GALA DAY AT CUSHING.

Saturday.

About the biggest day in the history of Cushing was the Fourth of July celebration held there last Saturday. celebration was given in honor to the Glorious Fourth, our Nations greatest holiday. At an early hour, even before Old Sol had peeped from behind the Eastern horizon, the crowd began to pour into Cushing, the first arrivals being a solid train load from Nacogdoches. Then came the stream of vehicles, people on horseback and on toot, until the crowd numbered at least five thousand souls.

Five Thousand People Were There It Was Taken From the Ruins of a Masonic Lodge.

Williams at Cushing, having recently been brought there from the premises of out to The Sentinel man last Saturday and citizens of Cushing who are familiar with its history say that after Stone wall Lodge went down the old building was given to negroes for a church and was torn down and moved over near Linn Flat. The stone was not disturbed for many years, being left in its position at the Northeast corner of the building. It is made in two parts, first a large stone some two feet square by about sixteen inches in thickness, with a cavity in the center of the top side for the repository of such things as are usually deposited in a Masonic corner stone. The other part is a cap stone, made to cover the first after receiving its deposits. one seems to know what became of its contents after the building was torn down and moved away, and the writer was unable to learn whether the lodge was suspended or consolidated with some other lodge. If the former contents of this stone could be found the exact date of the founding of Stonewall Lodge and the erection of the old building could be ascertained. Who can throw any light on the

It he wants to vote for John Smith for tax assessor, then he must put on his specks, take his pencil and mark out all the other names for that office, and so on clear through the ticket. There are four candidates for attorney general. The voter must make up his mind as to the one he wants, and mark out the names of the others. Every fellow who expects to vote in the coming primary, must have his poll tax receipt and a pencil, and if his eyes are not good he must have his spectacles right there. For the first time in the history of our country, every fellow will have to do his own voting. It is mighty easy to vote after one earns, and there are no difficulties in the world about learning. And the citizen who has not enough pride to learn how, and then vote, is an incompetent citizen and not worthy of the liberty he enjoys. In cases where the voter cannot or does not want to make out his own ticket the law provides that an officer of the election may make it out for him at his request.
