BOND ISSUE TURNED DOWN.

Attorney General Says Law Not Complied With.

There will be no issue of bonds for waterworks and sewerage purposes by the city of Nacogdoches as provided for by the recent election for that purpose. The Attorney General's office in Austin, to whom all the papers in the case were referred, as required by law, before the bonds could be issued, has decided that the bonds cannot be approved for the following rea-

"1st. The city council did not fix the time and place of holding the election, as re quired by section 3 of chapter 149. Acts of the 26th Legislamayor.

"2nd. The construction of waterworks and the construction of sewers constitute two separate purposes, under Art. 486, Revised Statutes of 1895, tor which bonds may be issued. The record shows that buy seed for the twenty acres come in and pay your debt. hundred pounds, Roman nose, these two purposes were submitted and voted on as one proposition. There are numerous decisions holding that such elections are void. Where it is proposed to issue bonds Growers of Nacogdoches for different purposes, the two separate propositions must be submitted, so that the voters may vote for or against either, as they may see proper.

These reasons come in a letter just received by City Secretary Crouch from T. S. John son, assistant attorney general of Texas, and they, of course, constitute an effectual bar to any bond issue based on the recent election. as the people have declared by a decisive vote that they want waterworks and sewerage and are willing to issue bonds for that purpose, it is understood that at the next meeting of the city council the proper steps will be taken to call another election in which the law will be fully complied with and there can be no doubt of the approval of the bond issue by the attorney general, is believed that another election will bring out an even larger vote in favor of a bond issue than the last one. Revolution Imminent.



Nacogdoches County Farmers To Build Cotton Factory.

The Sentinel learns from North communities of the county held a meeting last Saturday and inaugurated a movement which it is hoped that the farmers generally throughout the county will cooperate with and which will result in large and permanent benefit to our agricultural and other interests. The farmers of Nacogdoches county want to see a cotton factory built in this city, believing as they do that the proximity of such an industry to their cotton fields will help to increase the price of the staple and will also bring a heavy addition in population to Nacogdoches which it. must of necessity give a larger and better market for all farm products as well as cotton. They realize that they would be the beneficiaries of such an enterprise to a degree that justifies them in taking the initiative in the matter; and as the construction of the oil mill here made a profitable market for cotton seed, which before were selling for five or six dollars per ton, so the construction of a cotton mill would bring even larger benefits to them which justify them in the proposed move. The plan is this: There are about 2500 cotton farmers in the county, and of this number it is believed that fully 1500 will each contribute a bale of cotton next year to the building bought and paid the highest of a cotton factory in Nacogdoches.
