HAYWARD MILL NOTES.

One Mile Of Steel Laid on the Nacogdoches Southeastern.

The massive frame work for the heavy machinery at Hayward mill has been completed and the work of putting machinery in position has already begun.

The foundations have been laid for the big brick dry kilns, which are to be made fire proof.

The mill lake has filled up again to about the depth it had reached when it broke a few weeks ago. The dam has been strengthened so that it is not apt to break again, even with another of those "unprecedented" rains.

Nearly a mile of steel rails have been laid on the railroad, which extends it to the first bridge to be built. The steel cannot be laid any further until a pile driver can be built and put into operation to drive the piling for the bridges. This will suspend the track laying for a week or such a matter.

The grade has been leveled up for three or four miles out, and the ties have been placed in position, but there are several gaps yet to be completed on the grade before it is entirely completed for ten miles out as has been stated heretofore.

The first locomotive engine for the new road is now on the way, having already been shipped from the factory at New York. It will probably be here by the time the pile driver is completed and will be put to a construction train immediately when the track laying will begin again with renewed vigor.

Rev. D. Hewit preached an able sermon Sunday and Rev. G. W. Jefferson preached for us at night.

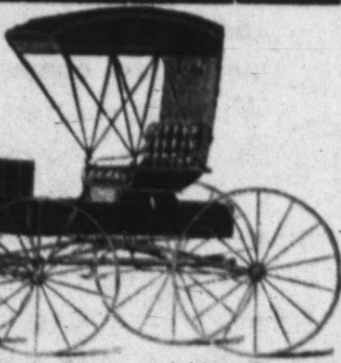
There will be preaching here on the 1st Sunday in June.

THE Beaumont Parker club organized Monday night by electing Hon. J. F. Keith president and Eugene A. Wilson Esq., Secretary.

The Sentinel is authorized to announce A. J. Spradley for re election to the office of sheriff of Nacogdoches county, subject to the democratic primaries of July 9th next. Mr. Spradley needs no introduction to the people. He is at present absent from the county and his request to announce him today comes by letter. When he returns he will probably have something to say concerning his announcement and giving reasons for his change of politics. He has served the people of Nacogdoches county a long time and his record as an officer is before the people. The Sentinel has opposed him in many elections because of political differences, not as an officer. His return to the democratic fold eliminates those differences and if he secures the democratic nomination the Sentinel will certainly not oppose his election. We are glad of the prospect of absolute harmony and that the day of bitter political fighting is past. The doors of democracy have been opened for the return of the prodigals. Let them return and, while we feel under no obligations to kill the fatted calf, nevertheless we find pleasure in extending the hand of welcome.

WE would think a whole lot more of that fellow at Beaumont who has used so much space in the Houston Post and Galveston News talking up the Nacogdoches oil boom if he would just "deliver the goods." We are dead anxious to see an oil boom "what is the rale thing" break out in Nacogdoches. The oil is here. All we need is somebody to furnish the boom.

THE sixty year old dowager countess of Ravensworth, Mrs. Georgiana Denman, has turned society topsy turvy by marrying her twenty-eight year old coachman, James Wadsworth. But what if the world does scoff, so long as James and Georgiana are happy with each other.

E. J. He came to America when fifteen years of age, and became a sailor by enlisting in the service of the U. S. navy after being captured as a Confederate soldier. He died in London, Monday at age of 64.

SALES DAYS.

THE following from the specials to the Post from McGregor, Texas, is interesting and might be a good to adopt in Nacogdoches.

"The board of trade of this city pulled off its first "trade and sales day" Monday. Early in the day the streets began to fill with country people and visitors from neighboring towns. By noon several hundred visitors were here with fine stock and poultry of every description.

At 2 p. m. a grand parade of fine stock, fine drivers and saddlers and trades displays, headed by McGregor's fine band, marched through the principal streets of the city and to the big tabernacle, where premiums were awarded for most everything from an ugly dog to finest horses.

The board of trade proposes to celebrate the third Monday of each month in this manner. The people are repaid by a liberal distribution of money prizes."

The Sentinel suggests that the business league take up the idea and give it consideration. Its adoption would no doubt encourage stock improvements and progressiveness generally among the farmers and bring large crowds to town on stated days set apart for trading and selling as is shown by McGregor's experience.

THE following extract from a special to the Galveston News from Crowley, La., is good news, and we Nacogdoches folks are holding the gates wide open for the return of all those visitors who are interested in the development of the Nacogdoches oil field. The excerpt says: "Several prominent Jennings oil men have interested themselves in the developments in the new Nacogdoches (Tex.) field. This new field has recently sprung into prominence, and those who have recently visited there are authority for the statement that it will cut an important figure in oil dealings before any great length of time." We are ready to cut the figure. "All hands up; swing around."

HOMER DOTSON has accepted the challenge to meet Steve King on the stump, and they say they are going to have a good time and lots of fun. The Sentinel man, who is also a candidate for Representative is agin' "stumping" and declines to make the rounds with them. We are not indifferent in this matter, but we are not out for a frolic nor for fun. As an editor we have been speaking out and telling where we stand for 27 years, and are still telling it to over two thousand readers of The Sentinel once a week. It costs a good deal to lay down one's work in a busy time and go out campaigning. For two years' service a Representative in the Texas legislature gets about five hundred dollars. A poor man, and one who has to hustle 365 days and a few minutes and seconds over each year to make ends meet cannot afford to sacrifice his time for this kind of an office. These young men say that they have

nothing else to do and are running for the office for pastime. It is different with us. We are willing to serve as a legislator because there is expenses in it during the term of actual service—but nothing more. We are not out for pastime, nor to kill time. We stated at the outset that we would not "scramble" for the office; that we were opposed to stump-speaking; that we believed too many "orators" have already been elected to the legislatures; that we favor shorter sessions, more work and less "hot air" in the legislature, and we are still running on that platform.

Cooks are often accused of want of method, but the Aunt Dinah in Howard Paul's new egg story is not open to any such reproach. Invariably when she put the eggs in the saucepan she began singing "Rock of Ages," and sang through two verses: "Aunt Dinah," asked Mr. Paul, "are there not three verses in that hymn?" "Dar is, massa, but I sings only two when I wants 'em soft and three when I wants 'em hard."—Jacksonville Banner

That plan might work some times, but we know some people whose singing would jar the eggs till they addled.

THE Sentinel promised to furnish the "hot air" for a big barbecue. Charlie Clark and Jim Christian promised to hustle up the fresh meats. Who'll do the rest? Let's be at it.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

WHO said anything about eloquence? We meant "hot air" strictly, and intend to keep up such a heat that the people will have to come across with that barbecue or be roasted alive.

K Lamity Bonner seems to have imbibed an awful amount of enmity for Lee Blanchette. We don't understand why it is, unless K wants Lee to put up some to hush him up. He says Lee is a rich man and that he furnishes the "mon" to run State Topics, which latter statement is a base falsehood, and we suppose he thinks he can make Lee "shell out" to hush him up. But since his sudden change of sentiment in regard to the state administration, every sensible person understands that K views upon any subject political are largely subject to modification by pecuniary considerations and are not therefore worth much.—Athens Review.

Much as we regret to see the unwarranted attacks of K Lamity upon our friend Blanchette, The Sentinel believes the Review is equally unwarranted in its attacks upon Bonner. There is too much venom in Bonner's tirade against Blanchette to render it of any service to Blanchette's opponent, and if he is getting anything out of Stephens for it it is a regular hold up. The same may be said with reference to Blanchette and State Topics.

THE HAYWARD ROAD.

Six Cars of Steel Have Arrived for the Track.

THERE are now six car loads of steel rails on the side track at the Hayward mill ready to go to the front. The cross ties have been placed in position for a distance of five or ten miles out on the new railroad, the Nacogdoches and Southeastern, and in a few days track laying will begin with a rush. The first ten miles will be in operation within a short while and the road will be pushed rapidly on to the oil field, about sixteen miles from this city. The vast body of timber holdings of the Hayward people lie from the oil wells eastward, extending clear over into San Augustine county, and within the year the new road will penetrate far into their timbered possessions, and will probably be extended on a distance of about twenty-five miles to intersect with the Cotton Belt, which runs across the Southeast corner of Nacogdoches county.

BROTHER Haltom of the Nacogdoches Sentinel has been halting between two opinions as to Hearst and Parker. He now "hobbles" across, and "jines" the Parker aggregation of political acrobats and "lotty tumbler." We congratulate Brother Haltom on looping the political loop. CONCERNING PRIMARIES.

Including the election there will be several democratic primaries held during the next six weeks. The chairman of the County Executive committee has requested the precinct chairman to hold primary conventions on June 4th to elect delegates to the county convention on June 11th, which will elect delegates to the State convention on June 21st. The San Antonio convention will elect delegates to the National democratic convention at St. Louis July 6th, to nominate candidates for president and vice-president of the United States.

On July 9th the primary elections will be held throughout the county for the purpose of thinning candidates to "two in a hill." On the 16th, or Saturday following the primaries, the county executive committee will meet in Nacogdoches for the purpose of officially counting the vote and declaring the result of the primary election. Then on the last Saturday in July, which will be the 30th, the election will be held to decide between the two candidates having received the highest vote in the preceding primary, for the final democratic nomination. The executive committee will meet again on the first Saturday in August, which will be the 6th day of the month, for the purpose of counting the vote and declaring the final result.

On the day of the first primaries, July 9th, the precinct chairman will hold primary conventions for the purpose of electing their chairman for the ensuing two years, and at the county convention on August 6th, a county chairman will be elected to serve the ensuing two years.

This explains the various dates and purposes of the primary elections and conventions, as The Sentinel can best understand them, and it would be well for all interested to paste them up in some convenient place for handy reference during the campaign.

JUST WHAT TEXAS NEEDS.

Mississippi's new vagrant law has gone into effect and labor over there is more plentiful than ever before. From all accounts it is the severest of its kind ever enacted. The day it went into effect there was a general exodus from the cities and towns, and the "scalawag" population swooped down upon the farms like grass-hoppers in Kansas or Japs in Manchuria. One of the strongest features of the law is that it punishes and suspends from office all officers who fail to enforce it to the letter. It includes not only the customary type of vagrant, but covers all undesirable persons, such as are usually found in every community; those who have no visible means of support, gamblers, women of ill-repute, illicit dealers in liquors, those who are able to work and do not, but hire out their minor children, and men who abandon wife and children. Texas wants this law; and the man who serves in the next legislature can make a record on which he can claim re-election if he will procure a copy of the Mississippi Act and push it to the dignity of a Texas law. There are entirely too many able bodied people lying around doing nothing. They must eat, and it therefore stands to reason that other people feed them.—Willis Saxon.

If ever we get elected to the legislature, we are going to procure a copy of the Mississippi law, if we have to go all the way to Jackson to get it, and if we don't get it passed by the Texas legislature there will be some mighty tired members in that body before we quit trying.

The Baptist Standard, published at Dallas and formerly edited by Dr. Cranfill, has been sold to Hon. Geo. W. Carroll, of Beaumont, and Dr. J. H. Gambrell has been appointed editor. Cranfill retired as editor of the paper after the recent encounter between himself and Dr. Hayden. Dr. Gambrell has the confidence of the Baptists of Texas and his appointment to this position is hailed with pleasure. He is able both as

an editor and a minister. He was formerly pastor of the Baptist church at Tyler and is quite well known in East Texas.

The young lady, Miss Freddie Luker, whose announcement as a candidate for county clerk of Houston county has attracted so much attention among the press of Texas, has withdrawn from the race. She was being supported by the Grapeland Messenger, and an opinion from the attorney general has been published declaring her eligible to the office should she be elected.

According to the estimate of Latham, Alexander & Co., bankers and cotton merchants of New York, the total acreage of cotton this year will be a little over 31,000,000 acres against 28,907,000 last year. The acreage of Texas and the territories this year is estimated at 10,042,920, against 9,298,000 last year, an increase of nearly a million acres, or about 8 per cent.

If the Sentinel man has any hobby at all, in case he should even serve the people in the legislature, it is for more effective laws against vagrancy and pistol toting. These laws are all right now, as they appear in the statutes, but there is something needed to compel their enforcement.

The sales day idea is bound to be a good thing. Let one day in each month be set apart for this purpose, clear everything else off the square and invite everybody who has anything to sell or swap to be in it on that day. It would make things lively at least once a month.

The South will be solid for any candidate against Roosevelt. What the democrats must do is to nominate a man who can beat him in the doubtful states.

The woods are full of candidates now. They are all on the move and will keep the bushes shaking for the next six weeks.

The farmers of East Texas are needing rain. The red lands in particular are getting dry and the ground in places is too hard for ploughing.

King's Rejoinder.

Editor Sentinel:

In view of the editorial which appeared in Friday's Sentinel, touching upon the race for Representative, desire to say a few words.

In the first place I have issued no challenge to either of my opponents, and with the courtesy that I felt was due my opponents I extended them an invitation to appear with me before the people if they so desire.

In appearing before the people publicly I do so neither for "pastime" or for "fun" as The Sentinel assumes authority to state, but for the sole purpose of giving the people an opportunity to find how I stand on questions of public interest.

The farmers are very busy preparing to reap a large cotton crop this year in spite of the boll weevil.

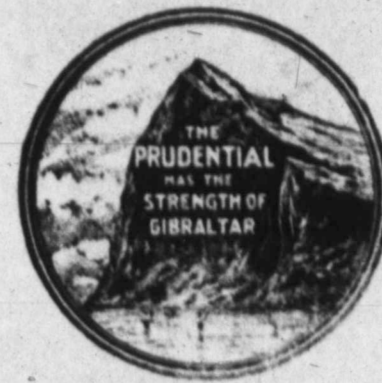
