KILLING AT CHIRENO.

Bob Lindsey Shot to Death By "Goober" Earl.

From Monday's Daily:

Another killing was reported from the vicinity of Chireno this morning. The killing took place some distance out in the country yesterday afternoon in which R. J. Lindsey was shot by "Goober" Earl, a lad of a boy, whom it is said was partially raised by Lindsey. The weapon used was a double barrel shot gun, both charges of which were discharged at once, the contents entering Lindsey's breast killing him instantly. The boy went at once to Chireno and reported the affair and sent word to Nacogdoches that he would be up here today to give himself up. It is not learned whether he was arrested at Chireno or not.

The particulars of the unfortunate affair as near as can be ascertained, are that the parties had been gambling and had fallen out about some money. Earl claimed that Lindsey owed him a dollar and demanded immediate payment. In the quarrel Earl threatened, so it is alleged, to kill Lindsey if he did not pay him the dollar. Lindsey jeered him about his "big talk"

and told him to get to work and kill somebody, and do it quick. Earl went to the house and secured the gun and came out in the road to where Lindsey was and shot him down as stated. These particulars are given from hearsay. No authentic report has been brought in as yet.

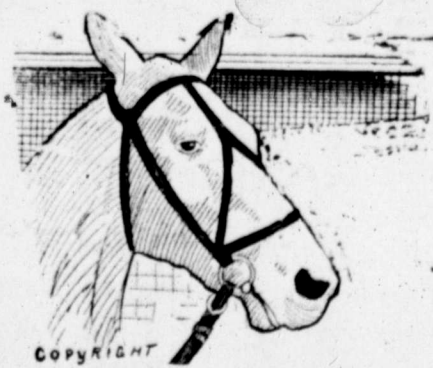

THE LINDSEY KILLING.

Particulars Only Known From His Slayer's Story.

From Tuesday's Daily:

Mr. W. M. Flournoy, of Chireno, was in the city today, and being interviewed by The Sentinel man in regard to the killing of Bob Lindsey by "Goober" Earl, which took place Sunday afternoon, said that he was one of the men who first went to Lindsey after he was shot. The body was not cold when he arrived on the scene, in response to the notification from the boy himself in person that he had killed Lindsey. The dead body was found in an old road about three quarters of a mile from Chireno, and about one mile from where the boy lived. The old road is about seventy-five yards from the main road and has grown up in bushes.

Lindsey was shot in the neck, which was broke, and in the breast. He had no weapon. He had a pocket knife, a box of snuff, some pictures and about forty-two dollars in his pockets. There were no witnesses to the killing and the boy simply states that Lindsey owed him a dollar and would not pay him and he killed him. The boy has not been arrested and is waiting for an officer to come and get him. Mr. Flournoy says the boy could have easily evaded detection, and Lindsey's body would have never been discovered except by the buzzards if the boy had kept the matter to himself. He does not think the boy could make any kind of a bond.

EXCITEMENT AT CUSHING.

Several Negroes Shot and Man Reported Robbed.

It is reported that Tom Sapp, organizer of the Woodmen of the World, was robbed of eighty-five dollars at Cushing Saturday night. He had just organized a Camp at Cushing with about twenty members, and had collected fees amounting to eighty-five dollars. The robbery was committed by someone who entered his room at night.

There was a big negro dance at Carriger's mill Saturday, and while the festivities were at a high pitch, some unknown party fired into the crowd from the outside, seriously wounding several negroes. None were killed outright, and so far no fatalities have been reported.

THEY are bringing in oil gushers at Chireno with pick and spade.

IT is time for the Nacogdoches oil field to take on another boom.

IT is getting almost time for somebody to start a small-pox scare. The yellow fever scare is over.

WELL, if prohibition make corpses of towns, there will be an awful big grave yard in Texas. Prohibition has about captured the whole State.

IF we half way solve the boll weevil problem Nacogdoches will almost double itself within the next 24 months. The knockers can't keep her down.

IF there is all in the Panama business that the papers say is concealed therein, then Teddy is the prince of grafters and the postoffice scandal no longer ranks first.

W. J. BRYAN has gone to Europe, but before he left he announced that he was not a candidate for President. Thank the Lord for that. Now lets hear from Grover.

WHEN strangers are constantly complimenting Nacogdoches, it must be that there is something attractive here, even if we fail to acknowledge it at home. This is the best town in Texas today, as compared to its population.

SECRETARY WILSON says it is about as practicable to eradicate the house fly as it is to destroy the boll weevil and thinks the only way to meet the evil is early planting. Nearly every other thinking man has about reached the same conclusion.

THE wholesale liquor dealers of Dallas are signing a petition to the antis of Harris county to keep their hands off the fight in that district against Pinckney for Congress. If Pinckney is defeated it will precipitate a contest for out-right State prohibition.

THERE was a big attendance at the Dallas boll weevil convention, many delegates from Louisiana being present. The verdict after all, however, was but a confirmation of the conclusion that had already been universally agreed upon—early planting, using northern grown seed, rapid cultivation and fertilizing heavily to effect early maturity.

THIS Panama revolution came in a very opportune time. How old is Ann is as old as the young lady herself. Dowie has left New York, the elections are over and there was absolutely nothing in sight, until the Panama flew off and the papers are either hurrahing for our strenuous president, as he is chases it, or insinuating that he knocked it off.

QUIT KNOCKING.

For goodness sake, let everybody, merchants, lawyers, doctors, farmers, all, quit "mully-grubbing" and go to grubbing for business, and push the boom and country along while the town is knocked at our door. This county will make nearly 20,000 bales of cotton this year and this and the seed will bring \$1,250,000. Instead of buying bread and feed, as was done last year, we will sell this year \$100,000 of corn. Nearly every body will get out of debt. This will put the merchants in good condition and the prospect of cotton being worth from 10 to 15 cents next year, what have we to grumble about? We have as fine peach and vegetable country as there is in Texas. Tell it to visitors. We have acknowledged, proven tobacco lands of the United States. Tell it to strangers. We have the best cotton county in East Texas. Tell them about it. We are building near here a saw mill which will employ 300 hands; a railroad into the timber belt, directly through the oil field and on to connection with the Cotton Belt and Santa Fe. We have an oil field, which when developed will astonish the world. There will be built within six months 10 miles North of town a saw mill fully as large as the Hayward mill. Just South of town two miles, the Mally Orchard Co. is letting contract to clear 200 acres of ground to go into peaches and vegetables. We have in Nacogdoches banking facilities second to no small town in Texas. Each of these banks are backed up by our home people. The combined wealth of the stockholders in each bank is at least \$1,000,000. Thus affording safe place for our people to deposit their money and giving ample banking facilities. We have the largest stocks of goods of any interior town in the State. We have the best equipped and most perfectly operated Telephone and electric light system of any town in Texas. We have not had a mercantile failure of any consequence in ten years. Our merchants are all in good condition. The most of them discount their bills the year round. Tell all these things to visitors. If we can't find a new comer for each man to talk an arm off, lets tell it to each other. Some of us don't want to believe these things; so lets practice upon each other awhile till we can all go at it with a vim.

CROCKETT has only shipped 2,000 bales of cotton so far this season, against 9,000 at same date last year. This falling off is due to the ravages of the boll weevil in Houston county.

THE total number of bales of cotton ginned in Texas from the growth of 1903, up to Oct. 18th, according to the government official report is 1,065,229, against 1,781,797 bales at same date last year, a difference of 716,568 bales. These statistics are obtained through a canvass of the individual ginners of the State and are considered authentic. The difference, however, may

be accounted for in the fact that the crop was three weeks late throughout the entire State, and does not necessarily infer that the crop of Texas for 1903 will be shorter than last year. It is not believed that the total crop of Texas this year will fall far short of that of last year.

Oil News.

Nacogdoches, Texas, November 10.—The Liberty Oil Company, operating on the Kuykendall survey, will bring in its well just as soon as the earthen tanks can be constructed. If they were to go ahead and bring in a gusher without any preparation for holding the oil it would involve a great loss. The nearest point from this well to the Texas and New Orleans railroad is eight miles, which can be reached by a pipe line over a level surface. Every indication at this well proves that the management is right at the oil and is only awaiting the tanks to open it up. Small tracts in the field are daily changing hands, and it will only be a few days before the boom is on, as other prospects for paying wells are going on.—Houston Post.

The above is "news" to Nacogdoches folks, at least most of them, though there is nothing surprising in it to any one. The oil is here, in vast abundance, and it is bound to be struck in some places; if the right depth is reached.

Maj. Chas. M. Raguet Dead.

From Wednesday's Daily. Telegrams were received here today announcing the death of Major Charles M. Raguet at his home in Marshall this morning at 9 o'clock and stating that his remains will be interred there tomorrow at 3 p. m.

He had a stroke of paralysis some weeks ago from which he got better, but later he gradually sank. He was about seventy years old and was born here. This was his home until he settled in Marshall. He was one of the original members of the military company raised here for the Confederate war, known as Co. H., 4th Tex. Cavalry, by Col. Henry W. Raguet, that left here on the 12th day of Sept., 1861. His wife was Miss Bell Edwards, also a native of this place, and the Edwards and Raguet families were leading pioneers. Judge Peyton F. Edwards, of El Paso, is her brother, and was at the death bed. J. R. Irion, of Overton, is a nephew of Maj. Raguet and was also present. Mrs. L. S. Taylor, of this city is his niece.

Mally Orchard Co.

The F. W. Mally Orchard Company of Quincy, Ill., having a capital stock of \$100,000 has been granted permission to do business in Texas. This is the company that is now clearing up a large tract of land near Nacogdoches, under the supervision of Mr. Mally himself, upon which a large orchard will be set out at once. Prof. Mally is now making headquarters in Nacogdoches, though the main offices of his company are in Quincy, Illinois. The company will also engage in truck farming.

WHAT TEXAS IS DOING.

The following from the Galveston News is worthy of reproduction in the columns of every enterprising newspaper in Texas: "Secretary Wilson's visit has brought to many who have heard or read his words assurance and encouragement. Not that Texans are not hopeful and jubilant any way. They have made and saved more good crops than the people of any other country, and are coming to realize the advantages and benefits which they enjoy. But Secretary Wilson is a wise farmer who understands that farming and all other kinds of work to which man is called upon to turn his hand should be undertaken with an inquiring mind and a hopeful heart. He disseminates good cheer as well as information. 'The people here need only to diversify,' he said. 'That is the solution of the problem they are meeting, and they are solving it. They are diversifying. They are doing things in the line of farming that can never fail to make their work a success. The work of the department has been to make experiments leading to results in farming in the South and the people have been adopting the results of the experiments. The doctrine of diversification is the thing that I have to expound to the people of the State, and I am pleased to see that they are really diversifying.' The people are diversifying, and are bent on diversifying even more, but it is never the less pleasant and gratifying to know that the policy stands so approved by good authority.

"The advantages, resources and possibilities offered by Texas to present and prospective citizens were forcibly recounted by the distinguished visitor. He began with the rice interests. 'They are gigantic interests already and their development is going on at a rate to indicate that the growth will be much greater. This is a diversification that has paid. The tobacco lands of Texas, especially in the vicinity of Nacogdoches, are the proven equal to the Cuban tobacco lands.' Isn't that a great deal to say? The rice crop or tobacco crop is all the people of some countries have to depend upon. But the Texan is unwilling to stop with these. 'There is the macaroni wheat that solves the crop proposition for the farmer of the semi-arid belt.' Of course in this Secretary Wilson recounted merely the products added to our lists by experiments inaugurated by the agricultural Department. There are other kinds of wheat, besides corn, oats, barley, rye, Kaffir corn, milo maize. What is it that we cannot raise?

"The forage crop is already great, but as the Secretary says: 'Texas should raise more forage crops and ship finished beeves to the pack-house. There is no section in the United States that offers a better field for diversification with alfalfa than a great many sections of Texas offer. The legumes will all do well in some portion or other

of Texas and there is no part of the State where profitable diversification of crops can not be accomplished. The fruit and truck farming opportunities of the State are unexcelled and offer a good field for diversification.' That is much to say for any country, yet is not half that is said with truth of the vast State in which we live; Secretary Wilson continued:

"I would not say to the Texas farmer that he should raise less cotton. On the other hand, he should raise more. But he should raise other things too. The cotton interests of the State are great, and cotton is a good crop to raise. It is a great staple and there is money to be made in its production. It should be continued along the most improved methods, the boll weevil will be but an incident. I do not expect the weevil to be eradicated, but I do expect that cultural methods and proper selection of seed will render the weevil harmless. The people of Texas should produce better animals. They should not allow any cotton seed meal to be shipped out of the State. This could be accomplished by creating a demand for it at home in finishing beef cattle here, raised on the Texas pastures, and fattened on forage crops and cotton seed meal, all produced in the State. As good cattle can be produced here as are marketed from any feed lots in the United States and produced cheaper. I have fed cotton seed meal to cattle in Iowa and made a profit on them when the meal cost me double what it would have cost the Texas feeder. I had to pay the freight and some profits to dealers that made the cost greater to me. The rice by products, the corn in the corn sections, and the cotton seed meal in the other parts of the State make it possible for this State to place on the market the best beeves in the country at the lowest cost and in the greatest numbers.

"Of course, all the important interests could not be touched upon. Oil, timber and the mineral resources must be added, besides numerous smaller interests and industries that are growing up in various parts of the State. Counted together, in a fairly reasonable and prosperous year, the products of Texas make up an aggregate contribution toward the sustenance and comfort of mankind that has never been equaled by any other country in the world."

The panic quarantine is one part mosquito fever, four parts fear of fever, and five parts graft.—Houston Chronicle.

This is, perhaps, true; but the other ninety per cent is due to the presence of the genuine fever, and the knowledge and wholesome dread by those who have had experience, of what that fever can do when it gets half a start.

THE President has aroused quite a storm of criticism from the democratic members of the U. S. Senate. They do not believe in the encouragement of a revolution, in order to secure the Panama canal. Senator Morgan advises a "vigorous policy of criticism."

PUSH WILL DO IT.

While at Houston the other day, Secretary Wilson, of the agricultural department, took occasion to say that he would have been glad to have made Nacogdoches a visit, but that it was not necessary any way, as the tobacco experiments here had demonstrated to the satisfaction of the government that the soil around Nacogdoches was equal to the best Cuban soil for growing tobacco; that there was sent to Cuba annually from the United States \$8,000,000 for filler tobacco, which our people could have by an effort. Secretary Wilson went from Houston to Dallas and made a speech at the boll weevil convention. The Galveston News of the 7th in a column editorial quotes Secretary Wilson as follows: "The tobacco land of Texas, especially in the vicinity of Nacogdoches, are the proven equal to the Cuban tobacco land." Since the beginning of the experiments by the government to test the quality of our land for tobacco our people have been afraid to expect too much. They have been hearing favorable rumors all along, but were afraid to attach much faith to it until those in authority spoke. Secretary Wilson is a cabinet officer, at the head of all matters pertaining to agriculture. He has spoken. This ought to satisfy the most pessimistic that we have a soil equal to Cuba for growing tobacco. There is no doubt about it now. The Galveston News goes to every State in the Union. These editorials will be read by thousands who have money to invest and who know what a boom this will give this country. This with other interests now centering in and around Nacogdoches will pretty soon put a substantial boom on us. The question up to us is, will we sit still and see others reap all the benefit. Property is lower here than any town in Texas with half the prospects we have. If our men with money do not put it into property at a bargain we will have no one to kick but ourselves when outsiders step in and buy up our homes and vacant lots. Watch our prediction. In less than six months there will be a clamor in this town for property. The fact of the business is, we can't realize what we have here. If you want to hear Nacogdoches boomed, talk to business men who live in Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, Beaumont and other cities. Lets all pull off our coats and push to make Nacogdoches a city of 15,000 in five years. Our people are afraid to hope that it can be done. Outsiders say we have the opportunity it we will push. Lets try it.

NACOGDOCHES believes in giving every body a square deal. Show it by extending a helping hand to the new enterprises and businesses that have sprung up lately. When men are earnestly endeavoring to adapt themselves to new conditions they should be encouraged.

Sondrio, Italy, Sept. 22nd, 1903. Dear Sir: The letter you put in the bale on the 9th of Dec. 1902, got here in Sondrio, Italy, which is a town quite in the North and very close to Switzerland. What is the most peculiar part of it is that the yarn we are to spin out of it is to be sent to Brazil, that is in America again. We will be very glad to know whether you get this letter, and you will oblige us very much if you will send us some illustrated post-cards of your beautiful country, and if possible, some flowers of cotton, as sample-post. AN OIL STRIKE.

Dr. W. S. Fall Gets a Fine Flow at 33 Feet.

From Thursday's Daily: Dr. W. S. Fall, of Stewart, Rusk county, was in the city last night on his return from a week's trip to his old home at Chireno on business. He still owns property in Chireno and has a joint interest in the old Parks place, upon which he has been making some improvements, among them being the cleaning out and deepening of an old well. This well was not producing water and it was decided to dig it deeper. To do this several feet of rock had to be blasted out, and while blasting in the rock a vein of oil was discovered. The flow of oil was sufficient, the doctor reports, to rise and stand about three feet deep in the well. There is not a drop of water in the well, he says, and he can draw oil out by letting down a bucket just like we draw water. He has a lot of the rock that came out of the well, which he is going to exhibit at Dallas, which place he will visit before he returns home. The well in which the oil was discovered is thirty-three feet deep. The strike is creating some excitement and a great deal of interest among the people of Chireno, especially owners of the adjacent lands to the Parks place.

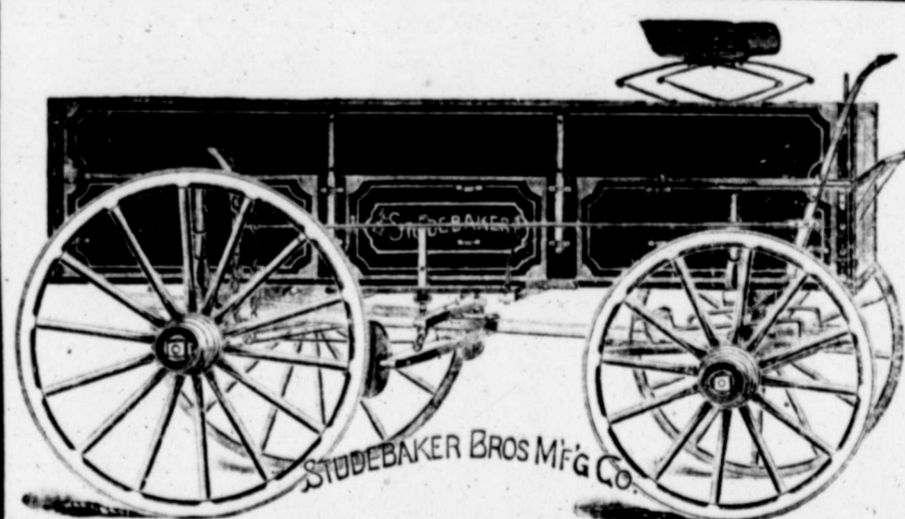

PETITIONS IN BANKRUPTCY.

C. G. Monzingo and Scoggin Bros. Filed Papers Today.

C. G. Monzingo, doing a nursery business, has filed a petition in voluntary bankruptcy, with liabilities aggregating probably \$36,000.

The liabilities to local creditors as listed amounts to about \$26,000, and there is probably due to nurseries from which he had bought his stock about \$10,000.

Among the local creditors are the employes and salesmen, whose salaries and commissions amount to about \$2,500.

There is not a dollar's worth of assets. Some of the liabilities are secured by deeds of trust against every dollar's worth of property owned by the bankrupt. Other paper is secured by personal security, while there is a large amount unsecured. The failure will bring a hardship, even a calamity, on some of his endorsers, all of whom are citizens of the town and vicinity.

The cause of the trouble grew out of the pressing of a claim by the Miller Nursery, of Rome, Ga., amounting to several thousand dollars, for which nearly or quite all the stock Mr. Monzingo had sold for this fall and winter delivery has been held up.

There are equities on about \$20,000 worth of contracts, but under present conditions are considered valueless.

Scoggin Bros., formerly engaged in the saloon business, also filed in voluntary bankruptcy today. Liabilities about \$1,250, with assets to cover.
