CHICAGOANS IN TOBACCO.

Will Increase Acreage As Fast as Land Can be Bought.

Houston Tex., March 24.—Mr. C. F. Taylor of Webb and others of Chicago returned from Austin last night and went to Nacogdoches this evening, where his people have arranged to plant large acreage in tobacco this season. Part of this acreage will be reared under shade. Mr. Taylor states that they base great confidence in Texas-grown tobacco on the report of experts, who were chosen to make the experiments, because of their special qualifications and that after investigation they were so satisfied with the tobacco's fine quality and flavor that they decided to go into the business this year. They will increase their acreage just as fast as they can buy the land upon which it can be grown.

"It is greatly superior to any tobacco that can be grown in any part of the United States," said Mr. Taylor, "and no better reason than this need be given for embarking in the business."

They have purchased about 850 acres to be put into tobacco, an unusually large area for that purpose. They expect to raise the finest tobacco grown. Those who own the largest interests are in Nacogdoches to return here Friday or Saturday. They are there with Expert L. H. Sheller, under whose guidance they are acting.

THE LEAGUE ENTERTAINED.

Miss Alice Webb Becomes An Honorary Member.

Taylor, Webb & Co. have purchased for 8000 dollars a tract of land near Redfield and will raise tobacco. Miss Webb is personally planning to move families from Holland, here to settle. She said that they were asking no money of people here, only the right hand of fellowship and encouragement. So far from asking financial backing, she is prepared to give it, for she stated that whenever we got plans for canning factories or other projects so crystalized that they could be laid before the proper parties intelligently that she could interest capital in them, and that when ever plans for immigration were set on foot, we would find the railroads ready and willing to co-operate to the extent even of bringing the immigrants to the county free.

At the close of Miss Webb's remarks she had the business League roused and enthusiastic. The future of Nacogdoches seemed brighter than ever and every member was determined that the new spirit infused into the League should not be allowed to die out.

Miss Webb was elected an honorary member of the Nacogdoches Business League and will hereafter be associated with all of its plans. A cordial welcome is assured the lady, not alone for the capital and influence at her command but for herself. She is a daughter of the great ship builder Webb, and is, aside from her genius as a promoter, a charming unassuming lady. Miss Webb left this morning for Houston and Beaumont but will be in the city again about Wednesday and will make her home and spend most of her time here in future.

THE ACT OF AN ASSASSIN.

House Fired Into at the Dead Hour Of Night.

From Tuesday's Daily: Ed Logan, a colored man living three miles from town on the lower Logansport road, reported to Sheriff Spradley this morning that someone came to his house last night about bedtime and fired several shots into his house and killed his dog. The party had crept up close to his window, and just as his wife knelt down for bedtime prayer one shot was fired through the window and over her head. The yard dog attacked the intruder and was killed. Logan picked two of the bullets out of the inside wall of the house. The bullets were fired from a 45 calibre pistol.

The tracks of the man were measured where he ran from the house and with these clues Sheriff Spradley has gone out to hunt down the would be murderer. Logan says if he has an enemy, either white or black, he has no idea who he is. Under the law it is burglary to shoot into a dwelling house and if the guilty party is found, he is liable to accompany the large number already sentenced to the pen at this term of court.

A REACTION is setting in in Nacogdoches and she will not be at a "stand still" many days longer.

THE Red Room was evidently darkened during the last conference between Teddy and Booker.

THERE is no use cussing bad roads when no effort is made to improve them. The roads are not to blame.

FLAMING headlines in the "big" dailies say "war reports are conflicting." Indeed they seem to be.

NACOGDOCHES must do her part toward the Texas exhibit at the World's Fair. It takes money and we must help raise it.

AS SOON as the new city council is elected we expect to see the work of marking the streets and numbering houses begin.

THE good roads problem is absorbing the entire nation. In no section is it of more importance than in the cotton growing states.

YET a little while longer, and Nacogdoches will have superior school advantages to offer that she has never possessed before.

IF Lee Blanchette is elected comptroller he will live up to the demands of the democratic platform. So will Sterling P. Strong, if he is elected State treasurer.

CROPS are three weeks earlier throughout East Texas than they were at this date last year. Farmers are now ploughing corn who had not planted this time last year.

NACOGDOCHES is coming out of the woods on the school problem. People in the distance see it and the demand for dwelling houses is increasing on account of the fine school prospects.

THE only absolutely sure way to get good roads is to build them by taxation and with convict labor, under contract. The problem will never be settled until some such plan is adopted.

BOOKER WASHINGTON is going to keep on hobnobbing with Roosevelt until the people down in the South will lose respect for him. He ought to be more cautious of the company he keeps.

THE last prop has been knocked from under the anti of Grayson county by the decision of the United States Supreme Court at Washington, D. C., affirming the constitutionality of the Texas local option law.

THE building boom has struck Houston. Among the numerous new structures planned for the near future is a six story flat to cost about \$80,000. Let the good old town spread herself, for everybody delights in her prosperity.

ORANGE has elected a bond issue of five thousand dollars to be spent in fire protection. Just how the money is to be used is not explained, but it is presumed that it will be spent for water.

BOOKER WASHINGTON, the "mentor," would doubtless be an acceptable running mate to Roosevelt, the "strenuous," should the latter be the republican standard bearer in the coming campaign.

THE fruit crop is reported damaged 25 per cent in some orchards in Cherokee county by the last frost. It is probable that a like damage would be discovered on examination throughout the East Texas fruit belt.

NO GOOD is accomplished by the disfiguring newspaper controversy going on at Austin. The administration is being attacked by one and defended by another, while the opposing editors are wrestling in mud up to their eyes.

IF Nacogdoches had a place to put it it would not be difficult to get an appropriation for a federal building. The post office here will enter the second class in a few weeks, which will entitle us to a federal postoffice building. Where will we put it?

THE sales of the National Biscuit Company for last year, says Printer's Ink, were more than \$40,000,000. The capital stock is \$52,000,000, on which dividends were paid last year amounting to \$2,897,000. That must be a pretty good sized bakery.

THERE is no use for those who love to agitate the question to be charging up the violations of the liquor laws in Rusk and Cherokee counties to prohibition. In some of the dark corners of these two counties bootlegging and illicit distilling has been going on ever since the war, as the criminal records will show.

THERE is danger of Booker T. Washington, the colored philanthropist getting his head turned by too much contact with President Roosevelt. Heretofore Washington has commanded the highest respect and esteem from both colors in the South. He will check his usefulness by mixing up in politics and will lose out in the end.

THE Iron guards, Rusk's military company, is receiving new guns, new uniforms, etc., and new armory equipments from the government to replace those lost by the burning of the Acme hotel, in which everything belonging to the company was burned. The government is making the loss good without expense to the company.

WHAT is the status of the title to the grounds upon which the proposed central school building is to be erected? What have the various boards, committees, etc., done toward making the proper transfers? This is a little piece of business that must be transacted in a timely and legally before the work can progress much farther.

ON last Monday night a party of Bohemians were attacked, beaten and robbed and one of them killed by negroes near Montgomery, Texas. One of the negroes was caught immediately after the killing and later was hanged by a mob. Two other negroes have been arrested but the lynchers seemed satisfied with lynching the first one caught and no further trouble followed.

WHY should Booker Washington and Roosevelt busy themselves to stop lynchings in the South and ignore the negro in the North? Is not the question the same wherever the colored brother exists? There should be a deeper motive than vote getting in their display of sympathy, and what is good for the negro in the South will apply to the negro in the North. The lynching of negroes for heinous offenses is not confined to democratic sections.

IT seems that the mayor and recorder's office cannot be filled by the same person. If that is the case, The Sentinel desires to place in nomination E. C. Branch, Esq., for mayor, a man who is eminently qualified to honor the position, and one whose public spirit, enterprise, energy and tireless efforts in the advancement of the public interest and progress of Nacogdoches entitles him to the confidence of the people as well as the highest honor we can bestow upon him. He is not a candidate nor an office seeker, but his patriotism and regard for duty would force him to accept, should he be chosen for the place. Do we hear a second?

THERE will be a constitutional amendment submitted to the voters of Texas at the next general election to authorize communities, cities and counties to issue bonds for road improvements, levying against overflows, etc. The people should study up on this subject and be prepared to vote intelligently when the time comes. There will be a campaign of education upon the question and those counties that have suffered from overflow have organized an association for the purpose of making a vigorous effort to prevent this proposed amendment from meeting the fate the irrigation amendment met a few years ago.

THE national prohibition party has indicated to Gen. Nelson A. Miles a desire to make him its standard bearer in the coming national election, to which the General has courteously answered advising the party not to nominate a candidate for president until after the "two great political parties of nearly equal strength" have made nominations and announced their platforms. If it be possible for the temperance party to do it, he advises that it support the nominees of either party that will build a platform and make nominations that will command its approval. There is a chance here for one or both old parties to put in a bid for this vote.

HEARST has launched a daily newspaper in Boston. There is no city in the United States where a progressive, fearless newspaper was more of a necessity nor where there was greater opportunity for broad-minded Americanism. When Hearst gets properly at work the fanatical South-haters will have to seek a more congenial abiding place or be eventually suppressed by exposure and ridicule.—Beaumont Journal.

TEDDY and Booker were closeted till the wee sma' hours of morn a few nights ago at the White House. No white man was ever thus honored by a midnight conference with the president. But then, on reflection, we are reminded that there was a dark subject before the president on this occasion. Teddy and Booker are going to stop the lynching of negroes south of the Mason and Dixon line. Lynchings North of said line were not discussed.

THE extravagance of the Roosevelt reign is being criticized by the press generally and his demand for new stables has precipitated the storm, but much of the money spent has been on permanent repairs and improvement in the White house, of which his successor will reap the benefit as well as himself. Let justice be done though the heavens fall. If the White house stables are unhealthy and old fashioned they should be rebuilt. That does not alter the fact that it takes a lot of money to float a yacht, and that if the president's yacht had not exasperated the tax payers no row would have been raised over the proposed stables, for every true American is a natural lover of horses and wants them properly cared for.

ROOSEVELT has given his adviser and family friend, Booker T. Washington, assurance that in the event of his election to the presidency he will suppress lynching of negro rape hends no matter what the cost of blood and treasure. The crime for which negroes are generally lynched in the South appears to have not been mentioned by either Roosevelt or Washington during the exchange of social courtesies in the president's private bedroom where the pledge above was voluntarily given. It is not probable, however, that Roosevelt will have opportunity to fulfill his pledge, and if he should be elected president he will find the Southerners prepared to protect their women with their lives.—Beaumont Journal.

BUFFALO BILL is suing his wife for a divorce at Denver, Colorado. He alleges that his wife, on various occasions attempted to poison him and that she was persistently discourteous to his guests. The other side of the case has not been presented, but The Sentinel will wager a week's subscription that his guests were usually a cavayard of carousing cow-punchers, whose company was unfit for the presence of a lady. "Mrs. Cody tried to poison me three years

ago," the colonel testified. "She had frequently threatened to do it. We were visiting Rochester, N. Y., during the holidays of 1900 and the day after Christmas I was ill. I supposed the turkey and plum pudding did not agree with me. She said she would fix me up. She pretended to give me medicine. It was poison. It almost finished me, for I was unconscious for some time, I think it must have been an overdose, for it made me vomit and I suppose this saved my life." We'll bet the old boozer was on a Christmas drunk.

THE Batson oil field is reputed to have yielded over 4,000,000 barrels of oil. It is to be regretted that salt has made its appearance in some of the wells, as this will probably give trouble every time a well is sunk to anything beyond the usual depth, and will doubtless eventually injure many of the wells now yielding handsomely.—Sabine News.

JUDGE M. M. BROOKS will be before the people as a candidate for re-election as one of the judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals. He stands among lawyers as a man of the finest legal attainments, of the highest sense of honor, and of incorruptible integrity. His course on the bench has shown that he holds the laws of the state sacred, and uses every proper effort to safeguard the interest of the people. All good citizens and lovers of order will do themselves a kindness to see that he is re-elected to the position he has filled so ably.—Rusk County News.

Land Owning Negroes.

Forty years ago the negroes of the South did not own a square foot of ground nor roof to cover them. Now, on the other hand, there are 130,000 farms owned by negroes, valued at \$350,000; 150,000 homes outside the farm township, valued at \$265,000,000, and personal property valued at \$165,000,000. So, starting from nothing, here is an accumulation of nearly \$800,000,000. When the work began not 1 per cent of the negro adults of the South could read or write. Today 40 per cent can do so.—Indianapolis (Ind) State Sentinel.

THE above is not to be put aside by some slight remark about the inferiority of the negroes. It addresses itself to the thoughtful as a matter of serious consideration. Just what its full meaning may not be so evident at once. We cannot blame the negro for acquiring property if he has the ability to do that; we can not blame him for increasing in intelligence as rapidly as he can, we do not blame him for progressing on any line open to him; but does his advancement in all or any of these lines diminish or increase the fiction between the races? We believe it increases it. Then how are the two races to dwell together? This to our mind is one of the dark problems that confront this country, and ever growing darker.—Rusk County News.

THE Small Factory. One of the greatest needs of Texas today is the small factory. Thousands of dollars are lost every year by the products of farms going to waste for the want of a nearby market. While bulding up packeries for the cattle, sheep and hogs, remember that it is just as necessary to have factories for farm products. The agricultural interests of this State stand side by side with the live stock interest. In preparing to get home markets for one, why not for the other?

TEXAS has made a fine start in cotton and rice mills and along other lines, but it is a mere start. There are yet millions of raw product going East and manufactured goods coming back with the addition of freight charges both ways. But it is not the big mill to which The Post now refers. Small and varied industries are what make for general employment and prosperity.

THERE should be canneries in all districts where truck farming is an important industry. This would save the fruits and vegetables from waste and enable Texans to use their own canned goods instead of buying from other States that have no advantage of us except in the shrewdness to establish factories.

THIS is a matter of no small importance, and it will be well to give the subject of factories a place on the program of farmers' institutes. It will be well for country papers to take up the cry. We make no mistake in naming it one of the greatest needs of the State—we make no mistake in saying that it would be the means of extracting wealth out of waste.—Houston Post

NACOGDOCHES is now planning the construction of a \$5,000 school building and plans for the same are being submitted to architects. Nacogdoches is rapidly coming to the front as one of the best cities in East Texas. The writer was raised in old Nacogdoches county and will always have a tender regard for the people who live there. All the harm we wish Nacogdoches is that she may get everything she goes after.—Orange Tribune.

REVISE your "figgers," Fuller. Nacogdoches has already adopted plans for one \$25,000 and two \$5,000 school buildings. She is going to build a five thousand dollar house for the colored schools. Thirty-six thousand five hundred dollars will be spent on school buildings here this year. Be sure to revise those figures in the very next issue of The Tribune.

THE Sour Lake Oil News recites that the latest rumor relative to the Beaumont Sour Lake line and its early completion, is to the effect that the International & Great Northern railway is back of the move; that the management of the road has guaranteed the tie contractors that pay for the ties will be forthcoming as fast as the ties are gotten out. U. P. Darnell & Co. have contracted to get out 30,000 ties.—Sabine News.

THREE WEEKS EARLIER.

Tomato and Peach Outlook Flattering at Present.

Jacksonville Banner:

Tomato plants are earlier than ever before known. Most of them are already in the field, and are growing right along. They have not had a single backset from the time they first poked their noses out of the ground. Nothing short of a heavy frost, a hard freeze, a hail storm or the visitation of some insect pest can now stand in the way of a good crop. The fact that the acreage has been considerably reduced from last year, amounting to perhaps 25 to 33 1-3 per cent, and the further fact that the crop is at least three weeks earlier than ever before known, adds encouragement to the growers, who have good reason to hope for favorable returns. The crop last year was a failure from every standpoint, and a more opportune time for a successful season never existed.

The peach crop is practically uninjured. There was a slight frost damage about ten days ago, but it amounts to hardly anything. Most of the trees are loaded with fruit, and considerable thinning will have to be done. Peaches have begun to form, and thousands can now be found as large as the end of your finger. A heavy freeze might kill the crop, but as the days go by the probabilities of such a disaster are lessened and the resisting power of the fruit crop itself is increased.

The acreage in fruit has increased wonderfully since our last successful season, two years ago, and shipments this year bid fair to almost double those of any previous season. Judging from the present outlook there will be busy times in Jacksonville from the middle of May to the last of August.

Damage to Fruit.

Alarming reports have been in circulation during the last few days regarding the dam-

age to fruit from the frost of Sunday night, the 13th. The matter has been thoroughly investigated, and the result is as follows:

A few orchards, located on low ground, show damage, the loss in some instances running as high as 25 per cent. A great majority of the orchards, fully ninety per cent, we should judge, are unhurt, and if the weather continues favorable from this date the trees will have more fruit on them than they can take care of, and a great deal of thinning will be necessary.—Jacksonville Banner.

District Court.

From Friday's Daily:

In the second case against Cal Scott, on charge of assault to murder, the jury returned a verdict yesterday afternoon, finding Scott guilty and assessing his punishment at three years in the penitentiary. This makes an aggregate of five years in the two cases tried. Both cases will be appealed.

Jim Rigeway, who was given fifty years for attempted criminal assault, was tried yesterday for robbery and given five more years in the penitentiary. The robbery was committed by taking the pistol belonging to Jailer Sloan at the time Ridgeway broke jail and was recaptured.

The grand jury to date has returned sixty-three bills of indictment; three for murder, fourteen for other felonies and forty-six for misdemeanors.

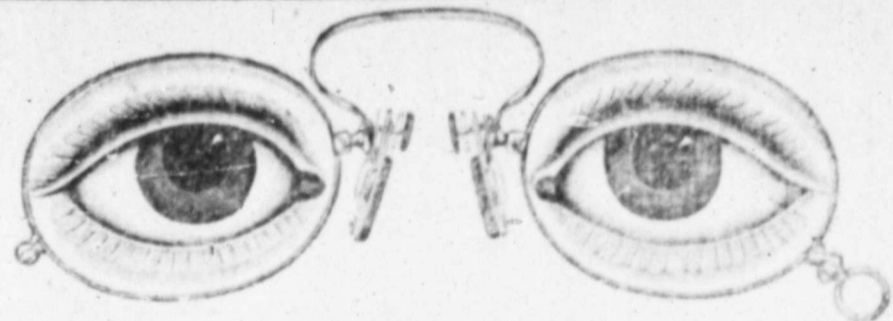

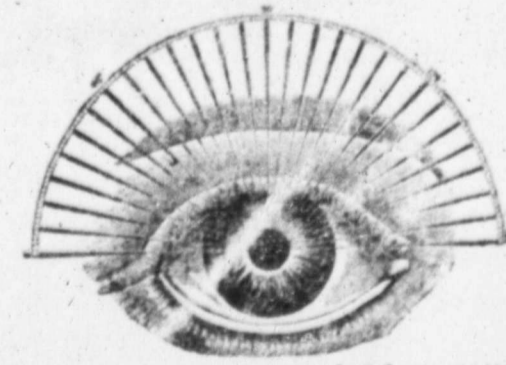

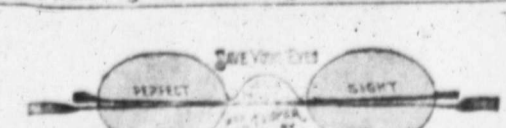

SUNDAY'S report said Port Arthur was corked, while on Monday it was reported that "the cork is still out." The bottling process in the far East is peculiar.

EDITOR FORD, of the Timpson Times, is now getting his toll from his neighbors' gardens and boasts of four varieties of vegetables at a time from these bounties.

CORRESPONDENTS who want their contributions to escape the waste basket are warned to write on one side of the paper only, and to leave off the discussion of candidates.

WIND, rain and hail storms have done a tremendous amount of damage in nearly every section of the country the past week. In many places life and property have been destroyed.

HON. ARTHUR LEFEVRE put his foot in it when he jumped on the newspapers and backwoods trustees. If those two elements join forces in opposition to him his chances will be gloomy for re-election.

THERE is not the slightest damage reported from the frosts of the past week in East Texas. The claim that March frosts never do any serious harm is holding good so far.

THE total number of commercial bales of cotton raised in Texas for 1903, according to the government bureau report of March 25th, is 2,562,632 bales. A comparison with the crop of 1902, shows a decrease of only 26,932 five hundred pound bales.

THE fruit and truck growers are again reminded that they should all be in attendance at the meeting to be held next Saturday. This is a regular convention and it is important that the full membership, as well as all others interested should be present.

THE New York Times is very much worried over "Hearst's active chase after votes" and thinks it is doing the democratic party much injury. It may be so, but this active vote chasing is no new thing, and certainly is not confined to democratic candidates for president.

COL. JAS. H. JONES died at his home in Henderson last week. He was once congressman from the 3rd district and was during his prime of life one of the foremost lawyers of East Texas. Owing to his advanced age he had been practically retired from public life for many years prior to his death.

NEPOTISM IS UNDEMOCRATIC.

Beaumont Enterprise.

In a recent letter from an influential democrat he says: "I see that certain parties in Austin are engaged in a crusade against Gov. Lanham and the present state administration. In my opinion they are engaged in pitting straws against a very strong wind, the fight will not amount to anything. Lanham was nominated and elected governor, by the democratic party of Texas, and to them alone is he responsible. The fact that he is accused of nepotism by some one with possibly a very dull ax to grind, will cut no figure. If I was an official and needed help in my office, if a kindman were competent and respectable, I should certainly prefer him to an outsider." All of which goes to show that many members and leading ones too of the democratic party of Texas, either don't know that the platform of the party contains a plank that specifically condemns nepotism or they do not care for platform pledges. It they are ignorant of the fact that the party condemns nepotism all right; they can soon learn it, but if they wish to ignore the plank let it be cut out of the platform, there is no necessity for continuing to affirm an untruth. At the next state convention the whole matter should be fully aired and discussed and will be unless the usual performance of some big gun's sitting on the safety valve takes place. The game of choke off is successfully played at nearly every convention when the investigation of the short coming of those in power is suggested.

THE prediction of Mr. Branch that Nacogdoches may become a city of ten thousand persons within a few years is not an impossible thing. Towns have grown more rapidly than that in Texas, and none are more favorably situated for such a possibility than Nacogdoches. All we have got to do is to go to work and make her grow.

MAYBANK, a very small new town on the T. & N. O., between Athens and Kaufman, has secured a \$300,000 cotton mill by putting up \$30,000 in cash and fifty acres of land. If a little town like that can secure such a prize, it ought to be "dead easy" for a city like Nacogdoches, yet the same proposition has been turned down here.

EVERY voter should familiarize himself with the new election law. It is too voluminous to be published in the newspapers, yet it is important that voters should know something about it. The law that governs the general election applies just the same in primary elections. No voter subject to poll tax can vote in either primary or general election without displaying his poll tax receipt or making affidavit that same has been lost. No candidate nor his friend can approach nearer than one hundred feet of the polls with the voter. Each voter must make out

his own ticket and the ticket must be supplied him by the judge of the election with the signature of said judge on the back of it. The judge or clerk of the election may assist the voter in making out his ticket in case the latter cannot read and write, but it must be done under certain provisions. The main thing is to always be armed with your poll tax receipt. It is easy to do the rest if the voter has taken that precaution.

THE big black bugs that so much resemble an overgrown boll weevil and have created some alarm by their existence in such vast numbers throughout East Texas, have been classed as the German Spehnophorus and are not considered destructive. This information has been received by Capt. Jno. S. Doughtie from the State entomologist, to whom he had written concerning these bugs, sending a number of them to the department.

THE proposition of Taylor, Webb & Co., the Chicago real estate people and capitalists, to put two hundred thrifty farmers in this community at once, is a matter that should interest every one in Nacogdoches and every citizen should co-operate with this firm in the effort to secure homes for these people at reasonable prices. The growth and progress of this section is being retarded by extortionate prices, as well as fickleness of land owners.

SUCH talks as that made by Miss Webb before the business League Saturday night are certainly promotive of inspiration and encouragement among our people. With the co-operation asked, and which is due to everyone engaged in her line of work, this good lady will achieve wonders in the advancement of local enterprise. She has offered her means to this end and only asks the hand of welcome and encouragement in return. To refuse her the support she asks is to turn the back of the hand to golden opportunity.

JUDGE MIDDLEBROOK says he is going to file suit against K. Lamity for insinuating that Nacogdoches has been sending poker players to the legislature. The Sentinel is ready to apologize for K. He was not acquainted with the Judge and takes it for granted that all legislators play poker. The rule will not apply to such men as Crossland, Watkins, Ingraham, Lewis, Skillern, Calhoun and Middlebrook, who have served this district respectively during the past fifteen years.

AND now comes Yantis, of the Athens Review, and pleads guilty to the charge of Hon. Arthur Lefevre, that "newspapers of today present an excellent field of ignorance and illiteracy." He says there is too much truth in the charge to make it an unpardonable offense, and closes a lengthy editorial with the following parting shot, "Grant Mr. Lefevre should have said all he is charged with saying, yet if he has shown himself to be a broad gauged man

and that he has succeeded in raising the standard of the teacher's profession, the efficiency of the schools, he ought not to be defeated for re-election at this time." The Sentinel is not concerned about defeating Mr. Lefevre, but it has doubts about the broad gauge of a man who will make such an attack upon the newspapers of Texas, and is not ready to lick the hand that lashes the press. Unless formal denial or apology is offered, and more courtesy is shown newspaper men than has heretofore been received from him, the newspapers of Texas are certainly to be excused for not being interested in Mr. Lefevre's re-election. The Sentinel speaks for its own observation.

THE pension bureau at Washington is submerged with applications for pensions and inquiries as to how to proceed. These applications are coming in at the rate of one thousand a day. Uncle Sam is now paying more in pensions on account of a war that ended nearly forty years ago than France spends in maintaining an army of 550,000 men. In 1865 we were paying \$8,525,153 in pension. Now we are paying \$158,155,342 per annum, and there is talk of including all teamsters hired during the war, whether they served a day or a year, and the pension roll will probably increase the amount to more than \$225,000,000 a year. There are now 999,443 persons drawing pensions, with no prospects of a limit to the increase.

SEVERAL weeks ago when "Ingomar" was played in this city, there were many inquiries as to the author. It was well known that Maria Lovell had translated it from the German for the English stage, but no one remembered the name of the writer. We ran across the desired information in the Washington Post of last Sunday and take pleasure in reproducing it. The gentleman's name was Baron E. F. J. von Munch Bellinghausen, and he wrote under the pen name of Frederick Halm. It is no one's fault that the name of the author of that great drama "Ingomar" is not more generally known, no one could expect a name like his to become a household word.

IN the course of Col. Wortham's speech last week he related a dream concerning Mr. Dixon. He said that he dreamed that he had died and gone to Heaven. Everything looked nice and comfortable, just about what he would have expected to see in Heaven, but he noticed several people wearing a ball and chain. "How's this Peter?" he asked the guardian at the gate. "Have these people done wrong in Heaven that they are punished?" "Oh, no," was the careless response "They are just some folks that Sam Dixon has been talking to about Nacogdoches and I had to chain them to keep them from breaking out and going there." There is no moral to this story. To those living in the county, or to those who come from the

frozen North to visit, it seems like a perhaps slightly exaggerated but natural fact, even if the mercury does drop to fifty and make the open roses droop a little.

THE Galveston-Dallas News will issue a Texas Almanac about May 1st next, giving a brief history, geography, description by county and the progress and prospects of the State. The book will contain about 400 pages and will be replete with useful information, statistic, etc. It will also contain a number of half-tone illustrations. The publication is destined primarily to furnish the home seeker and investor with detailed information concerning each of the counties, in order that when interested in the State as a whole he may be assisted in the selection of a location for settlement or investment. The book is being printed especially for circulation during the World's Fair at St. Louis.

For Tax Collector.

The announcement of W. J. Grimes appears in the announcement column for the office of tax collector of Nacogdoches county, subject to the action of the democratic primaries. Mr. Grimes is a plain farmer, was raised on a farm and has followed farming all his life. This however, has not kept him from keeping himself informed on public matters, or qualifying himself for public service. He is a man of good intelligence, practical education and business qualifications, and he is fully qualified for the duties of the office he seeks. He has been before the people before and is no stranger to the voters of the county. He asks a favorable consideration at the hands of the voters, promising faithful service and an untiring effort in the full discharge of duty if elected.

The son of W. J. Grimes, of Melrose was bitten by a mad dog early this morning at his home in Melrose. The boy on going out to the lot to feed the stock, was jumped at by the dog and bitten two or three times on the leg, and also on the arm and entirely through the right hand. The dog which belongs to a neighbor, was undoubtedly rabid, as it had been bitten about ten days ago by a suspected dog, and had been kept up, but had escaped. Mr. Grimes brought his son to Nacogdoches at once, and after a short delay proceeded through the country to Alto, where there is a mad stone.
