A telegram from Marshall received this afternoon announces that Rev. W. W. Watts, who has held the pastorate of the M. E. church of this city the past four years, has been assigned to Marlin, and that Rev. J. I. McClure, who has been pastor of the Methodist church at Empson for several years, has been appointed to succeed Bro. Watts here. Rev. 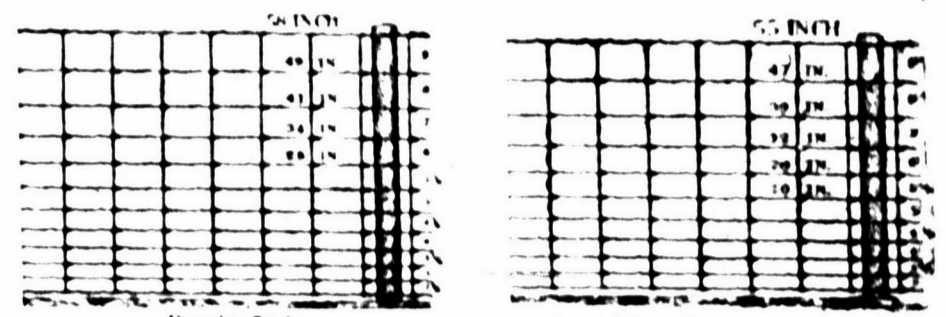

A number of Southern cities are planning to issue an invitation to President Roosevelt to visit the South at an early date. Atlanta, Mobile, New Orleans and Knoxville are taking part in the matter.

Since the gamblers were run out of El Paso, the banks there report that there has been a marked increase in the number of accounts opened by small depositors. These deposits formerly went to the faro banks.

The most valuable insurance thus far appraised by a jury in this country was a New Yorker whose widow the other day got a verdict for \$400,000 damages against an electric light company for killing him by an electric shock through its carelessness.

The census bureau yesterday issued a report by states and territories of the quantity of cotton ginned from the growth of 1904 up to November 14, showing that 20,011 ginneries had been operated this season up to that time, and that these had ginned 9,906,057 running bales.

The educated classes of Mississippi are hardly proud of their present governor, the notorious Vardaman. In answer to a courteous telegram from President Francis of the World's Fair stating that President Roosevelt had greatly admired the Mississippi building at the fair, Vardaman sent a coarse reply worthy of an ill bred boor.

A CONFIDENTIAL veteran in Waco the other day committed forgery in order to get a Mexican war pension. It is hard to believe. Confederate veterans as a class are the most law abiding men in this country, and we never before heard of one of them stooping to crime or even questionable practices to get a pension.

The managers of the National boll weevil convention soon to meet in Shreveport invited Governor Vardaman of Mississippi to be present as permanent chairman, but now there is a movement on foot to recall the invitation because of Vardaman's coarse, smart-aleck dispatch to President Francis of the World's Fair which was almost an insult to President Roosevelt.

It is nonsense for the South to be holding an active grudge against Roosevelt now that the campaign is over and he has shown a marked disposition to extend us a friendly hand. It is certain that we can do him no harm even if we wanted to, and it is equally certain that he can do us a great deal of harm and will be tempted to do so if we let the boor governor of Mississippi do our talking for us.

NO MORE INJUNCTIONS.

No more injunctions to restrain Commissioners of Courts in Texas from increasing returns and publishing notices of the result of a local option election is required by the state, says the Supreme court of Texas in refusing a writ of error in the Orange county prohibition contest in which the appellants sought to have the election declared void and requested an injunction restraining the enforcement of the result of the elections until the courts finally decide the contest. Justice Williams rendered the decision as follows:

After a very mature and careful consideration of the application we are of the opinion, for the reasons given in the opinion of Associate Justice Gill, that the Court of Civil Appeals reached the correct conclusion, and that an injunction does not lie to restrain the Commissioners' Court from canvassing the returns and publishing the notice of the result of a local option election as required by the statute. The reasons may be summed up in the conclusion that there is in the performance of these statutory duties no invasion, in a legal sense, of the property rights of the complainant as licensed liquor dealers, whether the election is open to attack in other ways or not. These reasons are elaborated in the clear and able opinion, referred to, and further discussion here would only involve the statement of additional or perhaps the same argument in different form tending to the same conclusion. We are satisfied, both upon principle and authority, of the correctness of the views which prevailed in the Court of Civil Appeals, and therefore refuse the application for writ of error.

The automatic cotton picker has arrived. A few days ago it was tested on a plantation south of Montgomery, Ala., in the presence of witnesses and was pronounced a success. It picked 3000 pounds a day but required five men to handle it.

The President has appointed Stonewall Jackson Christian of Georgia a grandson of Stonewall Jackson, to a cadet ship at West Point. A nice thing for Teddy to do and a wise one also, for that Jackson blood is mighty good fluid to keep circulating in army veins.

The United States army authorities have adopted the Southern view of the question and will not tolerate the marriage of white soldiers with negro women. One of them who recently made such a marriage at Fort Mott, N. J. has been dishonorably discharged from the army.

Gen. Joe Wheeler passed through Texas yesterday on his way to Mexico to show President Diaz a newly invented magazine rifle, which is said to be free from recoil and which makes a most admirable arm for the soldier. This rifle embodies the new rapid fire and magazine fea-

tures of the most modern weapons and which are inventions only of the last few years. It is more than likely that the Mexican government may give a trial order of the new rifle.

A new use has been found for the hobo, but not a very noble one. The Southern Pacific in Texas is employing him in the capacity of spotter for freight train crews and the train men now think they see in every weary Willie a spy in the hire of that company.

Abie Muckley has caught on in Sour Lake. Under the influence of his preaching a prominent saloon man has offered his business for sale, and is going over to the Christian side. Many other notable changes for the better have been made among the sinners there by earnest little Abe.

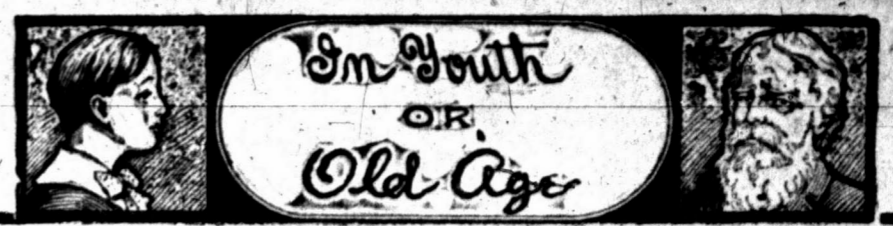
The Orange saloon men beaten by all the courts in Texas in their fight against prohibition, say they will die in the last ditch and carry their case to the supreme court of the United States. They take no stock in the maxim that the voice of the people is the voice of God, but it's a sound maxim, nevertheless, and wins out every time in the long run.

MAN-KILLING statistics carefully compiled show that in a period of profound peace more people are killed annually in the United States than in all the rest of the world combined. Well does the Galveston News say that this is the main issue in the politics of this country although the politicians and many of the people may prefer to evade it. The same paper says in the same connection: "If the News were called upon to suggest some change by which the laws might be magnified and our blood record rendered more tolerable, it would urge that we make hereafter not more than one law where we have been making at least a dozen; that we enforce at least a dozen laws where we have not been enforcing more than one; that we leave off the habit of sending brilliant young men to legislative bodies to be educated in the practice of oratory and otherwise trained as standing candidates; and it might have a word of advice to give to many over-generous traitors who have permitted themselves to be sadly misused a thousand times over in the court houses. But it is not the purpose to go deeply into either the cause, the disease or the remedy. It is a broad, deep and difficult trouble. To some the figures presented are utterly discouraging—appalling. There is no reason why we should be discouraged or appalled. The best thing for a patriotic American citizen to do is to recognize the most serious of all our weaknesses and set about doing his duty in the premises. That duty confronts him in his home, in his private life, at the ballot box, in the jury box, on the witness stand. He will not go far amiss if he holds out for fewer laws, wiser laws and prompt and vigorous enforcement of all the laws."

The Texas Liquor Dealer says that there has passed through the express office at Tyler \$79,000 worth of liquor since January 1st 1907. Granting the statement to be true prohibition saves to the drinkers during that time \$158,000 and the useful hours of trade were benefited by this saving to the drinkers. Anybody knows that liquor by the drink costs three times as much as it does by the gallon. This being true, if there had been open saloons in Tyler, these same drinkers who used \$79,000 worth of red liquor for the given time would have used for the same time \$237,000. So prohibition pays the drinker and increases the trade in useful lines, and business men see it that way and will be slow to vote against prohibition.—Greenville Banner.

Henry Fuller, formerly of this city and later editor and proprietor of the Huntington Enterprise, is now in Beaumont doing the oil, rice and lumber writing for the Beaumont Journal. He will be assigned the work of reporting the legislature for the Journal, and after that body adjourns will probably go to New Orleans where he has a tempting offer from the Times Democrat. Fuller has climbed high up the ladder as a reporter on the leading dailies of Texas and his Nacogdoches friends will be glad to learn that he now stands among the foremost in his profession. His ability as a writer and newspaper reporter was demonstrated years ago in his connection with the Nacogdoches papers, where he made a reputation and laid the foundation for his success in this line of work.

A bad boy at Temple robbed a chewing gum slot machine and was caught. He called up the county judge at Belton by phone and confessed his guilt. The judge, without taking the receiver from his ear, sentenced the lad to thirty days imprisonment in the county jail. Then the judge called up the sheriff and instructed him to escort the prisoner to the bastille, and in less than two hours the young offender was serving his sentence. This sounds good, but let us suppose a little. Suppose the criminal had been a man of wealth, or wealthy connections—and also suppose that he had stolen ten thousand dollars. Would the criminal have been peeping through the bars at the present writing? Not much. He would have secured at least two continuances, giving time to get some of the prosecuting witnesses out of the country. At the trial possibly he would have been given five years, but a new trial would have been obtained by his attorneys. Next time the sentence would have been cut down to two years, and the whole thing would have been reversed by a higher court. If all law violators were triendless boys justice might sit enthroned, but when a wealthy, influential criminal is to be dealt with, a farce comedy is generally rendered in the court house.—Honey Grove Signal.

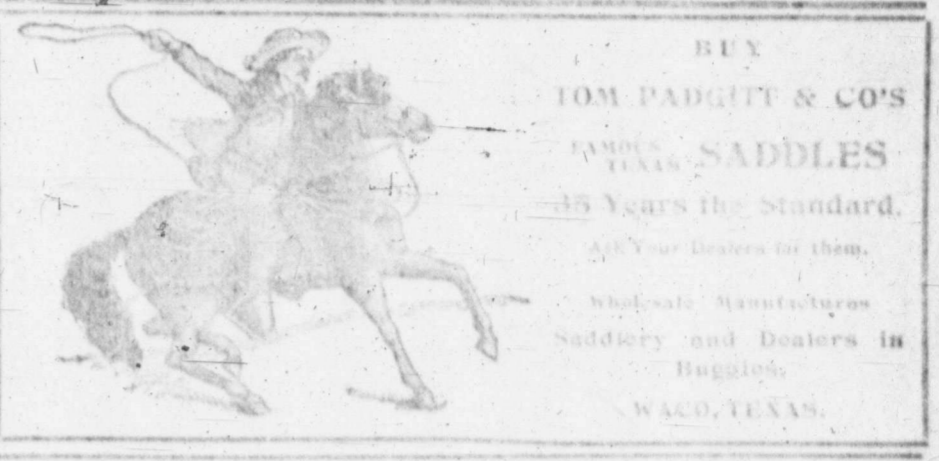

BROWN SAYS HOLD COTTON.

New Orleans, La., Dec. 5. —W. P. Brown, the cotton king, has issued an address over his signature as follows: "To the Planters, Merchants, and Bankers of the South: Cotton has declined to a point below the cost of production. Are you going to sell at present prices, or hold until you can get the market value for the balance of your holdings? The decline is unwarranted. To be conservative I will say that the balance of this crop could bring at least 10c at the ports and, according to my judgment, the only way to obtain an advance is for the planter to keep his cotton on his plantation until the actual demand is sufficient to enable buyers to pay the proper value for the stuff. The merchants who are carrying cotton should not force what they have on the market, but stand firm and demand higher prices or not sell. The banks all over the South should stand by the merchants and planters and not force them to sell their cotton at present prices, which they all know is below the cost of production. These prices mean ruin to the South. It affects every branch of trade, and the only thing to do is for all men that are interested in any manner, shape or form to stand together. For

the sake of argument admit that the crop is 12,000,000 bales (though I do not believe it is,) the consumption at these prices will be at least 11,500,000 bales, and the other 500,000 bales will be a small quantity to go into mill reserves. The spinners of American cotton throughout the world should at least add this year to their depleted stocks 500,000 to 1,000,000 bales. "The South went broke raising cotton at 5 1/2c and 6c per pound in 1897-98, and during that period everything was cheap as well as cotton and the cost of raising cotton was small as compared to the present crop, which is the most expensive one ever grown. It would pay the farmers to keep still and not sell a bale of this crop until they get above 10c and reduce their acreage another season at least 15 per cent and instead of raising another bumper crop, raise only enough to supply the world. The last crop was only 10,000,000 bales, and it brought more money than any crop ever raised—much more than this crop will bring unless the balance left brings much higher prices than those ruling now. With cotton at 7 1/2-2c at the ports, cotton plantations are worth today just about half what they were at this time last year. Now every man that is interested in the South, regardless of the character of his business, should be interested in keeping up the price of cotton. Cotton is one of the few things that the world

must have and the South has a monopoly on the territory where it can be grown. Yet they won't take advantage of the situation. There are so many things that can be raised in the South profitably, why not turn your attention to other things and raise less cotton? We have been told that we needed a 12,000,000-bale crop this year, and now that you have raised one close to that figure they say you must sell it at a giveaway price. Stand together, both merchants, farmers and bankers, and you will come out all right, but if you throw your holdings on the market you may rest assured that the spinner will buy it just as low as he possibly can, and I don't blame him for doing so. The spinners of the world at this time are forcing the market down, so are the bear speculators. Every spinner in the world, with a few exceptions, is doing the best business in the history of the trade. They can afford to pay from 9c to 10c per pound and make a good profit at the present prices goods are bringing. The consuming world is in a position financially to pay higher prices today than they have been for a great many years. Low-priced cotton really ought to be a thing of the past. Look at the prices of wheat and corn. We have raised big crops all over the world, with the exception of this year's wheat crop, yet prices are double what they were a few years ago. "A 12,000,000 bale crop is

worth 10c and that ought to be the low price for a great many years to come and it rests with the producer to say whether or not he will raise more than the requirements of the world and become a pauper, or whether he will raise a moderate crop each season and grow rich. "Hold firm, stand together and don't give your cotton away at present prices." THERE is one kind of peonage for the South and another kind for the North and the Associated Press gives us an instance of the latter just reported from Denver, Colorado, as follows: "Thomas Porter, an employe of the Union Pacific railroad in court this morning, asked to be freed from peonage and involuntary servitude, to which he has been subjected by the Star Loan company. Porter complains that because he borrowed \$60 in 1900 on which he has paid back \$470, he has been forced to assign his wages for life and, according to his computations, he will never become cleared of that loan of \$60. Porter, seeing that he was going deeper into the mire, went into the bankruptcy court. The claims of the Star Loan company against him were scheduled as a portion of his liabilities. On August 18 he secured his discharge, absolved from all of his debts. The loan company did not accept this discharge and as soon as another month's salary was coming to Porter, the life assignment was filed with

the railroad company and the money was paid into court by the employer. The loan company avers that Porter still owes it \$142." THE much advertised governor of Mississippi has relieved the embarrassment of the projectors of the approaching inter-state boll weevil convention in Shreveport by declining the invitation to act as chairman of that convention, a place tendered him before he sent that famous telegram to the president of the World's Fair. The new well is being sunk by the side of the one recently abandoned on account of the twisting of a pipe, which occurred just as a strong gas pocket had been reached. Several strata of oil have been passed in the new well but the company is determined to find "deep oil" if it exists in the Nacogdoches oil field, which is not doubted.

CONGRESS convened yesterday in Washington City.

ON December 4th, the net deficit in the State treasury at Austin was \$643,714.

JUDGE REAGAN has just donated to the library of the State University 2500 volumes of historic interest.

IN Texas there is a total prohibition of the sale of liquor in 101 counties and partial prohibition in 57 counties.

PANOLA county will have another prohibition election on the 10th instant. The county has been dry for two years.

JOE PARKS is moving the plant of the old Bastrop Vidette to San Augustine and will bring out the first issue of a new paper there about Dec. 8th.

THE report of State Revenue Agent Bell for the year ending Aug. 31st just submitted puts the assessed value of Texas property at \$1,077,000,000.

FEDERAL JUDGE BRYANT of this state has decided that it is no violation of the local option law to take orders for liquor for a firm whose place of business is outside the territory in which the sale of liquor is prohibited.

THE military genius of General Miles is not to be lost to his country after all though the age limit has put him out of the army. The new governor of Massachusetts, Douglas, the shoe man, has just appointed him adjutant general on his staff.

IN the estimate of the cotton crop for the current year by the Department of Agriculture, Texas is put down for 2,992,300 bales. The total for the South is 12,162,700 bales and the bottom dropped out when these figures were made public.

THE game law of Arkansas has a despotic provision in it which says that it shall be unlawful for any person who is a non resident of the state of Arkansas to shoot, hunt, fish or trap in that state at any season of the year and the supreme court has just held it is unconstitutional.

THEY manage their penitentiary system so well in Louisiana that this year it has not only been self supporting but has cleared \$60,000. The State has two penal farms where corn, cotton and sugar are raised and comparatively few of the convicts are kept in the walls at Baton Rouge.

IT is stated in St. Louis that a contract for the sale of eleven of the big exhibit pafaces, stock barns, festival hall, the colonnade of States, palyllions, aerodrome, bank, intramural railway, hospital, press building, police and fire stations, with other World's Fair structures that cost \$15,000,000, will be signed this week with a Chicago wrecking company for \$386,000.

THE PROBABLE COST

It takes a whole lot of money to run the State government of Texas and the approaching legislature will have to appropriate by the millions for that purpose. The Galveston News has taken the trouble to get up some interesting figures on the subject as follows:

The estimates of the appropriations said to be necessary for the support of the State government for the two-year term, ending Aug. 31, 1907, aggregate \$8,666,096. That sum alone seems large; but it isn't all, for the estimates cover only such items as usually are cared for in the general appropriation bill. Besides them, there will be something like \$400,000 to \$500,000 of appropriation deficiencies, and about \$160,000 legislative expenses, for both of which items appropriations must be made. These bring the total up to \$9,126,096.

Still even this is not all, for the estimates do not cover the appropriations which will be proposed for the establishment of new institutions of various kinds, nor the amount which will be asked for various schemes. It is evident that the total of demands for new appropriations will be in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000. The special requests, it seems, will not be tempered with modesty. Notwithstanding the Legislature will be confronted with the very urgent demand to provide for a deficiency of \$1,000,000 or more in the general revenue account. Thus the aggregate demand is about \$11,000,000, and the aggregate of estimated revenues about \$6,400,000.

Of course the Legislature need not, and probably will not, grant all the demands for special appropriations, and it will probably trim down the regular estimates also. These latter are considerably in excess of the appropriations made by the Twenty-Eighth Legislature.

COTTON dropped seven dollars a bale last week, a most disastrous break caused by the government's estimate of the crop which puts it at 12,162,000 bales. We are mighty thankful that we didn't advise farmers to hold for higher prices at the beginning of the season. The fact seems to be that the price of cotton from day to day is beyond human calculations and one man's guessing is worth about as much as another's.

C. M. COMPTON, state lecturer, on the growth of the Farmers' Union: "The union has increased 50,000 in Texas since the annual meeting in Fort Worth, and in this state now numbers 150,000. Indian Territory has organized with upward of 50,000. Oklahoma has not yet quite reached the necessary 50,000 for a state or a territorial union. The remainder of our membership is composed of local unions in Arkansas and other states which are under the jurisdiction of Texas until they get strong enough to organize state unions of their own."

THE quicker the South gets rid of such men as Vardaman, of Mississippi, Tillman, of South Carolina, Montague of Virginia and Aycock of North Carolina, the better it will be, for they are not representative of the southern sentiment or of southern culture.—Beaumont Enterprise.

THE Enterprise hes undoubtedly voiced the best sentiment of the South in its reference to Vardaman but, it has been most unfortunate in coupling his name with those of Tillman of South Carolina, Montague of Virginia, and Aycock of North Carolina. Tillman is in all things the immeasurable superior of Vardaman, and while it must be admitted that his temper sometimes gets the best of him and in his choleric moments he says unwise things, yet his shining virtues, his solid abilities, his stern Jacksonian courage, manliness and rugged simplicity of character make us condone his faults of temper and wish we had more like him in this meretricious age. And as for Governors Montague of Virginia, and Aycock of North Carolina, the Enterprise has been, if possible, more unjust in its reference. Each of those two men is the antithesis of Vardaman, and in culture, fine breeding, broad, patriotic views and complete emancipation from bigoted and dwarfing provincialism they stand in the very front rank of the best southern classes, and it is the very refinement of cruelty and injustice to class them with a coarse, cheap gasconading bigot like Vardaman.

THAT loathsome humbug "Divine Healer Schrader" is down in Southwest Texas playing the natives for suckers. The chain gang would be a good discipline for such an unblushing fraud as he is.

NACOGDOCHES pulled off a whole week of Carnival, day and night without one instance of rowdiness or disorderly conduct, not even on Saturday night after the jug train arrived. It is a noteworthy triumph of law and order.

SOMETIMES the verdicts of Texas juries disgust the trial judges beyond endurance and a recent instance comes from Beaumont. John P. Withers, an ex-bank president, charged with violating the Federal banking laws, was acquitted in that city last Saturday after a long trial and Judge Bryant of the Federal court trying the case, after the verdict was received, sternly said: "The persons composing the jury in the Withers case are discharged as I no longer desire their services."

THE old prejudice between town and country is gradually passing away, like mist before the rising sun. City people are buying farms and nearly every first class merchant and lawyer in Denton either owns a farm or contemplates buying one. At this rate we shall ere long all be farmers, with bank accounts and debts paid. Town people are beginning to look like country people and country people like town people. We are imitating each other, and if the assimilation continues we shall soon be unable to tell which from other.—Denton Monitor.

How Oil Was First Found in Nacogdoches County.

Oil Springs in Nacogdoches county, has the distinction of being one among a small number of springs that used to attract attention in pioneer days. One day while hunting deer in the vast pine woods sixteen miles southeast of Nacogdoches and ten miles south of Melrose, where he lived, Capt. L. T. Barrett stopped to noon at a clear spring that bubbled out of the sandy soil and meandered away among the ferns. Having finished his dinner he sat gazing at the water, when suddenly his attention was attracted to peculiar looking bubbles that would rise to the surface, burst and drift away. These bubbles left a bluish tinge on the water and Capt. Barrett fell to investigating. Securing a stick he vigorously punched the oozy mud at the bottom of the spring and was surprised to see immense quantities of oil come to the surface. He carried some of it to Melrose and had it examined by Prof. Huntington, a northern man and principal of the Melrose high school. He at once pronounced it lubricating oil of a high grade. Capt. Barrett carried a sample of the oil as well as the soil in which it occurred to Pennsylvania and had it analyzed by State Chemist Kari. The analysis was so satisfactory that Dr. Karl came all the way to Texas and spent several months in personal investigation. Arrangements were made to put down a well but the civil war came on and put an end to efforts in this direction.

In the meantime, Oil Spring, as it came to be called, was becoming famous as a watering place and health resort. People from far and near would come there, invalids in the summer, spend a few weeks drinking the oily water and return home in perfect health.

The method of collecting the oil was to take a pole and agitate the bottom of the spring and dip the oil off with a pine top as it came to the surface. People would thus gather it, take it home and mix it with their drinking water. At last one fellow conceived the idea of putting the oil up in small bottles, labeled as some kind of wonderful healing oil and sell it. Accordingly he did so and traveled with a partner through Kentucky and Tennessee. The sales were immense and finally the supply gave out. A barrel was at once ordered from Nacogdoches, but the agent who shipped it forgot to rub the name of the oil off the head of the barrel and the people in Kentucky at the place where the fake was being perpetrated got on to it by finding the barrel at the depot. In the meantime the fellow who was selling the oil heard of what was going on and got out of town, just in time to prevent the people from giving him a good coat of tar and feathers. He is now a drummer for a Houston grocery company and frequently laughs about his Nacogdoches oil venture.—Beaumont Journal.

Wants to be Recognized.
An Austin dispatch of Dec. 3rd, says: "Henry Marsh of Tyler, attorney, and W. C. Bay, president of the Nacogdoches & Southeastern Railway Company, were here today before the Railroad Commission in support of an application to have the road recognized as a bona fide company entitled to rates, etc., and also that the six miles in operation be valued preparatory to an application for

bonds. The road runs six miles southeast from Nacogdoches and is to be extended some thirty miles in the same direction, and possibly further.

Two Much Sixshooter.

The Post sincerely hopes that the legislature at the approaching session will pass stringent laws to suppress the six-hooter habit in Texas. It is quite apparent that all existing laws are totally inadequate to prevent pistol toting. It would be an unmitigated blessing if every sixshooter in the State were sunk in the gulf and laws were enacted to prevent the sale of them within the State limits.

Texas has outgrown the sixshooter. It has also suffered enough because of its unrestricted use. The Post does not assume to say just what measures are necessary to suppress it, but if the law can regulate the sale of poisons, it ought to be equal to regulating the sale of sixshooters.

The sale of poison was made the subject of legislation because some unfortunate people became addicted to the use of drugs, while others in moments of despondency purchased with suicidal intent. The sixshooter has found in Texas many more victims than all poison combined. Many unwilling victims at that.

It seems to The Post, however, that if laws are passed regulating the sale of such weapons or preventing their sale altogether, much good will be accomplished. The question is of great importance to Texas. Her good name as well as the lives of people demand that something be done to stop the almost indiscriminate use of the gun.

Men are going to have quarrels, but this thing of whipping out a gun and pumping ing lead into somebody every time a difficulty arises is as unnecessary as it is uncivilized.—Houston Post.

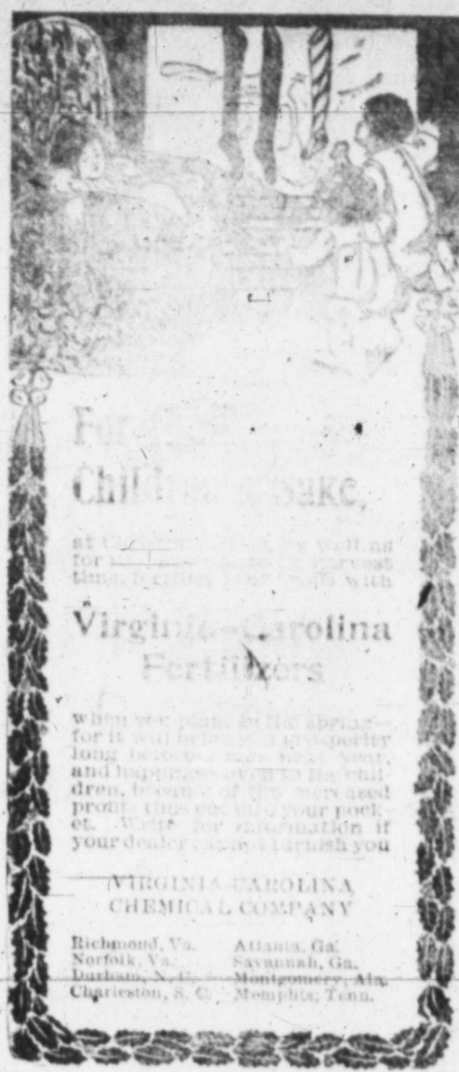

As to Notaries Public.

To whom it may concern: The representative to the legislature has nothing to do with the appointing of notaries public except that he may furnish a list with his recommendation to the State Senator in whose district the representative district may be situated. There is a large list of notaries in Nacogdoches county—too many, in fact. Heretofore it has been the custom to re-appoint the old list with additions made from new applications and it frequently occurs that many appointees do not qualify. At the next session of the legislature I would prefer to recommend none who do not make formal application, so there may be no mistakes in names nor any appointed who will not qualify. There is very little in the office, I know; for I have tried it. It costs about ten dollars to qualify, buy a seal and get a sufficient supply of books and stationery to fill the office, and I would advise those who want the appointment for the pay there is in it that, according to my experience, it is a poor thing. I have received \$61.00 for four years service, notwithstanding I have done a good deal of advertising and have offered to go to the "jumping off place" if necessary to do notary work.

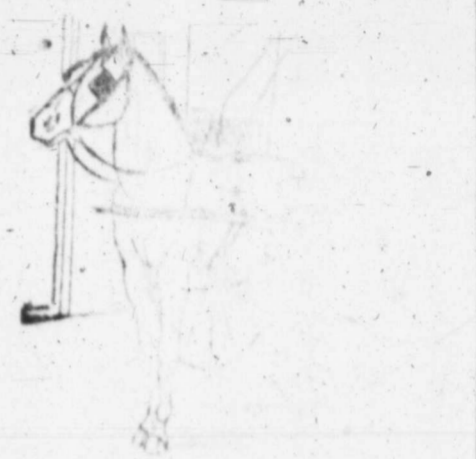
