of Agriculture Issues Recom mendations on Raising Cotton.

Washington, Jan. 20.—The plans of the Department of Agriculture for the broader experiments in the matter of boll weevil are rapidly being matured and work is to be commenced at once. The department, however, wants every cotton planter in Texas to profit from what has been learned during the past year, and to this end has prepared the following recommenda tions, which it earnestly urges upon the attention of the farmers. The department hopes that the press of Texas will give these recommenda tions the widest possible cir culation. The recommenda tions are as follows:

The work of the division of entomology for several years has demonstrated that there is not even a remote probability that the boll weevil will ever be exterminated. Although the very large yields of cotton of former times may no longer be possible, it is neverthe less entirely feasible to produce cotton at a margin of profit that will compare favorably with that involved in the production of most of the staple crops of the United States by following what have become known generally as the cultural methods. These methods consist of the follow ing changes and modifications of the system of cotton raising made necessary by the weevil. They were originally suggest ed by a careful study of the life, history and habits of the pest, and naturally any im provements that may eventu ally be made will be the result of the continuation of that study. They have now been tested successfully on a large scale by the division of ento mology, as well as by many planters, during two very un favorable seasons. For the most part they are directed towards obtaining an early crop and toward clean farm practice.

1. Plant early. If possible plant seed of the variety known to mature, or at least obtain seed from as far north as possible. It is much bet ter to run the risk of replant ing, which is not an expen sive operation, than to have the crop delayed. The prac tice of some planters of mak ing two plantings to avoid having all the work of chop ping thrown into a short pe riod is a very bad policy from the weevil standpoint.

Under identical conditions early cotton of improved varieties has invariably yield ed from two to three times as much as native cotton under the same conditions, and in many cases much more. Planted at the same time the early varieties begin to bloom from twelve to eighteen days sooner than native cotton.

Early cotton fields of either native or improved varieties have almost invariably yielded twice as much as late planted ones.

The early variety in general having a stalk and a short tap root are adapted only for rich soil. They also frequent ly grow well in the very light, drifting sandy loams of many

of the river valleys of which, in the long seasons before the advent of the boll weevil, often produced the largest yields. In these situa tions early varieties will yield but little more than native cotton.

2. Cultivate the fields thoroughly. The principal benefit in this comes from the influence that such a practice has upon the constant growth and consequent early maturity of the crop. Very few weevils are killed by cultivation. Much of the benefit of early planting is lost unless it is followed by thorough cultivation. In case of unavoidable delayed plant ing, the best course for the planter to pursue is to culti vate the fields in the most thorough manner possible. Three choppings and five plowings constitute a thorough system of cultivation, as is necessary in cases where the land has been previously kept reasonably clear.

3. Plant the rows as far apart as experience with the land indicates is feasible and thin out the plants in the rows thoroughly. On land which in normal seasons will produce from thirty-five to forty bush els of corn, the rows should be five feet apart. Even on poor soil it is doubtful if the dis tance should even be less than four feet.

4. Destroy by plowing up, windrowing and burning all the cotton stalks in the fields as soon as the weevils become so numerous that practically all the fruit is being punctured. This will generally not be later than the first week in October. Merely cutting off the stalk by means of the triangular implement used for that purpose throughout the South is by no means as effective as plowing, because the stumps remaining give rise to sprouts which furnish food until late in the season to many weevils that would otherwise starve. The plowing, moreover, serves to place the ground in better condition for early planting the following spring. In such cases turning cattle into the fields is advisa ble. Aside from amounting to a practical destruction of the plants, grazing of the cotton fields furnishes considerable forage at a time when it is generally much in demand. Nevertheless, cattle should never be turned into cotton fields in which Johnson grass has been started.

5. It is known that at present fertilizers are not used to any considerable extent in cotton producing in Texas. There is, nevertheless, no doubt that there should be; not because the land is poor, but that earlier crops may be procured. At present it is sufficient to call attention to the fact that it has been the uniform experience of experi ment stations and planters in the eastern part of the belt that certain fertilizers, espe cially those involving a large percentage of phosphoric acid, have a strong tendency to wards hastening the maturity of the plants.

### SIXTEEN BUILDINGS BURNED.

South and Southwest Blocks in Garrison Destroyed.

Garrison, Tex., Jan. 28.

Fire broke out on the South side of the public square morning just before 5 o'clock, destroying sixteen build-

ings and as many business concerns; aggregating a loss of about thirty thousand dollars with very little insurance. The fire broke out either in "The Gleaner" office or the lead room of B. L. Jopling & Son, adjoining. Both seemed to catch fire about the same time and it could not be determined in which it originated. No one had been in either building since yesterday evening and it is a mystery as to the cause of the fire.

Following is a list of the losses:

The Gleaner, entire plant, about \$500; no insurance.

Dr. Quillion, building, \$200; no insurance.

Z. B. Garrison, building occupied by A. B. Cole, lawyer, \$150; no insurance. Everything in the building saved.

Reasonover & Read, general merchandise; loss on stock \$4,000; on building, \$350; no insurance.

Garrison & McGuffie, feed store; loss on stock \$1,500; on building, \$700.

J. D. Birdwell, general merchandise; loss on stock about \$200; no insurance.

B. F. Hartt, general merchandise; loss \$2,000; no insurance.

W. F. Shepherd Drug Co.; loss about \$2,000; insured for \$1,500.

H. N. Higginbotham, restaurant; loss about \$100; no insurance.

J. P. Davis, general merchandise; loss on stock \$4,000; on building, \$400; no insurance.

J. A. Kelly, loss on building \$300.

W. D. Nail, loss on building \$250.

The fire burned from the west margin of the right of way of the H. E. & W. T. Ry., on the south side of the square, clear through the south block, and destroying the wooded buildings in the block on the west side clear up to the bank building. The bank building is the first brick with which the fire came in contact, where it was checked without the least damage to the bank or the building.

The men and boys of Garrison worked heroically to check the flames, and quite a number received severe burns, hurts and bruises, but none seriously.

Plans for rebuilding are already being talked, and it is believed that most of them will be replaced with bricks.

### THE WAR IS ON.

Japan Has Blown Up Three of Russia's Big Ships.

An Associated press report from St Petersburg, yesterday says:

"An official dispatch received here says the Japanese torpedo boats attacked the Russian squadron in the outer roads at Port Arthur and three Russian ships were damaged. Admiral Alexieff's official report of the attack by the Japanese is as follows:

"I most respectfully inform your majesty that at about midnight February 8, nine Japanese torpedo boats made a sudden attack by means of mines upon the Russian squadron in the outer roads of Fortress Port Arthur, in which the battleships Retvizin and Cesarevitch and the cruiser Palaga were damaged.

WE have been "spoke to" some more about running for the legislature, and are informed that we are running like an automobile in Angelina, San Augustine and Shelby counties. Haven't heard from Rusk and Cherokee yet.

## HON. D. E. SIMMONS.

Hon. D. E. Simmons, assistant attorney general under the present incumbent, is out for promotion and asks to be elected to the attorney general's office. He has issued a circular letter enunciating his platform, as follows:

1st. I am a Democrat, believe in party organization, and I stand by Democratic demands.

2nd. I am opposed to the issuance of free passes by the railroads.

3rd. I am in favor of local option, and am opposed to the issuance of injunctions by a District Judge to take effect in some other district.

4th. I am in favor of organized labor to meet organized capital, but am opposed to the use of violence or boycott on the part of labor unions or any class to compel a free American citizen to quit any honorable business or employment.

5th. As a lawyer, I have never represented railroads, and have no bias in their favor nor prejudice against them.

I was raised on a farm in Grayson county, which county I had the honor to represent in the 23rd and 24th Legislatures. I am 35 years old, and am a member of the Baptist church; was appointed Office Assistant Attorney General by Hon. Tom Smith which position I have filled for nearly five years. I believe in the enforcement of the law, especially the Anti-Trust law; and if elected Attorney General, will endeavor to execute the laws of Texas, without fear or favor.

Mr. Simmons has baited his hook well for catching votes, and as he is a most worthy young man, and one who has proven his ability to fill the office during his five years service as assistant attorney general, he has a fine chance at securing the prize he covets.

If patrons would visit the schools oftener it would lend encouragement to both teacher and pupil. How often do even the trustees visit the schools of Nacogdoches?

WHEN Mrs. Maybrick secures her final release she will shake the dust of England off her feet and return to America, her native land. She could not be blamed.

EXPLANATIONS in regard to the Kirby Lumber Co. receivership continue to come in. At last it is acknowledged that the Company was short on cash and working capital.

BAILEY lost his fight against the World's Fair loan. The Culberson amendment, which permits Texas cattle to be exhibited, was adopted and the bill authorizing the loan was passed.

BAILEY has but in on the proposed loan of half a Million dollars by congress to the World's Fair, and now there is a fight up in the Senate over the proposition. Bailey urges that it is no concern of the national government as to the success or failure of any exposition. It strikes us that the government ought to be

concerned about such an affair as the St. Louis Exposition. Much depends on the success of this fair as to the good results to this country and the country is the government.

### COOPERATIVE DEMONSTRATION. Railroad Industrial Agents Will Aid Farmers and the Government.

Houston Texas, Feb. 1st, 1904.—A meeting of the Texas Railroad Industrial Agents was held here today at which Dr. S. A. Knapp, special agent of the United States Department of Agriculture, who has charge of the Farmer's Co-operative Demonstration Work in connection with the boll weevil appropriation, explained very clearly and fully the situation and stated his proposed plan of campaign in the boll weevil fight for 1904.

At this meeting Dr. Knapp convinced us that no political influence would be allowed to interfere with his program and he asked for our suggestion, recommendations and co-operation.

During the last two or three years much valuable work has been done in the way of culture methods by experiments carried on under the direction of our A. & M. College, by other scientific institutions and by private individuals and our agricultural papers have frequently printed letters from intelligent cotton planters, who through their particular methods and modes of cultivation, etc., have successfully raised good crops of cotton in spite of the boll weevil.

Dr. Knapp's idea is to furnish this information to all cotton planters who wish to take advantage of the experiments of others and to adopt the methods of cultivation, etc. which have proved most successful. For this purpose he intends to furnish the information by sending intelligent farmers in to each district to provide this instruction to all willing to profit by it.

With this object in view and for the successful carrying out of his plan, you will readily see that it will be a wonderful advantage, if when the Doctor or his agent visits any particular section that they find those who are ready and willing to co operative with them in this work and for this reason I now suggest that as soon as possible you send in the names of prominent farmers, merchants and others in your county or locality whom you think would be willing to give some of their time and assist the Doctor or his representative when they arrive by organizing and otherwise assisting him to carry out his plans among the farmers and cotton growers in each community. After consulting with Dr. Knapp he agrees with me that valuable time can be saved by sending name to him direct.

He is sufficiently well and favorably known throughout the county to make him a strong man should the ticket meet with formidable opposition. He is entitled to a fair and at least an impartial consideration at the hands of the voters in the democratic primaries.

THE deadlock in the Indiana legislature has been broken by electing Hon. Isador Rayner to the United States Senate. Rayner is a Jew, and was the leading counsel for Schley during the great Naval court inquiry.

There is nothing fortuitous in the advancement of such men as R. S. Lovett. It was just as inevitable that he should rise to the top of things as it is that water will seek and find its lowest level, for though it may seem contradictory of terms, the force of gravity works both ways. We speak of luck and opportunity; especially are those of us who have failed prone to blame fortune, but in the careers of men, merit, after all, is the greatest force. Nacogdoches is enjoying a tobacco boom. The Herald can see no reason why old Anderson county could not get into that tobacco industry.—Palestine Herald.

THE report that parties had entered suit for \$3,000,000 worth of lands in the Nacogdoches oil field is the biggest kind of a fake. So is the report that the Kirby Lumber company controls the Nacogdoches oil field. These reports have had a tendency to demoralize things in the Nacogdoches oil field, when in fact they are not in the slightest degree involved.

THE office of R B Hawley, national committeeman of the republican party, at Washington, has been closed up and no farther recommendations will be made for candidates seeking appointment at the hands of the president. It is intimated that there has been a falling out between Roosevelt and Hawley and that the latter will eventually take a hand in opposition to the farmer's nomination for president.

THE joke of a lawyer at the close of his speech before a New York jury cost his client \$15,000. The client was a lady, who had been injured by falling in a hole in the street and had sued the city for \$15,000 damages. She made out a splendid case, but the counsel closed his argument by saying she had made such an interesting invalid from the accident that she had secured a good husband. Moral: Flattery and jokes count the same as evidence before the jury.

THE hotels of Nacogdoches are all crowded to their utmost capacity, an unfailing indication of a cities prosperity. The hotel owners have been compelled lately to make pallets on the floor to accommodate the press of travel. The numbers of people crowding here to make their home, or to prospect, is not the result of a sudden rush, but has gradually and steadily increased in its present proportions, showing that our city's growth is permanent and that both city and county offer unusual attractions to home seekers, business men and capital.

### THE BALTIMORE FIRE.

All the World's Known Fire Record is Broken.

Baltimore, Feb. 8.—The fire is still spreading to new territory.

The fire started yesterday has already exceeded the great conflagration of the year 1871, at Chicago.

To hazard an estimate of the loss is impossible.

At eleven this morning it was thought the fire was under control, but at noon it had spread to the harbor and river front and it is impossible to tell where it will end.

Firemen are fighting but against tremendous odds.

The chamber of commerce and stock exchange buildings have been destroyed.

It has gutted the buildings on the wharves, and along Pratt street it swept away the bridge over Jones Falls and burned into the freight terminals of the Boston & Ohio and Pennsylvania railroads.

All electric power has been destroyed.

Street cars are stopped.

The fire at noon was burning all along the harbor and river front.

The most conservative business men place the losses thus far at \$200,000,000.

The fire swept northward out of its original path to Lexington street, around the court house, the city hall and eastward to Jones Falls, when the wind changed and took the flames down the west of the stream to the water front, along which it is now extending some distance to the west.

A Lutheran church at Broadway and Canton avenue caught fire at 3 a. m. It is over a mile from where the fire originated. West of Charles street and north of Lombard everything has been destroyed, extending as far as Liberty street on the west and Lexington on the north.

At 3 a. m. the fire had burned itself out in that section.

East of Charles street and south of Lombard the fire is still burning freely. Large lumber yards are being destroyed along the west side of Jones Falls, over which the flames are threatening to leap into the heart of East Baltimore, toward the foreign quarters and Canton. On that side of the Falls the people are removing their effects and rushing eastward.

The outside boundaries of the fire, including the burned district, are on the west along Liberty, north to Fayette, south on Charles to Baltimore street, east on Baltimore to Holiday, and from there in spots to center of Market place.

South along Market space is a number of lumber yards, to the water front; the southern boundary is Lombard street, as far east as South street.

It is burned in places as far south as Pratt street. The western boundary is midway between Liberty and Howard streets.

Every newspaper office in the city is destroyed. The fight to save the court house and city hall still continues, with some hopes of success,

although both buildings have been on fire several times.

The court records have all been removed to the Northern police station, two and one-half miles away.

The Continental Trust building, a thirteen-story structure, caught fire at the tenth floor and was totally destroyed. The private bank of Alex Brown, located at Baltimore and Calvert streets, right in the heart of the fire, has escaped destruction. The bank is a one-story stone structure.

So far there has been no expense, the seed being delivered entirely free of cost to the parties for whom they are intended. [Quite a number have already received their share, but there are a majority of them on hand, which if not called for at once will entail an expense of storage which will have to be paid by the person receiving the seed.

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon at about five o'clock and one of the largest gatherings ever seen in the city of the dead assembled to pay the last tribute of respect to the departed.
