Louisiana.—Lutkin Tribune.

THE society for the prevention of cruelty to animals is getting into trouble in Washington. It has been sued by a man whose business employs many teams. He claims that the society is persecuting him maliciously and arresting his drivers for maltreating their teams without cause. The suit is now on and it remains to be seen whether the S. P. C. A. or the plaintiff is justified. Leaving this point for the courts to decide, the fact remains that it must take pretty good judgment to tell when a case of cruelty to animals should be reported and when it should not. Two cases occurring not long ago in Nacogdoches illustrates this. The first was that of a well dressed man who was beating a handsome horse on the head with a stick because he stepped on the sidewalk. That man should have been arrested and fined to the fullest extent of the law. The second case was noticed about sun down, when a yoke of oxen were seen toiling wearily through the sand up North street. They had evidently been cruelly overdriven for days and were as nearly exhausted as animals could be and travel at all. The indignant glance was softened at the sight of the equally weary driver, who was walking beside them, while in the wagon was a delicate looking woman with her tired, fretful children. "Movers"—and all the stamp of hopeless poverty and utter lassitude. The stock of the poor suffer with the poor, and while those poor oxen were really a case for the law's interference, how could it be reported? It only made the heart ache over the trouble in the world, the suffering and pain for beasts and human beings that cannot be remedied. The S. P. C. A. is a good and humane institution. It should be in Nacogdoches, for it is needed in many such cases as our first illustration, but at the same time if a member lacks discrimination he is in a position to do as much harm as good to the cause he has at heart.

IN a recent issue of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch there is a pen picture of Mrs. Molineux, wife of the man implicated in the celebrated poisoning case. The pen picture runs as follows: "Height, 5 feet 10 inches, weight, 140 pounds; age 30 years, hair brown, complexion clear, free from cosmetics, eyes large, dark and expressive, one of them being artificial," etc. Talk about jarring your mother's preserves, that would put up the winter supply for the entire family; and the joke of it is that it is not a joke; it is serious. It is on the front page of the Post-Dispatch and is evidently the latest development of yellow journalism. The people must like that style, or the big northern dailies would not so universally adopt it. "Do the people like it?" asked Mr. Hennessy. "Do yez think they're running a newspaper for their health?" returned Mr. Dooley.

THE Secretary of Agriculture, James Wilson, has written a valuable article in a recent Washington Post, urging young men of the country to fit themselves for positions in the Agricultural department. Much work is to be done along that line that requires educated men. Secretary Wilson says that a boy who wishes to take a place among scientific men of this department must be graduates of an agricultural and mechanical college; then the department can place them. The pursuit of agriculture is rapidly taking its rightful place as a science. The typical "man with the hoe" is being superseded by the man with information and progressive ideas, and the farmer who brings intellect, education and a scientific knowledge of the subject to bear on his work will soon be numbered among the aristocrats of the republic.

HOUSTON is on the road to reformation. A little while back she turned over a new leaf by putting the "screws" to pistol toters, and now she is making it uncomfortable for vagrants and bunco steerers. A jury fined a bunco man ten dollars and costs on a charge of vagrancy the other day, notwithstanding he had a "roll" on him. Heretofore, all a fellow had to do was to flash his "roll" in the face of the court and jury to show that he had "means of support" to play a successful bluff on a charge of vagrancy and go scot free. But they have decided down there that a vagrant is a vagrant, money or no money, and that a bunco steerer is the worst kind of a vagrant. Houston's efficient chief of police has determined to rid that city of this troublesome element and has made a good start in that direction.

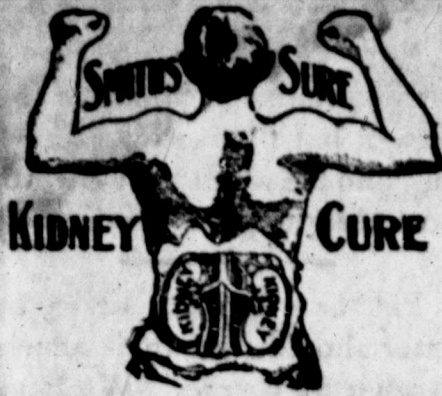
