to effect in this county, beg to advise that Art. 402 of the Criminal Statutes, provides that if any person shall, sell any intoxicating liquor that has been prohibited under the laws of this State, or if any person shall give away any intoxicating liquor in such County, Justice Precinct, City or town with the purpose of evading the provisions of said law he shall be punished by fine of not less than \$25 or more than \$100, and by imprisonment in the County Jail for not less than 20 nor more than 60 days.

In short, it is a violation of the "local option" law, for a druggist, merchant, or other person, to sell anything, under whatever name it may be sold, that contains a sufficient quantity of alcohol to be drunk and used as a beverage; hence we would advise that the various dealers, in "patent medicines," in this county, handle nothing in stock that can in any way be drunk and used as a beverage.

Varities of cotton resistant to the attack of the boll weevil will be discussed by representatives of the United States department of agriculture who have been experimenting in Texas for months. The lecturers will include the boll worm, which has proved more destructive in the northern tier of weevil infested counties than the weevil, and Prof. Quaintance, the government expert at Caldwell will take up this subject. 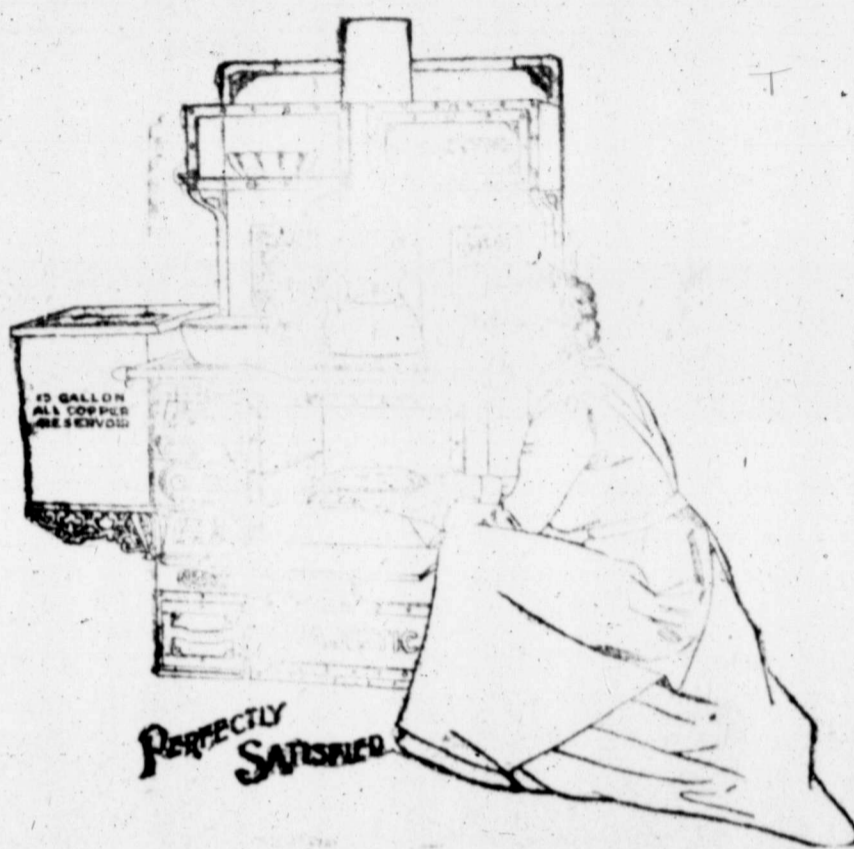

PROHIBITION VS DEMOCRACY.

Former Should Never Be Made a Political Issue.

Colfax, Tex., Oct. 30 1903. Editor Sentinel:

Through the courtesy of Mr. Cleve Thorn, a subscriber, I had the pleasure of reading several recent numbers of your interesting paper, and am particularly pleased with your position on the prohibition question; I am utterly astonished that our Southern people, whose terrible experiences in the past should make them wiser, should allow a blind enthusiasm to so far miss lead them.

I do not believe that it requires a prophet to foretell the disastrous result of prohibition when it assumes a political shape. I have watched political affairs for over fifty years and am convinced that the prohibition question is entirely an outside issue and has nothing whatever to do with politics and should remain on the outside.

We have two great political parties, the democratic and republican, and they have to stay. The little side shows, in the South, have always proven detrimental to the best interests of the country by weakening, and at times defeating the grand purposes of the democratic party, the only party in which there is any reliance or hope for the people of the South. The wild fanaticism now raging throughout this country on the prohibition question, will, if made a political issue, bring

disaster and ruin. It will finally so divide our forces as to make it an easy walk-over for the republican party into both National and state control. We need only to look back at the history of the Presidential campaign in 1860 to see and be rebuked for the unwise cause the prohibitionists now threaten to pursue.

I am a prohibitionist and wish the organization successful, but not at the sacrifice of every other principle looking to the welfare of our common country. We who favor prohibition can safely run our craft outside of political waters, if we can't, thus for heaven's sake let the old boat sink too deep into the sea of forgetfulness for resurrection. Better this than destroy the democratic party, the only anchor upon which the South can leave for safety. Yours for democracy, first, last and all the time. C. J. S.

THROUGH the efforts of General Passenger agent Anderson of the Southern Pacific and Lindsey & Harris, and L. H. Shelfer, of this city, a big deal is about to take place in which a Chicago syndicate will invest three million dollars in tobacco lands in this vicinity and along the line of the T. & N. O. railroad, to be developed at once. It seems to be the plan of this syndicate to establish extensive tobacco warehouses, barns, etc. and engage on a heavy scale in the culture of tobacco here. Three millions is a big pile of money and will open up many thousands of acres of splendid tobacco lands in Nacogdoches and adjoining counties and put an impetus to the tobacco industry here that will mark this as one of the foremost tobacco growing sections of the United States.

PETERS, the president of the Texas Cotton Growers' Association, has investigated the weevil proof cotton seed of North Carolina and recommends the North Carolina product as the best adapted to Texas planting. This is the character of seed that will be handled by Mr. W. T. Wilson and others in Nacogdoches during the planting season. It will pay the cotton raisers of this county to use up every seed grown here this year and plant foreign grown seed entirely next year. There is no doubt but that the weevil hibernates in the seed during the winter, and when the seed is placed in the ground in the spring he comes out and raises two or three big families in time to feed on the crop.

East Texas had settled into a cotton growing rut and it has taken the boll weevil lash to get the people out of it and so develop a section the resources of which are only now beginning to be guessed.

ONE LONE FRIEND.

The only friend of the boll weevil we have met was in town a few days ago. He was a stranger, and was moving from San Jacinto county to North Louisiana with his family. He said he had been living in the Big Thicket about eight years engaged in farming, but had never made a good living until after the boll weevil came and run him out of the cotton patch. He unhesitatingly pronounced the boll weevil a good thing. He was going back to North Louisiana because he was raised over there and that is his home.

It's an ill wind that blows no good at all, and it is probably true that some people are better off by the advent of the boll weevil, because they were not successful farmers probably to commence with, which we venture the guess was the case with the individual herein referred to. But we must raise some cotton. We can't all raise tobacco; we can't all raise tomatoes, and we can't all devote our entire fields to fruit, and there would be no sale for it if we raised nothing but corn. Cotton is the sure money crop of the South and it would be a calamity if none could be raised in this section at all. The boll weevil must be fought. He is a problem that is hard up against us. What to do with him is the biggest question that has ever confronted the cotton growers. Those who take the view of the matter our Louisiana friend does and quit cotton may do well. But all cannot do that. But what are they going to do? Will they go on planting and risking, or will they join in the fight to lessen the evil, if not destroy it entirely? This is a very serious question and demands the most sincere, careful and prayerful consideration of every planter. If there is a cotton crop raised in Nacogdoches county next year it will have to be done under different methods heretofore employed. That is a fact we all admit. Then what method? Get together and decide upon it. Do it now.

The Houston Post is itching to get hold of the liar who sent out the report that there were twenty cases of yellow fever in that city. The Post offers \$50 reward for his detection. Such liars, ought to be made to feed on yellow fever germs until they learn sense enough to stop circulating false reports about a town. —Pittsburg Gazette.

THE BACON HOG.

From the Farm Stock page of the Texas Farm and Ranch we extract the following, which makes interesting reading if not considered good advice:

"The American people need some education before they can appreciate good bacon. We are a nation of grease eaters and want solid chunks of hog fat and want plenty of lard in which to fry our food, for fried food being difficult and slow of digestion, allays hunger for a longer time than more digestible food. And then food saturated with hog grease is more easily swallowed, thus enabling us to eat faster, and more of it. When hunger is appeased. We are a pushing, money making race, and cannot afford to waste our time eating food that must be masticated, and saturated with saliva before it can be swallowed. Therefore much time is saved by saturating our food with grease. As for its unhealthfulness, we care little. We have physicians everywhere and they must live, and it would be cruel, if not selfish, to adopt a system that would deprive them of much of their practice. In this country, the pork hog, or the lard hog, brings the best prices at the great pork factories, and before the bacon hog can be grown successfully our people must learn to appreciate good bacon, rather than fat pork. The Tamworth is the favorite bacon hog of Great Britain and the Scandinavian countries. They are very prolific, good breeders and of large size; they have deep bodies and arched backs which insures large sides; their bones are large, legs very strong and feet well formed and powerful. These hogs are kindly disposed and very vigorous and healthy. Perhaps if these hogs were raised in large numbers, a good market could be built up for them. But at present the demand is for pork and grease, and not for bacon with alternate layers of fat and lean. At present we would not advise the raising of Tamworth hogs except for home use. Poland Chinas, Berkshires, Duroc-Jerseys, and other breeds that run largely too fat, are best marketing, as the packers will pay more for them."

A Big Difference.

There is a big difference. If you doubt it go along our prominent city streets where residences stand and rich people live in luxury. Occasionally you will see a daintily dressed little miss talking through the fence to the gentlemanly little boy next door; but at most of these palace-like dwellings you will hear no childish laughter, and see no romping boys and girls. Occasionally you will see a little pug-nosed poodle sleeping on an embroidered rug on the piazza. If you will change your course and stroll along the unpaved streets lined with small cottages where a different class of people eat, sleep, get their frugal breakfast and in the dim twilight hurry to their daily labor, in the shops and factories, you will see a material difference in the

average age of the inhabitants, and wonder where so many children came from. You will see them everywhere, singly, in pairs, in parties of four, five six and more individuals, and many of the girls of ten or twelve years, will have infants in their arms, and you will have to seek solitude or the purlieus of the rich to escape the din of their riotous laughter and mischievous pranks. You will also see about as many dogs as children, but fewer poodles and pugs, the bob-tailed and ring-necked curs predominating. —Texas Farm and Ranch.

Colonel Imboden has been in Beaumont during the past few days. He was once a congressional aspirant. There is an old adage of once a swimmer always a swimmer and it might fit here but with the Colonel it is probably a case of always to be an aspirant as well. —Beaumont Enterprise.

Imboden must have been "feeling around" while he was in Beaumont. Still we are unwilling to believe that he is chasing a congressional butterfly. He has a judicial bee to get rid of first.

THE Palestine Herald contains an editorial on the yellow fever question that has based its argument in favor of quarantine on facts and so is incontrovertible. We hope and believe that the danger is over for this year, and the United States will probably take every possible precaution against a further spread next year, but we agree with the writer of the Herald that quarantine is preferable to even one case of fever. As he is not theorizing, but cites his own experience in a fever stricken city, (Monterey Mexico,) to prove that it can and does spread in a clean town and one of high altitude, his remarks are to be listened to and his opinion accepted as true when he says, "Any man who ever went through a yellow fever experience, and suffered from business paralysis, would undoubtedly favor the drawing of quarantine lines as closely as possible, to prevent another disaster."

Robert Runnela requests the Times to express to the people of Timpson his profound gratitude for the interest they have shown in him and the efforts they have put forth in his behalf. The confidence and esteem of the neighbors who have known him from childhood is the one bright star that illumines the cloud that is lowering over his life. —Timpson Times.

The zeal with which Robert's Timpson friends have adhered to him is certainly worthy of his deepest gratitude. Few men in trouble have had the encouragement and the persistent demonstration of confidence that they have shown Runnela in his dark hour, and should his case be affirmed this thought will doubtless comfort and sustain him during his two years of penal servitude, and whether guilty or innocent, he will return to his friends a better man and begin life anew, strengthened and encouraged by the warm clasp of friendly hands and the moral support of those who remained true to him.

SHOT FROM AMBUSH.

Well Known Houston Contractors Fired On by Assassins.

Houston Chronicle: Mr. E. A. Avey is lying at his home, corner of Canty and Main streets, suffering from wounds inflicted with intent of assassina-

He was shot in the forehead, three in the back of the neck and one in the arm took effect. Before he could be borne to a place where assistance could be procured he had all but expired from the loss of blood.

Mr. Louis Whitten, also well known in Houston, was slightly wounded at the same time. The two men in company with a third, were ambushed in the woods near Diboll, a small station this side of Lufkin in Angelina county on the Houston, East & West Texas railroad. Mr. Avey was brought to Houston last night.

Mr. Avey and Mr. Whitten are contractors engaged in work near the scene of the shooting. They had arranged to go out in the evening to hunt by lantern light. Before they had proceeded far from the town of Diboll, and while they were tramping through the woods, a shot gun was discharged immediately in front of them. Mr. Avey fell to the ground. The unknown assailants escaped.

The assailants are believed to have been negroes. Recently a race war has been in progress in the vicinity and numbers of attempts have been made upon the lives of white men in that locality. Few have attained the degree of seriousness that marks the latest outrage.

The assailants were concealed behind some bushes and fired point blank into the midst of the party of white men blinded by the light from their own lanterns. It is believed that the assailant knew the plans of the white men and laid in wait to kill them.

Mr. Avey is one of the contractors who erected Sweeney & Coombs' opera house and is well known in Houston. The attempt on his life has aroused excitement here as well as in the country where the assault was perpetrated.

Every effort to apprehend the assailants is being made by the Angelina county authorities but the circumstances of the affair are such as to make the case most difficult.

Frank Dunson died this morning between four and five o'clock, at the residence of his mother on Pillar street. He had been slightly ill for some days, but it was not regarded as anything at all serious. A weak heart caused the end to come very unexpectedly, the physician not arriving until after his death. Mr. Dunson was a young man

of many good qualities and lovable traits and was probably his own worst enemy. Every one had a kind word for him, and positions were all ways open to him, owing to his undoubted business qualifications and to friends who were always ready to extend a helping hand. He was a member of the Methodist church having joined during the Stewart meeting some years ago. Comparatively a young man when he died, every one sympathized deeply with him, and with the heart broken mother to whom he was the idol of her heart's affection.
